




Dear readers, please "really" look at all the inspired details. You will be amazed. This issue also offers you accessories from bags to clutches and sandals to flats in our hubbub section.







MICA

Busy mom, volunteer and businesswoman makes promoting children's literacy a priority

y father always told my sisters and me that we could pursue any educational degree we wanted, the choice was entirely ours, so long as we ended up with a doctorate," Mica Strother said in a recent interview. She was born in Little Rock and raised in Mountain Home.

"I have two wonderful parents, Lane and Judy Strother, both of whom are practicing attorneys in Mountain Home. I have two sisters, Jodi Strother, an attorney in Mountain Home, and Megan Strother, a neuroradiologist at Vanderbilt Medical Center in Nashville, Tenn.," she said. "I kept my maiden name when I married—my sisters did as well. My parents raised us to be feminists!"

She graduated in 1994 from Ouachita Baptist University with a bachelor's degree in history. In 1999 she graduated from UALR William H. Bowen School of Law with a Juris Doctorate.

Since graduating from college in 1994, she worked in some aspect of politics, law, or government.

"When I got out of college with my history degree and no teaching hours, I found that there weren't a lot of employers looking for history buffs! I started volunteering on Jim Guy Tucker's campaign for Governor and caught the political bug. I worked for him until 1996 when I went to law school," she said.

It was during those years working for Governor Tucker that she got to know Mike Beebe and Morril Harriman. "Both were state senators at the time and both are now my bosses – Morril is the chief of staff at the Governor's office."

She is currently the finance director for the Mike Beebe for Governor campaign, where she is directing the fundraising operation for his re-election, on leave of absence from the Governor's office, where she worked for the past three years as Director of Appointments to Boards and Commissions. She has worked for Mike Beebe since 2002 when he ran for Attorney General and she was a consultant on his campaign. From there she went with him to the Attorney General's office, then to his campaign for Governor and to the Governor's Office.

"I love getting to know and work with people all across the state," she said.

"Because of my years working with Governor Beebe, there isn't a county in Arkansas where I don't know someone I could call for help if I had a flat on the side of

When and how did you become interested in fashion? I have always

loved clothes and fashion! I can remember as far back as the third grade being upset because my mom wouldn't buy me a crayon belt – these were belts in all colors that had a buckle that looked like a crayon. They were the fad among my friends! I think they cost around \$5 at the time and my mother told me we couldn't afford it. Not understanding budgeting, I thought we literally didn't have \$5. When I was in the sixth grade, my parents implemented a 'clothing budget' for my sisters and me. It started in August of each year and went for a full year. We were each given a certain amount of money to spend on our wardrobe. Everything we bought from shoes and socks to coats and dresses - had to come out of that amount and was recorded in a ledger book. If we ran out of money in the first six months we were just out of luck for any more new clothes that year. But if we had money left over at the end of the following July, my parents would write us a check. There wasn't one year that I had money left over! But it taught me to plan carefully and buy the things that I loved.

Where's your favorite place in Little Rock to shop for clothes and

accessories? I shop everywhere. Little Rock has some wonderful boutiques for clothes, shoes, and accessories, but I also love Dillard's, Banana Republic and other chain stores.

ucky for Strother, her husband, Greg Hale, understands her busy days. He is a political consultant with the Markham Group in Little Rock and runs a cattle farm in Sevier County, where he was raised. He has worked on four presidential campaigns and multiple campaigns in foreign countries, but he enjoys most the time spent on the back of his horse in DeQueen.

Strother has a son, Eli, almost eightyears-old, who attends second grade at Forest Park Elementary.

"My days are busy," she says. "I work, I hang out with my husband and son, I exercise, I'm involved with my church... and when I run out of something to do, I start a new project around the house. I'm

fortunate to begin and end each day with the ones I love the most in the world – my family!"

It is no surprise that Strother is involved with her son's school and is also serving on the board of Reach Out and Read, a nonprofit that focuses on childhood literacy.


"The unique thing about ROR is that books are distributed to children, from ages six months to five years, at their pediatric check-ups. Parents trust pediatricians, and the gift of a book by their pediatrician allows them an opportunity to talk about the importance of reading with their child!"

"Early exposure to reading for children is critical. Reading provides such a wonderful opportunity to spend time with your child. Every night I put Eli to bed we read together. I have books memorized because we read them over and over again so many times. Now we read chapter books together. Eli is such a great reader now... but still he loves for me to read to him. He and I both love the time we spend together engrossed in books," she said.

