THE JULY ISSUE OF THE *JOURNAL* IS ALWAYS DEDICATED TO THE YOUTH IN THE AMERICAN Quarter Horse industry – those horse-crazy kids whose parents, grandparents, extended family members and 4-H leaders haul them to horse shows, expos and movies, and indulge their love of Breyer models, horse posters and books, and watching “The Black Stallion” for the 35th time (hey, it’s way better than any purple dinosaur video).

When we compiled our story ideas for this issue, we did it keeping in mind that the youth of this Association are also the future of AQHA. What’s more, when you look at the list of articles, there’s almost a “6-degrees of separation” string going through them.

We really wanted to talk-up the youth initiative, which began with AQHA Past President Peter J. Cofrancesco III of Sparta, New Jersey. I think of Peter as AQHA’s “all-around member” – he started in AQHA showing horses as a kid, got involved in AJQHA (now AQHYA), was president of AJQHA, continued on to show as an amateur, was elected to the AQHA Executive Committee and became the first AJQHA president to also serve as AQHA president. He has been the entire route, and he’s worried that there aren’t that many kids following in his footsteps. So, we’re developing a youth initiative that will open more doors for horse-crazy kids to get involved with horses.

And how about the coincidence of the 2011-12 AQHYA president – Abigail Pait – being from the same state and horse farm as Peter? Abigail’s dad, AQHA Professional Horseman Jeffrey Pait, trains for the Cofrancesco family, so it’s no surprise that Abigail had a good footing in the horse industry. She’s also had a good role model in Peter and a number of other AQHA Professional horsemen, judges and leaders.

Now that Abigail’s high school career is complete, where is she going to further her education? We talked to Abigail and Laney Hixson of Atlanta about their college plans and how they chose the colleges they’ll be attending and the collegiate equestrian teams for which they’ll be competing.

Speaking of collegiate equestrian teams, we’ve got a feature on the National Collegiate Equestrian Association’s horses of the year. 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Cool, Clear Water

THE HORSE'S MOST VITAL NUTRIENT IS WATER. An adult horse's body is composed of roughly 70 percent water, which equates to 770 pounds or 96 gallons of water for the average 1,100-pound horse. Foals' bodies have even higher water content, roughly 80 percent, and on a weight-to-weight basis, small horses consume more water than large horses.

A horse's daily water requirements are influenced by age; body condition; the amount, type, and quality of feed consumed; fitness level; and activity level. Add to that the temperature, as well as the freshness, purity and palatability of the available water and it becomes obvious that there are a number of factors that influence water consumption. Because fat is low in water content compared to lean muscle, fat horses typically require less water than horses maintained at optimal body condition.

As a general rule, water intake is proportional to dry-matter intake, but the composition and digestibility of the feed is also a factor. Horses consuming all-hay diets drink more water than horses fed a grain diet coupled with hay or a complete pelleted diet.

Horses on good-quality pastures, which can be 65 to 80 percent water, will consume less drinking water compared to horses on hay and grain because a large percentage of their water needs are met by the moisture in the grass. That is why idle horses may actually consume less water in the summer than in the winter when they are stalled and on a hay-based diet. Their total water intake may be identical during both seasons, but just coming from different sources.

We all know that salt consumption increases thirst, but feed protein intake above the horse's requirement increases both water intake and urinary output as the horse voids excess nitrogen via urine.

An idle, 1,100-pound horse in a cool environment will drink six to 10 gallons of water

Signs of Dehydration

If your horse is not drinking enough water, his blood volume will decrease which will result in physiological changes that may become life threatening. Therefore, it is important that horse owners are able to recognize the early signs of dehydration. Here are a few simple tests:

- A normal adult horse's heart rate will be between 28 to 40 beats per minute but will increase in an effort to maintain the horse's blood pressure.
- The gums should be moist and "bubblegum" pink. Put pressure on the horse's gum with your finger and release it suddenly. The pink color should return immediately. If it takes several seconds, the horse may be dehydrated.
- Finally, pinch up a small area of the skin on the horse's neck just in front of the shoulder, the skin should retract back to normal in less than two seconds. If it remains tented the horse may be dehydrated.

Fortunately, dehydration in its mild form can usually be corrected by offering fresh, clean water unless a disease condition is causing the dehydration. In that case, you should contact a veterinarian immediately.

per day. That amount may increase to 15 gallons per day in a hot environment. Work horses require 10-18 gallons of water per day on average but may require much more in hot weather. Nursing mares drink more water because of fluid loss associated with milk production and increased consumption of feed to support milk production. A 1,100-pound nursing mare may easily drink up to 20 gallons of water per day. Foals also have higher water requirements and will drink six to eight gallons of water per day even in relatively cool weather.

A horse's water consumption will also be greatly affected by the temperature of the water. Consumption appears to be best when the water temperature is between 45 to 65 degrees Fahrenheit.

Sudden weather changes can also affect water consumption and lead to problems such as impaction colic. To combat this, add an ounce or two of a loose salt to the horse's daily ration when weather changes are imminent. The salt will stimulate water consumption.

Horses typically drink less water in cold weather, whereas heat and humidity increase their water requirements. In exercising horses, water intake may increase as much as 80 per-

WE LIKE TO SIT AROUND AT FAMILY GATHERINGS and recount some of the episodes reserved only for kinfolk that most kids want to forget. One of my favorites was when our youngest daughter, Lacy, was probably 8 or 9, and thought of her daddy as a real hero.

It had always been our policy that when I was out of town, all phone numbers were prominently displayed so I could be reached in an emergency.

I was judging a show in Canada at the training grounds of the Northwest Mounted Police in British Columbia. I had just reversed the horses in a large western pleasure class and asked for the jog when a woman came into the arena, obviously in a hurry to reach the judge's station. I asked the class to return to the walk and turned my attention to the woman from the office.

She said in a loud whisper, "I have a young lady on the phone, crying, says she's your daughter. I hate to disrupt the class but I think you'd better come to the phone right now, I'm afraid something dreadful has happened."

I had the class ride "at will" and I jogged to the office.

My hello was greeted by a lot of hysterical sobbing and then finally, "Daddy! Daddy! Charlie's sick!" poured out of the receiver.

Now, I admit in those days I traveled a lot and was probably away from home too much, but I didn't have a clue as to who Charlie was.

I said, "Honey, calm down, stop crying and tell me where is your mother."

"I don't know," she said, "I just got home from school and Charlie's real sick. Daddy, I think he's going to die."

Just then my wife, Ardy, who had been outside, came in and took the phone from Lacy's shaking hands.

"What's going on there?" I almost belted.

She said, "I don't know, dear, but I'll find out," and promptly put me on hold.

There I was standing in the horse show office with dozens of concerned eyes fixed on me. I was on hold, my pleasure class was on hold, the whole show had come to an abrupt halt because of someone named Charlie I didn't even know.

When Ardy came back on the line, with our daughter crying loudly in the background, she explained that Charlie was a black-and-white rat that had been given to Lacy a few days ago by the eccentric neighbor kid who launched rockets from the roof of his

garage across the street.

"A what?" I yelled. "A rat!?"

Everyone in the office was silent, listening. I was relieved that Charlie was not of the human species, but at this point my cool was waning.

As the story goes, it seemed that Lacy came home from school, went to her room, found her rat with its head hang-

ing over the water dish, couldn't find Mom, ran to the phone and called Daddy 2,000 miles away in the middle of a western pleasure class.

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Foal Heat Breeding

MARES ARE UNIQUE AMONG DOMESTIC ANIMALS IN that a fertile ovulation generally occurs within the 10 to 14 days after foaling. A majority of mares come into “foal heat” six to seven days after foaling, and ovulation occurs nine to 11 days after foaling.

If you want to maintain a 12-month foaling interval, (a foal each year), mares should be bred on the foal heat. The average interval from foaling to conception for mares bred on foal heat is approximately 25 days. This number, combined with a 340-day gestation length, yields an average actual foaling interval of one year.

Waiting to breed mares on the next natural heat cycle, the “30-day heat,” will result in a mare conceiving later each year until eventually she is open and must be bred early the following year. This strategy will lead to loss of a foal crop for one season every four to five years.

Mating mares on foal heat can be successful if a few general guidelines are followed.

First, the foaling had to be normal; there was no retained placenta; and there was no prolonged uterine/vaginal discharge.

Mares normally pass the placenta within 30 to 90 minutes after foaling. A placenta is considered to be retained after three hours. Retention can lead to a severe uterine infection, systemic illness, laminitis and other medical complications, and can also significantly compromise foal heat pregnancy rates.

It is considered normal for mares to have a discharge of dark-colored fluid called lochia from their uterus for the first three to four days after foaling. Presence of a discharge for five to seven days or more after foaling is not common, and is usually associated with retention of inflammatory fluid in the uterus. This is also detrimental to foal heat conception.

If the mare qualifies to be bred on the foal heat, the next important consideration is tim-

ing of the ovulation. Pregnancy rates are lower and pregnancy loss rates are higher if mares ovulate prior to 10 days after foaling.

The equine uterus must undergo dramatic changes called “involution” after foaling. Placental tissue remnants and fluid must be removed; the uterine lining, must be regenerated; bacteria in the uterus must be eliminated; and the overall uterus must decrease in size. These events must occur quickly if she is to have a uterus that can accept and nurture an embryo within the after foaling. In fact, if a mare ovulates 10 days after foaling and conception occurs, the new embryo will enter the uterus five to six days later or just 15 to 16 days after the previous occupant left the premises. A simple breeding strategy for the foal heat is to initially evaluate the mare seven days post-foaling to determine the size of the developing ovarian follicle and to determine if there is any fluid present in the uterus. The mare is re-examined two days later (Day 9, post-foaling) and if the dominant follicle is still present, a breeding decision can be made. An ovulation-inducing agent such as hCG or deslorelin can be administered on Day 9 or 10 or later as needed.

If the mare has ovulated by Day 9, breeding is withheld due to the probability of low conception rates, and the mare can either be administered prostaglandins five to seven days later to short-cycle and allow her to return to estrus early, or a decision can be made to wait for the 30-day heat.

It should be noted that some mares do not have a foal heat ovulation. Mares that foal out early in the season (i.e. January, February or early March) can remain reproductively dormant with inactive ovaries until later in the spring. In addition, some mares that foal out early might have one foal heat cycle associated with ovulation and then shut down for two to three months.

Housing pregnant mares under lights for the last 30 to 60 days of pregnancy can help reduce the problem of post-partum anestrus in foaling mares. ❏

TOGETHER OUR FUTURE

AQHA launches development of a youth initiative that will open more doors to horse-crazy kids

IF YOU'VE EVER PUT TOGETHER A JIGSAW PUZZLE, YOU know that it's always nice to have all of the puzzle pieces and a picture of the finished puzzle in front of you to ensure a successful build.

That's a good way to look at the approach used by AQHA leaders and staff members in the development of an equine youth initiative over the last couple of years. The group started with the big picture – what they wanted the end product to look like. They identified a specific age group currently underserved by AQHA and zeroed in on a new program for these families.

“But we still were unsure if we had all pieces to this puzzle,” says Todd Branson, AQHA director of youth development. “We needed to identify all the entry points that kids will be able to use to enhance those first-time horse experiences and to get involved.”

These were all important pieces of the puzzle that painted a picture of AQHA's commitment to kids and their families.

“It's not just learning the parts of a horse or how to take care of a horse; it's not just AQHYA; it's not just showing horses; it's a mission with so much more,” Todd says. “It's more than a simple promise; what we do today must be our commitment to the future of the horse industry.”

The mission is to impact the lives of young horse-interested people through engaging and relevant family experiences, with fun, educational classroom activities and through healthy competition and quality leadership opportunities that ultimately foster a positive, lifelong relationship with horses.

“We believe this is best achieved by providing families, caregivers and educators with healthy living, educational and positive child development resources that offer hands-on onsite, at-home and digital experiences, using the horse and horse artifacts to teach language arts, math, science, social studies, health, life skills and visual arts to children around



the world, ultimately building a healthy, lifelong relationship horseback,” Todd explains.

This means that the big picture will focus on three areas: healthy living, education and youth development.

Like any puzzle, once you have all the pieces and a picture to use as a guide, you make a strategy to organize the clutter, start finding pieces that fit together and find a large workspace to give you the greatest chance of success. Here’s our strategy.

The Problem

OVER THE PAST FIVE YEARS, TODD SAYS, THE INDUSTRY HAS SEEN up to a 30 percent decline in youth horse association participation, with a steady decline since 2008. This includes the American Quarter Horse Youth Association, the American Junior Paint Horse Association and the youth groups associated with AQHA Alliance partner organizations.

With more than 26,000 members, AQHYA is one of the largest equine organizations in the world.

“The reality is that most AQHYA members are passively



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involved at best,” Todd says. “Less than 5,000 AQHYA members exhibit annually, which really is the dominant group within the entire youth membership.”

AQHYA membership peaked at 31,696 in 2007. We saw a decline of nearly 3,000 members just from 2008 to 2010, and only 30 percent of the youth members will purchase an adult membership within their first year of eligibility.

Todd says a lot of the AQHYA members receive memberships as a gift from an older relative or friend who wants to fuel the child’s horse passion or as a way of getting the child interested in horses.

“There’s no argument that there’s great

value to an AQHYA membership,” he adds. “But currently, there’s no process in place to embrace, engage and involve these younger AQHYA members when they receive memberships as gifts. If these kids aren’t on the path to showing horses, there has been little focus on encouraging them to find alternative ways to getting horseback. And when there are so many other activities for children – sports, boy/girl scouts, 4-H, academic activities, etc. – it has become increasingly difficult to keep them as members or to get them to become active in horses.”

As a father of three, a former AQHYA president and one of the youngest people to ascend to the presidency of AQHA, Peter J. Cofrancesco III of Sparta, New Jersey, says it’s disheartening to not see very many people his age or younger coming up through AQHA. That’s why his presidential “platform” in 2011 was to focus on doing something about the future of the Association.

“What we’re finding is that for a child to be involved in this industry, it appears that more than likely his or her family would have had to have been involved,” Peter says. “So really, we’re getting the same families. The problem is, we’re having a hard time attracting kids from outside the industry. In this day and age, there’s so much to offer children, so many activities, so many sports programs; schools offer so much more. I just think that we’re viewed as a lost puzzle piece of the larger picture. That may not appear to be a problem right now, but down the road 10 or 20 years from now, these kids are the future of our industry and the future leaders of AQHA.”

With a background in education, 4-H and showing horses in the youth division, Todd tackled this issue, digging deep into trends, numbers and demographics.

“We had to understand the landscape before we built the all-important pathways to horseback opportunities,” he says. “You can say we found one of the world’s best-kept secrets. To us, it’s no secret that horses make a positive impact on human lives. But we needed to find new ways to tell the story of horses to parents and kids.”

For example, one of Todd’s spreadsheets – and he has a few hundred – compares the economic impact of the horse industry¹ against the taxpayer cost of drug use² in the United States. Two great realities emerged:

2 The Economic Impact of Illicit Drug Use on American Society – US Department of Justice



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First, on average, the horse industry adds a value of \$2,400 to each taxpaying household and drug use costs the average taxpaying household \$2,700. Second, children exposed to positive youth-development experiences are half as likely to misuse drugs in their life³.

“Major positive youth-development experiences such as YMCA, 4-H, Boy and Girl Scouts all have horse programs, not to mention the positive influence organizations like AQHYA bring to the table,” Todd says. “Although it’s impossible to quantify the opportunity presented, the more we can do to expose children to horses, the more we’re doing to invoke a positive influence in American society.”

The Plan

AFTER THE 2011 AQHA CONVENTION AT WHICH PETER WAS elected president, a strategic operating plan was developed to create a more robust youth program – possibly even one that would benefit the entire equine industry, not just AQHA. And while these steps aren’t the “pretty” part of the puzzle, they are critical pieces.

The planning process reviewed:

- What the youth organization should look like going forward
- Infrastructure that would be required to build and grow the organization
- How groups like 4-H, boy/girl scouts, the Certified Horsemanship Association and the vari-



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ous Alliance Partner youth organizations could influence and might factor into the plan

- How we should recruit, embrace, engage, involve and provide relevant and meaningful service to youth members
- How we can best communicate with this important audience (website, magazine, newsletter, mobile, etc.)
- How we can generate revenue to subsidize a larger youth organization with more resources behind it

It became evident that a new youth initiative was needed. “Simply said, how AQHA speaks to children and young families needs a bigger umbrella – or a bigger table (if you’re still piecing together your jigsaw puzzle),” says Don Treadway Jr., AQHA executive vice president. “We’ve always thought of AQHYA as the umbrella for all of AQHA’s youth programs. However, we need to position ourselves to be something bigger and broader in order to



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welcome kids of all ages.”

The new initiative will include AQHYA, which will be a group of top American Quarter Horse exhibitors; and it will offer online entertainment and education, reaching younger kids where they live – the Internet, TV and smartphones – and introduce kids of the world to horses and provide endless hours of opportunities to be involved with horses.

This new approach not only supports more opportunities for kids who show American Quarter Horses, it also unleashes new ways to use our AQHA Professional Horsemen and the connections we have with the Certified Horsemanship Association to offer educational and hands-on opportunities to

horseless kids and horse-related summer camps and dude ranches. Sure, as these children grow in knowledge and ability, a percentage will want to move on to competition, and the AQHA Professional Horsemen can be there to coach them. By offering a new approach that includes a robust menu of programs and services, the rest have plenty of inclusive ways to enjoy their American Quarter Horses as children as well as through adulthood.

Three Pieces

PUTTING THE “IT TAKES A VILLAGE TO RAISE A CHILD” THEME to work, our focus on youth now has a real community feel, promoting healthy living, education and youth development – some of the primary core values important to parents.

“The core values that drive these three focus areas are animal welfare, character, responsibility, the educational institution, child safety, a common love of all things horse, healthy activities and rewarding programs,” Todd says.

Under **healthy living**, we:

- Offer a positive alternative with inclusive points of entry to dangerous environments like drug use or joining a gang
- Support innovative programs that inspire a healthy lifestyle
- Improve and encourage exercise



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Under **education**, we will use the horse to:

- Inspire children through innovative outreach programs from the American Quarter Horse Hall of Fame & Museum
- Teach children by offering a vast library of activities and classroom lesson plans
- Create experiences like no other through clothing, toys, books and games

Under **youth development**, we will:

- Build leaders and improve character
- Encourage healthy competition
- Provide incentive for continued education through scholarships

The Specifics

WHILE THE PUZZLE IS STILL BEING PIECED together, these three focus areas show you what it looks like. It's not far fetched to consider AQHA's library of programs and services as the individual pieces of the puzzle.

Some of these pieces include Junior Master Horseman, a multi-level book-based equine education program that AQHA started nearly a decade ago; field trips, workshops and a robust trunk program of American Quarter Horse Hall of Fame & Museum artifacts

and horses; and AQHYA programs such as exhibiting American Quarter Horses, developing young adults into leaders at the Bank of America Youth Excellence Seminar and promoting healthy worldwide competition at the Ford Youth World Championship Show and American Quarter Horse Youth World Cup.

A new piece is Digital Oats, a digital platform for our younger audience, in development that uses horses as a way to emphasize healthy living. This digital experience uses relevant technologies to introduce families and kids to new horseback opportunities.

"It all leads to getting a kid on the back of a horse," Todd says.

It is time for us to really focus, not through words but through actions, on how we can work together today to serve tomorrow's generations, Don adds.

"If that means adding an "extreme" element to horse competitions that youth – particularly, boys – are drawn to, let's talk about it," he says. "A lot of time and resources need to be focused on kids – by all of us."

To that end, the youth activities committee is developing new puzzle pieces to significantly grow AQHYA membership and participation. Of course, all of this requires more time, more staff and more money.

"I completely support AQHA's efforts and the executive committee fully intends to continue supporting Peter's platform," says current AQHA

President Gene Graves of Grand Island, Nebraska. "We know this will take quite a bit of time to fully accomplish, and we must take the steps now to correct the concerns with youth in order to have future generations to support AQHA's programs."

Because the primary focus of the youth initiative now directly supports a healthy lifestyle, education and developing young minds into successful adults, a completely new opportunity presents itself from a fundraising point of view. The American Quarter Horse Foundation, which provides funding for youth initiatives, welcomes gifts to develop and sustain programs and services that influence AQHA's commitment to kids and their families.

"We've got to do whatever we can to support a variety of innovative puzzle pieces that attract young families and their kids to horses and ultimately our business," Don says. "I think every single one of us involved in this industry has to embrace this new approach to youth, to act as recruiters, ambassadors and salespeople. It's our duty. We've got to do whatever we can so that this Association remains viable for future generations."

So, pull a chair up to the table, grab a puzzle piece and let's assemble this puzzle. Together, we can unveil a beautiful picture of a thriving horse industry for future generations to enjoy. 🐾

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a TOUGH DECISION



Abigail Pait and Touch Of Sudden Luck

IT WASN'T THAT LONG AGO WHEN THE ONLY THING YOUNG equestrians had to look forward to after they finished their youth careers and high school was the amateur show ring.

In 1967, an alternative came about with the Intercollegiate Horse Show Association, where riders of all levels could show in college. Today, more than 370 schools across North America participate in the competition.

Thirty-one years later – in 1998 – Varsity Equestrian, now renamed the National Collegiate Equestrian Association, was labeled an emerging sport by the National Collegiate Athletic Association. Today, 23 schools compete in either Division I or Division II for riders showing at the highest level only.

Now there are options for anyone looking to continue their horse showing in a different arena than just AQHA. Most youth are now faced with the decision of which direction they

want to go after high school if they want to show on the intercollegiate circuit – IHSA or NCEA. AQHA sponsors both programs as valuable ways for horses and riders to continue their careers.

Two young competitors had to make decisions in the fall of 2011, and they chose two separate paths.

Catching Their Eye

ABIGAIL PAIT OF SPARTA, NEW JERSEY, KNEW SHE WANTED TO continue showing horses while she was in college, and she knew she wanted to go to a warmer climate to do so.

“A couple of years ago, my mom said we needed to start thinking about colleges and figure out what I wanted to do,” Abigail explains. “I began to think, would (showing intercollegiate) be something I wanted to continue doing, so I can keep riding? And I thought, ‘Yes, why not?’ It was an opportunity to go somewhere different.”

Abigail, the 2011-2012 AQHYA president, was perhaps known more for her success showing halter. She won youth world championships from 2009 through 2011, but she has been working hard to improve her horsemanship skills.

That hard work paid off when she made the top 20 in horsemanship at the 2010 Built Ford Tough AQHYA World Championship Show. She also put together great rides at the 2011 Ford Youth World, even when she knew coaches from NCAA schools were watching.

“I knew I just had to go out there and just ride,” she says. “It was very stressful.”

While most prospective NCAA athletes send in videos from horse shows and riding lessons for recruiters, Abigail took a different route.

“They all got the opportunity to see me show at the World Show, so I never had to send in stuff like that.”

But for those who might not get that opportunity, most coaches prefer to have videos sent in a year before a high school student’s senior year so the coaches can make a recruiting plan.

The summer before Abigail’s senior year of high school, NCAA schools were allowed to start expressing their interest in having her join their team. Auburn University in Auburn, Alabama, was the first to contact the 17-year-old. Then after the Ford Youth World, Baylor University in Waco, Texas, and the University of South Carolina in Columbia joined in the mix.

“We were really excited (to get the first recruiting phone call) because it’s the first step toward what you’re going to do and it’s just an exciting feeling,” Abigail remembers.

She filled out the NCAA clearinghouse form online to confirm her NCAA eligibility and declaring any prize money she might have won in August 2011 before her recruiting trips to the prospective schools – the one part she was looking forward to.

“I was tired of the cold weather (in New Jersey), so I was ready to go to a warm school,” she jokes.

Eighteen-year-old Laney Hixson didn’t worry too much



about staying warm, she just wanted to continue riding horses. A native of Atlanta, Laney has shown in AQHA for four years and has represented Georgia in National Youth Activity Team Tournament at the All American Quarter Horse Congress.

When she set her sights on competing in the intercollegiate arena, she looked at both NCEA and IHSA schools.

“I can’t imagine my life without being able to ride my horses, especially being away from home,” Laney says. “It’ll be really nice to have that little bit of comfort to be able to ride like I do at home.”

Laney first heard of Berry College, a private college with a competitive IHSA western program in Mount Berry, Georgia, when her older brother started attending the school 90 minutes from Atlanta.

While Laney was interested in the school, she also wanted to look at opportunities at NCAA schools like Auburn, the University of Tennessee at Martin, Texas A&M University and the University of Georgia, but her heart kept bringing her back closer to home.

“I kept going back to Berry because of the academics and the hands-on experiences you can have in pre-vet and pre-med,” Laney says. So she contacted the head coach of the 2011 IHSA western national champion team and voiced her interest in riding for the team.

Laney put together a video of some of her shows and sent it



TIPS FOR POTENTIAL COLLEGIATE RIDERS

“Be organized,” Abigail points out. “Get the paperwork done early, because you don’t want to deal with that headache if you aren’t prepared. If you want to be recruited, definitely keep practicing and keep working at it – even if you’ve already been recruited.”

Berry coach Margaret Knight points out that riders should understand the differences between showing IHSA and NCAA.

“The biggest tip is to be knowledgeable about the different divisions of IHSA and the association in general, as early as freshman year in high school,” she says. “Try to stay qualified for a level in which the rider can compete in the IHSA. One of the biggest problems for recruits is that they have to start at a higher level than necessary. That might hurt their chances of making a team.”

Starting the sophomore or junior year of high school, students are encouraged to start researching what schools they’re interested in and putting together recruitment videos. Some schools might already have their recruitment list filled up by the time prospective riders are seniors in high school.

Abigail and Laney are ready to tackle the next phase of their horse show careers and are looking forward to the opportunities that abound.

“If you’re given an opportunity like this, just take it,” Abigail advises.



to Coach Margaret Knight at Berry. Margaret and the other coaches liked what they saw and invited Laney to a tryout at the school in the fall of 2011. Laney was invited back for a second tryout during one of the team’s shows where she warmed up the school’s horses and got a feel for what an IHSA show was like.

The Decision

“WHEN I VISITED BERRY, I FELL IN LOVE WITH THE COACHES, facilities and the program,” Laney says of her visit. “After that, it felt like it was destiny for me to be there.”

Abigail had a similar feeling when it came to choosing among the three recruiting colleges. After her college visits, she had a lot to consider: She loved Auburn’s school pride and the atmosphere on campus. She loved the beauty of Baylor’s campus, as well as South Carolina’s. Finally, in November 2011, Abigail made the decision to become a member of South Carolina’s equestrian team.

“I felt more at home (at South Carolina),” she explains. “I had an inkling as to where I wanted to go, but I wanted to make sure (I made the right decision) – it is such a big decision because this will affect four years, or maybe more, of your life.”

Abigail participated in National Signing Day in December with one of her best friends who signed to play basketball at a Division II school.

Laney chose to go to an IHSA school because she looked forward to jumping in and showing on the team immediately.

“I know there’s a lot of competition to get on the NCAA teams and to actually get to show,” she explains. “I didn’t want to wait on the sidelines for my turn to show; I wanted to go at it full-force. I just wanted to challenge my ability and hopefully be able to win some more national titles for Berry.”

Abigail was offered a partial athletic scholarship to ride in horsemanship – one of two NCEA western disciplines – for the Gamecocks, but she has not yet declared a major.

