Eve Wiley's pregnancy went from easy to scary when a sonogram showed the umbilical cord wrapped four times around her baby's neck, posing a serious threat. "Our world turned upside down," says Eve. The doctor checked her into a high-risk pregnancy unit at her local Baylor Scott & White Medical Center for 24/7 monitoring and immediate access to the delivery room. "Just in case," adds Eve. She credits the nurses with being her "calm in the storm." Then, 17 days into her hospital stay, the storm clouds cleared as her baby managed to unwrap himself. Eve spent the rest of her pregnancy back home, returning to Baylor for the birth of what she calls her "miracle baby."



MOM-TO-BE: JAYME DITTO



fter weeks of coping with pregnancy pain in her hips, mom-to-be Jayme Ditto traded in working on her feet as a PepsiCo contractor for working full-time from her Dallas home on

Yeti & the Beast, the event styling and stationery business she co-owns with best friend Allie Hill. Now, the 29-year-old spends her days designing and nesting (collecting vintage furniture for the nursery) with husband and fellow designer Mitchell until the arrival of their baby girl in April.

HOW DID YOU TELL MITCH-**ELL YOU WERE PREGNANT? I**

bought [the baby] a pair of baby Vans because I always told him that if you get a pair of baby Vans, it means we're pregnant. The next morning, I gave him a card with a quote from his wedding vows and the box with the shoes. He didn't have any idea when he opened the card ... but then he opened the box and saw the shoes.

DID YOU WANT THE GENDER TO BE A SURPRISE? No. I was

really anxious to know because I wanted to get an early start on nesting and Mitchell wanted to know too. We're both graphic designers and very particular about styling our home, so we took the blood test at 10 or 11 weeks to find out the gender early.

WHAT WAS RUNNING THROUGH YOUR MIND WHEN **YOU GOT THE RESULTS?** Ever since I was little, I wanted a girl but I was preparing for a boy because girls are extremely rare on my husband's side of the family. With the exception of his cousin's daughter, there hadn't been a girl born in his family in 21 years.

HAVE YOU DECIDED ON A

NAME YET? We have. It's Harriet Walsh. My husband wanted to name her Harriet. My dad named me, so it was really special for me to have Mitchell pick the name. In the end, I really loved the name he picked so we went with that.

HOW HAVE YOU BEEN FEEL-ING? ANY NAUSEA OR PAIN?

Lately, heartburn and issues with my hips, but I've been going to Cafe of Life Chiropractic which has been so helpful.

WHAT ISSUES HAVE YOU HAD WITH YOUR HIPS? I've had symphysis pubis dysfunction where your ligaments in your pelvic

bone become too stretchy too soon and it causes alignment issues. There is pain putting on my pants in the morning, putting on my shoes, walking too long and sitting too long. My chiropractor gave me a little belt to wear. It makes sure my hips aren't misaligned.

ANY LABOR AND DELIVERY FEARS? I'm trying to stay really

calm about it. My doctor told me that labor is not my show or my husband's show or her show either. It is the baby's show. Just knowing that and accepting that early on released any fears and has helped me go with the flow.

HOW HAVE YOU BEEN PREPAR-**ING FOR LABOR PAIN?** I was

introduced to transcendental meditation. Growing up, I lived in an old house and the water heater would go out so guickly. When the water turned cold, I would pretend that I was at the beach enjoying a cold-water shower on a hot, sunny day. And I thought if I could make my body do that, I could do [labor].

WHAT ADVICE DO YOU HAVE FOR OTHER MOMS-TO-BE?

Go with the flow. You're not in control. There are things you can try to control but your body is going to do what it wants. Take all the advice that people want to give you with a grain of salt because it's so different for every person.

MASSAGE FOR TWO

The lowdown on local rubdowns for expectant moms

regnancy takes a toll on the entire body. It does a number on your posture, compresses your lower back, weakens your core and places a lot of additional pressure on your legs and feet. So doctors often recommend massage as a common therapy to help relieve an expectant mom's aches and pains.

According to the American Pregnancy Association, an Irving-based nonprofit that promotes reproductive and pregnancy wellness, studies have shown that prenatal massage can alleviate muscle tension and joint swelling (called edema), as well as reduce Mom's stress, depression and anxiety levels.

Other benefits include curtailing headaches and sciatic nerve pain, improving blood circulation and relieving sleep issues.

It's recommended that expectant moms whose pregnancies are considered high-risk or who have conditions like preeclampsia or high blood pressure discuss with their doctor any potential health risks prior to scheduling a prenatal massage.

A prenatal massage differs from a traditional one: For starters, you'll likely be lying on your side. You may have the option to lie face-down on a massage table that has a hole for your belly.