A great way for people to get involved is through hosting Book Bashes in their homes, according to Strother. At Book Bashes people are asked to bring board books and donations to buy books.

If you had to wear one thing for the rest of your life, what would it be?


Jeans, boots, and a great top.

HIGH SPIRITS

Cranford helps raise funds to "care for and beautify" Mount Holly Cemetery

ome may think it strange and a bit morbid to picnic in a cemetery, but to Frances
Cranford and many other locals, it's anything but weird. The Pine Bluff native, former
Miss Arkansas and future resident of Mount
Holly, has served on the board of the Mount
Holly Cemetery Association for eight years, and is
committed to maintaining one of Little Rock's greatest treasures and the final resting place of numerous Arkansas notables.

Built in 1843 from land donated by Roswell Beebe and Senator Chester Ashley, Mount Holly Cemetery is the second oldest in the state and is on the National Register of Historic Places. It spans a four-square-block space between 11th and 13th and from Broadway to Gaines.

A ccording to The Encyclopedia of Arkansas, there are 11 state governors interred there, 13 state Supreme Court justices, four Confederate generals, four United States senators and 21 Little Rock mayors, as well as doctors, attorneys, prominent families and military heroes, like venerated David O. Dodd, a 17-year-old boy executed for being a "Confederate spy," and often referred to as the "Boy Martyr of the Confederacy."


Just like any antiquated structure of its size, Mount Holly Cemetery needs constant care and maintenance. That's where Cranford and the MHCA step in. Cranford says the ladies' Mount Holly Cemetery Association was incorporated in July 1915 to clean and preserve the grounds of Mount Holly. "They had dead trees removed, driveways cleared, unsightly vines removed from the

fence and markers straightened. Their stated goal—to 'care for and beautify' Mount Holly—has been consistently met."

But Cranford says maintaining the cemetery is a difficult and costly task, especially since it's on the National Register of Historic Places and must follow strict preservation standards. "All of the walls need repair, and now the one on Broadway is crumbling due to the snow and ice," she said. "There's always something that needs attention, from trees being damaged by storms to just the daily maintenance of the grounds. Therefore, one of our jobs is to raise money."

The association's primary fundraiser is its annual picnic, which is now in its sixth year. The theme of the picnic is "Restore in Perpetuity" and will be held from 5 to 7 p.m. Sunday, April 25, on the cemetery grounds. Tickets are \$75 per person, and the festivities will include cemetery tours, boxed suppers, musical entertainment and a silent auction. Attendees can sip on wine and Mount Holly spritzer, a refreshing mixture of wine, lemonade and fresh mint.

From "Recipes in Perpetuity" as told by Frances Cranford Dr. Isaac Folsom

Dr. Folsom was a doctor in Lonoke who was instrumental in starting the medical school and the first public clinic in Little Rock. He and Mrs. Folsom had no children, but he loved kids and equipped his office with a pet monkey, a trick dog and a parrot to entertain his young patients. When he died in 1892, he left \$20,000 to the medical school with the provision that his name appears on all the diplomas. This amount doesn't sound like much now, but it was a fortune in the early 1890s; and his wish was granted. His name still appears on the diplomas in very small letters. Folsom died in 1892 in Lonoke and is buried at Mount Holly in his private mausoleum, made of 'buttered brick.' During prohibition, the mausoleum was used as a drop-off for bootleg whiskey.

HCA also plans to unveil their new cookbook, "Recipes in Perpetuity," a project three years in the making which will include recipes as well as stories of some of the cemetery's most notable residents (see pg. 24). In addition, DVDs of the documentary "A Guided Tour of Mount Holly Cemetery," featuring Mary Worthen, the late Peg Smith and Tammie Dillon, and filmed by one of Cranford's sons, Chris, will be for sale.

Prolific and talented sisters-in-law pursue their vision

or Jamie Richardson and Kathryn Richardson, owners of Ember Boutique in the Heights, fashion is about more than just wearing and selling what's "in style;" it's about offering unique clothes that are soft and feminine, and oftentimes, handmade by them. "I think personal style should be as intuitive as possible and you should wear things because they make you feel a certain way, or act as a means for self expression," said Jamie. "I think most fashion crimes are the ones that are never attempted."

Their love of fashion isn't the only common thread they share. They're also sisters-in-law; Jamie is married to Adam Richardson, and Kathryn is married to Adam's younger brother, Cullen Richardson.