“I decided to go undecided because I don’t want to waste the time or money on a major I’m not sure about, but I think I might work toward being a pharmacist. I feel it is a career that would suit me and would be perfect,” she explained.

Laney, on the other hand, already knew her major, thanks to some family inspiration.

“I’d love to go into pre-med because my father and grandfather are radiologists and I think it’d be pretty cool to be a third-generation radiologist,” she explains. She’ll be riding open-level horsemanship and reining for the Vikings, the top level IHSA has for those western disciplines.

Preparation Is the Best Defense

THOSE MAJOR DECISIONS OUT OF THE WAY, BOTH INCOMING freshmen felt relief from their early college decisions, especially after watching their friends nervously waiting for acceptance envelopes or choosing among upwards of six schools.

“It’s been great because a bunch of my friends are afraid they might not be accepted to their schools,” Laney says.

Now Laney and Abigail just have the typical forms to fill out for their first year of college – housing, meal plans and summer orientation – on top of hitting the gym and riding as many horses as possible to be in the best shape possible for their teams.

Abigail has been working with the team's conditioning program to help get in the swing of the workouts she'll have to do with the team once she moves to Columbia.

"It's not something you're used to because you don't think about having to run and work out to ride horses," she says.

Laney and Abigail both agree the worst part of conditioning is the running.

"Running is definitely not my favorite," Laney says. She took the initiative to do her own conditioning program two years before leaving for college so she would already be used to the routine of morning workouts and afternoon riding lessons.

Laney has also been taping her riding lessons and horse shows and sending them to the coaches at Berry to help with her training.

"I send videos every week, and we keep very close contact," she says. "I've been sending (Coach Knight) photos of my horsemanship outfits for her approval and keeping her up-to-date on my riding."

Laney will participate in a clinic at Berry with incoming and current team members this summer.

"That's what I like about (IHSA)," Laney says. "I know in NCAA you're not allowed to talk a whole lot with the coaches, but it's been awesome that I've gotten to meet a lot of the older girls and get used to what the coaches are looking for."

The camaraderie has been important to both girls. Abigail has started to form close friendships with her future teammates. She kept in close contact with teammates, frequently asking them questions when it came to any forms that needed to be filled out or sending good luck notes when the team competed in April at the national championships in Waco, Texas.

When she attended an event in which South Carolina was showing at Delaware State University, she immediately felt the team bond: "The girls brought me into the huddle and they were fabulous. I really enjoyed it – I love the team aspect

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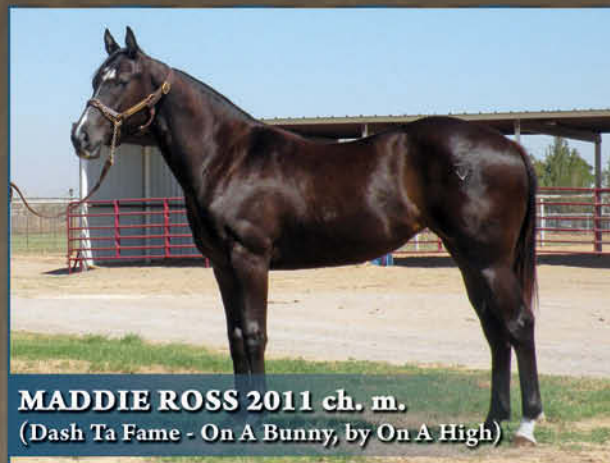

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Quite a Ride

*Dr. Glenn Blodgett has
devoted a lifetime of service to
the American Quarter Horse.*

DR. GLENN BLODGETT HAS TRAVELED A LONG WAY IN HIS 63 YEARS. Born and raised in Spearman, northeast of Amarillo in the Texas Panhandle, he hangs his hat in his home on the Four Sixes Ranch at Guthrie, Texas – southeast of Amarillo, a distance of more than 175 miles.

Uh, oh, wait a minute ...

That's only as the crow flies.

Dr. Glenn Paul Blodgett, the resident veterinarian and manager of the historic ranch's horse division, doesn't fly like a crow. Or any bird. Or for that matter, any other *whatever*. The soft-spoken man with an easy smile, dry sense of humor and steely spine maps his own path, a route that has taken him from a family farm to the top of the American Quarter Horse industry, across the continent and around the world.

"I love to travel," says Dr. Blodgett, who lives in remote King County (with a population of about 300 people) but has visited most of the States, Canada, Mexico, England, Australia and South Africa. "I like the ranch country here in Texas, but I like traveling just to see different country. I enjoy seeing things all over the world. I don't enjoy the cities as much as I do being out in the country, and when I'm in agriculture areas I'm always paying attention to barns, sheds, feed troughs, fences – particularly fences, because I'm big on safety and I'm always looking for a better, safer fence for a horse. I'm always looking at different things, intrigued by how things are done, picking up ideas about how to do things."

Dr. Blodgett received the 2011 AQHA Racing Council Special Recognition Award. Along with the presentations to

Leverne Perry and sisters Dawn and Rhonda Rae List for the Gordon Crone and Millie Vessels awards, respectively, Dr. Blodgett accepted the honor in a special program for the announcements of the 2011 AQHA Racing Champions on January 18 at Heritage Place Sale Co. in Oklahoma City, the evening prior to Heritage's Winter Mixed Sale on January 19-20.

"The Special Recognition Award means an awful lot to me," said Dr. Blodgett at the presentation. His numerous and disparate accomplishments have also been recognized by many others, for everything from high school honors to the Texas Veterinary Association's equine practitioner of the year to the Association of Racing Commissioners International's Joan Pew Award for the racing commissioner of the year.

"It means that somebody thinks that I made a big contribution," he continued. "In life, you always try to do what you yourself think is best. You are always striving to do what you think is right. And you always want to do better. You're always looking back to try to figure out, well, how could I have done this better or done this differently and made it better? This is one of the fruits that you can enjoy – if you've been doing a good job and doing the right thing. And when other people agree with you and think so, too, that adds a great degree of satisfaction to it. It really means a lot to me that other people think that."

Ranch Resume

DR. BLODGETT BEGAN REPRESENTING TEXAS AS AN AQHA DIRECTOR in 1991, and in 2011, was elevated to director-at-large. He has been a member of the AQHA Stud Book and Registration Committee since 1991, on which he also served as chairman. He also served on the AQHA Hall of Fame Selection Committee from 1995 to 2009.

Dr. Blodgett has served in numerous other capacities in the horse industry, including on the boards of the American Association of Equine Practitioners and the Texas Racing Commission.

But those positions are merely continuations of his chosen highway. Learning the value of hard work early, Glenn Blodgett grew up working on his father's farming and stocker cattle operation at Spearman, where they leased grassland and ran cattle on wheat pasture. Before he reached high school, he had pretty much decided on the route his life would take.

"I enjoyed the ranch country, and became attracted to the ranch way of life when I was young," he says. "I grew up in town, but I really wanted to work with the livestock, the cattle and the horses. My dad always had me helping out with the harvest and some of the busier times of the farming operation, but just as soon as he'd cut me loose, I'd be out helping with the cattle operation. We had a man named Dale Hawkinson, who had a big influence on my horsemanship skills and interests. He kind of taught me how to handle cattle and horses. I spent all the time I could with him and the livestock, and from the time I was about in the eighth grade on, I got really focused real strong on that way of life."

In the manner for which he is now widely known, Glenn Blodgett set his sights early and began working diligently toward his goal.

"When I was a freshman in high school, I bought a broodmare, a daughter of Billy Clegg," he says. "Dale Hawkinson had a Billy Clegg mare, and I thought I'd like to have one, too. We found one so he and I kept those two mares together. The horses we used on Dad's cattle operation were geldings that we bought. So I got into the breeding business at that time with Miss Sandy Clegg."

Dr. Blodgett received his bachelor's degree in animal science from Oklahoma State University, where his wife, Karen, also earned her degree. Dr. Blodgett earned his degree in veterinary medicine from Texas A&M University, and has since been recognized as an outstanding alumni by both universities.

After graduating from veterinary school in 1974, Dr. Blodgett spent a couple of years at Dr. Ed Murray's Spur Veterinary Hospital in Spur, Texas. Then he put in half a dozen years at the Hansford County Veterinary Hospital in Spearman.

Glenn and Karen were sweethearts in high school (though Karen was a student in her hometown of Gruver, Spearman High's hardcore rival). The couple have been married 43 years, and they have two daughters: Buffie Guynes, 38, who lives with husband Michael and daughters Catherine, Rebecca and Claire in Keller, Texas, where Buffie is a pediatric nurse; and Brandie Mustian, 35, who lives with husband Mike, son Maddox and daughter Myla in Weatherford, Texas, where Brandie is the marketing director at Equine Sports Medicine.

The Sixes

DR. BLODGETT HAS BEEN AT THE FOUR SIXES RANCH SINCE 1982, where he is the resident veterinarian and manager of the ranch's horse division. In his tenure at the Four Sixes, the ranch has become an all-time leading breeder of both racing and performance American Quarter Horses, and in 1993 won the AQHA Best Remuda Award.

The Four Sixes Ranch is part of the famous Burnett Ranches LLC, which is among the most storied family owned businesses in Texas history. It was started by Capt. Samuel "Burk" Burnett in 1868 when he bought 100 head of cattle with the now-famous "6666" brand. (The oft-told story that Burnett won the cattle in a game of poker by laying down a hand with four sixes is not true.) Burk bought his first land 125 miles northwest of Fort Worth. As the days of the open range ended, he increased his holdings, buying the old 8 Ranch, near Guthrie in north-central Texas. That ranch became the nucleus of the Four Sixes Ranch today headquartered at Guthrie, and a later purchase added the Dixon Creek division in the Texas Panhandle.

Burk's son, Tom, joined his father in running the ranch, and later founded his own ranches – the Triangles, near Paducah and Iowa Park, Texas. Tom's daughter Anne Burnett Tandy, upon the death of her father and grandfather, took control of both the Four Sixes and Triangle ranches. "Miss Anne," as she was known throughout the cattle and horse industry, was instrumental in the early years of AQHA, and in 1940 hosted the AQHA founders as her dinner guests the night before the meeting that originated the Association. Miss Anne was posthumously inducted into the American Quarter Horse Hall of Fame in 1990, during the Association's 50th anniversary celebration. Miss Anne's daughter, Anne Windfohr Marion – "Little Anne" – is the current owner of the "Sixes," which now stretches over more than 310,000 acres.

In addition to its cattle, the horse operation sets the highest standards for racing, performance and ranch horses. The ranch's foundation stallions included Joe Hancock, Hollywood Gold, Grey Badger II and Cee Bars. With a racehorse breeding program that has been headed by world champions and leading sires Dash For Cash and Special Effort, both American Quarter Horse Hall of Famers, the Sixes currently has a very deep stallion roster headed by Mr Jess Perry. A leading sire ever since his first crop went to post a dozen years ago, Mr Jess Perry was the third-ranked

sire of graded stakes winners last year, when he was represented by Heritage Place Futurity (G1) winner High Rate Of Return and Los Alamitos Super Derby (G1) winner Miss Racy Jess – the latter co-owned by Burnett Ranches and AQHA Executive Committee Second Vice President Johnny Trotter, who also co-own Trotter's homebred One Famous Eagle, the champion millionaire who stands at the Four Sixes and whose first crop now are 2-year-olds.

As a young man, Johnny aspired to be a cowboy on the Four Sixes. Now he is in business with the ranch and Dr. Blodgett.

"When you talk about Dr. Blodgett, you have to talk about credibility," Johnny says. "He is one of the most credible guys in the industry. There is a certain amount of respect and trust that goes with each and every partnership and business relationship. The horse business is more of a reputation-based business than it is just a horse-trading business, and that is a pretty fair assumption with Glenn Blodgett. He's got a reputation, and it's not all about making a quick dollar on a horse. First and foremost, he's a fine person, with all the integrity and credibility that goes with it, and second of all, he's a good businessman, good horseman and tremendously successful veterinarian. Speaking for myself, I consider being associated with him to be one of the biggest honors of my life."

Growing the Job

"WHEN I FIRST CAME TO THE FOUR SIXES, I HAD NO IDEA THAT the job was going to lead into what it has become," Dr. Blodgett says. "At the time, I had the idea that it was more animal-health related. I like the opportunity to do both things: the animal health – equine health, for the most part, but a lot of cattle, too – but also the management of the horses, too. I really enjoy the care, the breeding and marketing and all of that stuff that goes in with the horses. That part has always really interested me."

When he was hired by Little Anne, the idea was that Dr. Blodgett would breed and raise horses on the ranch. In 1993, the decision was made to expand the ranch's services to the public and get back into the breeding of racing Quarter Horses, a branch of which the Sixes was divesting itself when he first came aboard.

"When I first came here, we were liquidating the last of our old racing broodmares," he says. "We just had our ranch horses, and we built and expanded our facilities as we needed them for ourselves. But as things progressed, we made the decision to get back into racing as well as western performance horses, and over time, it's just kind of grown into what it is today."

What Dr. Blodgett runs today is a first-class, multi-tiered operation, with Four Sixes race-breds winning championships and Grade 1 races on the track, the performance horses taking championships in arenas across the nation, and the working horses so sought after that the Sixes' ranch horse sale each September attracts buyers (and lookers) from all over.

"There's a great deal of pride and a sense of accomplishment when you can look back at a good horse and remember two or three or four generations of breeding that you've been involved with. It's a big, big-time feeling. And that's with any kind of horse, racing, performance, whatever. On the racing side, when you are involved in selecting and then racing one, that's a real degree of satisfaction, but when you are actually involved in the breeding process, it's an even more satisfying feeling. Here at the Four Sixes, being involved in some of those decisions and actually performing some of the work involved in doing it – the artificial insemination, the embryo transfer in some cases – is extremely satisfying.

"And that's whether it's with our own horses or for our clients, because we like to see other people successful, too," he says. "It's the real good success stories that drive people into the business, keeps them there and keeps everybody happier. Proven performance is your best advertisement."

Speaking of happy . . .

"I feel very fortunate to work here," he says. "We have a lot of good people here who really try to do the best job they can. I'm fortunate that I've always felt like I have a job that I really like and enjoy. I think that helps anybody do a better job. If people enjoy what they're doing, they just do a better job overall."

And speaking of people doing good jobs . . .

"I've been pleased with some of my accomplishments, but I want to do better," he says. "I want to raise better horses, I want

to be a better employee here, I want to be more productive, I want to serve the overall industry better and I want to serve my profession better. And I want to continue to be a good husband, good father and, now, grandfather.

"I couldn't have done it alone," Dr. Blodgett concludes. "There are just so many other people involved – my family, co-workers, employers, mentors. And horses. We've been very fortunate to have been involved with some of the best stallions and mares in the breed. There are just an awful lot of individuals who have played a role in the whole thing, and it's been quite a ride up to this point." 🐾

As the first equine veterinarian to serve as a member of AQHA's executive committee, Dr. Glenn Blodgett brings a different perspective to the committee, along with his wealth of experience and respect in a wide cross-section of the horse industry.

"As a veterinarian, I think one of the things that I can provide perspective on is making the best decisions for the welfare of the horse and ensuring that we have the highest standards of care for all American Quarter Horses," Dr. Blodgett says. "I've been privileged to serve on the stud book and registration committee, and many of the issues that we have discussed concern the integrity of the breed and maintaining the value in the registration of our horses. I believe those are crucial considerations for the Executive Committee in the next five years."

In addition to being the primary veterinarian at the Burnett Estate's Four Sixes Ranch in Guthrie, Texas, Dr. Blodgett also directs the horse operation that extends across racing, performance events and ranching.

"Two of the areas that I'm excited about are developing more markets for ranch horses through the AQHA Ranching Heritage Breeders and other programs, along with the growth internationally," Dr. Blodgett says.

The Four Sixes recently shipped 20 horses to China and has long been invested in shipping and breeding horses in South America and Australia. In addition, under Dr. Blodgett's direction, the ranch stands more than 25 stallions that include champion and leading freshman sire One Famous Eagle to leading sire Mr Jess Perry, along with cutting, reining and working cow horse stallions and ranch stallions.

"Obviously, I'm just getting started on serving on the Executive Committee, and I get to see a fairly wide cross-section of the industry on a regular basis," Dr. Blodgett says, "but I'm already surprised about all of the services that AQHA provides to its members and all of the ways that people can get involved.

"We have some challenges ahead," he continues, "but I'm confident that we can find ways to grow this industry."

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Pait's Place

Outgoing AQHYA President

*Abigail Pait holds a unique place
in AQHA's storied history.*

ABIGAIL PAIT OF SPARTA, NEW JERSEY, DIDN'T HAVE TO LOOK TOO far for guidance during her AQHYA presidency. She just had to ask her neighbor – AQHA Past President Peter Cofrancesco III, whose term in office coincided with much of hers.

"He lives right across the back wall," laughs Abigail, the 17-year-old daughter of Jeffrey and Bronwyn Pait. "I've been able to have him help me with a lot of things. It was something that we were all able to share here. I don't think too many people will get that opportunity."

Along with Peter, Abigail says AQHA First Vice President John Dobbs of Champaign, Illinois, was also helpful throughout her presidency.

Johne says she expects great things from Abigail as she moves on to her collegiate career.

"I have known Abigail since she was born and have watched her transform from a friendly little girl into a confident, smart, capable young woman," John says. "She is very articulate and can hold her own when it comes to getting her ideas across. She has been an excellent leader of AQHYA this past year."

While Abigail had great support from AQHA's leadership, she says she couldn't have made it through the year without her fellow AQHYA officers and directors.

"This year's officers and directors have been absolutely amazing," Abigail says. "I don't know what I would do without them. They've been really great."

Presidential Journey

ABIGAIL HAS SPENT HER ENTIRE LIFE ON COFRANCESCO FARMS where her father, Jeffrey, has conditioned champion halter horses for 26 years. While the senior Pait had a profound influence on Peter's success in the show ring, it's was Peter who encouraged Abigail's involvement in AQHYA leadership.

"That was something that he was always involved in," Abigail says. In fact, Peter is the first president of the American Junior Quarter Horse Association, as AQHYA was formerly known, to become AQHA president. "I always was exposed to that type of atmosphere. Peter and my parents both encouraged me."

Although the adult influence was strong, it was Abigail's friend and future collegiate teammate Ali Ceresani who actually started her on the path to the presidency. At Abigail's first Youth Excellence Seminar, an event designed to develop general leadership skills and involvement within AQHYA, Ali ran for a director's position for Region Five. Abigail thought it looked like fun so she ran for director the following year, thus paving her way to run for AQHYA president.

One of Abigail's goals as AQHYA president was coming up with ways to increase youth membership.

"I would really love for more kids to become involved with AQHYA," she says. "We've been able to do different things to entice new members. We had a mini YES for our region. We had different people come and do presentations about

American Quarter Horses and why it would be great for them to become AQHYA members. A long, long, *long*, time from now, I want my kids to be involved with it. It's really shaped me as a person, and I would be really disappointed if it doesn't continue."

Shaping a Leader

WITH AN AQHA PROFESSIONAL HORSEMAN AS A FATHER, IT'S NO surprise that Abigail found herself in the show ring at a tender age. In fact, she doesn't remember how old she was when she entered her first lead-line class.

Now, she's a three-time AQHYA world champion, with a collegiate equestrian scholarship to the University of South Carolina, a journey that is detailed in "A Tough Decision" on Page 20.

In 2009, Abigail won her first AQHYA title in yearling mares with Taryn Rose, a horse given to her by Aunt Peggy (Peter's mother). The following year, the duo won the reserve world championship in 2-year-old mares, and Abigail successfully led the spectacular mare Virtues to the yearling world title. In 2011, Abigail and Virtues were able to duplicate the feat that eluded her and Taryn Rose, by winning 2-year-old mares at the Built Ford Tough AQHYA World Show.

"She's a very special horse," says Abigail of Virtues, the daughter of A Radiant Image out of Sheza Virtuous Lady by Statutory, bred by the Peter J. Cofrancesco Estate.

Peter and her father showed both the sire and dam to numerous titles.

"I really appreciate her as a show horse. She, my father and I spend a lot of time together. She's one of those horses that I have a connection with when I show her. We read each other really well."

Although she enjoys showing halter – especially for the time she gets to spend with her dad – Abigail says horsemanship is probably her favorite. Her current horsemanship partner is Touch Of Sudden Luck, aka "Spanky," a 2004 sorrel gelding by A Touch Of Sudden and out of The Career Girl by Luck Too, bred by Jeff Cochran, of Oxford, Iowa.

"It's always fun to do because it's always something different," says Abigail, who has ridden under the direction of longtime friend and mentor AQHA Professional Horseman and judge Christine Thompson, as well as AQHA Professional Horsemen Brent Maxwell, Jackie Krshka and Pierre Briere, and trainer Sue Witts.

Abigail will join her friend Ali in showing horsemanship for the Gamecocks this fall. Between collegiate horse shows and studying to be a pharmacist, she also plans to finish out her youth career, which ends in 2013.

Culture Shock

UNLIKE MANY INCOMING COLLEGE FRESHMAN, ABIGAIL IS AN OLD hand at culture shock. She has already experienced that in her travels as AQHYA president. Some of her various trips included

the FFA Area 1 Convention, the AQHA Region Five Championship, the American Youth Horse Council annual meeting, and 2012 AQHA Convention in Las Vegas.

The FFA convention was her first exposure to the agriculture group.

“Don’t get me wrong, where I’m from it *is* the Garden State,” she laughs. “It’s very country. It’s not like I’m living in the city, but I can be in the city in 30 minutes. My friends say I’m the most agricultural person they know because I have horses.”

She was also introduced to a whole new world when she made a trip from AQHA headquarters in Amarillo to Clarendon, Texas.

“It was a little bit of culture shock to me,” Abigail says of the hour-long trip through the edge of the Panhandle Plains of Texas. “We kept driving and driving, and there was nothing on either side of the road. It was just different; I’m used to green and hills everywhere!”

Throughout her travels, Abigail met many people involved with different aspects of AQHA and the horse industry in general.

“There are so many different aspects of the horse industry,” she says. “You don’t have to own horses, but if you have a love for them, it opens so many doors.”

Open Doors

AS SHE COMPLETES HER FINAL YEAR OF HIGH SCHOOL at Pope John XXIII Regional High School, Abigail can appreciate how horses and her experiences as AQHYA president have so many doors for her future.

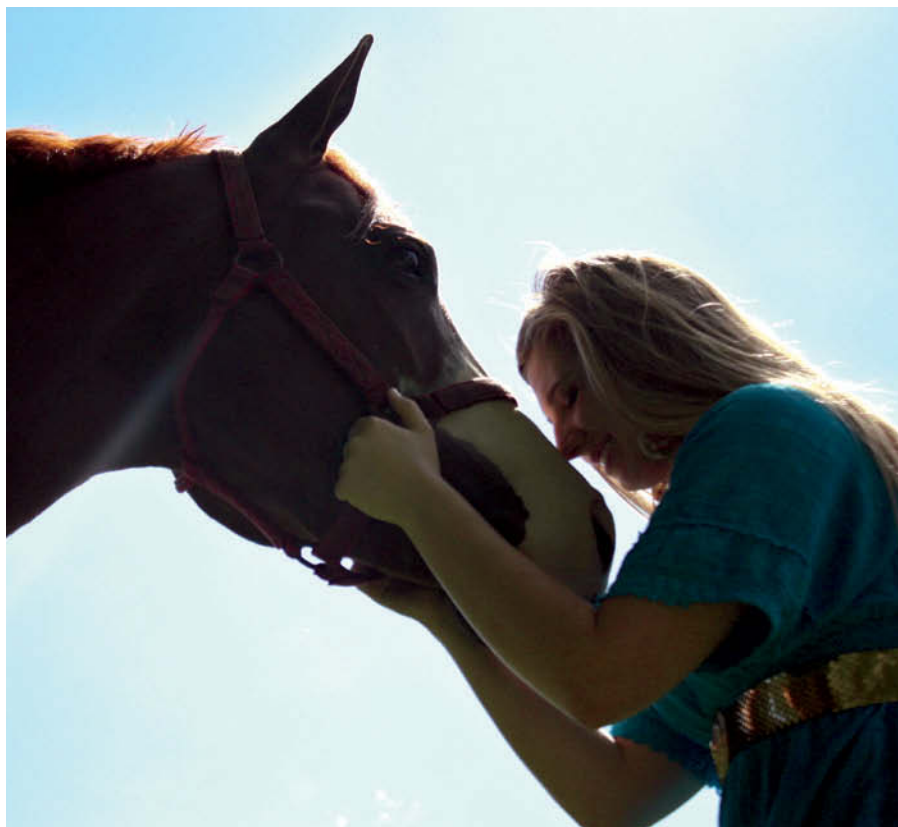
“It’s something that’s been a big influence on my life,” she says. “Horses have taught me so much with school. I’ve just learned to be prepared. You learn to teach yourself. If I’m gone to Congress, the day I get back, I have to turn in all my homework and take any tests that I missed. If you don’t get good grades, you don’t ride!”

Joking aside, Abigail says showing while attending a strict preparatory school has taught her responsibility, and more important, the time management that goes along with it.

“You learn to make a schedule for yourself,” says Abigail, who also found time to participate in school activities such as Latin Club and fundraising for Operation Smile, a worldwide charity that provides free surgeries for children with facial deformities. “You’re not going to be able to go to the movies with your friends on Friday night. You’re going to have to get up and ride and do chores in the morning. You learn where you really want to put your time in.

“You teach yourself how you should live your life. You learn to make better choices than a lot of the kids you’ve been exposed to because you’ve already learned that there are some things in life that are way more important.” 🐾

DYNAMITE SUGAR BAR WILL GO DOWN IN HISTORY AS ONLY THE second horse, and the first American Quarter Horse, to have her genome sequenced – the entirety of her DNA mapped out in a computer-readable line.

A research team at Texas A&M University announced in February that it had done it. “Sugar,” a 1994 bay mare by Doctor Dynamite and out of Sugar Bar Blake by Sugar Leo Bar, was bred and is owned by the Texas A&M University Department of Veterinary Medicine.

The first horse genome sequenced belonged to “Twilight,” a Thoroughbred mare owned by Cornell University, sequenced in 2007 through the work of the Horse Genome Project, an international consortium.

Why bother to sequence another horse, and an American Quarter Horse, specifically?

“Because of what it contributes to what we know about horses in general,” points out Dr. Noah Cohen, Texas A&M University veterinarian, professor and research team member.

“In genomic terms, it’s an astronomic amount of new information.”

“We’re in Texas,” adds Dr. Scott Dindot with a smile – the Texas A&M geneticist and assistant professor is the research team leader. “Quarter Horses are such an important breed to our state and the horse industry as a whole, doesn’t it make sense?”

The research was conducted through collaboration between the Texas A&M College of Veterinary Medicine and Biomedical Sciences, Texas A&M College of Agriculture and Life Sciences and the AgriLife Genomics and Bioinformatics Center. Results were published in BMC Genomics 2012, “Whole-Genome Sequencing and Genetic Variant Analysis of a Quarter Horse Mare,” Ryan Doan, lead author.

