The National Ag Day program believes that every American should:


- ♠ Understand how food, fiber and renewable resource products are produced.

Yolo County Crop Report 2018

he gross value of Yolo County's agricultural production for 2018 was \$675,896,000. This represents an increase of \$39,501,000 or 6.2% above 2017's value of \$636,395,000 corrected value. Almonds remain in the number one spot with a gross value of \$112,980,000, followed by Processing Tomatoes with a gross value of \$100,944,000.

Almonds, Tomatoes, Wine Grapes, Rice and Organic Production are the top five commodities according to gross value.

Alfalfa Hay, Walnuts, Sunflower Seed, Nursery Products, and Cattle round out the top ten commodities for 2018.

We would like to express our appreciation to all the farmers, ranchers, and agencies who contributed data to make this Yolo County Department of Agriculture report possible. 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



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AG FEST POSTPONED