Regardless of your positioning preference, a prenatal massage feels amazing. Schedule a session at one of these eight specialists in Dallas-Fort Worth ASAP. You can thank us later.

@ PEACE FLOATATION SPA // Float safely in a 95-degree tub loaded with 800 pounds of Epsom salt during a Self Care I package (\$165). As you float, magnesium sulfate leaches toxins from the body and relieves inflammation and stretched-out muscles. In fact. the float is so relaxing that one hour in the tub feels like four hours of restorative sleep. Following the float, massage therapists rub lemongrass, lavender or peppermint essential oils into your skin to knead out any remaining lower back pressure during an hourlong face-down massage. GRAND SPA // Begin with the 25-minute Hot Oil Scalp massage (\$50). Exotic nut oils are drizzled from a Tahitian coconut bowl and gently rubbed into the scalp and neck. Next, let soothing hands give you a

customized prenatal massage (from \$125), concentrating on the areas that ache the most such as your lower back and leas - by rubbing them with sweet almond and coconut oils. Dallas, 972/392-9393; grandspa.com

HIATUS SPA // The 60- or 90-minute side-lying or facedown Momma-To-Be massage (\$120, \$165) begins with a cleansing foot soak and a fiveminute aroma journey: Choose from a collection of essential oils, including stress-relieving lavender and rosemary mint, then close your eyes and inhale. Make a day of it, and indulge in a Tailor-Made facial (from \$110). which features steam and acupressure techniques to restore and balance hormone-affected skin (thanks, pregnancy-induced acne) and includes a complimentary hand and foot massage. 

Third trimester preparations for your new bundle



Il the prep work involved in welcoming your new bundle is enough to make anyone's head spin - with or without pregnancy brain. So after you've prepared the nursery and been

showered with gifts from your registry, check these final basic to-dos off your list.

WEEKS 27-31

- Properly install car seat. (You'll typically learn this in a baby basics class, but you can always stop by the local fire department to make sure you've installed it correctly.)
- Look into options for storing or donating cord blood (if you choose)
- O Buy diapers, wipes and any other baby items still needed
- Stock the freezer with made-ahead meals that can be popped in the oven or reheated
- Tour the hospital or birthing center
- Create a birth plan
- Alert your health insurance company that you will be adding a baby

- Update life insurance and wills to include your new addition, including quardianship
- Take childbirth, baby basics and breastfeeding classes

WEEKS 31-38

- Check with your insurance about getting a breast pump. (Most insurance companies cover at least part of the cost of a pump; check with yours to weigh your options.)
- O Determine a visitation plan for grandparents, family and friends
- Sort out your maternity leave, including whom you should inform when you go into labor
- Find a pediatrician. (Get recommendations through our online directory of Mom-Approved Pediatricians.)

- Schedule a newborn photo shoot
- Determine who will take care of your pets, plants and home while you're in labor and/or staying in the hospital
- Wash all baby clothes and baby bedding
- O Set up baby's bed
- O Purchase adult diapers (trust us, you're going to want these if you have a vaginal delivery) and nipple balm (if you plan to breastfeed)
- Buy and wash comfortable and stretchy clothes to wear in your fourth trimester

NEW MOM: CATHERINE HARRELL

fter years of responding to midnight pager alerts as a medical resident, Fort Worth dermatologist Dr. Catherine Harrell now welcomes waking to the sound of her crying baby Samuel, who arrived in December of last year. Catherine, 33, and her husband Jason spent one year struggling to conceive. When months of fertility treatments failed, Jason's pastor suggested they try IVF — it only took one round for Catherine and Jason to become Mom and Dad.

WHAT WAS THE IVF PROCESS

LIKE? We started on the IVF iourney in January of last year and by April I was pregnant because, fortunately, I only had to go through one round. First, you go through a stimulation process, which is about 2 1/2 weeks of going to the doctor every other day, getting ultrasounds and blood work done. Injections were twice a day and would increase depending on my hormones. When the process was finally completed, they harvested 19 eggs and took my husband's sperm. Of those 19, only 14 fertilized, only 12 started to develop and altogether we ended up with seven embryos.

HOW WAS YOUR PREGNANCY?

Pregnancy seemed like a breeze compared to everything else I went through - giving myself injections and going through the procedures.

DID YOU HAVE ANY WEIRD CRAVINGS? I should have known I was having a boy

because all I wanted in the first trimester was barbeque.