The Nitty Gritty

TO MAP SUGAR’S GENOME, THE RESEARCHERS TOOK A BLOOD sample and extracted all of her DNA (chromosomal and

mitochondrial). In that process, the chromosomes were fragmented into small pieces. Those genetic fragments are then sent through a machine that takes a week or so to generate short “reads,” or sequences, of them, a listing of the nucleic acids that make them up.

“The ordering of those sequences is where the computers come in,” Dr. Dindot explains. “Each chromosome is one long sequence of DNA, and we have a computer program that matches each sequence from Sugar’s genome to its place on the (annotated) reference Thoroughbred genome. It’s just like putting back together a puzzle.”

The vast majority of the two horses’ chromosomes are the same, because they are both horses. The differences are what make them individuals, and that’s where the fun begins.

“With Sugar, we were able to map her genome back to 97

percent of the reference (Thoroughbred) genome,” Dr. Dindot says. “But, we had a lot of DNA in Sugar that we couldn’t find a match for in the reference genome sequence, what we think is extra genetic information.”

Specifically, more than 19.1 million bases of new equine genomic sequence were generated through Sugar. (See “Big Process,” Page 64)

“Also, we found a lot of differences, or genetic variants, in Sugar’s DNA,” Dr. Dindot adds.

From small additions or deletions in the chromosomes to significantly large “chunks” of DNA, there were more than 3.6 million genetic variations of different kinds in her sequence.

“For example, if we talk specifically about single base-pair changes, (one kind of genetic variation,) there were approximately 700,000 of them in the Thoroughbred mare.

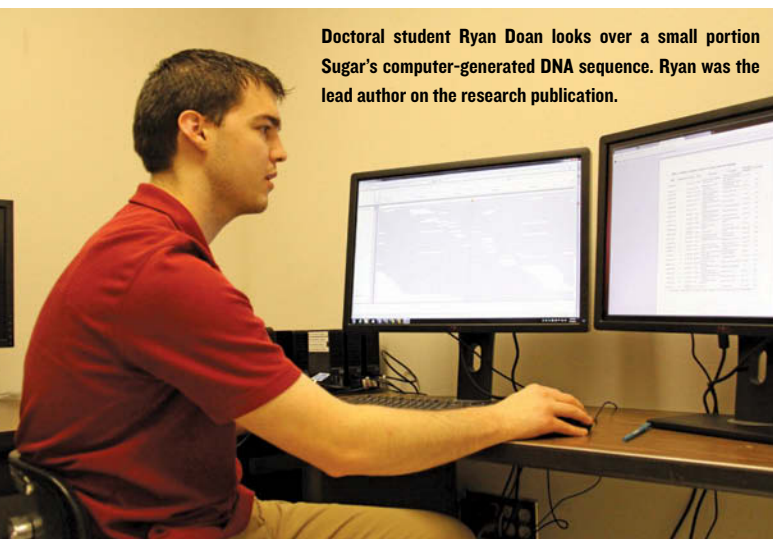
“When we sequenced Sugar, we found 3.1 million of them. Sugar’s sequence alone tripled the amount of genetic variation we knew about in the horse.”

In the analysis of Sugar’s genome, the research team compared her genetic sequence with everything currently known about equine DNA. For example, they found that she is a carrier for hereditary equine regional dermal asthenia.

In addition, much of her enhanced genetic variation relative to Twilight lies in genes involved in sensory perception and immune defense. She also has some genetic variance associated with endurance.

“The variation in the genetic sequence that we’ve found in each of these two animals is a starting place for us to understand how some of these genes are responsible for the traits that we see different between the two breeds,” Dr. Dindot says.

“Now, imagine doing this (and knowing these things) on a population scale. That’s where these projects are going.”

BIG PROCESS

A “genome” refers to an organism’s complete hereditary information; in mammals that information is in strands of chromosomal and mitochondrial DNA. Individual “genes” are portions of those DNA strands that code for certain traits. (“Genomics” is the study of entire genomes, whereas “genetics” refers to specific genes or groups of genes within the genome.)

When a full genome is “sequenced,” the order of all an organism’s DNA is plotted out in a single process.

Full genome sequencing generates a huge amount of data. Most of the advancements in genomics have been possible through advancements in computer technology – in processing power and memory storage.

Because of these technological advancements, what used to take years to accomplish in sequencing now takes weeks: Twilight’s – the Thoroughbred’s – genome was sequenced in a couple of years; Sugar’s genome was sequenced in less than a year, and now could be done in a couple of weeks.

Likewise, the cost has gone from millions down to thousands of dollars, and full-genome sequencing is rapidly becoming more and more commercially available to the public.

“The biggest bottleneck in genomics research today is in the analysis of the data,” Dr. Scott Dindot explains. “For example, Sugar’s genome all total is nearly a half of a terabyte worth of data. The computers we use to work with it have 100 GB of RAM.

“The data output is so great that just opening her file on one computer is impossible because there’s not enough memory on one computer to deal with a file that size.”

Personalized Medicine

“IN THE PAST, GENETICISTS HAVE LARGELY LOOKED AT INDIVIDUAL genes or individual variants,” Dr. Dindot points out, thus the discovery of single-gene disorders such as HERDA, hyperkalemic periodic paralysis, polysaccharide storage myopathy and glycogen branching enzyme deficiency.

“Research has moved on to looking at larger groups of genes, or arrays, and now our microscope is much bigger with the entire genome,” he says.

Looking at groupings of genes, or at entire genomes, increases researchers’ ability to understand the genetic components behind more complex diseases. Take, for example, laminitis.

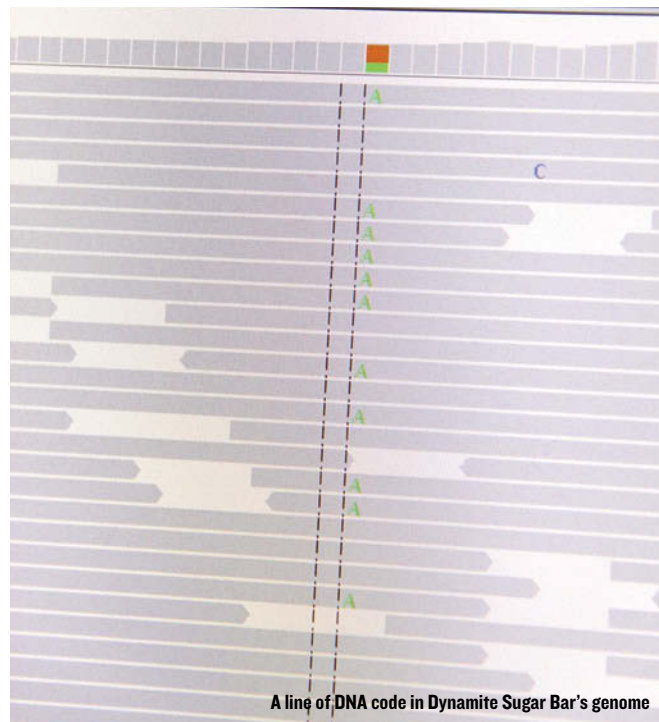
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- Hyperkalemic periodic paralysis, HYPP
- Polysaccharide storage myopathy, PSSM
- Glycogen branching enzyme deficiency, GBED
- Malignant hyperthermia, MH

Imagine what you might learn about how different horses contract laminitis if you could compare the genomes of 100 horses affected by it to the genomes of 100 horses not affected.

“It is likely that a lot of genes are involved with laminitis,” Dr. Cohen explains. “But a genomic analysis could lead to identifying animals at high risk for it. It could also identify molecular processes that could suggest strategies for new treatments: Drugs targeting a specific pathway involved with either inflammation or cellular metabolism might be suggested, for example.

“We also know that a lot of the way that animals respond to certain drugs can be genetically determined. So, in this example, we might be able to understand which horses are better responders to certain treatments for laminitis.”

Genomic studies could uncover combinations of genes that could predispose or protect individuals from other diseases such as *Rhodococcus equi* pneumonia or equine protozoal myelitis.

“By identifying certain genes related to a disease, there is the potential for targeted therapeutics and prevention,” Dr. Cohen adds. “It’s going to change medicine. In humans, these concepts are part of what is called ‘personalized medicine.’”

This kind of research becomes more of a possibility as the cost of genome sequencing goes down.

“In the past few years, we’ve seen a technological revolution in genomics comparable to what we’ve seen in computers,” Dr. Dindot says, “in equipment used, what we can do and what it costs. The technology used to sequence the Quarter Horse is very different from what was used to sequence the Thoroughbred.

“From the consumer standpoint, it’s still very expensive but the cost is going down. At some point, we could see this technology offered – and affordable – to just about anyone.”

Breeding Strategies

OF COURSE, THAT LEADS TO TESTING: ONCE YOU IDENTIFY A GENE or group of genes and how it’s expressed in a horse, you can test for it and use the result in your breeding program.

AQHA breeders are familiar with testing for single-gene disorders and using that information to decide what indi-

viduals to cross (see “Five-Panel Test” on Page 64).

Imagine expanding that to having a test for genes that could avoid a predisposition for laminitis or for genes that would enhance trainability and good disposition.

“There are cattle studies trying to identify genetic variants that may or may not predispose an animal to getting sick at a feedyard,” Dr. Dindot says. “(Knowing that) might not guarantee that certain cattle won’t get sick, but a feedyard manager could use that information. He can say, these are (genetically) at risk for getting a respiratory illness whereas these are not, and bring that into how he manages them.”

He adds: “Remember, unless you are talking about single-gene disorders where there is a mutation clearly causing a disease, with most diseases you would just be trying to stack the (genetic) cards in your favor.

“There is always an environmental component. For example, studies have shown that environment can influence behavior more than genetics can; but clearly some innate behavioral traits have a genetic component behind them.”

Genomic analysis could also further help breeders maintain healthy levels of genetic variation in their herds, helping them see exactly how inbred an individual is or not.

Sugar has only one full Thoroughbred in the first four generations of her pedigree: on her dam side, Three Bars (TB) shows up through his son, Sugar Bars. Three Bars appears one more time in Sugar’s pedigree but further back – her sire, Doctor Dynamite, is a tail-male descendant through Doc O’Lena.

The rest of Sugar’s pedigree is peppered with different lines going back to a cross-section of American Quarter Horse foundation sires. When individuals do repeat, as with Three Bars, it is typically further back, through different families and on either the sire or dam side of her pedigree. Two examples: Old Sorrel’s blood comes in through Two D Two by Silver King on her sire side, and Handy Pep Dublin by Hired Hand on her dam side; she traces back to Leo through Rondo Leo on her sire side and through Mac Lee on her dam side.

The breeding lines and crosses in her pedigree indicate the enhanced genetic variations the researchers found in her genome.

“Hybrid vigor in an individual shows up as how often it is heterozygous for traits, (receiving different copies of a gene from its sire and dam),” Dr. Dindot explains. “Animals that are outbred are very heterozygous because they have a lot of different genomes represented (from different individuals in their breeding).”

Case in point: Sugar’s previously mentioned 3.1 million single base-pair changes vs. Twilight’s 700,000.

Just a Spoonful

THE PLAIN, BAY MARE LOOKING OVER THE white fence in a paddock across from the Texas A&M University Large-Animal Hospital looks about as ordinary a Quarter Horse as you can get. Her eye is friendly as she nudges her nose into the purple halter Dr. Cohen holds up. Her hoof breaks over squarely under a short cannon and generous hip as Dr. Dindot leads her back to a stall in the old hospital.

It’s a visual representation of the lines of DNA in her cells, coding for traits that stock-

men have sought and treasured for generations.

“From a genetic standpoint – our understanding of horse genetics is greatly advanced just by sequencing the whole genome of one more horse,” Dr. Cohen says. “For us, it’s more than just the exercise of doing it; we have specific ideas in mind for using what we’ve learned from Sugar in terms of studying disease and traits in horses.

He adds: “Sugar’s genome data was in the public domain before our research manuscript was formally accepted. Our intent is to share what we have.”

The accomplishments of each exhibitor and horse will be recorded on AQHA’s official records – another cause for celebration.

“I am really proud of how the Latin American Championships came together, and I especially want to thank the Brazilian

Quarter Horse Association for hosting the inaugural event,” said AQHA Past President Johannes Orgeldinger, who helped establish the Latin American Championships and was there to help exhibitors and present awards. “When we first talked about this, I think we would have been happy with only a few countries participating. But to have all of the Latin American affiliates represented is much more than we expected, and everyone had a good time cheering on their favorite

Region **10** Snapshots

Who's who and what's what at a sweet little Regional Championship.

TRAIL IS GOING STEADILY OUTSIDE UNDER A BRIGHT sun and a stout breeze at the 2012 Region Ten Championship in Jacksonville, Florida. Inside the Jacksonville Equestrian Center, the western pleasure is big enough for splits in some classes. Lined up at the concession window for fresh, hot ham sandwiches is a nice cross-section of the Region Ten population.

The lure of a relaxed show with great prizes has brought in characters of all kinds, 'cause horse people are certainly that: characters in their own little stories. Some just might sound like you!

"I got tired of livin' in this four-walled condo," says Hilda Houston, 83, of Albany, Georgia, so she bought a Ford truck and a 16-foot cattle trailer and went on a horse hunt. It was shortly after her son, Marshall, died of a brain tumor in 2007.

Hilda began showing in AQHA pleasure driving in 1983, and Marshall shared her horse love. Hilda's husband, Otis, died in 2002, and

eventually Marshall moved home. But when he became ill, they sold off their 20-plus horses, and she moved to town.

But retirement and no horses just wasn't her cup of tea. Hilda had worked as a bookkeeper until age 80, and had always started her own driving horses.

"I found this horse in the woods," she says of Bills Hollywood Babe, a 2000 mare by Wagners Junior Joker and out of Bills Beauty by Stuffins Jack, bred by Janice Day of Dawson, Georgia.

"I've trained four (pleasure drivers)," she says, "but this is the hardest horse I've ever had!"

She worked the mare on the ground but was worried about hooking her up without help. Eventually, she sought out trainer Bill Moore, also of Albany, and he has hauled her to shows ever since. After she "had a spell" with her heart in February, Hilda thought about quitting but didn't. They hauled in to the Region Ten for two driving classes.

"I go day-by-day now," she says and points to the gray mare. "That's my life, my horse."

“The Jumping Cow Horse from Indiantown,” that’s what Veronica Harris of Indiantown, Florida, calls her 10-year-old gelding, Pesetas Tivio. By Cee Heart Taylor and out of Pesetas Baby by Poco Epic, the bay is from South Dakota, bred by Veronica’s cousin, Judy Mathis, who “just didn’t know what to do with him,” so Veronica took him on.

Veronica, a professional braider on the hunter-jumper circuit, does everything on the gelding, from jumping to extreme trail riding, cow horse and moving cattle. Pesetas Tivio even once dragged a jeep that broke down during a parade.

The two schooled over a palm tree that fell down in their pasture before coming to Region Ten, “to have fun showing.” For their trouble, they won the reserve in Novice amateur working hunter.

“He’s the best,” Veronica says, proudly. Not sure anyone would argue that he’s an all-around American Quarter Horse. They finished in the top-five in cow horse boxing and competed in reining to complete their Regional Championship experience.

Lanette Wilke of Jacksonville, Florida, and An Obvious Bet

“It’s amazing what horses will make you buy!” says Lanette Wilke of Jacksonville, Florida.

Lanette literally “just retired” the week before Region Ten after 38 years with AT&T. Her 7-year-old gelding, An Obvious Bet, is part of her retirement plan – he’s already “made” her buy a trailer. She sold her house last week, too, and is looking for another place ... with land, maybe? For a barn and, well, we all know how that goes, don’t we?

She brought An Obvious Bet to the Regional Championship to “get some exposure”; it’s their first AQHA event. The gelding is by The Bets On and out of Zippos Satin Review by An Obvious Zippo, bred by Jimmy Bryant of Chatsworth, Georgia, and has 44 Palomino Horse Breeders of America halter points.

Lanette hauled in with friends, Jeff and Kathi Player of Naples, who were showing their gelding, Totally Golden Kid. Lanette was hoping she’d be ready for her regional class, but she needn’t have worried – this show is meant to help people get their feet wet and enjoy what AQHA shows have to offer. 🐾

GOOD GOLLY!

The Region Ten Championship committee was thrilled with the entries for this year’s show, roughly double the 2011 event – final entries stopped just shy of 1,150 (unofficial at press time).

In addition to the regional championship classes, the committee added double-judged AQHA and Palomino Horse Breeders of America pointed shows. AQHA entries hit about 775 and PHBA added another 50 (unofficial at press time).

More fun facts:

- Region Ten had five judges, with Jill Newcomb, Clay Cavinder and Tim Finkenbinder for Region Ten; Jeff Allen and Murray Griggs for the AQHA pointed show; and Clay Cavinder and Tim Finkenbinder also judging the PHBA show.
- Fun stuff included a “Doggie Trail” class for the kids; Florida farms hosting hospitality breakfasts every morning; and a “happy hour” cash bar from 4 p.m. to 7 p.m. Friday and Saturday.
- When trail pre-entries went well over 100, the Region Ten committee went to work on a back-up plan, scrambling five extra judges at the last minute: Peter Morgan, Don McDuffee and Pam Scott for the Region Ten; Larry Little and Nancy Swarm for the AQHA show; and Don McDuffee and Pam Scott for the PHBA show. Riders showed in random order in the outdoor pen.
- The biggest Region Ten class (by entries) was Novice amateur showmanship at 49; in second was Novice amateur western horsemanship with 45.
- More than \$135,000 in prizes went to regional championship exhibitors, thanks to AQHA corporate partners and regional sponsors.
- Of course, adding to the excitement this year is the prospect of qualifying for an AQHA Novice Championship Show in October.

There are three ways to qualify for the SmartPak West and Nutrena East novice championship shows – through a state AQHA affiliate, by showing at 20 AQHA shows or by finishing in the top 10 in a class at a regional championship.

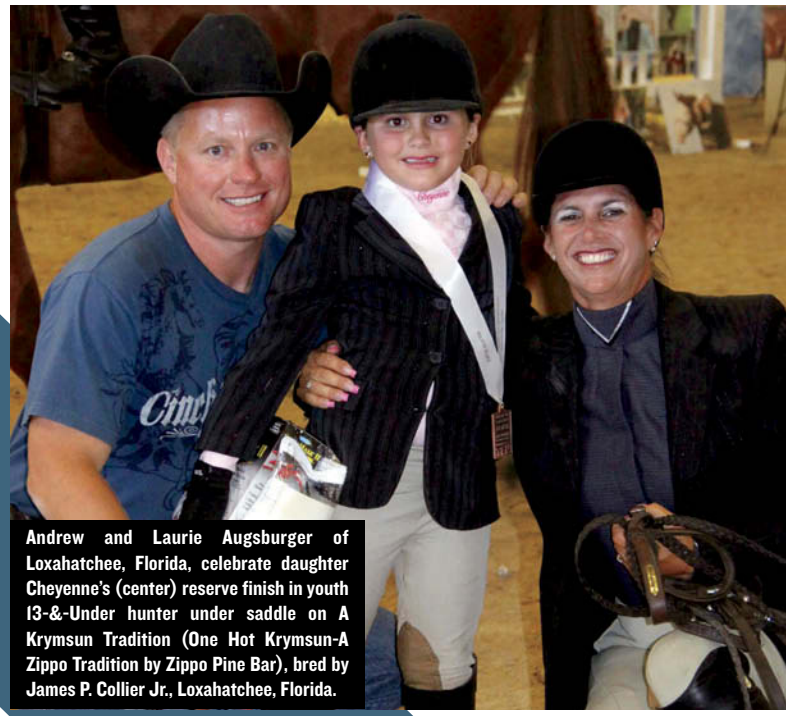

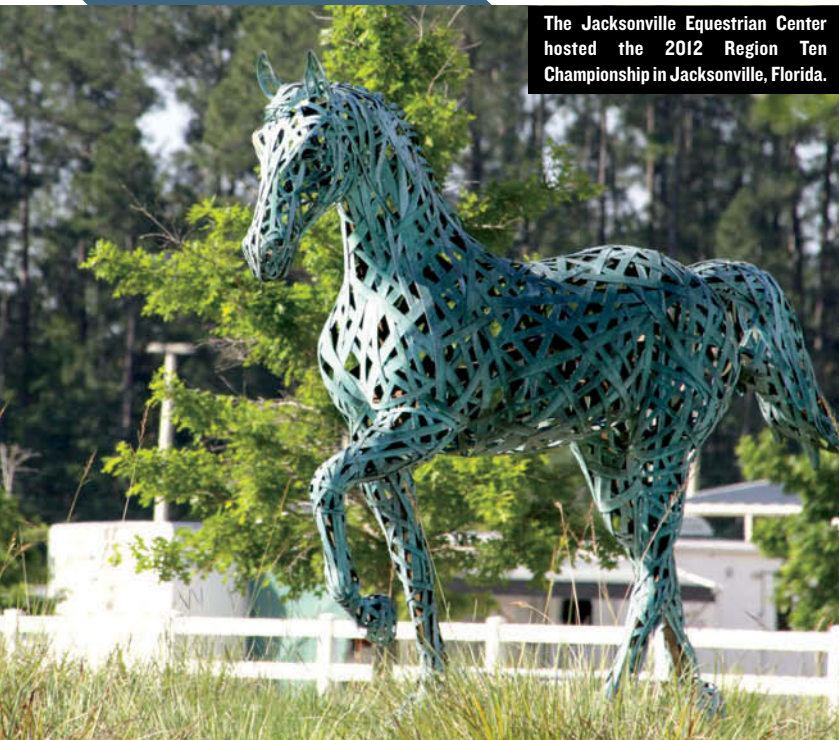

AQHA IS SHINING THE SPOTLIGHT ON THE TWO EXTREMES OF the competitor equation: This year, the youngest and the most golden exhibitors who step foot into an AQHA world championship arena will ride out toting accolades.

And on the other end of the spectrum, at the 2012 Adequan Select World Championship Show, competitors age 70 and over will vie for the brand-new Super-Select award, presented to the top-three 70-&-over competitors in every class at the show.

The 13-&-under and Super-Select competitors won't receive just any ol' trophy; these awards will come straight from AQHA's new trophy company, Awards Recognition Concepts.

"Recognizing our 13-&-under and Super-Select exhibitors is a great way to place those exhibitors in the limelight; those exhibitors have worked hard to qualify for the world shows, and they are tough competitors when they get in the pen," says AQHA President Gene Graves of Grand Island, Nebraska. "There are many great opportunities this year to be recognized for your performances at the AQHA world championship shows." 🐾

DON'T FORGET ABOUT INTERMEDIATE AWARDS

Once again, AQHA will recognize the top-three Intermediate competitors in every class at the AQHA world championship shows. Here's how the Intermediate awards work:

- An Intermediate exhibitor at the AQHA world shows is defined as follows: An exhibitor who has never been in the top 10 at a world show in the particular class in which they are competing. For example, AQHA will not separate junior reining from senior reining, or junior western pleasure from senior western pleasure, for purposes of determining if an exhibitor is an Intermediate. However, AQHA will recognize the Intermediate exhibitors in each of the junior and senior open classes.
- Intermediate will run as classes within classes, not separate. AQHA will not bring back the top Intermediate riders for a ride-off or in a separate class.
- Intermediate exhibitor status is based only on an exhibitor's lifetime, combined world shows record, not on the number of points he/she has accumulated.
- An exhibitor does not have to make it to the finals of his/her class to be considered for an Intermediate award.
- There is no entry fee or nomination procedure for an exhibitor to be considered for an Intermediate award.
- The awards will be called the AQHA first place, AQHA Intermediate second place and the AQHA Intermediate third place.
- Intermediate accomplishments also will appear on the exhibitor's and horse's AQHA official record.

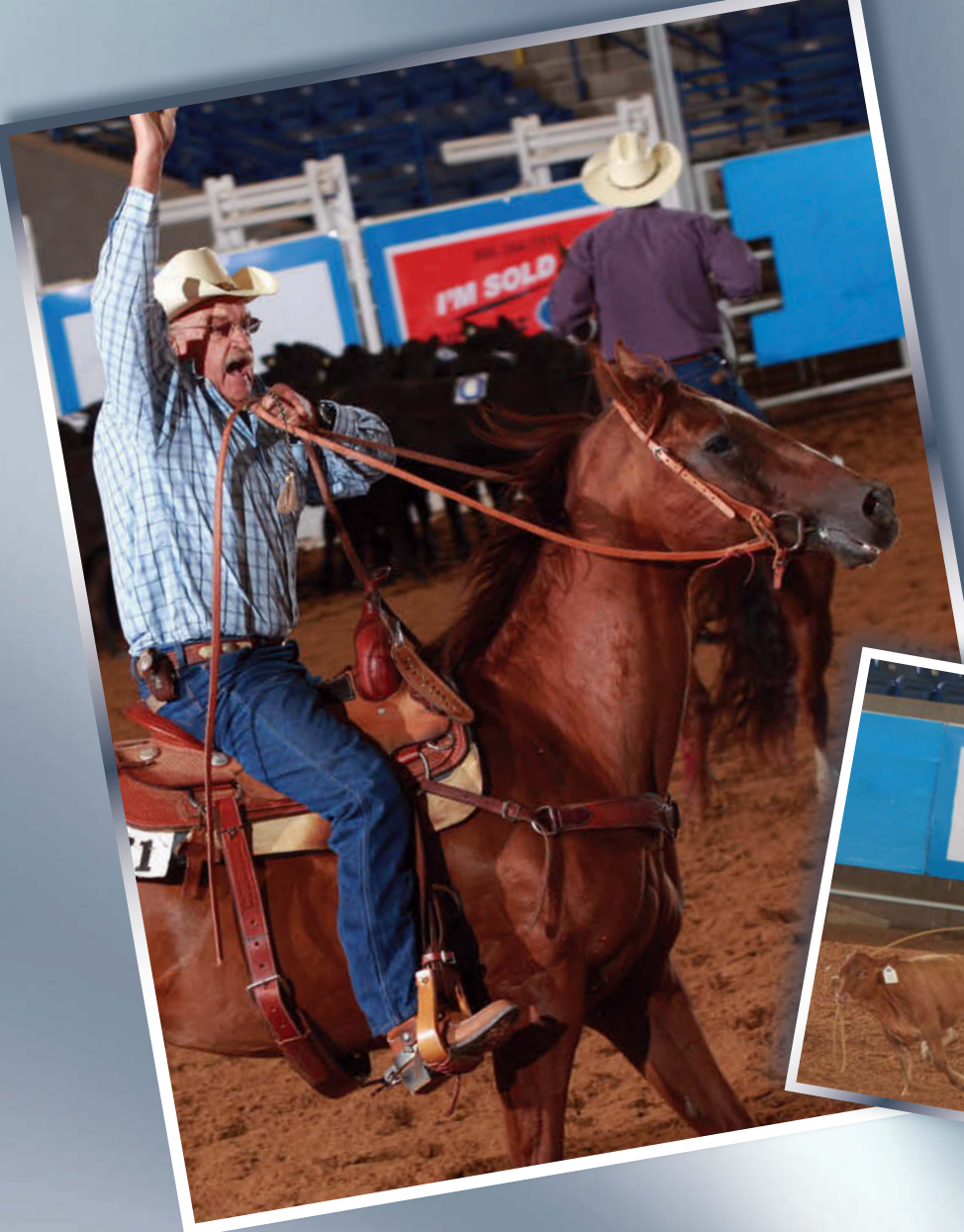

*Horses earn their own awards during
the NCEA national finals.*

DURING THE NATIONAL COLLEGIATE EQUESTRIAN ASSOCIATION'S national finals, teams compete to put their universities on top.