Each of the women has richly woven histories in fashion. Jamie, an El Dorado native, majored in fashion merchandising at Harding and finished her certification in fashion design with an emphasis in fashion illustration in Santa Fe. Immediately after college she began working in product development for Dillard's and later in boutique sales at Elle Ladies' Apparel and others.

Kathryn, who was born and raised in Pittsburgh, interned with Mimi Maternity in Philadelphia during college. After graduation, she accepted a position as assistant boys designer at Dillard's, Inc., before moving to Hong Kong where she says she was constantly inspired by the culture and shopping.

"The short version of the story is that Kathryn and I wanted to make a living doing what we loved," said Jamie. "We knew we had the ability and opportunity, and together we had the confidence to take a chance. We had both been creating and selling our designs at a local boutique, but wanted to maximize our production and profits."

In late 2008 their dreams came to fruition when Kathryn purchased several suitcase loads of fashion-forward clothes from Hong Kong and Jamie got a deal on an office space in west Little Rock. "We planned on setting up a modest showroom with our styles (which we constructed on-site), selling Kathryn's Hong



Kong pieces, and maybe carrying some affordable and casual styles purchased on the occasional market trip."

"Kathryn and I had several areas of focus when we opened: handmade goods, organic/green wearable products, and affordable prices," said Jamie. "We were blown away with the response towards our prices. Therefore it became our primary focus. Obviously, moving to the Heights was the best decision we've made. An unbeatable location combined with our pricing strategy (nothing over \$75 now) allows us to keep a fresh sales floor with new shipments arriving twice a week and an almost complete inventory turnover occurring monthly."

And Jamie and Kathryn (who has recently moved to Washington, D.C., but is still very much involved with Ember) maintain a section of their store devoted to their handmade items. "Most of the handmade items are very simple silhouettes with a twist, i.e. appliqués, ruffles or hand-painted accents," said Jamie. "We have to walk a fine line of indulging our creative whims and converting an item into a quick sell."

- > Any accessories that are staples for you? I wear a Patek Philippe watch and carry a wallet in my coat.
- > From who do you take your fashion cues? Luciano Barbera.
- **> Hmm...an Italian aristocrat. Do you own any clothes you can relax in? Yes, I do dress casually** on weekends usually golf clothes or a comfortable pair of jeans.

SHARP DRESSED MAN

How Wayne Ratcliff is building on Bauman's stylish reputation

n the finicky world of fashion, popularity is fleeting.

"One day you're in, and the next day you're out," as Heidi Klum, the supermodel host of Project Runway, likes to say. Remember when Jordache was in style? Iconic status is reserved for names that stick around, like Louis Vuitton, which was established in 1854.

Remarkable as Louis Vuitton's staying power has been, it's perhaps more noteworthy when a local retailer enjoys the same kind of duration, like Bauman's Men's Store has. Established by Simon Bauman in 1919, the upscale store has moved a few times throughout the years, but has always carried exclusive merchandise, even in difficult economic times.

ARKANSAS LITERARY FESTIVAL COMES TO (DOWN)TOWN



Grown-up breakfast and brunch with cool jazz

There was a time when people didn't mind standing in line for a fabulous breakfast. Bard's in the Heights was one of those places, and we miss it still. It was the perfect way to ease into a Saturday or Sunday. You could see people you knew or wanted to know, and waitresses knew your name and what you wanted to order.

hat was then. This is now. Breakfast and brunch are back, but in style and upscale.

Nancy Tesmer is known for her work at Lilly's Dim Sum, Then Some in the Market Place Shopping Center. She'd been thinking about breakfast for quite awhile. Using the party room from Lilly's as a

breakfast room was a fairly easy undertaking. When she made up her mind it was full tilt boogie. If you want eggs, bacon, hash, French toast, pancakes, waffles and biscuits, this is your place. Or if you want something a little different, this is your place.

We visited the first time around 10 a.m. on a Saturday. There were a few people standing in line, but because Tesmer suggested we

share a table with another couple at the back of the room, we did not wait. For us, sexy jazz was perfect for a quiet, lazy day. And we saw people we knew.

I ordered vegetarian hash (\$7.99), and my husband ordered the waffles (\$5.99); a safe bet. Fresh squeezed orange juice in a small glass seemed extravagant at \$3.99, but it tasted so good I didn't care. The hash arrived, and as advertised it included crisp potatoes, onions, peppers, slow cooked tomatoes and cheese. Somehow I ate every bite.