WHAT WAS IT LIKE SEEING YOUR SON FOR THE FIRST

TIME? I thought from things my friends had told me that I'd automatically be so in love with my baby, that I would feel like I've known him forever. Well, I looked at him and said, "I don't know you. You're this whole other person that I need to get to know. You have your own personality. You are not me." That was honestly my first thought which isn't as romantic as I thought it was going to be.

HOW HAS YOUR MARRIAGE EVOLVED SINCE SAMUEL JOINED THE FAMILY? It's

deepened the relationship. We've always been a pretty good team, even without the baby. Truthfully, I have the best husband ever. He loves to be involved, loves to help, doesn't complain and is just so overioved to have a baby that it is fun to watch him be a dad.

WHEN DID IT REALLY HIT YOU THAT YOU'RE A MOM? I

was speaking to a patient and referred to Samuel as "my son." I had to stop and get used to that.

WHAT HAS SURPRISED YOU MOST ABOUT MOTHERHOOD?


Breastfeeding has been something no one really prepared me for. It has been a labor of love to try to make sure my child is getting breast milk and enough of it. The hospital says breast is best, but I had to give him formula supplement a few times because I literally wasn't making enough. Because of that, I kind of have this quilt that I wasn't enough - I wasn't providing enough food for my baby.

HOW DO YOU DEAL WITH **SLEEP DEPRIVATION? It's**

manageable knowing that it's temporary and won't be like this forever, knowing that it's worth it and you get to hold your baby. There have been times in my life where I didn't sleep for 36 hours straight because I was in the hospital every night working. So for me, it is easier to hear my baby cry and pick him up than respond to my pager in the middle of the night.

ANY ADVICE FOR OTHER

MOMS? Go with your heart, go with your gut, enjoy your child. If you're doing something because someone else told you to do it, it takes the joy away.



- My favorite postpartum workout is pushing my little guy up and down the street in his Chicco Bravo Trio stroller.
- The first restaurant we took him to was Rodeo Goat in Fort Worth.
 - My mom made me these delicious lactation energy bites with peanut butter, oats, chocolate chips, honey and flaxseed. It's a perfect quick energy booster and great for breastfeeding.
 - We read both The Happiest Baby on the Block by Harvey Karp and On Becoming Babywise by Robert Bucknam and Gary Ezzo, which has been incredibly helpful in getting our child to sleep!
- Lucie's List is a great website full of wonderful resources, especially when moms are creating registries. There are so many options, and she has a review for just about everything.
 - I would tell every new mom to register for a DockATot, a Diaper Genie and a play gym — we use the **Baby Einstein** Nautical Friends Play Gym.
 - The Rumina Relaxed Nursing Bra allows me to be hands-free while pumping.
 - Sarah Wells makes a great pump-slash-diaper bag with two big insulated milk storage compartments. It's great for working moms.

Public places with private spaces for breastfeeding

e know. We know. Under Texas law, you are free to breastfeed your baby anywhere, but that doesn't mean you're comfortable doing so. For many moms (and their babies),

breastfeeding requires some quiet, privacy and comfort which can sometimes be difficult to find in the public arena. Instead of hiding your child (and your bosom) under a hot cover or feeding him in a bathroom stall, duck into one of these nursing-friendly spots around town.

SECOND-TIME MOM: SAM STEWART

am Stewart wears many hats — more than just the trendy sun hats she models on her blog, Style of Sam, which reaches more than 24,000 readers. The Fort Worth style maven, 40, is also a parttime pharmacist at John Peter Smith Hospital and a mom of two: Matthew, 3 ½, and Mia, 8 months, both adopted through nonprofit agency Hope Cottage. Sam and Don, her husband of 14 years, finalized Mia's adoption in January.

DID YOU ALWAYS WANT CHIL-DREN? Yes, I've always wanted children - we just ran into a lot of trouble having them. We struggled with infertility, and it took us over seven years to do all of the fertility stuff. By my last surgery, I knew I was ready to start the adoption process.

DID YOU GET TO CHOOSE THE GENDER? For both of our adoptions, we were open to either a boy or a girl. Deciding to be surprised made the experience similar to a regular pregnancy you don't know what you're going to get! Because we had a boy the first time, we just assumed we'd have another boy. When we got the call for a little girl, we were shocked and excited.

WHAT'S BEEN THE BIGGEST ADJUSTMENT WITH ADDING MIA TO YOUR FAMILY? I was

really worried about splitting our love between two kids. I couldn't understand it until I had Mia, but there's more than enough love to go around. I love Matthew and Mia so differently.

ANY CHANGES IN YOUR PARENTING PHILOSOPHY NOW THAT YOU HAVE TWO? I'm a lot more laid-back. With the first one, you worry, "Is he breathing?" But with the second, you realize that you can do it and you really don't need to fret about the little things, because in the big picture, the brand of baby food really doesn't matter.