This year, Texas A&M University won the overall and western title, while Baylor University won the English title April 14 in Waco, Texas.

But in addition to having the best riders, colleges also hope to have the best horses.

The teams get to vote for their favorite horses in each discipline. The judges also get to choose their favorite horses, and those horses are recognized with a trophy.

In the western disciplines, those horses are American Quarter Horses.

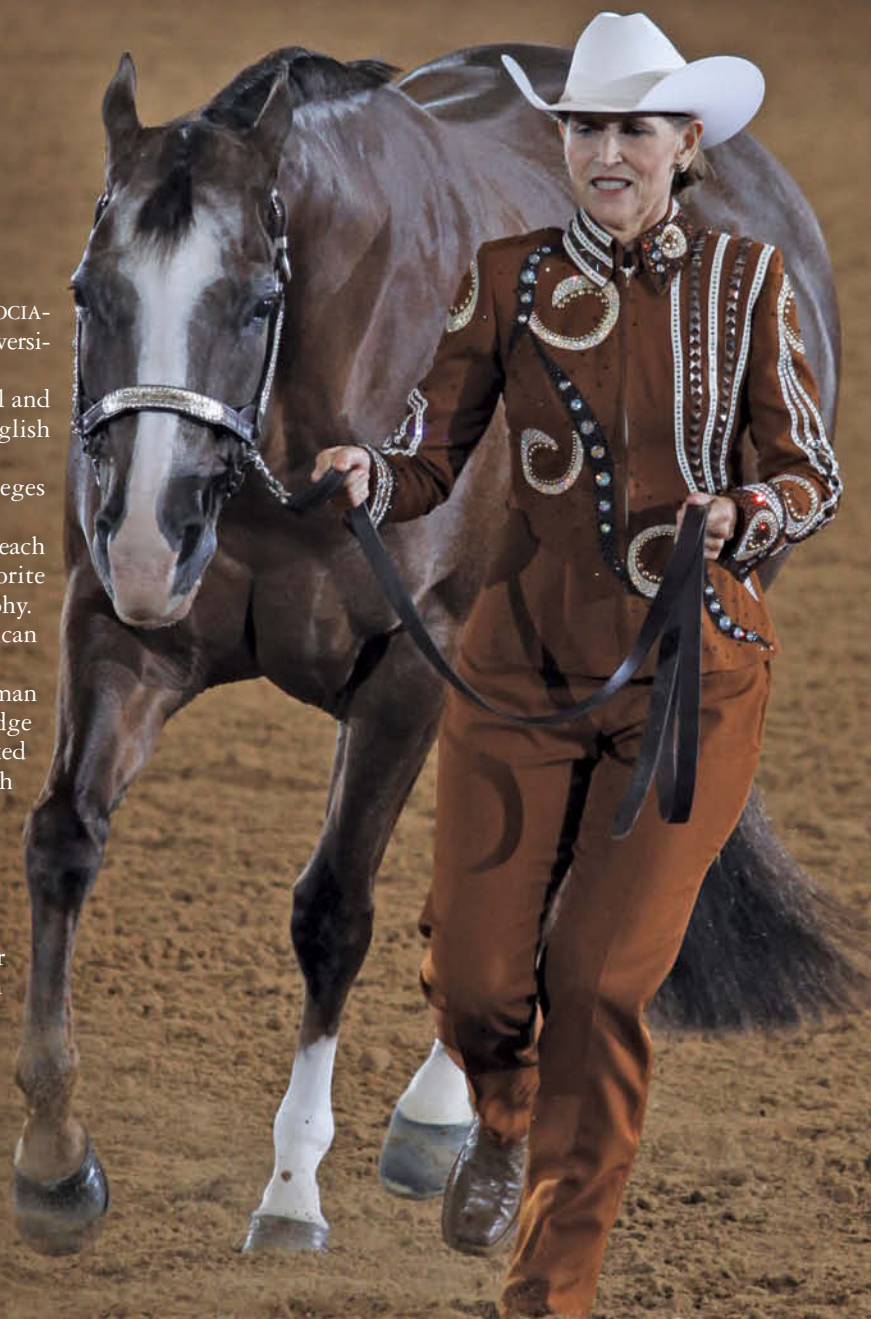
In 2012, the judges, AQHA Professional Horseman Betsy Tuckey of Liberty, Kentucky, and AQHA judge Debra Jones-Wright of Plainville, Georgia, picked What An Easy Chic in reining and Assigned With Love in horsemanship.

The equestrian teams picked Mr Solanos Kid as the horse of the year in reining and Zippos Smokin in horsemanship.

Both reining horses belong to the Oklahoma State University equestrian program, the third year that Oklahoma State has had a horse honored in reining.

"We don't just bring a team that's in contention for national titles," says AQHA Professional Horseman and OSU head equestrian coach Larry Sanchez. "We want to bring horses that are in contention for awards. That's our goal as we ride every day throughout our season."

In 2010, Assigned With Love was in the top 10 at the Adequan Select World Championship Show in showmanship with Bonnie Elber. In 2012, she was the team choice for top horsemanship horse at the NCEA national finals.

What An Easy Chic

WHAT AN EASY CHIC, THE JUDGES' REINING PICK, IS A GOOD example of the OSU program, Larry says.

The 2000 sorrel mare arrived in Norman, Oklahoma, six years ago with a few quirks.

"I'm just proud of my team and the way they ride day-in and day-out to get her to receive such an honor and to be recognized by the judges," Larry says. "She's so talented a mare, and to be so bright and happy as she was all week at nationals and to be recognized by the judges for that? It's a testament to how the athletes ride every day."

"Shady" is by Smart Chic Olena and out of An Easy Answer by Great Pine. She was bred by trainer Patti Brownshadel of Hempstead, Texas, who also owned a full sister to An Easy Answer, Pines Nifty Doll.

"I had two full sisters by Great Pine," Patti remembers. "My entire breeding program was built around these Great Pine daughters. They both gave me incredible babies that sold for good sums, and they trained well, and people wanted them."

Patti has trained since she was 10, but An Easy Answer was her first project to prepare for the National Reining Horse Association Futurity.

"I purchased her as a yearling," Patti says. "I trained her for two years, and then 30 days before the big show, I got a trainer friend to ride her – and she was a finalist. My very first horse made the finals."

After Patti and her husband showed An Easy Answer extensively, they sent the mare to the breeding shed, matching her with Smart Chic Olena because Pines Nifty Doll already had an outstanding Smart Chic Olena foal.

"I never showed the mare again because she started having such nice foals," Patti says, adding that she never got to show Shady, An Easy Answer's second foal. When Shady was 2, Patti took her to the NRHA Futurity to keep up her training at the show. That's also where Shady found a new home.

"We sold her to a really nice family, William and Barbara

Shobe," Patti says. "She was just a real beautiful, talented mare. She was kind and trainable, very tolerant. I would imagine that a collegiate reining horse would have to be tolerant to deal with all the different riders.

"I'm sitting here in an indoor arena riding one of (Shady's) siblings that (An Easy Answer's) babies helped me build. So to hear this mare has been named (judges' pick), I'm as thrilled for her as if she were still mine."

Mr Solanos Kid

MR SOLANOS KID, THE HORSE PICKED BY THE EQUESTRIAN teams as their favorite reiner, has a funny barn name. Well,

it's funny to everyone but Larry, who has to share his name with the horse.

"He came with the name," Coach Larry says. "We understand it came from Larry the Cable Guy. (The horse) can be a little goofy sometimes."

He's also an honest ride.

"He just gives his heart every time he goes into the pen, and he's a very talented individual," Larry says. "He has a lot of natural talent and is very gifted in his abilities. A horse that has those kinds of talents and the type of heart and try that he has, you notice when you've been around horses any time at all."

The 2000 dun gelding (Brennas Kid-Solanos Melody by Mr Melody Jac) was bred by Wayne and Stacey Jones of Franklin, Kentucky. He earned \$10,817 through the National Reining Horse Association, and he saw quite a bit of success in AQHYA show pens with Taylor New of Anna, Texas. In 2007, they were fifth at the Built Ford Tough AQHYA World Championship Show in reining, plus seventh in the 2007 year-end youth reining standings. When Taylor, now a junior, joined the OSU equestrian team, so did "Larry."

Soon, the family donated the horse to the college.

Stacey isn't surprised the gelding makes a good collegiate reiner. She was a big fan of Larry's mother.

"We crossed (Solanos Melody) several times with Brennas Kid, and we were really pleased with the resulting foals," she says. "She was a daughter of Mr Melody Jac out of a mare named Cinderella Solano, and I bought her at the end of her show career. I loved the mare. She just had a ton of heart."

"I liked her so much that I bought her full sister, Ms Moonshine Melody, and still have her today. (Solanos Melody) was just a top-notch mare."

As a colt, Larry was a looker, a big red dun like his sire, Brennas Kid.

"Just as sweet as he could be," Stacy remembers. "A beautiful red dun, just really a nice colt. ... I'm thrilled (he won) and happy for (Oklahoma State). It sounds like he's just like his mom and he'll give it his all."

Zippos Smokin

IN HORSEMANSHIP, THE JUDGES WERE IMPRESSED WITH ZIPPOS Smokin. They should have been. The 22-year-old gelding has been impressing judges across the United States for a long time.

In youth, amateur and open AQHA competition, Zippos Smokin has earned 406.5 points. He has youth and amateur Superiors in showmanship plus seven performance Registers of Merit.

Currently, the big chestnut belongs to youth exhibitor Hayden Holcombe of College Station, Texas, who loaned him to the Texas A&M University equestrian team for the trip to the national finals.

"He's a quirky old man, and that's probably why he's sound at 22 and still going strong," says Texas A&M horsemanship coach Beth Bass. "He's talented and honest, a steady Eddie. He has a lot of buttons, but if you know how to push them, he's pretty solid for you."

Zippos Smokin is by American Quarter Horse Hall of Fame stallion Zippo Pine Bar and out of Smokeys Decision by Smokey Duster Too. Hayden and the A&M athletes call him "Smokey."

His breeder, Ann Perry, who now lives in Santa Rosa Beach, Florida, remembers him well, along with his mother, a gray mare belonging to a customer. Ann and her husband, Robert, owned Zippo Pine Bar.

"We leased mares," Ann explains. "We'd get the next year's baby, and we'd send them back home bred, so the owner of the mare would get a baby the following year. We had an opportunity to breed some great mares, but we didn't have the expense of owning them all the time."

Ann still maintains a website for Zippo Pine Bar and says horse owners still contact her about their horses, saying the horses look just like the legendary stallion.

"One of the attributes everyone loved so much about ('Zippo') was his disposition and that anybody could ride him," Ann says. "The trainers loved him because they could go win the big ones, but kids and amateurs, they could all get along with him,

Emily Stockford, Kansas State University

and I think that says it all with this horse right here.”

And Zippo always loved children, she adds.

“If people who came to the ranch had young children, he loved us to put them on his back, and he would jog up and down that barn aisle, and it was really cool. He just was a mellow soul, he really was.”

Assigned With Love

IN HORSEMANSHIP, THE EQUESTRIAN TEAMS PICKED ASSIGNED With Love, a 2001 chestnut mare owned by New Mexico State University.

“We’re very proud of her,” says NMSU Assistant Coach Robin Morris. “She’s got a lot of show experience, good training and she had a well-done resume before she came here. We had high hopes that she would fit in really well, and she was so easygoing and easy to be around, and she was a willing horse to ride.”

“She got right into it with no problem, and she was a star.” But “Emma” isn’t really a horsemanship horse: She’s a world champion in youth showmanship.

“She’s fancy,” Robin says. “It’s not like she was just a good honest horse. She’s a fancy horse, and that’s something you don’t always see in a collegiate horse.”

With Jessica Baird of Rockville, Indiana, Emma gathered 222.5 showmanship points and 96.5 in western pleasure plus a handful of points in horsemanship and halter. In 2007, Emma and Jessica were the Built Ford Tough Youth World champions in showmanship.

Select exhibitor Bonnie Elber of Phoenix bought the mare particularly for her showmanship skills.

“I’ve had two hip replacements, so I really couldn’t ride well,” she says. “Showmanship was the only thing I could do.”

Bonnie added another 64 points to Emma’s showmanship total, plus a couple of top-10 finishes in showmanship at the Select World Championship Show.

“By then, I’d had both hips replaced, and I had a hard time riding her, because I don’t have a lot of leg strength, and so I donated her.”

Bonnie had previously donated another horse to NMSU, and she was comfortable with the process. But she still watched avidly on the AQHA live webcast of the NCEA national finals to see how Emma was doing in Waco.

“She looked fantastic performing,” Bonnie says. “I emailed the coach and said she looks better there than when I had her.”

One of Emma’s drawbacks was that she only has a simple lead change. That’s not a problem for collegiate equestrian competition, where the patterns call for lead changes without specifying flying or simple. Plus, the daily routine has been good for Emma, Bonnie says.

“I know she’s hard to ride, but she didn’t look hard to ride when they were riding her,” she says. “They’ve done a lot with her. Somebody told me when I donated her that she was going to touch more lives there than going to a private buyer. I felt good about that. And it turned out to be true.” ■

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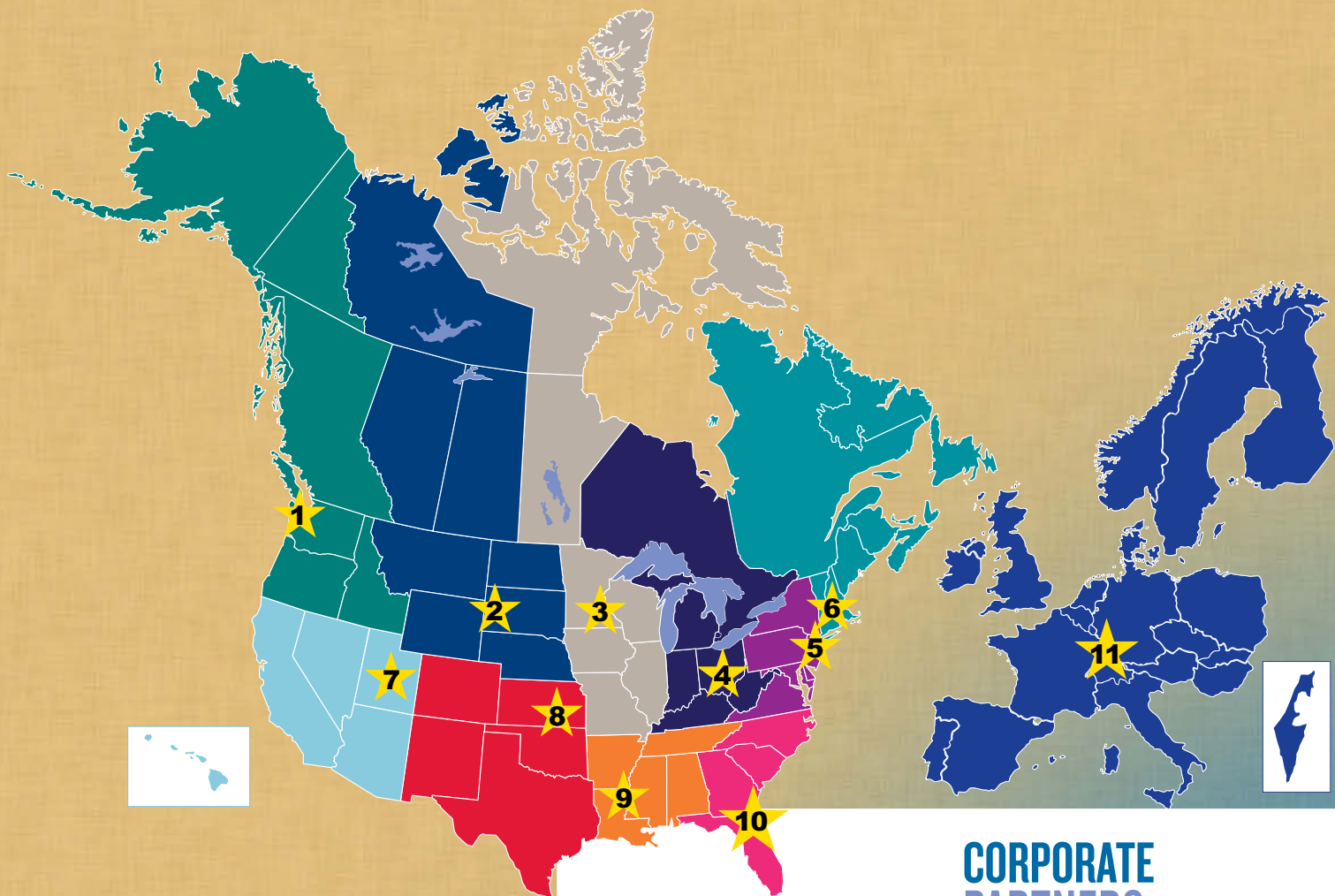

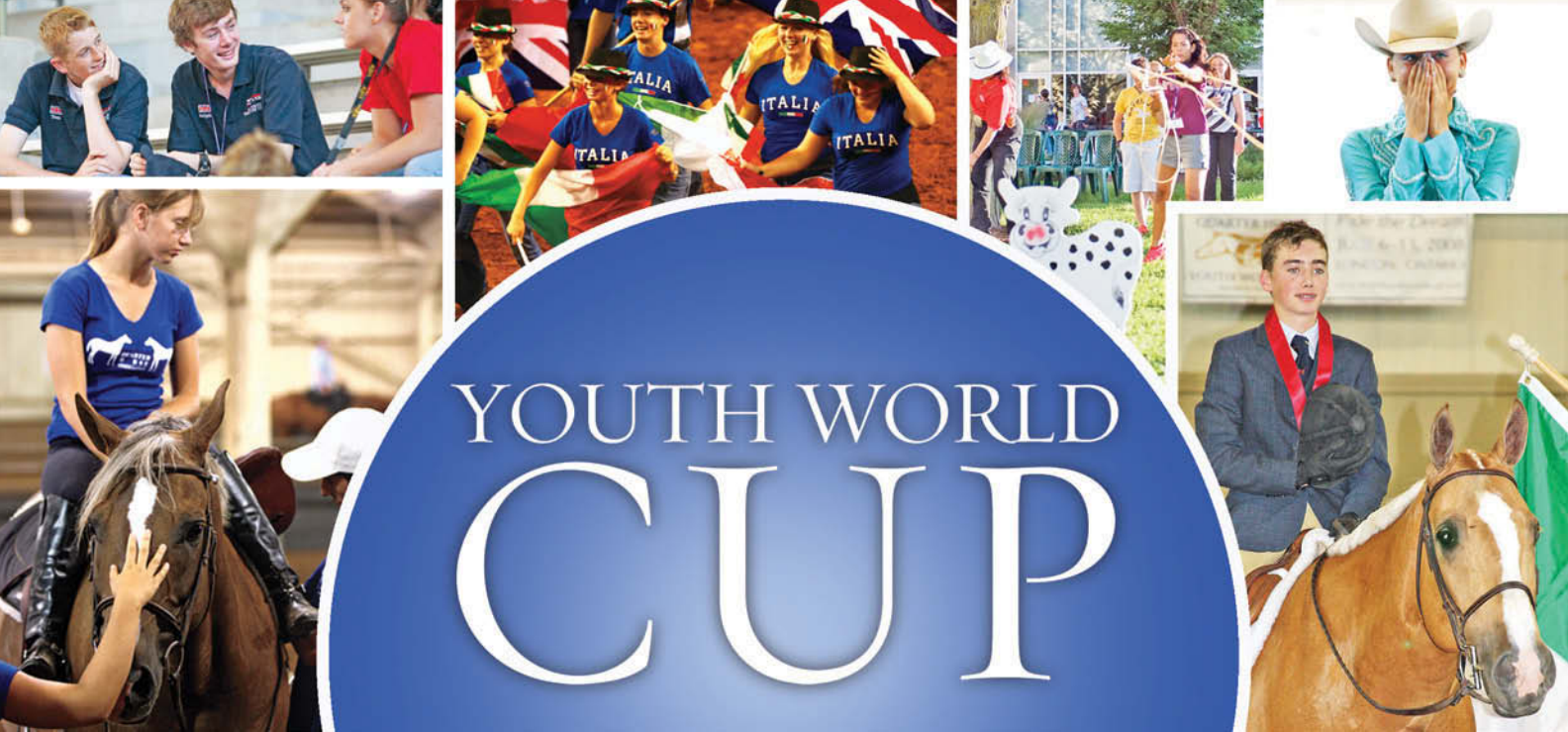

*Competition, fellowship and American Quarter Horses combine
for a unique international youth experience.*

AROUND THE GLOBE, YOUNG RIDERS HAVE BEEN PREPARING FOR THE 2012 American Quarter Horse Youth World Cup.

The competition, which takes place every other year, pits teams from different countries on sets of horses they have never ridden in two horse shows. This year's competition is July 21-29 in Kreuth, Germany, and 16 countries will be fielding teams of five youth riders.

AQHA's international department and organizers in Germany have been working full steam ahead for the last few months. Poul Moller, the president of the Federation of European Quarter Horse Associations, is host of the big event, which depends on the kindness of Quarter Horse donors for its success.

"The beauty of having this competition in Europe is that people show their horses in a variety of events," says David Avery, AQHA director of international. "All the horses are shown in halter, and a higher percentage is shown in three to five events. I've found 40 (donated) horses so far that have substantial show records."

David is working from an extensive checklist, based on owner comments and show records, to make sure each set of horses has at least two high-performing individuals in it. When the teams arrive in Kreuth, they'll draw for their sets. Then through clinics with AQHA Professional Horsemen, they'll get to know their horses before competition.

They compete in seven all-around events – showmanship, horsemanship, western pleasure, hunter under saddle, hunt seat equitation, western riding and trail – plus reining and cutting.

"We're running a special event that's an AQHA-NCHA cutting event the Saturday prior to the Youth World Cup cutting on Sunday, so that we have all those horses available to the youth," David adds.

Most of the countries picked team members several months ago, and those riders have been in training with a team coach since then, preparing to put all their work on the line for national glory.

But the American Quarter Horse Youth World Cup isn't just a horse show. It's an opportunity for youth exhibitors to meet their peers from around the world.

"It's amazing to see where Youth World Cup leads competitors. These are the riders who go on to be industry leaders in their countries," David says. "Just at the 2010 Alltech FEI World Equestrian Games alone, we had four international riders who had come up through the Youth World Cup ranks. Jessica Sternberg, who back in the day rode at the Youth World Cup for Team United Kingdom, was one of those four riders at the 2010 World Equestrian Games and she's also had so much success in National Reining Horse Association competition."

Grischa Ludwig, a former Youth World Cup member representing Germany, represented his country again in the 2010 WEG, David adds.

Parties, receptions and cultural exchanges are highlights for the competitors, who often maintain those friendships as they become leaders of AQHA in the future.

Former all-around competitors Roger Wagner and John Mitchell both represented Australia on Youth World Cup teams and are now cutting horse trainers based in the United States with multimillion-dollar careers.

"I'm just thrilled with all the things going into Youth World Cup right now," David says. "It's going to be exciting to see all these future leaders in one place, all sharing the love of the Quarter Horse." ■

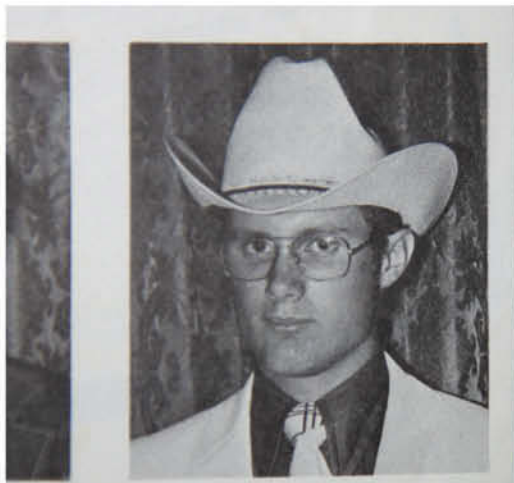

The mare with the crooked blaze was a one-of-a kind broodmare.

ALTHOUGH SHE WAS BRED TO BE A PERFORMANCE HORSE, ST High Society never saw the inside of a competition arena. Instead, she became one of AQHA's all-time leading halter broodmares, holding a record that's enviable today.

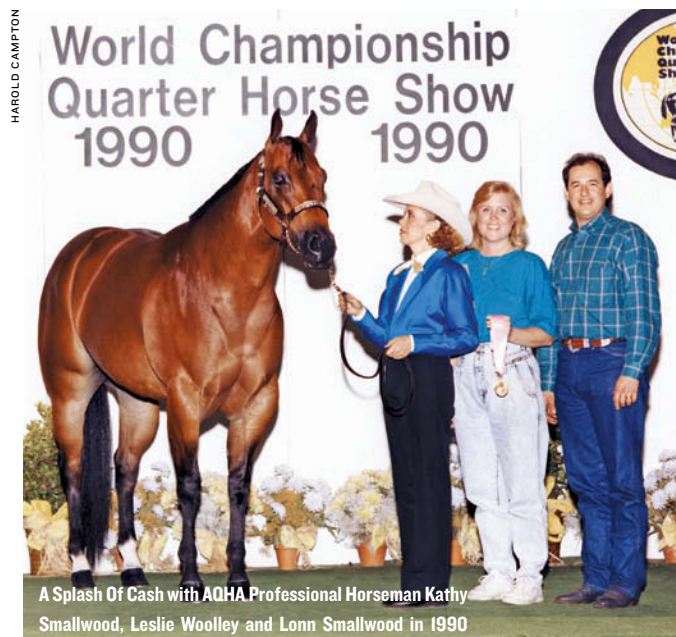
Leslie Woolley of Phoenix, St High Society's owner for most of the mare's life, first saw her in 1981 when she was looking for a pleasure horse.

"Ray Logan found four late 2-year-old rider prospects for me to see," Leslie says. "We were looking for a possible (All American Quarter Horse) Congress 3-year-old maturity horse. Sonny Thomison had all four, and 'Slide,' although the least broke, appeared to have the movement and the pretty to make it to the Congress for the next year."

In addition to the looks and fancy way of going, the mare, bred by Paul and Frances Scott of Parker, Colorado, had the perfect performance bloodlines. Her sire, Slide Me Five, a 1975 black stallion by Isle Breeze, had earned Superiors in halter and western pleasure, the 1976 yearling stallion world championship and an AQHA Champion title. Her dam, Gene Bars, was racing

bred, tracing back to Tonto Bars Gill.

Leslie decided to take the bay mare, and Ray started training her. After 90 days, both were beginning to look at the mare as a definite 3-year-old maturity prospect.

"She was about 14.3 or 15 hands, with beautiful conformation," Leslie says. "She was structurally what they wanted for a pleasure horse back then, plus she was a fancy, fancy mover."

The mare continued to progress and "by late summer, she was making all the right changes," Leslie says. However, with payments made and the Congress only a month away, tragedy struck.

"She severely pulled her stifle," Leslie says. Although the injury was surgically repaired, Slide was put on six months of stall rest. Congress was out.

Eventually, the mare progressed to hand walking that continued through the late fall, winter and early spring. It was during those months that Leslie saw the mare begin to change from "a nice pretty little pleasure mare to a big beefy halter mare."