On a second Saturday visit my husband tried French toast kabob, French toast on a stick wrapped with bacon and drizzled with maple syrup (\$7). It's a little different, but it was fine. He also tasted the crispy beignets with lemon curd and whipped cream (\$8.49). No food for me, but I did manage to drink a mimosa made with that delicious, fresh-squeezed orange juice. It's served in a small flute (\$6), so watch yourself.

Jeffrey Moore, B-Side chef, has teamed up with Tesmer to create

a number of breakfast dishes that you probably haven't tasted in your regular coffee shop. I never saw a frittata on Bard's menu, but it sure looks great (\$7.99). Some dishes just have a different name, like biscuit mountain, a concoction of buttermilk biscuits, sausage and Pommes Rosti topped with a house-made sausage gravy and two pan-fried eggs (\$10.99). Figgy piggy is a glazed pork tenderloin with sweet potato hash (\$11.99). Fried chicken and waffle is just what it says, a golden boneless leg of chicken and a waffle (\$11.49). Thankfully Moore added a healthful, gorgeous fruit and yogurt parfait with homemade granola (\$6.99).

Next visit I plan to check out Lil'uns (what they call their "sides"; the main dishes are called "Big'uns"). Smoked gouda grits (\$2.99), oatmeal with brown sugar, butter and cinnamon (\$2.49), fruit plate, and Pommes Rosti (\$2.99) are just a few of the offerings.

Service was flawless. Dishes were brought out by one person, and coffee was added by someone else. Tesmer seemed to visit with everyone. Watching the wait staff was like watching water ballet, smooth and effortless. The décor is peaceful. Art decorates the soft yellow walls of the square room. Ah, just like we wanted.

A DAY IN LITTLE ROCK

— SOCIAL GRACES –

rs. Butts was either Cool Hand Luke or as stone deaf as advertised. I had just introduced myself and my dance partner as Donald Duck and Minnie Mouse, and she didn't miss a beat.

It was the winter of 1978 or '79, and Little Rock Junior Cotillion still reigned supreme from the ballroom of

the venerable old Grady Manning Hotel, soon to be razed with the Hotel Marion to make way for the Excelsior.

The equally venerable and perhaps equally old Mrs. Roger G. Butts — I'm not convinced Mrs. Roger G. wasn't actually her first name — founded the Junior Cotillion in 1948 and was, by then, a legend among the "established" families of Little Rock who wished to bestow upon their offspring the social graces that were, frankly, lacking at Star Systems and Godfather's. (As eighth-graders, we hadn't yet graduated to the big leagues of Murray Park. For those familiar with the movie "Dazed and Confused," Murray of the late '70s and early '80s was Little Rock's Moon Tower.)

Junior Cotillion was what the "in" crowd from the Heights and Pleasant Valley did (Chenal! didn't exist yet; back then it was simply lonely, old Shinall Mountain).

Not that my family was "established," nor I an "in" kid, by any means. But my mom went through Cotillion back in the day, and therefore, I had no choice.

Mostly though, whatever sliver of social legitimacy I hoped to attain — and therefore avoid banishment to the realm of boys who loved "Dungeons & Dragons" and girls who loved horses, and I was teetering as it was — rested on my participation in Cotillion.

By my eighth-grade year — year three in Cotillion regimen

— Mrs. Butts (Roger G.) had been directing the show for a while, and was, well, showing her age. But she was doing so with much grace. Mrs. Butts didn't lead the dance instruction anymore; she simply presided.

And presiding she was that fateful night. Waiting in line to pay respects to Mrs. Butts at the end of the night, armin-arm with the poor girl to whom I'd been partnered for the last dance, my

job was to formally introduce us and say good night.

Afterward it would be time to gather friends with whom I'd carpooled, get dropped off at Shakey's, and adorned in church clothes that didn't quite fit, engage in classic prepubescent ritualism — eat pizza (and at Shakey's, watch 'em make it), play what video games were around in the late '70s, and mostly, pretend like you belonged.

But first, the reception line featuring Mrs. Butts (Roger G.) awaited. And tell her I did. Although it came out, "Good evening. I'm Donald Duck, and this is my escort, Minnie Mouse." Or something very close to that. But nod and smile, she did. And we moved on.

I don't remember the reaction of the hapless girl who got pulled into this silliness, but I do seem to recall she disappeared fairly quickly once we got through the line. \$\sigma\$