WHEN DID YOU START BLOG-GING? All of my friends had children and they blogged about it. They encouraged me to blog about my struggle with infertility and IVF, but I didn't feel comfortable publishing that for the whole world to read. The original name of my blog was My Friends Want Me To Blog. My friends always complimented my style, so I decided to focus on that. Then it changed to Inside My Closet, But I didn't take it very seriously; I'd take pictures with a self-timing camera.

NOW YOUR BLOG IS VERY INTENTIONAL - DID YOUR MINDSET CHANGE? About four years ago, I changed the name to Style of Sam and started devoting more energy towards the blog. At the time, I was undergoing more intense fertility treatments and started working only part time, so it was a good way to use extra time.


HOW HAS GROWING YOUR **FAMILY AFFECTED YOUR MAR-**

RIAGE? When we got Matthew, it was hard. My husband wasn't used to sharing me, and he thought that things would go back to normal after six weeks. So the second time around, we talked about expectations. It's nice because there's a one-to-one ratio of kids to parents, but it's also a challenge because we each put a child to bed, and by the time we are together it's late and we're tired. I have a lot of mom guilt about leaving my kids, so date night is hard. But I would like to set a date time - we miss each other and miss hanging out all the time.

WHAT ADVICE DO YOU HAVE FOR MOMS ADDING TO THEIR BROOD? I'm not the best at following this, but give yourself some grace. There's more than just being a mom going on, and it's so easy to overextend yourself.

DO YOU HAVE PLANS TO EX-PAND THE FAMILY FURTHER? I so in love with Mia - he keeps

think we're done. My husband is asking, "Are you sure we're done?" But I'm 40 and I'm tired!

SLAYING THE DRAGON-IN-LAW

hen I had Genevieve 2 ½ years ago, both my mom and my mother-in-law came to help me take care of my newborn baby.

My mom did everything I asked and then some. She cooked, cleaned, even packed and unpacked (we closed on our new home when Genevieve was 3 weeks old). My mother-in-law, on the other hand, gave me unsolicited advice and not much else.

I know I didn't admit it at the time (at least not to her), but I didn't know what the heck I was doing. I had, however, done a lot of research and read loads of books about babies and mothering while I was pregnant. And just as I become an expert on the topics I cover as a journalist, I thought I knew everything thanks to the parenting studies and articles I had read before giving birth.

Yep, I was that mom, the one who argued with my mother-inlaw about her outdated (read: late '70s) child-rearing practices on everything from letting a baby watch TV to dressing a baby in her Sunday best to do nothing more than roll around on the ground.

I took issue with the littlest things: how much she should be held and rocked and how to properly feed and burp her when I wasn't nursing.

Thankfully, my snotty attitude seems to have disappeared with

the birth of Graydon last summer. I now realize I don't know everything and even welcome some "things to try" when I'm at my wits' end with a stubborn toddler or constipated baby.

Plus, I appreciate time with my husband and time alone so much more. I no longer feel like I have to hover and correct how she cares for the kids. I'm just glad to be able to have a quiet, mess-free meal out with Scott or a pedicure that I don't have to do myself at midnight.

If I could do it all over again, I would totally do it differently. I would channel my best friend, who also has a highly opinionated mother-in-law but who accepts every piece of advice with such grace — even the advice that she thinks is completely ludicrous, like putting cereal in her 4-month-old's bottles to "help him sleep." She just smiles and says, "Thanks, I hadn't thought of that," rather than do what I used to do and get all confrontational about the research that proves that theory wrong, citing statistics and quoting experts like I'm on Meet the Press.

I owe my mother-in-law an apology, not just for my attitude in the months after Genevieve arrived but also for not realizing sooner that grandparents and in-laws play a vital role when it comes to raising my babies. It isn't about me (or my mother-in-law for that matter), it's about my kids and surrounding them with people who love them to pieces, a iob that both grandmothers nail.

I know that my mother-in-law respects my non-negotiables, like feeding Graydon only the food I've left for him or making sure that Genevieve eats her veggies. but I also know that when she visits, she gives both of my kids all her love, even if that means giving Genevieve two cupcakes (let it go, Wendy). In the end, I know that the relationship Genevieve has - and that Graydon will one day have - with both of her grandmothers is priceless.

I only grew up with one grandparent. My kids have four plus a very special quardian Oppa. I want them to have as much time with all of them as possible. For me, that means approaching each in-law visit with a whole lot more grace and remembering just how lucky my kiddos are to have her love - and how lucky I am to have her help.