By the time she could be ridden again in the late spring as a 4-year-old, Slide had not only grown quite a bit taller and broader, she wasn't quite the mover she had been. Although she was ridden some that summer, by the time the fall rolled around, both Ray and Leslie decided she probably wouldn't fulfill their original goal of becoming a top pleasure horse. In addition, Leslie still had a year and a half of college to finish, and the bills on Slide had slowly mounted; she seriously began to consider selling the mare.

"Ray didn't think I'd be happy if I sold her and thought he could make it so it wouldn't cost to keep her," Leslie says. "He said, 'I know someone who has a stallion looking to breed some good mares. He'll keep the foal and send her back.'"

Leslie agreed to lease the mare; that first breeding to Other Brother resulted in Brother Of Society.

"He was never shown in a registered show but was the high-point horse in multiple events in open horse show associations in Arkansas and Tennessee," Leslie says.

From there, Slide was turned over to C.A. and Joan Cofer, who were standing Cash Dominator at the time, and it was there that the mare began to prove herself as a producer of halter horses. The cross to Cash Dominator produced three

foals: A Splash Of Cash, a 1987 bay mare; The Perfect Solution, a 1988 sorrel gelding; and Casual Impression, a 1989 buckskin gelding.

Under the direction of AQHA Professional Horseman Kathy Smallwood, A Splash Of Cash was the first of Slide's foals to show in AQHA competition, earning 285 points, 163 grands and reserves, and numerous California high-point awards during her career. She was also the 1991 year-end high-point junior halter mare and finished third in the open high-point halter mare standings. As a broodmare, A Splash Of Cash went on to produce eight foals, four of which were point earners.

"Kathy was the one who first saw the potential of a nice sort of halter mare in 'Splash' as a late 2-year-old," Leslie says. "She also was the one who suggested I consider going to the (AQHA World Championship Show) with Splash. That was the mare's 3-year-old year, and (Kathy) had taken her from the pre-Denver Circuit in early January through fall, winning at most of the major shows and circuits that year. That was really pretty exciting for me because I knew of the World and had even gone and watched it a few times, but never really thought I'd have a horse good enough to go."

Not only was Splash Of Cash good enough to go, the mare placed fifth in a large class, and while it was Leslie's first trip to the World Show, it wouldn't be the last.

Splash's brothers also did well in the show ring: The Perfect Solution earned 77 AQHA points plus 20 grand and reserves titles, and high-point awards in New Jersey, while Casual Impression earned points in both AQHA and American Buckskin Registry Association competition.

St High Society next went to the court of Tardee Impressive, producing The Power To Impress, a 1990 bay stallion. The Power To Impress earned 88.5 points plus 81 grand and reserve championships. He was 1993 amateur reserve world champion 3-year-old stallion, and 1992 open and amateur reserve world champion 2-year-old stallion. He went on to sire a reserve world champion.

"Kathy was also the one who fit and showed The Power To Impress," Leslie notes. "He was such a remarkable foal even though he was born in May. She handled him the whole time I owned him, winning almost every baby futurity with him, including a third in the big futurity of its time, the Solid Gold in Illinois. The all-age baby stud colt class took most of the day with 100-plus babies, and he was by far the youngest."

Leslie believes that one of her greatest honors came in 1991 when the show records of A Splash Of Cash and The Power To Impress put her on the leading breeders list among "all these breeders with lots of mares and babies," she says. "It was quite the honor."

By this time, Slide had taken up residence with AQHA Professional Horseman Denny Hassett, which is where Slide's sixth foal, High Continuettee (by Tardee Impressive), was born in 1992. High Continuettee's career included 453.5 halter points with 288 grands and reserves and several halter Superiors in youth, amateur and open. He was 1992 world champion weanling gelding and 1996 amateur reserve world champion aged gelding in addition to earning several World Show top-10s.

Slide's next foal was Kidding Me, a 1994 mare by Kid Clu. After a string of colts, Leslie couldn't believe the mare had produced a filly.

"Slide always seemed to have stud colts and they were bay, which Denny referred to as 'rat brown,'" Leslie recalls. "He called to say the mare had a baby on the ground and thought it had a white foot and some white on its face. I assumed by his conversation it was another stud colt.

"He kept letting me think that until (his wife) Dana told him he'd better tell me the truth. He did, but I didn't really believe him and kept asking him if he was kidding me about the whole thing."

Kidding Me went on to earn 214.5 points along with 120 grands and reserves, as well as the 1997 reserve world champion 3-year-old mare and 2000 amateur reserve world champion aged mare titles.

St High Society's next three foals were by stallions owned by Stewart Quarter Horses. Astentatious, a 1995 chestnut gelding by Playgirls Conclusion, earned 101.5 halter points. He was followed by Endorsements, a 1996 black stallion by Kechi Cowboy. Shown through his yearling year before being sold and moved to Mexico, Endorsements earned 22 halter points and 18 grands and reserves. He also placed in the top 10 at the World Show.

River City Rolex, a 1996 black stallion by River City Renegade, was also shown only as a yearling before being sold and moved to Canada. He earned 13 points and 13 grands and reserves.

Slide's 11th foal, Ovations, a 1999 black mare by GQ Eclipse, earned 175 points along with 80 grands and reserves. She also placed in the top 10 in amateur and open World Show competition in three of the four years she was shown there.

"A tragic accident took her way too early," Leslie says, "but many in the halter industry still remember her. They will say, 'I remember you and that beautiful black mare, she just stood apart from the rest.'"

Amazing, Slide's final foal, never made it to the show ring. The 2001 bay stallion by GQ Eclipse suffered a broken elbow as a weanling followed by a systemic infection. However, he sired six foals before a debilitating injury led to his euthanization at 6. Leslie currently owns one of his daughters and her 2011 foal.

When St High Society quietly died in November 2001, she had compiled a produce record equaled by few other mares. Out of 12 foals, she produced 11 performers, 10 of whom earned points in AQHA events. Those 10 earned a total of 1,437.5 halter points, more than \$17,000 in World Show earnings and almost \$36,000 in AQHA Incentive Fund earnings.

In addition, her produce earned one world championship, seven reserve world championships and placed in the top 10 in World Show competition 40 times, all divisions combined. That's in addition to the many year-end high-point honors, Superiors and Registers of Merit they earned.

St High Society is also one of only a handful of mares who have had three foals showing and earning top 10 placings at one World Show, and it happened three times. It was A Splash Of Cash, The Power To Impress and High Continuettee in 1992; Kidding Me, High Continuettee, and Astentatious in 1995; and Kidding Me, High Continuettee and Endorsements in 1997.

St High Society is the granddam of AQHA world and reserve world champions as well.

She still ranks as one of AQHA's all-time great producing broodmares, ranking 17th in producing amateur point earners, 23rd in open point earners and 57th in youth point earners (as of November 2011). She carried all of her foals.

"She was one of a kind," Denny says. "Regardless of who you crossed her with, she'd come up with a good one, one you could go to the show pen with. She's one of those great mares and producers."

"She was a kind mare who loved her babies, a good mama," Leslie adds. "She is fondly remembered not only by those of us who cared for her and her foals, but by the many who had sons, daughters, grandsons and granddaughters.

"When she passed, the cards, emails and flowers from the halter industry astounded me. She truly touched many in the Quarter Horse industry." ❏

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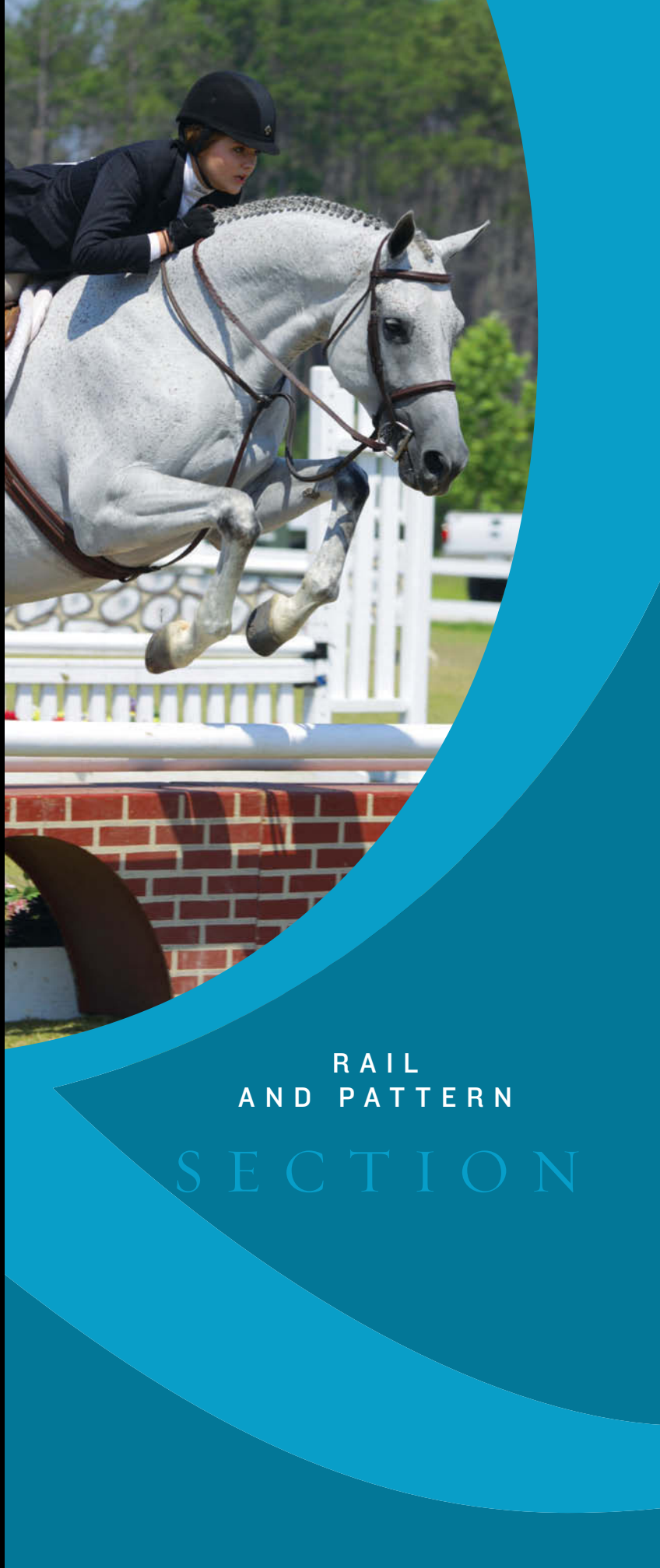

A Bit

of
Western
Advice

*Select a western bit
for your horse*

By Andrea Caudill



IF YOU HAVE STOOD IN FRONT OF THE BIT WALL AT THE LOCAL tack store and wondered which one was your all-around horse's "magic slipper," you are not alone.

With each style and brand touting various attributes to help your horse improve, what is the best way to choose one for your horse?

The *Journal* consulted with AQHA Professional Horsemen Pete Kyle of Whitesboro, Texas; Robin Frid of Denton, Texas; and Jackie Krshka of Yukon, Oklahoma, to see what's in their horses' mouths.

Starting Out

WHEN FIRST STARTING A 2-YEAR-OLD, PETE AND ROBIN PREFER to use a snaffle.

While Robin notes he usually gets horses in that have at least 90 days on them vs. doing complete breaking, he prefers a fat, ring snaffle on his youngsters.

"You never really know what kind of horse you're going to end up with when you first get on," he says. "A snaffle gives you a little more control if, for some reason, you end up with a horse that needs a little more guidance in the



beginning stages. Not all of them are easy to handle right at the beginning. I am not asking a horse to give to a ton of pressure, I'll just ask him to follow his head."

Pete, too, starts his colts in a smooth-mouth snaffle. As the horse's education matures, he tends to switch bits around, using different mouthpieces, depending on what he's asking for.

"Sometimes we'll rotate them into the twisted wire when we start to ask for more of their face, then we go back to a smooth," Pete notes.

Jackie, however, prefers to start her horses in a rope hackamore.

"This is passed down from my father, Jack Kyle, who was a master at starting his young horses in a hackamore," she says. "The theory is you can instill trust and voice cues with a horse, as well as developing some flexibility with a hackamore while preserving that delicate mouth. Once 'Whoa' has become a recognizable cue and flexibility is established, then I move to a snaffle bit."

When is a horse ready to graduate into a curb?

In Pete's barn, it generally takes at least eight months of training on a colt before he is educated enough in the basics to consider moving up, although as always, it depends on the individual.

"Those who give their face and their body real good, and they're not real resistant to you," Pete says. "They're really dropping off well and have done that consistently for a while. A lot of those we'll be riding in a draw rein as well. If they're being pretty consistent, then we know they're ready to advance up into the bridle. We try to not rush them, we make sure they're ready to go into it."

Robin's horses – not only youngsters, but new horses in the barn – have to prove they are ready to move to a curb before they switch over.

"It is a long process for me," Robin says. "I do not change into a curb bit until I can totally control and maneuver every single part of that horse's body. I can ask them to give to pressure, ask them to break through their withers and drop down. Until they have decent self-carriage where I can handle them, move their bodies all over the place, I don't go to any form of a curb bit. I stay in some form of snaffle until then. Actually, every single horse I get in, if I have not ridden it before, it's in a snaffle right away until I can control that horse and totally be able to maneuver its body where I feel I need to."

Jackie wants a horse to be responsive and light before graduating to a curb.

"I want to make sure I have established an excellent responsiveness to feel through the bit," she says. "In other words, with a light pull from the rein, I can move the horse from side to side and have vertical flexion. As well, the horse should be responsive to stopping with a light pick up."

Curb Appeal

ONCE A COLT IS EDUCATED AND READY TO MOVE INTO A CURB, what is the first bridle the trainers grab?

Jackie prefers a Myler hinged snaffle curb with a medium shank.

"I use it with about two to three fingers between the curb and jaw line to start out with," she says. "As the horse becomes comfortable with the feel of the curb, I may take it up slightly, so that the horse feels that curb pressure a bit

earlier. This will prevent me from going too deep to the mouth."

Both Pete and Robin's first go-to bit of choice is a short-shanked, low-port correction bit, with the shanks measuring 5-6 inches from top to bottom.

"Once we put them into that bit, we still come back to the snaffle quite a bit," Pete notes. "We'll ride them a couple days in the short-shanked correction, then come back to a snaffle for a few days."

Another of Pete's favorites is an aluminum solid-shank, medium port curb with a lot of tongue relief, as it is a soft bit that is easy for the horse to trust. But different horses enjoy different bits, and sometimes they enjoy variety.

"A lot of times, I don't keep a horse in the same bridle," Pete says. "There are certain horses that you find a bit and they really like it, and you can use it on them for a long time. But I try to rotate them around and use different corrections – with longer shanks or S-shanks and come back to a shorter shank, maybe with a little bit more of a cathedral mouthpiece. Just try to change it up occasionally. That seems to help them; they don't just get bored with that same bridle."

Robin says he has yet to find a horse that won't go around in a short-shanked correction bit. His first preference is one with a U-shaped port to provide tongue relief, although some horses prefer a different set up, such as a higher port that works on a different part of their mouth. He says the shank material varies depending on the horse.

"A horse that tends to move its head more, I like more of a steel bit, because it's a little heavier and gives them something to hold on to," he says. "A horse that is softer through its head and wants to hold it still, I like the aluminum shank."

Robin prefers a shank with a sweep to it, as it's more forgiving.

"When you're dealing with pattern horses, to me, whether it be a western rider, trail or whatever, when they're on a looser rein, they're guiding through those bridle reins," Robin says. "But especially in horsemanship, when you're going to touch that horse's mouth a decent amount, the straighter that shank, the quicker the reaction. It takes a great, strong rider for me to allow her to ride in a straighter shank bit, because she has to be very soft and very fluid with her hands.

"Things are so fast, and so active now when we show, and those riders have so much to think about, if you move your hand just a tiny bit too quick here or there, you're going to catch that bit too fast and the horse is going to react poorly. That is a lot for the rider, so I try to keep where that shank cuts back a little more. It gives a lot slower reaction and it's more forgiving if my rider moves her hand a little fast."

When deciding between a correction bit or a more solid bit, Robin has a piece of advice.

"The more solid the bit, the more solid the horse," he says. "The looser the bit, the looser the horse. So if you've got a horse that's just all over the place, you want to start making things a little more solid. If you have a horse that's really tight through his body and it's hard to break things loose, you need something with more moveable parts."

Don't forget to correctly attach the curb strap – preferably loose enough to get fingers comfortably between the jaw and strap – and properly position the bit in the horse's mouth.



“Most people can recognize when a bit’s too high, for the most part, but a lot of people don’t seem to recognize when a bit’s too low,” Robin says. “A lot of horses will kind of fool you when you get that bridle on, they’ll hold it up in their mouth. Then you go to riding, they let go, and it’s now hanging an inch too low. And it’s really not being effective for you at that point. Every time I get on a horse, I check that bridle. Even if I know I rode him in it yesterday, and didn’t use it since, I still pay attention.”

A few other favorites Jackie uses on her older horses include a Sunburst “C” bridle, with tongue room that is easy on the bars of a horse’s mouth. Another is an Avila correction bit, which adds mild palate pressure to encourage breaking at the poll.

The Magic Slipper

HORSE THAT IS UNCOMFORTABLE WITH ITS BRIDLE IS LIKE A runner with an ill-fitting shoe – the athletic performance is bound to be effected. It is important to find the bit that the horse likes best.

“You can tell real quick if you have too much bridle, because it’s going to scare them,” Pete says. “They’re going to raise their head up and be a little scared of that bridle. They’ll let you know pretty quick on that. Some that just kind of lean on you and drag you around a little bit, you probably need to go to more bridle. They’re not respecting that bridle and respecting your hands and legs, they’re just tugging on you and dragging you around. That’s when we’ll switch and go up to a little more bridle.”

Don’t be afraid to try different bits, Robin says, to see your horse’s reaction.

If a horse is gapping its mouth, even on a loose rein, it is a good sign there is too much bit in his mouth, he says. And if a horse’s reactions change for the worse – he suddenly becomes dull and unresponsive, or his initial reaction to feeling you pick up your hand is defensive – it is a good idea to try a different bit. And that includes your veteran show horse.

“Horses change as they get older,” Robin says. “People tend to think the older a horse gets, the duller it gets, the bigger the bridle. I actually find as my horses age, I go to less bridle. They’re getting a little older – a little grumpier, maybe – but they’re broke. They know their jobs..”

More bit isn’t always better, either. If a horse isn’t giving, you might automatically reach for a stronger bit – but that’s where you might be wrong, Robin says.

“Just because they’re not giving, because they’re not soft, doesn’t mean they need more bridle ... they might need less bridle,” he says. “If you try more bridle and they’re better, you might want to check less bridle and see if they’re better yet. That’s why it’s important to have different bridles to try out. Don’t be afraid to try different things to see what will work for your horse.”

The Greatest Tool

A BIT IS SIMPLY A COMMUNICATION TOOL WE USE WHEN RIDING our horses. The foremost thing to keep in mind is that there are other, more important tools – starting with the hands at the other end of the rein.

“My ultimate goal is everything we do is leg to hand,” Robin says. “It might be a fraction of a second, but your legs close before your hand moves.”

That ultimate riding goal, Robin says, and one he works

on every ride, is to never have to bump on his horse’s head – to be able to close his leg and hold his hand and have the horse be soft.

“Try to keep it simple,” says Pete about bit shopping. “There are a lot of different options out there with bits, and a lot of the bridle is really how you use your hands and legs, as much as what you have in their face.

“Sometimes it’s not the bridle’s fault – it’s that you’re too quick with your hands,” he continues. “Especially an amateur or non-pro, but even sometimes as an open rider, we get too fast with our hands. The jerk we give those horses is what scares them, not necessarily the bridle. So be aware of that – what training are you doing to them, and what are you trying to accomplish? Are you trying to get a little bit more break at the poll? Then maybe you could go to a little higher port and try to get that on those broke, older horses, and that’ll help them. But again, if you go to more port, you have to be slower with your hands. I think that’s really important to realize – the bridle is only as good as how you use it.

“You can easily put too much bridle in a horse, and sometimes not enough, but it’s much better to have a little less than too much,” says Pete.

“Find reading material that explains the function of all bits,” Jackie says. “Each and every bit differs in its pressure and contact points with the mouth.”

Those changes in a bit’s design – shape, size, material – all influence how it will affect a horse, and needs to be carefully considered for both the horse and the rider using the tool.

“Any bit can be made severe by a rider’s severe use of his hands,” Jackie says. Q

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LuAnn Knost and Melody Zipper

Melody Zipper

*The versatile gelding and
LuAnn Knost had a blue-ribbon
partnership that lasted a lifetime.*

"MELODY ZIPPER HAD A HEART AS BIG AS DALLAS," SAYS LUANN Knost. "He was my once-in-a-lifetime horse."

In 1983, LuAnn and Melody Zipper secured their place in the record books as the first recipients of AQHA's all-around amateur award at the AQHA World Championship Show. They earned their high honor with reserve world championships in western pleasure, hunter under saddle and horsemanship, and thirds in hunter hack and hunt seat equitation. *Wow.*

From the moment LuAnn set eyes on him when he was just 3 until the day he died 23 years later, she and Melody Zipper had a special bond and a blue-ribbon partnership. But we're ahead of ourselves. First, some background ...

Nebraska rancher Norman Reynolds purchased the gelding's sire, Zippo Pine Bar, as a weanling. In 1975, he bred his future American Quarter Horse Hall of Fame stallion to Jaguar Sue by King Jaguar, and the following May, a big-eyed bay colt arrived on the planet. They named him Melody Zipper.

Fast-forward three years to the 1979 Florida Gold Coast Quarter Horse Circuit where Diane Gregerson was riding Melody Zipper in amateur western pleasure for Norman Reynolds, and the big, handsome bay gelding caught LuAnn's eye.

"I *loved* him," she recalls. "My husband, Don Paul, loved him, too, and said, 'Just go ride him.' So I rode him. Loved him. Bought him!"

For a short while, she had Melody Zipper in training with Doug Lily, but before long, LuAnn brought the gelding home. A quick study, the gelding retained every lesson and simply loved to show.

"I never had to school him," she says. "When I decided he needed to learn to pleasure drive, the first time in the harness, he acted like he'd done it all his life. I asked Clark Denton from the University of Findlay to teach him to jump, and they immediately went reserve champion working hunter at (the All American Quarter Horse) Congress, and the following day, I rode him to a reserve championship in amateur western pleasure. He was almost a freak of nature – he was just so good at everything I asked of him.

"Sometimes, I'll hear about people at shows who need to get up in the middle of the night to ride or longe their horses before a class. You know, when 'Zipper' saw a trailer with an open door, he was ready to jump inside and go show. I'd drive there, park and go directly into our class. He was always ready."

At home, the handsome gelding was a pet.

"If he was out in the pasture, I'd whistle and he'd come running," LuAnn says. "He was my best buddy. I'd walk into the barn in the morning, and he'd start tapping his stall door with his foot. I'd open the door, and he'd hang his head out to watch me feed all the other horses. He was like having a big Great Dane."

There was a real dog in the barn – and in most of their win shots, too.

"I had a little Pug named 'Auggie,' and she'd sit in the stands and watch our classes," LuAnn says with a chuckle. "She'd follow us with her eyes, and when we lined up, Auggie once even trotted into the arena to line up with us. When we posed for our winshots, she'd sit down next to us. She's in all of our win pictures."

And there were many win pictures leading up to their 1983 World Show all-around honor. In 1979, at their Congress debut, they won amateur western pleasure, horsemanship and equitation, as well as junior western pleasure and the western pleasure maturity.

“Unfortunately, right after the show, a farrier cut his feet too short,” LuAnn says, “and he nearly foundered. He was laid up for a while, and we missed the AQHA World Show that year.”

For three consecutive years – 1979, 1980 and 1981 – LuAnn and Melody Zipper were the all-around amateur champions at the All American Quarter Horse Congress. The gelding was the 1979 AQHA reserve all-around high-point amateur horse, and the following year, Melody Zipper was the AQHA high-point all-around amateur horse.

In his early years standing at stud in Nebraska, Zippo Pine Bar was offered primarily to local ranchers who wanted versatile, good-minded horses to ride on the range. Two Reynolds-bred offspring, Zippo’s Shasta and Four L Roxzip, had national show success before Melody Zipper loped into the winners circle.

But LuAnn’s resounding success with her best buddy put Zippo Pine Bar on the map. From a bargain at \$150, the stallion’s stud fee rose to a well-deserved \$750. In 1985, his last year in Nebraska, Zippo Pine Bar stood to 200 mares.

“Norm and his wife were at the 1983 AQHA World Show when we won,” LuAnn says. “He was a great guy, and they both became very good friends of ours. Melody Zipper not only helped put their stallion on the map, but he helped set a trend for the modern style of Quarter Horse.”

After purchasing Melody Zipper, LuAnn bought his dam, Jaguar Sue.

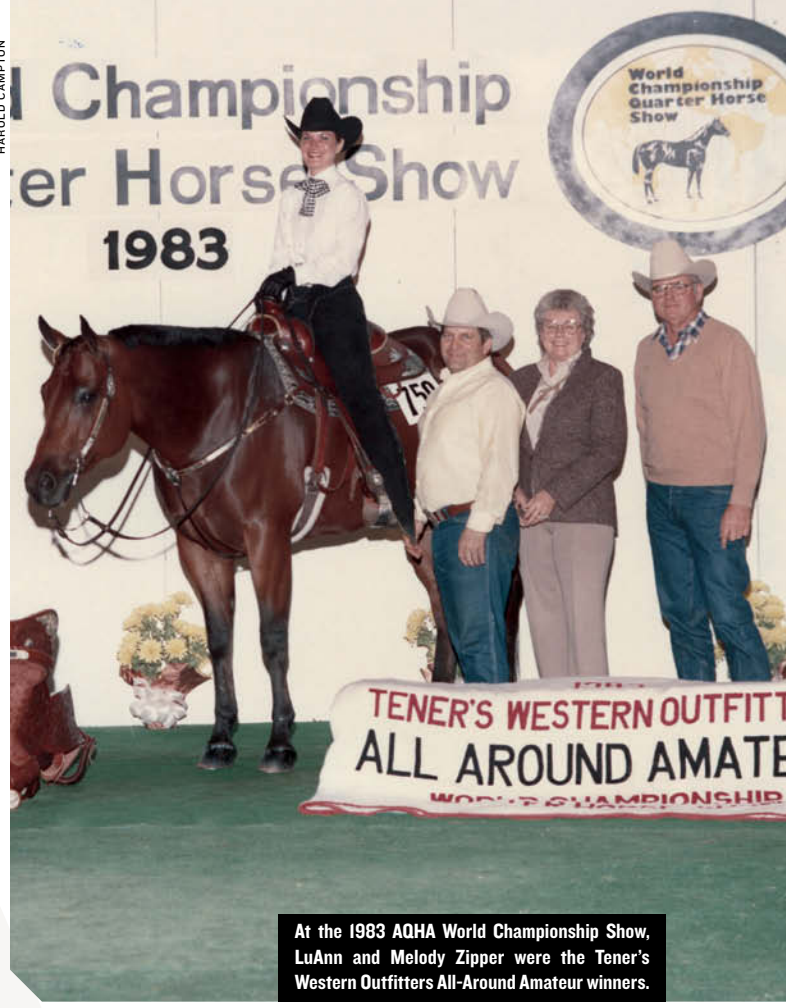
“But she never produced better,” she states. “Zipper was a fluke!”

Obviously, a great fluke to have in the barn.

“I think horsemanship was his favorite class – he was a great pattern horse. And it wasn’t long before people were offering a lot of money for him. But he was never for sale.”

Their 1983 World Show All-Around Amateur Award brought them recognition in the national spotlight and some great stuff to take home.

“Our award was sponsored by Tenger’s Outfitters, and we won a very nice shopping spree there,” LuAnn remembers. “I still have Zipper’s cooler, and we won a beautiful saddle. Much later, I had the silver taken off the saddle and put in a frame that’s in my house today.”

The following years, they were asked to represent the American Quarter Horse in the Challenge of the Breeds in St. Louis.

“It was a thrill and an honor,” she says. “We won working hunter, which made me realize that Zipper really was capable of doing anything and everything.”

Eventually, Melody Zipper retired from the show pen with nearly 2,000 AQHA performance points and moved to Texas with LuAnn. There, he was turned out with the broodmares for long, lazy days in the sun.

“He was one happy camper,” she says. “And he deserved it – he made showing such fun. He didn’t have a flaw and always had such integrity. Sometimes, he felt almost too good to be true.”

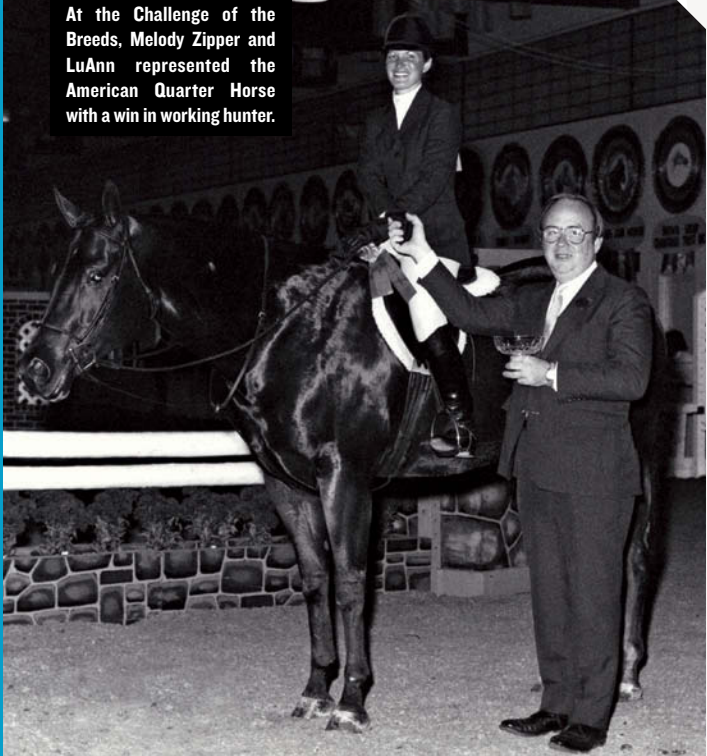
In 2002 at 26, Melody Zipper died in his pasture while eating breakfast at his hay rack.

“They called me, and I went down to say goodbye. His lip was pulled up just a little, which made him look like he died with a smile on his face.

“People always tell you to dream big – Melody Zipper was my dream.”

What I didn't think about was all the hard work involved. I blithely assumed we'd collect applications, conduct a one-hour riding competition, have judges interview some girls and that's it.

Boy, was I wrong.

Let me tell you something. Rodeo queens work hard. Not only do you have to know how to ride, but you have to have Dale Evans' wardrobe and the ability to answer questions like a competitor in "America's Next Top Model."

But first, you have to ride.

Since I'm something of a pattern princess, it came as a surprise to learn that none of my young contestants had bothered to memorize said pattern. Thank goodness for my time spent on the American Quarter Horse circuit. Without missing a beat, I took a can of white Shapley's and outlined an arena on the ground. I then performed the pattern on an invisible steed.

The contestants stared at me as if I had inhaled too much Shapley's.

Undeterred, I directed them to line up behind me. We invented a new line dance that day, the Rodeo Queen Shuffle, and it worked like a charm.

As I worked with our four contestants, I came to realize that a lot of what we do on the American Quarter Horse show circuit crosses over into other parts of our lives. I have mastered the art of hair nets and thus the fast food industry does not scare me. Neither does laundry. If I can get a saddle pad clean, I can wash anything. And makeup ... I am the



queen of eye shadow whether for me ... or my horse.

Still, when one of the queen contestants asked whether she could borrow my horse for our annual parade and then the rodeo's grand entry, I had mixed feelings. It is one thing to know your horse is bomb-proof on the Quarter Horse circuit, quite another to entrust that horse to another rider while riding in a parade. That meant marching bands and banging drums and big scary monsters otherwise known as parade floats. Reluctantly, I handed over the reins, but I needn't have worried.

My Quarter Horse did me proud. He carried that young lady down city streets as if she were Cinderella on her way to a ball. And when she won the title of rodeo queen, he carried her around the rodeo arena, albeit verrrry sloooooowly. He didn't bat an eye when it came time to push cattle into the stripping chute, either.

And as I watched my giant sorrel and our beautiful rodeo queen work together, my heart swelled with pride. He never ceases to amaze me, this horse. He never disappoints, either. Bippidy Boppin Along hasn't won a world title. No Breyer horse carries his name, but that's OK. My Quarter Horse is one helluva horse.

Our Cottonwood Rodeo Queen thinks so, too. 🐾

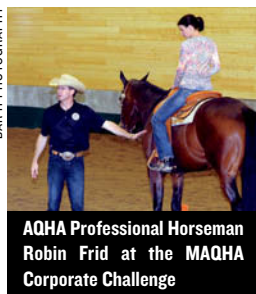

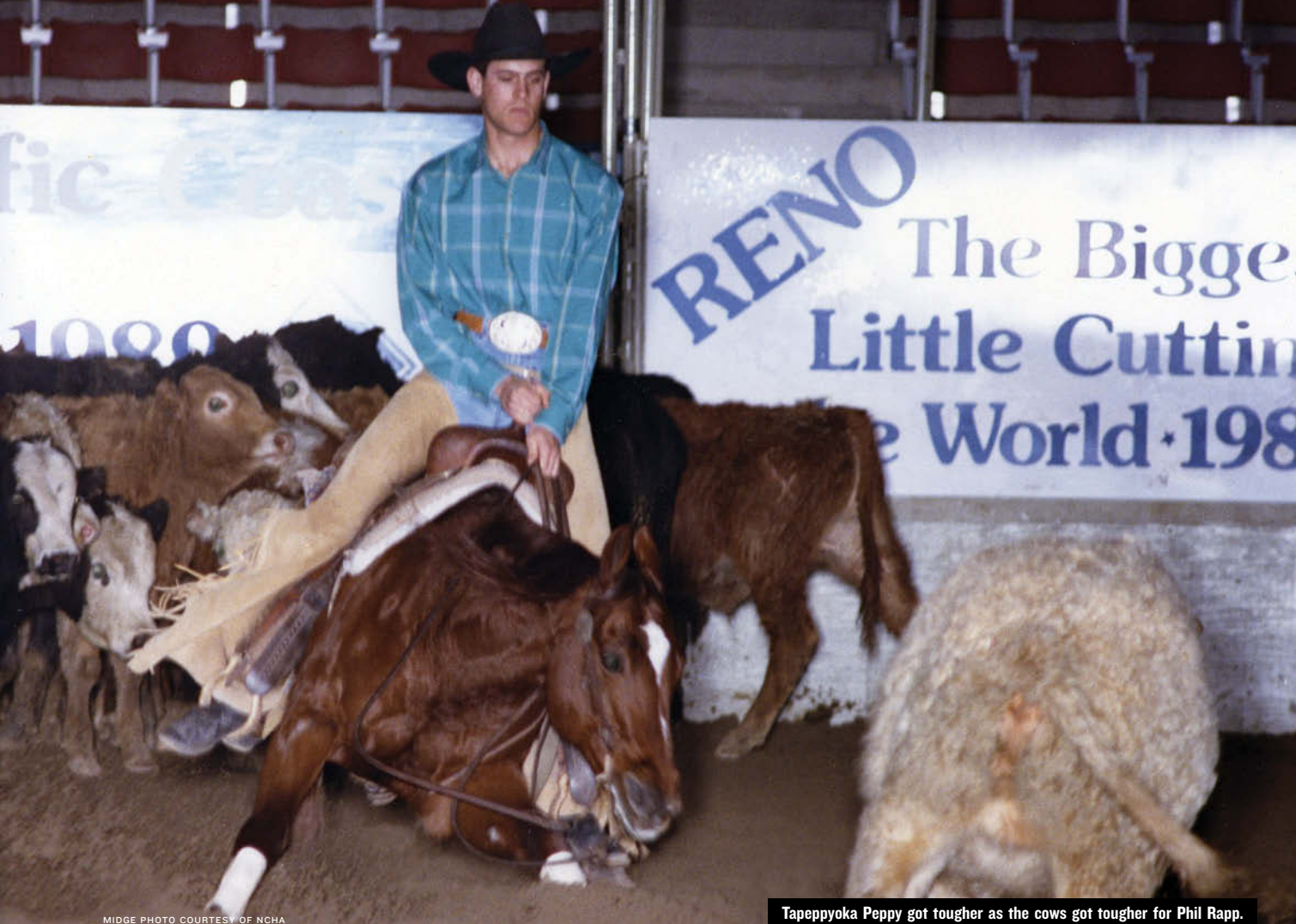

PHIL RAPP IS A FAMILY MAN. THE NATIONAL CUTTING HORSE Association's \$8 million man is married to cutting's all-time leading non-pro rider, Mary Ann Rapp, and they have two young riders in the family, Ryan, 11, and Emma, 6.

At presstime, the standout cutting mare Dont Look Twice is

on her way to becoming NCHA's top-earning mare of all time. The mare owned by Waco Bend Ranch is part of the Rapp family as one of the fourth generation of a family of horses that has carried Phil to the winner's circle since his teen years.

Dont Look Twice, aka "Lipstick," is by High Brow Cat and out of Tapt Twice, who is out of the great NCHA Hall of Fame mare Tap O Lena, the first offspring of Tapeppyoka Peppy, a horse Phil's dad purchased for him in the early 1980s.

"I had a lot of firsts with Tapeppyoka Peppy," Phil says. "With her, I marked my first 75, then my first 76, rode in my first open cutting finals and won my first AQHYA world championship."

It's hard to believe now, but when Phil's dad bought the mare, a teenage Phil was not very happy about it!

Tapeppyoka Peppy (Doc's Oak-Senorita Peppy by Mr San Peppy) had been consigned to an August 1984 horse sale at the Rapp Ranch, and Phil's dad, the late Jerry Rapp, bought her.

"Dad was really proud of her," Phil remembers. "I'd hoped to get something older – this was my first youth or non-pro horse – but Dad figured that we could learn together. I was not impressed.

"Tap' was just 4 years old at the time and trained by Lindy Burch, who'd made the finals at some futurities on the Pacific Coast with her. So in early September, I went to Lindy's place to try the mare out, and we got along great. Then I took her down to Norco and won the non-pro."

Gradually, the teen started to see the chestnut mare from his father's point of view.

In January 1985, Phil, then 15, went to the Arizona Sun Circuit, showed Tapeppyoka Peppy 12 times and brought home a check. That summer, he had the opportunity of his young lifetime, and spent six weeks at Tom Lyons Quarter Horses.

"It was like an extended summer camp," Phil says with a chuckle. "Of course, he owned Doc's Oak. I turned back for Tom and loped horses for Tom, and every Sunday, he'd give us some money and a couple of us would go to Six Flags. Tom was a great guy and ran a real professional outfit. He was the best guy in the business to work for."

They went to the NCHA Classic Challenge and Phil was fourth after his first go-round but so nervous that he locked up during the second.

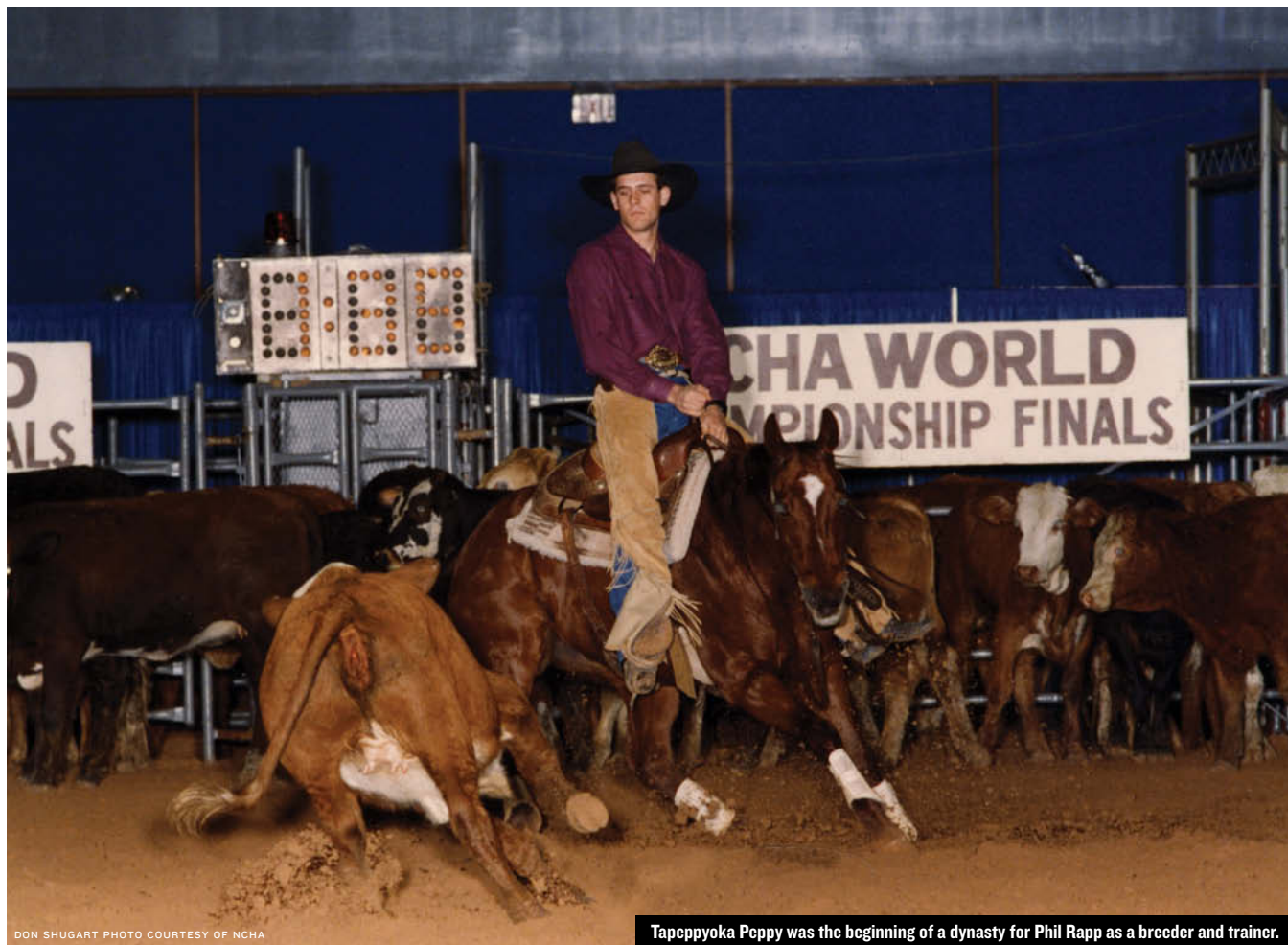
"Later, I marked a 209 in the non-pro and thought I might win a buckle," he says. "So, I said to Tom, 'What'll it take to earn a buckle?' And I'll never forget his reply: 'You showed so bad, you don't deserve a buckle!'"

Phil had been to the Youth World before but had never made the finals. Perhaps the 15-year-old wondered whether 1985 would be different as he drove to the show with his parents and Tapeppyoka Peppy.

"We made the finals and it felt pretty great," he says. "Then we drew fourth in the finals. And won."

But that wasn't the only memorable moment the show held in store.

"Tap was normally a quiet mare," Phil says. "So when AQHA asked if I would carry the flag for them, I was honored. But 'Ol' Tap' went absolutely crazy! Only then, I

remembered that she was quiet until something startled her. She loved to go to shows and if a trailer door was open, she'd jump in. But she didn't like to be startled, and all of her daughters were the same."

The Next Phase

PHIL CONTINUED TO SHOW TAPEPPYOKA PEPPY IN NCHA EVENTS. In 1986, they were NCHA Area 2 non-pro champions and the Pacific Coast Cutting Horse Association year-end non-pro champions. They were NCHA year-end non-pro top-10 in 1986 and 1987. In 1989, after winning the Arizona Sun Circuit amateur aged championship, "Tap" was retired from the show pen, with \$123,555 in lifetime earnings.

"She was still competitive and not burned out at all," Phil says. "But we took her to breed to Doc O'Lena and got real lucky."

The following year, Tap O Lena was foaled, and by 1993, the beautiful bay mare was showing the winning ways that would eventually earn her more than \$450,000 at NCHA events and a ticket into the NCHA Hall of Fame. She still lives at Rapp Ranch today and is 22 this year.

Tapeppyoka Peppy produced seven more foals, three with NCHA earnings. Her last, the Smart Little Lena gelding Tap It, nicknamed "Clyde," is Phil and Mary Ann's daughter Emma's favorite ride today.

Was there one particular great ride that Phil recalls with the mare?

"Actually, Ol' Tap was a vital part of many rides that were important to me," he answers. "Winning the finals and the AQHA youth championship. Marking my first 75. Taking

me to my first NCHA open finals. We shared a lot of firsts. She got me going and kicked things off for me in the cutting pen. She was the first good horse I had.

"Ol' Tap was gritty and cow-smart and tough. She had big stops and was dependable – she was always there when I needed her. The tougher the cow, the better Ol' Tap was. I hauled her all over, and she was always sound."

Then he adds with a soft laugh, "turned out my dad was a great judge of horseflesh, and I was very, very lucky."

Tapeppyoka Peppy lived out the rest of her days with the Rapp family and died in 1996.

"We had just closed on our place," Phil says. "So we were able to bury her on our ranch."

In January of this year, Phil and Dont Look Twice – Tapeppyoka Peppy's great-granddaughter – marked a record 231 to win the Mercuria NCHA World Series of Cutting open finals at the Augusta Futurity. For them, it looks to be a record-breaking, history-making year.

The pretty chestnut mare, bred by Phil and Mary Ann and now owned by Louis and Corliss Baldwin of Waco Bend Ranch, represents the fourth generation of the equine family that has been close to the Rapp family for nearly 30 years.

"It's been fun to reminisce about Ol' Tap," Phil says. "And Dont Look Twice is part of that dynasty ... She's just such an awesome horse. I hope that in another 20 years, we'll be taking about *her* dynasty." 🐾

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Horse Shopping



There are a lot of variables to consider when matching an amateur rider with a new mount.

TWO FEET PLUS FOUR HOOVES DOES NOT ALWAYS equal six winning legs. Finding a horse that suits a particular amateur rider can present a challenge for trainers. It takes experience, perseverance and a little luck to make sure any horse-and-rider combination will click successfully in the show pen.

There are different ideals that must be correlated, including physical size, personality types and suitability for use intended. Those considerations can also vary depending on the discipline.

Choosing a new horse ain't easy.

Roping Requirements

AQHA PROFESSIONAL HORSEMAN LES OSWALD SPECIALIZES IN ROPE horses and also branches into the four-event and working cow horse genres. From Oakdale, California, Les manages AQHA competitive rope horses differently than his cow horses. Often, the amount of money an owner can invest in a horse post-purchase dictates what caliber of horse is needed.

"Whether the horse is staying in training or going home with an amateur plays a factor, and you're talking two different worlds between roping and cow horse," Les says. "An AQHA rope horse needs to stay in training as much as possible so it stays tuned. An amateur cow horse can work cattle

twice a week to keep his timing up.

"The amateur roper (not taking advantage of full training) needs to have a horse near a trainer or someplace where he can go rope at least three or four times a week. People get more bang for the buck when the horse stays in training until it gets to a certain age. An 8-, 9- or 10-year-old rope horse is pretty much seasoned and less likely to come untrained."

Even though Les has multiple AQHA roping world championships on his résumé, it isn't always easy to find the perfect horse for that amateur rider right out of the box. As hard as they try, few if any trainers have a flawless record when it comes to mounting customers.

Les likes to purchase horses he has watched at shows or is at least familiar with their provenance. It is generally not important to him if they have been shown.

"We've all made mistakes and bought the wrong horse for somebody, but I've also felt like I've found the perfect horse for people," Les says. "I just matched an amateur with a rope horse that he'd ridden four times and gets along with as good as you could ask; it just worked. The 6-year-old came out of a structured cow horse program from snaffle bit to the bridle and had about three months of roping when I got him. I've known the horse since he was 2. The owner allowed me to ride him all summer before he started on him the end of the year."

When a purchase doesn't suit the new owner, Les tries to give the partnership time to adjust – at least six months. He recommends the horse be put into training to see whether the trainer can't broker a deal between horse and rider. After a half-year of negative results, however, he thinks it is time to find a different horse.

"You've got to spend enough time to find the ins and outs

and learn the horse's personality," Les suggests. "I recommend to someone taking a new horse home to ride the horse every day of the week, whether you rope on it or not, just ride the horse.

"Give the horse an honest chance and get to know him at your place before you take him out anywhere to rope or show. Until you get familiar with the horse, you don't know how to get the horse prepared to win. You might have a rope horse that needs to be loped for an extra 20 minutes or one that just needs to be walked around to look things over. You must understand your horse so it performs at the top of its level right from the beginning."

Cow Horse Coupling

TED ROBINSON HAS SET OR BROKEN NEARLY EVERY MAJOR RECORD in the National Reined Cow Horse Association, including an unprecedented seven open Snaffle Bit Futurity championships, \$2 million rider status and two World's Greatest Horseman titles.

Yet even with all his cow horse expertise, the Oak View, California, trainer is well aware of the difficulties in correlating a horse and rider team.

When Ted looks for a non-pro bridle horse, he prefers not to have to put the horse into training. He hates to set up anyone just getting started with a monthly bill. He also likes to buy non-pro horses that have been ridden and shown by non-pros.

"I'm OK with putting them into training if that is the customer's thing," Ted says of seasoned bridle horses. "But I think they get to know the horse better at home. I want them knowing the horse, and then I show them how to fix him. If I fix the horse, it can discourage the rider, but it builds their confidence to fix the problem themselves."

He adds, "Futurity horses are a different game. Those 2- and 3-year-olds have to be in my program unless you are one

of the top non-pros like Jody Gearhart (three-time NRCHA Snaffle Bit Futurity non-pro champion); you don't have to help Jody, you just give her pointers.

"I think non-pros match themselves with Futurity horses and have a bond. I'm not going to buy the horse I want, I'm going to let you buy the horse you want. Then we put the program together."

Because most horses work well in a familiar and "schoolable" environment at home, Ted likes to try the horse during a horse show situation, if possible. Also, cow horses in boxing classes are scrutinized differently than those being asked to run down the fence.

"I'm always looking for a horse that will save the non-pro," Ted explains. "The boxing class is real easy, and we can get away with a lot of things there on a lot of different kinds of horses. When you start down that fence, I want a horse that's going to protect a rider, even for myself. I want a horse that is protecting himself, because then he's protecting me.

"I have no use for these horses that will run over a cow. I

can't train that type of horse to be good because they have no self-preservation."

Custom Cutting

TEMPLETON, CALIFORNIA, CUTTING HORSE TRAINER MORGAN Cromer doesn't get in a hurry when shopping for a cutter suitable for one of her amateur customers. Morgan, 27, recently won her second Pacific Coast Cutting Horse Association Open Futurity and qualified two catch rides for the semifinal round at the National Cutting Horse Association Futurity in Fort Worth, Texas.

The main attributes Morgan relishes in horses are being cowy; having lots of heart and try; the way they move; and how they are broke. Fitting the new horse to her amateurs creates an added challenge.

"We have our strengths and weaknesses and so do the horses," Morgan points out. "I think the biggest thing is making sure you find the appropriate level of horse for the level of rider. Horses and riders who are already in my barn are easier to match because I know them well. But sometimes, it takes months to find the right horse, and it can be very frustrating when you want to get someone mounted."

According to Morgan, cutting horses with a prowess for smooth stops and turns are an important asset for the green rider. Those streamlined, fluid-moving horses allow competitors to relax and think about the basics of their run, rather than worrying about being jarred around or turned off. Instead of riding in survival mode, riders can concentrate on showmanship.

"A nervous rider on a nervous horse is not a great combination, but finding the right match can be tough," Morgan says. "I have a guy who gets nervous about showing, so you think you need to find him a pretty calm horse. But if the horse is too calm, he gets nervous that it is too calm! He

needs a horse that is going to spark up some for him before he can relax.

"One horse I bought him was too calm, and he got a little impatient and got to leaning his body around to get the horse started. I'm looking for a new horse for him now and have a better idea of what he needs.

"It is all about personalities, so fitting somebody to a horse that you don't know is tough. It's hard enough for me to try to buy a horse that fits me, let alone one that fits other people."

Back in the day, sellers often allowed buyers to take horses home and test-drive them for a couple of weeks or take them to a horse show. With the escalation of equine prices, that is seldom an option, making the picking and choosing even more onerous.

"I think there are times when trying a horse might fit, but on the more expensive horses, (owners) are really not into doing that," Morgan says. "A lot of times it is an amateur and nobody really wants someone new climbing on their best horse in the barn to try it ... especially two or three times."

Reining Requests

AQHA PROFESSIONAL HORSEMAN TANYA JENKINS, OF TEMECULA, California, prefers to match the horse to the rider rather than vice versa. Like Morgan, this reining trainer prefers to know clients and have knowledge of their drawbacks to be able to find a horse with the features to compensate.

"If my non-pro is an ultimately weak rider, I have to find a horse that can make up for that," Tanya explains. "In that case, I cannot have a horse that won't lope correctly without the rider constantly pushing it with his or her legs. I need a horse that will pack the rider with ease."

Tanya, who trained and successfully showed Spooks Gotta Whiz (Spooks Gotta Gun-Prettywhizprettydoes by Topsail Whiz) until he left her barn just days prior to winning the

2010 National Reining Horse Association Open Futurity, also prefers to mount her greener non-pros on horses that are slower thinkers mentally. She wants a horse that is willing to wait for a rider's signals and not anticipate the next maneuver.

"Don't get me wrong, I do want the horse to react fairly quickly to the rider's cue, but I do not want them to over-think what the rider is thinking," Tanya explains. "These horses must be forgiving at all levels. My non-pros will make mistakes, and I need the horse to have the brain to (overlook the errors). If the horse is overly sensitive to a rider's mistakes, it's not going to work."

Because reining is one of the more visual disciplines, Tanya believes mounting her customers on a proportionately sized horse is important.

"If I have a rider who is 6 foot 6 inches I really don't want a horse that is 13.3 hands," she says with a chuckle. "I do try to find a somewhat relevant size for the ultimate match. I

have to remember that this will be that rider's horse for quite a while. Although riders can and do ride horses of all sizes, consideration is also given that smaller horses may have a little shorter stride, making them a bit more rough to ride."

Fitting the Bill

THERE ARE SO MANY TRAINERS, PROFESSIONAL and amateur riders, horses and oh so many variables within the assortment of disciplines contested. No wonder putting together those six-legged partnerships can look like a monster jigsaw puzzle.

And if you thought the basic matchups were tough to fit together, the individual considerations just add to the challenge.

"When I choose a horse for a top non-pro vs. a greener reiner, I have a lot more options to work with," Tanya says. "I can look for a younger, greener horse like a 3-year-old."

Les says that the horses he sells to amateurs or lower-numbered team ropers are horses he's had on his place for at least three months.

"We kind of know them inside out because we don't want any surprises," he says.

Ted adds that he shows riders how to fix their horses.

"I think a trainer discourages a non-pro when they jump on a horse during a lesson and fix a problem real easy," Ted says. "I'll show them how to fix their horse. You set people back when you can fix it easy and they can't."

Finding the right horse for a customer is a really tough part of her business, Morgan adds.

"But it is a really important part because the amateurs and non-pros are what make our business roll," she says. ☐

GET READY FOR 2014

The 2014 Alltech FEI World Equestrian Games in Normandy, France, are still two years away, but for the organizers, it's more like only two years away.

AQHA specialized judge Michele Pfender of France has been named the reining discipline manager for the games. In addition to being an AQHA judge, Michele is an AQHA international director serving on the international committee. She's also a judge for the National Reining Horse Association.

She took time out of her preparations for Normandy to answer email questions for the *Journal* in this exclusive interview.

Q: What does your schedule look like between now and WEG?

Michele: In early May, (the discipline managers) had a meeting in Normandy at the Haras du Pin with the managers of the organization committee. The amount of work already done is simply amazing. The quality of the team allows the discipline managers to be focused on the technical part.

We are proud to work with Alltech as the title partner for the FEI World Equestrian Games 2014 in Normandy.

During 2012, we have to define the different areas for horses, grooms, competitors, delegations, partners, spectators, etc.

The biggest part of decisions will occur this year, the first delegations will begin to visit after the Olympic Games (in London later this month).

Decisions have to be made about a reining test event in 2013.

A main consideration is the quality of the footing and the organization

committee began to work on it a long time ago.

In 2013, we'll begin the training for all the WEG teams during different shows in France and at the test event, if needed. Besides this, we are working on an educational program during the next two years to make the reining rules more familiar to people from other disciplines.

Around August 2013, the team managers will meet in Normandy.

Q: How many countries do you expect to have reining teams?

Michele: In 2006, 21 countries went in Aachen. Thanks to the development of reining all around the world and especially in Europe we are hoping for 25 countries for reining in Normandy.

Q: How big is the reining facility in Normandy?

Michele: The reining facility will be the Parc des Expositions of Caen, which is in the center of the village of stands, restaurants and entertainment. You cannot imagine a better place for a maximum of people being in connection with reining.

The main competition field is 240 x 120 feet, with a warm-up arena of 180 x 90 feet and a ready area of 75 square feet. The Parc des Expositions can hold 4,000 visitors.

Q: When will tickets go on sale?

Michele: Ticket sales will begin during spring 2013. Many different packages are still in a process, including many disciplines or different visits in Normandy.

Q: What are your goals for the 2014 WEG?

Michele: Our main goal is to provide the best facility and organization to help horses and competitors to express the best of themselves in a humane competition.

The World Equestrian Games give the opportunity to show reining to many people who are not familiar with the western world. We want enthusiastic audiences and that no visitor will forget what reining is after the Alltech FEI World Equestrian Games 2014 in Normandy.

We want Normandy to be the other country of reining for one week ... and maybe after WEG!

Tradition Continued

BACK IN 1980, THE WORLD WAS A LITTLE DIFFERENT PLACE. There were no cell phones, Internet or reality TV. Pac-Man was released, Mount St. Helen erupted, and Ronald Reagan was elected president.

And in the world of professional rodeo, South Dakota cowboy Paul Tierney ended the first year of the iconic '80s decade by winning the prestigious all-around cowboy title, breaking the four-year winning streak of six-time champion Tom Ferguson.

It has been 32 years since Paul took his place in the rodeo history books and earned his second gold buckle. But while he has retired from his career as a full-time professional cowboy, he has not faded away. On the contrary.

While raising his family near the Black Hills of South Dakota, Paul instilled in his four children both a love of the sport and an appreciation for great horses. He and wife Robin began their own tradition of raising and training talented American Quarter Horses on their family ranch near Oral, South Dakota, and specifically raise their horses with the intention of making great rodeo and ranch horses.

With talented horses, dedicated trainers and a passion for the sport they all love, the Tierney family legacy is now one they are sharing with the world.

Gold Buckle Dreams

GROWING UP IN THE SANDHILLS OF NEBRASKA, PAUL HELD A rope in his hand and rode a horse for most of his life. But at age 28, he reached a turning point in his rodeo career.

"I came to a point in my life where I decided I was going to either see what I could do or I was going to do something else," Paul explains. "I'd saved up about \$7,000, and I put it in a can to go to the winter rodeos. I wanted all my fees, all my travel expenses, everything paid at that time. When the can ran out, I was going home."

The year was 1977, and Paul traveled to Denver for one of the first big rodeos of the season. He won a little money in the team roping, which was not one of his specialty events of tie-down roping and steer wrestling, but it was enough to send him to another rodeo.

Fort Worth, Texas, was the next stop, and there, Paul made a big deposit into his \$7,000 savings account.

"I set a record for the most money ever won in one rodeo (at the time) – a little over \$10,000," Paul says with a smile. "At that particular time in my life, I'd never seen a check wrote out to me for \$10,000. I'd sold some calves in my life, but there weren't many, and calves weren't (priced) all that high. So I mean, this looked like a very good way to go."

From there, Paul continued on the rodeo trail. He headed to the other winter rodeos – Houston; El Paso, Texas; Jackson, Mississippi; and Phoenix, winning money at nearly every one. Before he knew it, Paul had won more than \$16,000 on the PRCA rodeo circuit.

“I realized I could do this, so I switched who I was hanging around with, which was guys who maybe weren’t going to the NFR, and I started traveling with Dave Brock, who *was* going to the NFR,” says Paul, who has always believed in the importance of the mental game. “I started traveling with people who thought like I was thinking.”

After spending a couple of months at home in the spring, Paul hit the rodeo road again in June, and spent the rest of the year there. He qualified for the 1977 National Finals Rodeo, which at the time took place in Oklahoma City. That year was a sudden-death format for the world championships, and Paul narrowly missed out on capturing the all-around cowboy title.

“I missed my last calf to win the all-around. It was a deal where maybe I had opportunity, but I didn’t capitalize the way I should have. But it was still a great year.”

So Paul returned to the pro rodeo circuit in 1978, missing six weeks during a crucial part of the summer due to injury, but still making the NFR in tie-down roping. That year, he

finished second in the tie-down world standings to traveling partner Dave.

The next year was pivotal for Paul. He won the tie-down roping championship, the first gold buckle of his career.

In 1980, PRCA went back to the former system of declaring world championships based on season-long earnings and not just the NFR. That year, Paul won the all-around title by a mere \$100 over Tom Ferguson, who had been on a four-year winning streak. Paul also captured a gold buckle in tie-down roping, making for a great year and stellar start to the decade of the ’80s.

“I had a great winter, and came out of the winter leading the all-around standings,” Paul recalls. “I was in the lead that whole year, and they never caught me. I was steer wrestling, calf roping and team roping, and I’d occasionally rope a steer, too.”

In 1981, Paul was poised to win the all-around title again but was overtaken at the NFR. During the next several years, Paul qualified for several more NFRs and came close to clinching another gold buckle in 1984, coming in second in the all-around standings again. Then, in 1987, a back injury kept him from qualifying, and he decided it was time for surgery.

The surgery helped put an end to his career as a professional, full-time rodeo cowboy, but Paul was far from finished with the sport. Many factors led to his decision to stay home, one of them being his growing family.

Paul knew what he wanted when he started breeding horses.



“I kinda fell away from the rodeo deal and started riding a lot and training horses. Then we started getting a bigger family. A wife will never get in the way of rodeoing, but kids will, because they give you roots,” he explains. “If you don’t live where they’re rodeoing, it’s hard. It was too much to be gone, so I didn’t do it full-time anymore.”

Raising Children and Horses

PAUL’S CAREER RAISING AND TRAINING HORSES STARTED BACK IN his early rodeo days, when a horse that he bought at the Rapid City Stock Show sale for \$450 took him to two gold buckles.

“I took him home and started roping on him, and this horse turned out to be a really great horse. His name was Coffee Jeff (Ash Creek-Coffee Queen by Coffee Wagon),” Paul says. “I trained him from the ground up. Being on the road like that, when he quit working so good, then I had to buy horses. I bought three more horses in my career, and they were all ‘made’ horses. But none of them ever worked like he did.”

Paul realized that if he wanted the best rodeo horses, he’d have to train them himself.

And with four children – Jesse, Paul David, Amy and Jordan – also rodeoing, it became a family affair to raise and train rodeo horses. Paul and Robin, a barrel racer and former Miss Rodeo South Dakota, began selecting horses for their program based on a strong set of criteria. They look for horses that are well-suited to ranch work, arena competition, trail work and hauling.

On the ranch, the horses work about 300 mama cows. Paul and Robin’s names are both on the 20-year AQHA breeding certificate they have earned.

The ranch’s main stallions are PTS Frosted Cash, a 1993 gray stallion by Frosty Feature and out of De Blitz by Deregulate, and Frenchmans Sanwood, a 1998 palomino stallion by Frenchmans Guy and out of Driftwood San by Sak Em San. Paul and Robin bred Frenchmans Sanwood, and Ray Wardell of Moorcroft, Wyoming, bred PTS Frosted Cash.

The mares come from recognized rodeo bloodlines, such as Driftwood, Dash For Cash and Frenchmans Guy.

The Tierneys are involved with the breeding, training and finishing of their horses from the beginning to the end. Son Paul David usually gets the young ones going, while Paul works on finishing the roping and steer wrestling horses and getting them seasoned for competition. When it comes to the women’s events of barrel racing, pole bending and goat tying, Robin, who was the Badlands Circuit barrel racing champion in 1986, as well as in the Women’s Professional Rodeo Association top 25 and third-place finisher for rookie of the year in 1987, takes the reins.

All of the Tierney children are actively involved in training their own horses as well.

The couple’s oldest son, Jesse, who qualified for his first National Finals Steer Roping in 2011, has his own ranch and horse operation near Hermosa. Paul David lives near the Tierney Ranch in Oral, and assists with everyday work and training at the ranch.

Amy is in college at Northeastern Junior College at Sterling, Colorado, where she is a member of the rodeo team. Jordan is a junior in high school and is an active participant in the South Dakota High School Rodeo Association, Little Britches and 4-H rodeo, where she participates in nearly all of the girls’ events. Jordan’s work ethic is much like that of her parents, and it’s not unusual to see her in the practice pen at home well after dark.



RANCHING HERITAGE BREEDER

Along with training children to win, the Tierney family is training and breeding horses to win in the arena and also work on the ranch that is the lifeblood of the family’s operation.

As lifelong ranchers and longtime American Quarter Horse breeders, Paul Tierney Family Performance Horses is an AQHA Ranching Heritage Breeder.

Ranching Heritage Breeders raise horses that embody and epitomize the versatility of the American Quarter Horse. To become a Ranching Heritage Breeder, a ranch must:

- be an AQHA member
- have a ranch remuda consisting of registered American Quarter Horses
- own at least five AQHA mares used to produce ranch horses
- maintain a remuda for the specific purpose of operating a working cattle ranch
- have at least a 10-year AQHA breeding award
- apply to and be approved by the AQHA Ranching Council
- pay a \$10 annual fee to maintain status in the program

The Tierneys’ AQHA breeding program has now surpassed the family’s own need for both ranch and arena mounts.

The family began hosting its own sale in 2010, the Midwest Versatility Horse Sale. This year’s sale is September 28-29 in Rapid City, South Dakota.



COFFEE JEFF

Coffee Jeff was a 1967 sorrel by Ash Creek and out of Coffee Queen by Coffee Wagon. He was bred by Albert Lopez of Walker, South Dakota.

“My grandfather was the breeder on the papers,” says Albert’s grandson, AQHA Ranching Council member Jim Hunt, “but he gave the mare Coffee Queen to my mother, Effie Lopez Hunt.”

The *Journal* profiled Jim’s family ranch in Faith, South Dakota, in February 2012, where he talked about his grandfather’s influence on his current ranching lifestyle in Faith, South Dakota.

“My dad, Gene, started (Coffee Jeff) and broke him,” Jim says. “The horse was quite a handful, had a lot of grit and strike and kick. Then Paul got him and that’s a whole other story. Paul and I like to get together and swap stories.”

Coffee Jeff became an icon synonymous with tie-down in the day. His talent out of the box and at the end of a tied-on rope became the envy of many ropers across the nation. The rodeo industry honored Coffee Jeff, along with Paul, when the cowboy was inducted into the ProRodeo Hall of Fame. They are featured together in an action half-size bronze.

The American Quarter Horse is buried in a place of honor near Spearfish, South Dakota, at the Western Heritage Museum’s Black Hills acreage.

“All of my horses were bred and raised at the ranch,” Jordan says. “I’ll be riding my own for the breakaway this spring, but the rest are my dad’s horses. My mom works on our barrel horses with us. My parents do a lot to help us, but we also do a lot and help season them, too.”

Jordan’s hard work doesn’t go unnoticed by her parents, either.

“It doesn’t make a difference what she’s working on, Jordan works hard at it,” Paul says of his youngest daughter. “Right now, she’s wrapped up in basketball. She runs all summer long, three to four miles at least four times a week. Her volleyball is the same way. And then she’ll come home at night and be out in the arena until 10 or 11 p.m.”

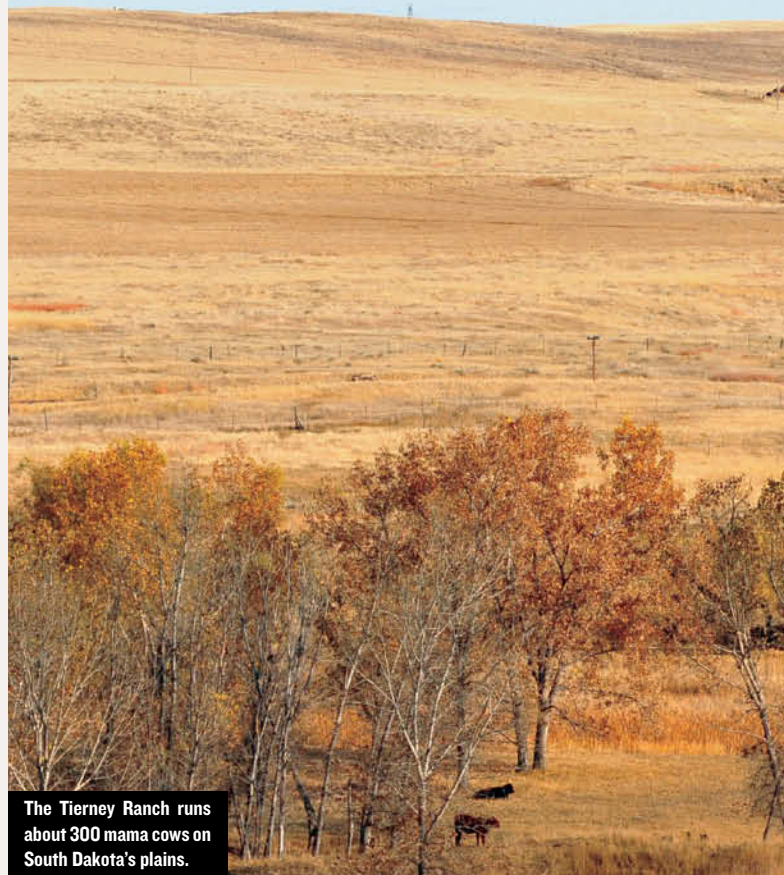
Trained to Win

THAT WORK ETHIC IS SOMETHING PAUL HAS BECOME KNOWN FOR. As he mentors many young competitors in addition to his own children, Paul not only shares his wealth of knowledge about training good horses, but also about training minds to win.

“We’re always working on the fundamentals,” Robin explains. “But sometimes the kids realize their dad has an ability to compete. We have to allow the fundamentals to work, but then live on the edge a little bit and take some risks. And that’s probably what we encourage them to do more often than not, but we work on the fundamentals all the time.”

Learning how to win is something that Paul learned at a young age from his mentor, Clark Brown of North Platte, Nebraska.

“Clark Brown really taught me to win under pressure,” Paul says. “When I went to work for him at 19, we had match ropings every day. And he would always say that it didn’t matter how much money we had up, but we always put some money up. Every day we put up a dime in the go-rounds and 50 cents in the average. And it was unreal how much money he made off me. ... He just hardly ever missed. But if he did, he would say

to me, you have to go rope four calves. That’s it. In a sense, he would kind of harass me, but he made me realize that I just needed to catch sometimes. Those are the things that I took with me. Sometimes that’s all I needed to do – catch – for big money. But a lot of times, I was catching for 50 cents.”

Today, the now-wiser Paul uses the same technique on his sons when he competes against them, as he did at the 2012 Timed Event Championship in early March at the Lazy E Arena in Guthrie, Oklahoma.

Learning how to step up under pressure is often what separates champions in the arena, and Paul and Robin work hard to help their children learn that quality, and as Robin explains, it often comes down to repetition of the basics and competing as much as possible.

“We have a college girl (Amy) who has placed at the top in every go in college, and then gotten to the finals and missed,” Robin says. “So we’ve talked about what we need to do to help her get over that, and the answer is to get her to more competitions. More pressure. More of it will help you get through it.”

Paul’s advice to young competitors is to remember the basics and stay in the present.

“You can’t stay in the prize. But you gotta stay on the price – what is the price we have paid to win? You can’t think about the win – you have to stay focused on the journey to win and the process. So any time the mind starts to wander and you start thinking about that \$50,000 or that gold buckle, you’ve got to bring your mind back to the basics. You bring yourself back to the start, and then to your position – your score, position and catch.”



But most importantly, the Tierneys stress to their children and the other kids and people they train to appreciate every opportunity and accolade that comes their way.

“You have to be thankful of what’s being created and what’s become. If you’re not thankful, you can become arrogant, big-headed and prideful. So I’ve always told my kids that it can be taken away from you tomorrow. It’s easy come, easy go,” Paul says from experience. “You have to be appreciative of what’s going on in your life. So many people become a champion, and next thing you know, they think they are ‘it.’

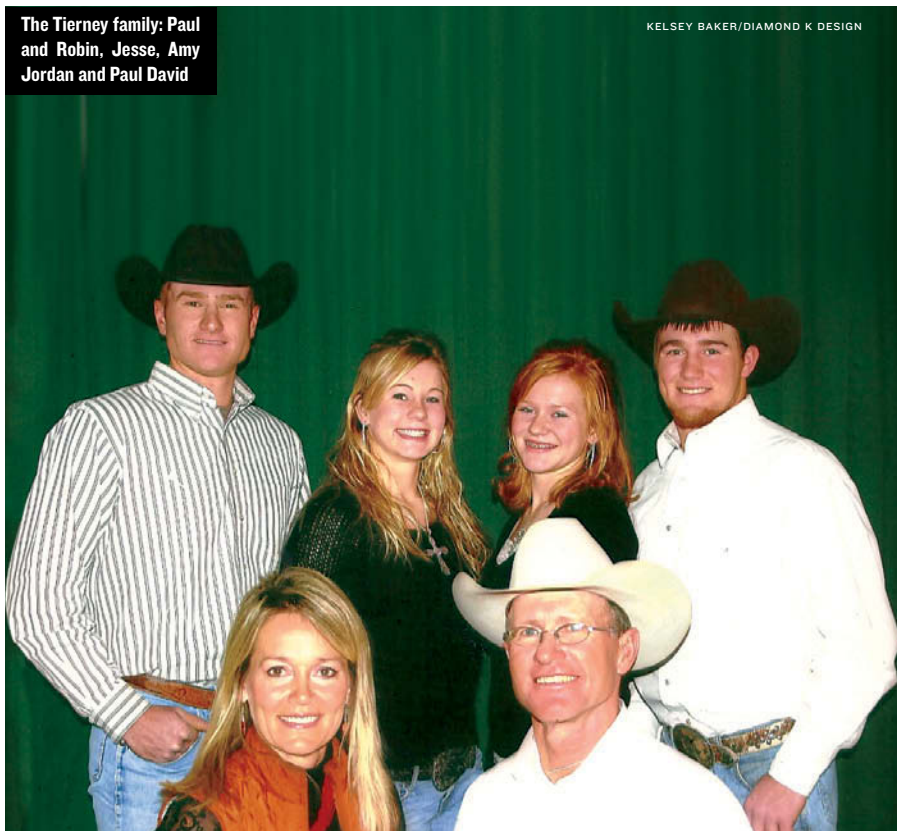
“But you’re easily replaced – someone can come along tomorrow and take it away. So be thankful for the things that are at hand and what you’re involved in. Yeah, they talk about you when you’re winning, but they talk about someone else next.

“A lot of kids don’t see the work that goes into being the best anymore, and we’re showing them that no one gets to the top without putting in the work.” □

IT'S BEEN A PLEASURE

*All-around horse finds her niche
in the ranch pleasure class.*

YOU COULD SAY IT ALL STARTED WHEN AQHA INTRODUCED RANCH pleasure as a class. But that's probably not far enough back.

You could say it all started a few years ago when Ann Hards' good show mare injured herself. But that's still probably not far enough back.

Or you could say it all started back when the white rule was rescinded. That's when longtime breeder Ann, then living in eastern Pennsylvania, decided she wanted to get American Quarter Horse papers on her breeding-stock Paint mare by HBF First In Command.

"I called his owner up and said 'I know from looking at his pedigree that he's a Quarter Horse,'" she says. "So I spent a summer making phone calls and finding dead horses and the people who were associated with them."

A few hundred phone calls later, HBF First In Command had his Quarter Horse papers. Celeste Fender of Dublin, Ohio, owned the stallion and is a partner on one of his gray sons, HBF Iron Man, a five-time world champion in western pleasure and hunter under saddle in American Paint Horse competition.

Ann, an all-around exhibitor, bred her mare Jaybos Love Notes by Jaybo Lad to HBF Iron Man, and in 2006, Ann had a filly she named Lavish Love. Looking down at the wet, gray bundle, Ann made a prediction.

"I said I think this is probably one of the best ones that I've ever bred," Ann recalls. "She looks like she's going to have a personality that's easy to get along with. That was evident the day she was born."

But Ann didn't really intend to show "Lovey." When Ann moved from Pennsylvania to Berthoud, Colorado, she took the weanling Lovey along to later become her ride-around-the-farm trail horse.

In 2011, when Ann's show mare fractured her pastern and had to be on stall rest, Lovey was called up from the bench to the first string.

"I sent the horse to (AQHA Professional Horseman Bill Bormes of Castle Rock, Colorado) and said if you can find something this horse can do, I'll do it with her," says Ann, who has been showing and breeding Quarter Horses since 1971. "Our first goal was an AQHA Championship."

That was in May 2011.

Performance points came slowly for Lovey, who was shown in halter, western riding, trail, western pleasure and hunter under saddle before January. That's when AQHA introduced ranch pleasure, and Ann had the bright thought of trying her homebred in the new class.

"I said, 'I think this mare is going to like this class, and we've got to give it a shot,'" Ann remembers. "She qualified (for the AQHA World Championship Show) the first time she went in the class."

Lovey had found her niche in AQHA.

And the points just keep coming. In five weekends of shows, Lovey has earned approximately 47 points – though that total was unofficial at presstime – and was leading the nation in ranch pleasure. She also has completed her AQHA Championship, though again, that was unofficial at presstime.

"I'm very appreciative of AQHA starting this class because there are a lot of horses that can't move as they have to do in regular western pleasure or whose owners would rather they not," Ann says. "This is really a nice opportunity to be a little more forward."

Ann has circled November 6 on her calendar. That's the date the ranch pleasure preliminaries will be run at the World Show.

"(Bill) said, 'You know, you're going to start getting offers on this mare,' and I said, 'Yes, but she's going to come back home,'" Ann says. "After this year, after the World Show, she's going to come back home and go back to being my trail riding horse."

That's what being a pleasure is all about. 🐾

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Homey *to the* Rescue

An unlikely candidate becomes a goat-tying wonder.

A RED DUN AMERICAN QUARTER HORSE GELDING NAMED CHEVY H TUCK AND I trail some cows in the photo on the cover of my new book, “Further Along the Trail.”

The gelding called “Homey” lives with my good friends Ronnie and Becky Moyer, and their daughters, Kaylee, 22, Annie, 18, and Laramie Jo, 12. Ronnie is a cowboy chaplain, rancher and professional bullfighter, and the family runs Moyer Ministries from their place, Living Springs Ranch near Simla, Colorado.

Homey was a great ranch horse for me that day in the photo, moving and sorting cows. But that horse really won my heart when Ronnie told me the

story of how the horse had helped his daughter, Kaylee, when it looked like her solid college rodeo career suddenly might be lost.

Kaylee and her seasoned mount, "Havoc," were performing well in collegiate rodeo, finishing up her sophomore year in a two-year program at Eastern Wyoming College. The cowgirl was offered a full rodeo-academic scholarship at Oklahoma Panhandle State University to complete an elementary education degree.

With only two weeks to go before starting her first semester there, Havoc had a fluke accident and nearly cut off her hoof in a gate at home on the ranch. For a while, it looked like the mare might need to be euthanized for the severe injury. Havoc has since made a slow but steady recovery but won't compete again.

It was devastating for Kaylee, plus the deadline for starting at a new school loomed ever closer. She was particularly renowned on the circuit for fast times in goat tying and now would have to go off to school and somehow compete without her established rodeo partner. In a split second, her horse, her rodeo career and her education all hung in the balance.

Kaylee and her family did their best to figure out what to do next. Although the ranch had plenty of horses, none seemed likely candidates to step up and provide serious help for Kaylee with her pressing college rodeo team obligations.

It was then that Homey, perhaps the most unlikely candidate of all, was nominated for his big chance.

"I didn't have anything I'd started on goats other than Homey," Kaylee says. "Clear back when he was 2, I ran him by a couple goats and that was it! Dad was like, 'Well, why don't you try him. What's it going to hurt?'"

Homey came to the Moyers as a 2-year-old, a gift to the family from the gelding's breeder, rancher Rex Hook of Ottawa, Kansas. A 2003 red dun, Homey is by Poco King Solano and out of Poquito H Reina by Pauls Poquito Bueno. He settled into the Moyers' ranch life and developed

what Kaylee calls a somewhat "lazy" disposition.

The laid-back attitude mostly worked to his advantage since Living Springs Ranch hosts a range of clinics, many of which involve children. Homey became one of the main mounts for children in clinics, including being a trusted mount for children with physical disabilities. All in all, he was kind of the opposite of what one might expect a young, competitive, collegiate goat-tying cowgirl to take on the rodeo circuit.

"So I took him out of the pen, and it was two weeks before his first college rodeo, and every single day, we went by goats," Kaylee says. "I had him in one jackpot, and I won the fast time in that jackpot off of him.

"Then we went to our first college rodeo, and he made the short go. In the short go, he ended up bucking me off, and I landed on my face and broke my hand, and it was interesting! The next college rodeo, he didn't do very well either ... kinda slow poke, I guess.

"The third college rodeo, we ended up winning by 3/10ths in the long go, and then won the short go by 2/10ths. So I won the whole rodeo by a half second. From there, our career kind of took off.

"He was a God thing," she adds. "I told Dad it was like God taking David from the Bible, the lowest of lows, the scrawny little kid who you didn't think could do anything, but he steps up and slays the giant, literally! Making the college finals is a huge step that I've never even taken before, and I never ever would have imagined it would have been on Homey.

"I told Dad that I want to name him 'David' because he went from a kids' horse plodding around the pen at a slow walk to high-tailing it down the pen and being a speed horse. He just doesn't look like it, he looks like a scrawny 2-year-old, really."

The gelding might have been called David if he had become Kaylee's goat-tying horse earlier in life. Originally, he was called Chevy, referencing his registered name.

“Dad said we couldn’t have a Chevy on the place, so we had to rename him,” Kaylee explains. “He seemed more like a Homey at the time, so it stuck.”

Homey isn’t built like a typical competitive timed-event horse, neither does he seem like a natural candidate for the job, so just what is it that allowed him step up and within weeks become the kind of horse to take Kaylee to the inter-collegiate National Finals in 2011 and have her ranked second in the region as of May 2012?

“I think it’s that he’s the most honest goat horse I’ve ever had,” Kaylee says. “He’s never failed me (other than that one

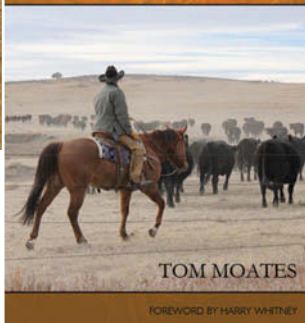
bucking incident). There were times where he wasn’t up to par, but he did whatever it took. A lot of the horses end up ducking out or kicking at you or cutting in front of you, and he has never done that. He has always run straight and true.”

ORNERINESS

Homey certainly was a perfect gentleman with me that day working cattle, both in the open and in the confines of pens and chutes. But Kaylee, who spends the majority of her time traveling and living with him, paints a slightly different personality picture of this equine hero.

“He’s hilarious,” she says. “Every time I get done with him, I let him go roll. And he gets up really slow like he’s just going to kind of get up and stand there, but he always gets up, puts his butt toward me, looks over his shoulder, and it’s like he almost winks at me and he takes off and bucks and farts and runs around the pen about three times, and then he runs circles around me and then he just drops his head and lets me catch him. It’s just so funny because he has so much personality. He’s just ornery.”

“I can put him in a pen, and I won’t even leave for five seconds and if I leave that gate undone, he’ll be loose.

“At the college rodeos, I have panels that are aluminum and I always set up a pen, and he and my breakaway horse are together in those pens. Homey decides that if he wants to go to a bale of alfalfa or if he wants some grass, he takes the entire pen of panels wherever he wants! He’d take them a quarter of a mile to get to where he wanted.

“We were at Fort Scott (Kansas) and we had the panels off the side of the trailer. And, when we woke up in the morning, Dad tried to get out to help me feed and he couldn’t open the door because Homey had pushed the panels up against the door! We had to call a friend to let us out at 5 in the morning. He’s ornery!”

ELMER HEPLER

Elmer Hepler was a legend in the early days of Quarter Horse racing, and in 1991 he was inducted into the American Quarter Horse Hall of Fame.

In 1940, Elmer was in Fort Worth, Texas, at the founding meeting of the American Quarter Horse Association, and he was at the Cabrito Bar in Albuquerque, New Mexico, in 1954 when he and a few others laid down the basics for what became the All American Futurity.

He also owned some great horses. Elmer and his brother Charley bought the mare Shue Fly in 1942, right after she had won the World's Championship Quarter and beat the best horses running at the time – after falling to her knees at the break and giving the other horses a 7-length head start. Under their ownership, she was the 1941-1944 world champion quarter running horse, and, of course, she, too, is in the Hall of Fame.

Elmer owned a lot of other good horses, too – including Johnny Dial, the world champion in 1952 – and he did a lot of other things, including trying to be a movie star. However, he didn't quite make it.

In 1971, a film crew was in Carlsbad, New Mexico, Elmer's hometown, shooting a rodeo movie called "The Honkers." Among the actors in the movie was cowboy star Slim Pickens. Slim was a friend of Elmer's and had arranged for Elmer to have a part in the movie.

Slim said, "We had shot one scene with Elmer in it and then they went on to something else. In a little bit, they needed Elmer again so the director hollered for him. Somebody answered, 'Elmer went to the ranch to breed a mare.'

"The director said, 'Why didn't he let the horse do that? We need him.'

"And that ended Elmer's picture career," Slim said.

OTT ADAMS WAS FACING A QUANDARY. THE HORSEMAN HAD ONE of the greatest sires in Quarter Horse history on his ranch at Alice, Texas. The horse – Little Joe, a son of Traveler out of the Sykes Rondo mare Jenny – was foaled in 1905 and now, at the dawn of the Roaring Twenties, Adams knew the day was approaching when he would have to find a replacement for the stallion.

For two months now, *The American Quarter Horse Journal* has been looking at “Horses in Parradise” – Quarter Horses in the area of South Texas ruled by George Parr. Of all the Quarter Horses that the “Duke of Duval” bred, none was more successful than Parr Passum, the sire of AQHA racing champions Tonto Parr and Above Parr 2. The stallion by Danger Boy II was out of a mare by Joe Moore.

Joe Moore was one of the best sons, if not *the* best son, of Little Joe.

Back to the quandary: Adams had an outstanding band of broodmares – he called them his “wax dolls” – but so far none had produced what he was looking for. He took a big step toward finding Little Joe’s successor when he got the chance to buy the Old DJ mare Della Moore, the fabulous Cajun match racer who was born to run. Out of the Dewey mare La Hernandez, Della Moore and her full sister Old Queenie also were born to mother. Old Queenie became the second dam of the club-footed Flying Bob mare Queenie, the 1945 world champion racing Quarter Horse, while Della Moore’s first baby was the Joe Blair (TB) stallion Joe Reed, who founded the family that flowered through Joe Reed II, Leo and First Down Dash.

Even then, that kind of blood did not come cheap. Buying Della Moore cost Adams \$600, a sizable sum in 1922. Adams bred the mare to Little Joe the day she arrived on his ranch. The result, however, was a filly that Adams named Aloe and

soon sold to another noted horseman, John Dial of Goliad. Della Moore was dry the next year, as she turned out to be every other year. The year after that, she produced Grano De Oro, a fine son of Little Joe but still not what Adams was seeking.

Della Moore’s next baby was Joe Moore, who was foaled March 23, 1927 (or 1926; reports vary). In any case, Joe Moore was born either the year or the year after Adams, under severe financial pressure, was forced to sell Little Joe.

But at least the horseman had what looked to be a suitable replacement. Joe Moore grew into a fine-looking bay stallion (though his head left something to be desired). Nonetheless, Joe Moore from the throatlatch back was a splendid Quarter Horse, a perfectly proportioned, well-muscled stallion with sloping shoulders, straight forelegs with short cannons, a good barrel, and strong hips and hind legs, all packed into a 14.2-hand frame.

Adams liked him from the day he was born.

Writing in “Sires of Speed” in the November 1950 *Quarter Horse Journal*, Montague Rockingham warned breeders “who are trying to produce speed” not to overlook “old Joe Moore. He was used most of his life in the production of ranch stock, but his great heritage of speed has been successfully passed on to many sprinting favorites, grandsons and granddaughters as well as direct get.”

So back to another quandary: One of the greatest mares in history had just foaled a real nice baby by Little Joe. What is Adams going to name the successor to one of the greatest sires in history?

Joe More? ❏

THE *JOURNAL* EACH MONTH LOOKS AT THE DEVELOPMENT OF freshmen racehorses. The *Journal* is profiling a filly trained by Kenneth “Kenny” Roberts and the day-to-day operations of Robicheaux Ranch.

Owned by Jude and Regina Robicheaux and managed by their son, Ryan, the ranch at Breaux Bridge, Louisiana, stands world champion Oak Tree Special and champion Toast To Dash; Grade 1 winners Game Patriot, Swingin Jess and First Down Illusion; Grade 2 winner Heza Fast Dash; and Jet Black Patriot, a Restricted Grade 1 winner who ran second in the All American Futurity (G1) and at this writing is the second-leading freshman sire by earnings.

Kenny Roberts is developing Agents Of Game, a daughter of Game Patriot out of the Runaway Winner mare Agents Of Fortune, dam of the graded stakes-winning geldings Agents Of Copper by Copper Buff and Gametime, Agents Of Game’s full brother. Agents Of Game is bred by Gerard Hebert of St. Martinsville, Louisiana, and is owned by the partnership of Jason Richards of Tyler, Texas, and Mike LeBlanc of Orange, Texas.

The *Journal* spoke May 22 with Kenny and Ryan.

Kenny Roberts **Trainer, Agents Of Game**

“AGENT” IS STILL ON THE SHELF. SHE BLED IN A WORK RACE (from exercise-induced pulmonary hemorrhage, EIPH) and got a little sore in the shins, too, so we had to back off of her. That was near the end of April.

We took her to my farm at Orange, Texas, and she has been there ever since. We thought we might have her back up again by now, but we wanted to really take it easy with her and give all the time she needed, so we’ve been sitting back and waiting a little bit more with her.

She seems to be over the (EIPH). All the time off has helped her with that. Hopefully, it all works out.

Next week, we’re planning on trying to X-ray her shins and go from there. She still might be a little sore – we put another little blister on it, so we’ll take a picture of her shin just to make sure she doesn’t have a fracture or any kind of injury on that shin. Whatever it takes, that’s what we’re going to try to do. If we need to give her a little more time off, that’s what we’re going to do.

If the X-rays show nothing, we’re planning to bring her

back then.

I think she's enjoyed her little layoff. Right now, she's still at my farm. I have a pool at the farm, and we've just been swimming and walking her there on the place. She seems to be doing good, so we're hoping for the best. We'll just have to wait and see.

Ryan Robicheaux Manager, Robicheaux Ranch

THE (YEARLING) SALES ARE COMING UP, SO I WENT THROUGH sale boxes today, kind of thinking that the early bird gets the worm. I hate to wait 'til the last minute to start packing up and ordering everything when I have to be shipping yearlings for sales. This isn't a dead time, but right now we're in between breeding mares, foaling babies and yearlings coming in so I had a little time.

We've got between 50 and 60 yearlings in the barn now. We've been putting them in the swim hole, breaking them to the walker, the boys have been brushing them and picking up their feet – for the first time on some of those yearlings that come here from other places.

We raise about 30 yearlings on the farm, and those babies are accustomed to being handled. After we wean them, say in August, we break them to the wheel (hot walker), give them baths and do everything like that, and then we turn them out. When they come back in April and May, they might be a little green to it, but they've had it happen to them already and so it's not too bad. But some of the customers' yearlings come in and they haven't been touched as much as ours, so it takes a little more time with those. That's what we're doing right now.

I'll be leaving to go to the (Texas QHA Yearling) San Antonio sale and the Louisiana (QHBA) sale before you know it. The Texas sale is July 27-28 and the Louisiana sale is August 3-4. While I'm in San Antonio, I'll have a hundred horses that need to be clipped at the farm. We'll leave Wednesday for Kinder (Louisiana) after I get back Sunday from San Antonio, and I'll have another crew washing stalls and getting ready for the Louisiana sale. So I'm trying to get a jump on things right now, before I have 140 babies on the farm at one time.

When you get to a sale, you never know what you're going to need, so I don't want to be worrying about packing up at the last minute and finding out that I've got to order more buckets and halters and lead ropes, screws and hammers and double-sided tape, and things like that – horse gear and maintenance equipment, both – right then.

Most sales aren't like Heritage Place. In Oklahoma City, you show up, plug in and go on. And most aren't like Ruidoso; up there on the Mountain, you don't have to bring a fan (to cool the horses in their stalls), where at all the other sales, you need a fan for every horse. I have 102 head in the Louisiana sale this year, so that's 102 fans, 204 buckets and all the other stuff that I have to have ready to go before we leave, besides everything else we have to do. It's like moving your whole farm in a week, and then moving back everything that's left when it's over. It's crazy then: Is this done? Is that not done? What else do we have to do? That's what I was going through today.

Last time we talked, we had about 10 mares left to foal. Now everything is foaled out. That's all done.

The babies are looking good. We had some babies on medicine, to prevent *Rhodococcus (equi)*, but that's kind of

slowed down and quiet now. We're a little dry right now. We've had a few afternoon showers but we could use a little more rain right now, and that's when the *Rhodococcus pneumoniae* seems to come. When a baby's blood level spikes, I don't wait – I treat it like it is *Rhodococcus*.

We're still breeding some mares. Some of the trouble mares are done, but we've got some of the later mares that have just finished foaling out and right now we're at the point that we've got to decide what to do with them. Do we leave her open or do we try to breed her? If we leave her open, she won't have a baby coming next year, but she'll be early next year. Or do we flush her, where she gets a baby and comes back early next year? That takes into cost, but this is one of the times when you probably benefit from flushing embryos. You can flush an embryo and still have a baby. Even though it's late, you still have a product and the donor mare is back in early next year, so you can start in on her again in February and move her back up in the schedule.

Some people want to keep trying. We breed through June 10. Everybody wants early babies, but First Down Dash was a late May baby and some other great horses were May babies. In the back of your mind, when you're selling a yearling, this is way too late, but that's not necessarily true.

I had my first (Louisiana QHBA) board meeting a week ago. It went all right. I had some issues to discuss and a few things to talk about. Being at a breeding farm, I talk to customers and members of our association every day, and I hear a lot: Ryan, what are y'all doing here? Can you bring this up? Can you bring that up?

What if you have two horses in a sale, and your best horse draws No. 1 in the sale and your second horse draws like 200, in the middle of the sale. Well, you were stuck with that. But Ruidoso and some other sales let an owner swap two horses. So I brought that up to our board, and we ruled that an owner can move two – if you have 10 in the sale, you can't move 10, but you can move two. You can have one swap; choose the horse you want to put in the best spot that's in your consignment and swap it with one other of your horses. Put that best horse at 200 and put your other horse at the first of the sale. That benefits you and it benefits the sale, makes a better sale. You put the better horse in the better spot.

When our bylaws were written years ago, there weren't a lot of concern about ET mares, no such thing as if a donor mare stays (in Louisiana) but the recip mare leaves, or the donor mare left to go breed in another state but the recip mare was still here, well, what do you do? Those kind of things need to be answered. What is the right way to do things without breaking our rules? I didn't want to just sit and be a bump on a log, but it being my first time there, I didn't want to raise too much trouble, either, being a rookie and all. We have a great association and one of the best breeding programs in the country, but we just need to keep moving forward.

Hey, there's one more thing: I was able to leave this morning for a little while and go watch my little girl's kindergarten graduation. Rhylan will be a first-grader next fall, and she sure is excited. 🐾

HORSES IN PARRADISE

A LOT OF GOOD HORSES AND A LOT OF GOOD HORSEMEN CAME out of South Texas. The land between the Nueces River and the Rio Grande is a major area for producing cattle, but handling stock on those rugged, brush-covered plains requires strong, tough and hardy vaqueros mounted on the kind of fast, tough and hardy horses that could work on the ranch all week, compete in ropings on Saturday evenings and run match races on Sunday afternoons.

As detailed in last month's *Journal*, those were the kind of foundation Quarter Horses that were bred by men such as Will and Dow Shely (who owned Traveler), Ott Adams (Traveler's son Little Joe), M. Benavides Volpe (Little Joe's son Zantanon, sire of King P-234) and George Clegg (Peter McCue's son Hickory Bill, the sire of Old Sorrel). Descendants of those horses still work cattle on storied spreads such as the King Ranch and still win ropings and rodeos all across the region. But with rare exceptions, such as Las Palmas Race Park at Mission, the tracks have disappeared and the racehorses have moved to the pari-mutuel circuit.

"There used to be a lot of Quarter Horse racing in this area," says Shreta Elliott-Martinez, who with husband Eleuterio owns San Diego Downs. "This is one of the areas where Quarter Horses were born. I was raised in Oklahoma, and when our state's Indians struck oil, they went to Alice to buy their first Quarter Horses. It used to be such a big deal here. People would come out after church, enjoy themselves with their families, visit with friends and watch the horses run. It's sad, because this area was so strong in Quarter Horses and it's just kind of gone away."

Named after a daughter of King Ranch founder Richard Kleberg, Alice is the county seat of Jim Wells County and is the town near where Clegg and Adams both ranched in the first half of the 20th century. San Diego Downs is just west of San Diego, which at about 10 miles west of Alice is the county seat of Duval County. San Diego Downs began as a match track when George Parr, the county judge known as

the "Duke of Duval," sent a road crew to scrape a straight-away out of the mesquite and cactus choking a pasture on one of his ranches off State Highway 44. The track eventually expanded into a mile-long oval, with a 550 chute and 10-horse gate, but now is a training center for horses moving on to tracks such as Retama Park near San Antonio and Sam Houston Race Park at Texas' largest city – or before they leave the Lone Star State altogether in favor of greener pastures next door in New Mexico, Oklahoma and Louisiana.

San Diego Downs was part of a circuit that back in the day provided a place for horses to run every weekend year round.

"We used to have four racetracks here in a 20-mile area," says Arnold Munoz, who grew up in the area and schools Quarter Horses at San Diego Downs before taking them to tracks in Texas, Oklahoma and Louisiana. "It was all match races. That whole culture has died off."

Getting the Goat

IN A LAND OF LAID-BACK LIFE, WHERE EVERYONE KNOWS EVERYONE else and seldom walks across the street without running into a relative, Carlos Garcia, 69, was heavily involved in the culture, running horses throughout the region, promoting racing at San Diego Downs and managing his own Santa Fe Downs, where his brother operated the photo-finish camera.

"We'd have a race meet on a Sunday, and hundreds of people would show up, maybe thousands for big races," he says. "Say there were six match races, 12 horses. Whatever we made at the gate – we charged maybe \$1 or \$3 a person – it was 20 percent for the track, and then we'd divide the rest of the money between all the owners. Everybody got a little bit from the gate for putting on the show."

Santa Fe Downs was about 24 miles south of Alice, on a ranch that was owned by Garcia's grandfather and now belongs to one of his aunts.

"That's where Eddie Cox started," he says, referring to the jockey who won the Grade 1 Retama Park and Sam Houston

futurities aboard champion Shining Sky. “Johnie Goodman (who conditioned Higheasterjet and world champion Special Effort, the industry’s first two millionaires) would come here. Doug McMullen, Butch Smith, lots of people raced here.”

Santa Fe Downs was a straightaway that began with a two-horse gate and eventually was expanded to accommodate six head before it closed in the 1980s. Garcia opened the track in 1966.

“The county sent a maintainer and we went from there,” Garcia says. “George Parr said it was OK.”

Parr bred some very nice horses. His most well-known were Parr Passum, who sired champions Tonto Parr and Above Parr 2, and Papitas, who sired world champion Pap. Both were by Parr’s stallion Danger Boy II, a 1943 son of Coldstream (TB) out of a granddaughter of Little Joe (and Parr Passum was out of a mare by Little Joe’s son Joe Moore).

Danger Boy II, Parr Passum and Papitas each won on official tracks. All three also were top match racers on the South Texas bush tracks, where they ran for cash or whatever other stakes the owners could agree on, from titles to ranches to cases of beer or sides of beef.

Joe Valadez, whose mother was a sister of Carlos Garcia’s father, remembers a mare whose sire probably was Chicaro Bill (who was out of a mare by Little Joe).

“Our cousin Hector Garcia had a real nice mare he called La Yegua Prieta, ‘The Black Mare,’” says Joe. “She wasn’t registered, but she could really run.

Hector had matched her to run in the (Rio Grande) Valley. Hector was light enough to be a jockey, and he was working her out down there. But somehow, the people in the Valley found out what mare she was.

“Somebody opened their eyes, recognized her and said, ‘Hey, you’re not going to beat that mare, you’re not going to win that race, you’d better back out.’ They backed out, so the following day, Hector loaded the mare and brought her back to San Diego.

“George Parr was there working out Danger Boy, and he asked, ‘You want to run La Yegua Prieta against Danger Boy?’ Hector said, well, he’d run her up to 350. George said he wanted to race Danger Boy to a quarter of a mile. Hector agreed, said they’d go a quarter of a mile. So they took them to the gate and they took off, and La Yegua Prieta was ahead of Danger Boy all the way to 400 yards, and from there on Danger Boy passed her and beat her by about half a length or so. So Parr won the bet – a goat, a barbecued goat.”

The More Things Change . . .

PEOPLE NO LONGER RUN THEIR HORSES FOR GOATS, BUT THEY aren’t running them for much more, either.

“You can’t make a living on the Texas racehorse circuit anymore,” says Shreta Elliott-Martinez. “We love the sport. But we suffer with it, like everybody else who loves the sport. The only thing that keeps us going is that my husband is a trainer – Thoroughbreds now, but he used to train Quarter Horses – and we own and breed, also. If our horses win, we make money, but if they don’t, well, we plug along until they do. It’s a tough business, and it’s even tougher for the Quarter Horse people. In Texas, it’s terrible. Look at trial purses: In Houston, \$3,000 – Remington \$15,000. It’s the same way in Thoroughbreds, too. But if you love the sport, you struggle and make do.”

The Martinezes make do.

“We love Quarter Horses – my husband and I were both raised on Quarter Horses,” Shreta says. “We would love to have a fair meet at San Diego some day. That would be tremendous. Besides gaming, if we could have OTB parlors in Texas, and have a little, small, short fair meet here like they do at Gillespie (County Fair in Fredericksburg), people could come and have a good time, eat sausage on a stick and drink

a beer, and it would be fabulous. You could do that here and in Brady or in several other little places around the state. Texas is a big state and there are a lot of people who like to gamble. A lot of politicians have made a lot of promises, but nothing ever seems to change.”

Some things have changed a lot.

“I was still in (grade) school, 12 years old,” recalls Arnold Munoz, now 50. “My dad,

Cristobal Munoz, was the jockey who rode Parr Passum, and he and my mom went to vacation in Oklahoma. I stayed at the house because I didn’t want to travel with my parents. The (ranch) owner had 400 mama cows on 2,000 acres, and lived in San Diego. We lived on the ranch.

“My dad told me, don’t be running any horses, Arnold, while I’m gone,” he says, with a laugh. “‘OK,’ I told him, ‘we won’t be running any horses.’ So Dad left, and the boss called and said, ‘Arnold, you want to run Sunday?’ ‘Well, yeah, let’s go!’ My little friend was 10, so we load the horse and got ready to go. But I’m a young kid – what am I doing going to the races? It was a 100 miles to that track. What am I going to do? I went to one of my cousins who worked in the oil field, knocked on the door: ‘Hey, man, I need some help to take a horse to a track.’ ‘OK, let me get dressed.’ So we went.”

Then again, there are those things that never change.

What did Dad say when he got home?

“Oh, he didn’t know. I never told him.”

NO ALIBIS NEEDED

It was an incredibly tight finish at the wire of the May 26, \$1,048,560 Heritage Place Futurity (G1) at Remington Park, with less than a length separating the top third of the field, but first across was BP Cartels Alibi.

Owned by Raymundo Villarreal Jr., trained by Trey Wood and ridden by Ricky Ramirez, the Corona Cartel colt was a head in front to earn the \$440,398 first-place prize. He finished the 350 yards in :17.580.

West Texas Futurity (G1) winner El Duero was second, followed by Sum Better Stuff, Dash For Coronas, Captain Strawfly, CC Seis, Thequeenhasgonenuts and Valiant Lil Lady. PYC Kant Katch Me and Dashin Brown Streak were scratched.

Bred by Bill Price, BP Cartels Alibi is out of the Chicks Beduino mare My Ladys Alibi, a stakes-placed mare and dam of stakes-placed runner Cartel Lady.

BP Cartels Alibi has now won two of three starts and earned \$450,900.

On May 27 at the Oklahoma City racetrack, reigning world champion Cold Cash 123 took on a tough field of 11 other older horses in the \$250,000 Remington Park Invitational Championship (G1), one who entered the gates with a combined five championships, 105 career wins and earnings of \$6,310,225. The 4-year-old overcame a rough start, getting bumped on both sides and nearly turning sideways before recovering and running away from the field. He won going away by three-quarters of a length, with a time of :21.267 for the 440 yards.

Racing for breeder T-Bill Stables of Clare, Michigan, Cold Cash 123 is trained by C. Dwayne "Sleepy" Gilbreath and ridden by Roy Baldillez. He has won 11 of 16 lifetime starts and earned \$1,190,281. He has won two Grade 1 victories this year, including the Leo Stakes (G1).

Champion JLS Mr Bigtime was second. Llano Teller was third, followed by Mr Truly Uno, A Toss Up, champion Rylees Boy, Candy Cartel, Nowurtalkin, Streakin Down, Giorgino, Jazz Be First and T Gold J.

Sleepy, the sport's No. 5 all-time leading trainer by earnings, has had many stars in his barn over the years, including multiple-world champion and American Quarter Horse Hall of Fame member Refrigerator, said, "I've been fortunate enough to have some good horses, but very few are great horses. This is a great horse."

Bred in Michigan by owners Carolyn and Walter Bay, Cold Cash 123 is by Oak Tree Special and out of the Takin On The Cash mare Hot Cash 123. Read more about the Bays in the March 2012 issue of *The American Quarter Horse Journal*.

In May, the Oregon Racing Commission adopted an amendment to limit the medication clenbuterol to 2 picograms in blood of American Quarter Horses and Thoroughbreds racing in Oregon.

This means an approximate withdrawal time of 30 days from use of the medication.

The rule was adopted as a temporary measure and is effective for 180 days after filing, which will cover the entire racing season. The measure might be adopted permanently in the future.

This rule was supported by AQHA, which officially recommends a 30-day withdrawal time on the medication and that threshold levels should be 200 pg/ml or less in urine and 1-2 pg/ml in blood.

cent in horses moved from a cool climate to a hot, humid climate.

Depending on the conditions in which a horse is exercised, total water intake for a 1,100-pound horse can increase from a normal four to 10 gallons per day to as high as 30 gallons per day.

All horses need clean, good-quality water at all times. Outdoor water troughs should be cleaned at least every couple of week to remove debris and algae. Stall water buckets should be emptied and rinsed daily of feed and other materials. Check automatic water systems daily as they may malfunction and not be providing adequate amounts of water. Damaged wiring in automatic waters can electrify the water source and result in an electric shock each time the horse drinks.

While traveling, some horses will refuse to drink chlorinated water or water that may smell or taste different than what they drink at home. To avoid this, take water with you on short trips or provide some flavoring agent to the horse's water for several days before leaving on a trip. Some horsemen add small amounts of Gatorade, Kool-Aid or Coca-Cola to their horse's water for several days before transport in gradually increasing amounts. They then continue to add masking flavors to new water sources while they travel. ☐
