Coronavirus: A worldwide pandemic

The coronavirus is a worldwide pandemic. There are cases in every continent except Antarctica. There are currently around 170,000 cases of COVID-19 worldwide. About 6,500 people have died from the virus while almost 80,000 people have recovered. The virus's epicenter is Wuhan, China, where it started. The city has over 80,000 cases.

Symptoms of the coronavirus are fever, cough, and shortness of breath, very similar to the flu. An infected person may not show symptoms for up to 14 days. Individuals with preexisting health conditions such

hypertension are put at a much higher risk of getting the illness. The death rate is estimated to be 3.4%. The elderly and infants are especially at risk with their death rate going up nearly 15%. It is very important to prevent the spread of the virus by washing your hands for 20 seconds, coughing into your elbow, and not touching your face.

The top ten countries with the most cases outside of China are Italy with 25,000 cases, Iran with 14,00, South Korea with 8,000, Spain with 8,000, Germany with 6,000, France with 4,500, the U.S. with 3,500, Switzerland with 2,000, the U.K. with 1,500, and Norway with

Louvre in Paris has been closed along with almost all French cafes and shops. In Spain and Italy, people are only allowed to leave their homes to buy food, get medicine, see a doctor, and go to work.

In the U.S., President Trump has declared a National Emergency over COVID-19. There are nearly 3,500 cases nationwide and over 60 deaths. The only state without any cases is West Virginia. Massuchusetts, New York, California, and Washington have the most people infected by the coronavirus. Millions of schools have been closed across the country for the health of students and their families.





Did you know plastic waste kills up to about a million seagulls each year? From lakes, to oceans, to beaches are affected by plastic waste which affects our environments and marine life as well.

Plastic pollution has been occurring for decades around our world today with used to be clean oceans and clean environments. According to geographic studies, it has been shown that at most 800-1,200 species worldwide are affected by manufactured or processed material known as marine debris is 80% plastic waste that floats within the ocean from factories and litter. Up to about 13-15 million pounds of plastic waste enters the ocean each year from garbage trucks or litter threatening all marine life and increases the rapid growing of plastic waste.

Plastic is not only a danger to marine life but to human health as well. Breathing in plastic can cause you to inhale toxic chemicals such as dioxins, phthalates, vinyl chloride, ethylene dichloride, lead, cadmium, and many other harmful dangerous substances. These toxins make up plastic and help produce that stretchy smooth like material for the plastic. We rely on plastic too much because it has that durable like material that makes it easy to use for packages, able providing protection on contaminants, and reduction on food waste. Relying too much on one single material can make our environment covered in it, if we mainly use plastic for our environments it risks our health

and our clean oceans or beaches. Too much exposure to plastic can cause links to cancers, birth defects, impaired immunity, endocrine disruption, and other effects it can have on our health.

One of plastic's main elements are oil and phthalate (DEHP). About up to 12 million barrels of oil are used to create plastic each year. Breathing in too much oil mixed substances and phthalate is bad for the reproductive system. Phthalate is made up of industrial chemicals that is used to soften plastic and act as a role of a solvent. It is included in multiple products used today and is one of the main elements for plastic to allow it to be flexible but can have a possibility of causing severe damage to the liver, kidneys, lungs, and mainly your reproductive system.

Another element included in plastic is ethylene dichloride which causes the plastic to be flammable. Ethylene dichloride is to primarily reproduce vinyl chloride which is within plastic too. Too much inhalation of this element can include effects on the human nervous system as well as the respiratory distress, cardiac arrhythmia, nausea, and vomiting. This element reacts with hydrogen chloride and oxychlorination which leads to other elements that are bad to inhale.

We can reduce plastic by giving dumptrucks another area to dump trash in, clean up plastic covered beaches or oceans, and simply not litter to make our environment and ecosystems improve for our community. It is possible to rely less on plastic material and live in a world with better ecosystems and environments.


La Colorina: The Best **Sweet Shop in Town**

People look at me and they see my intelligence. It's what they consider, and often it feels all that I amount to in people's eyes.

Even if you are autistic, you're smart enough you'll find ways to get around it.

Autism is a spectrum, and it's not up to a person who has not lived that life to determine. You never know what a person is going through. At school I answer questions and debate with classmates. People see how I get high grades and do well, and there's a whole world they don't have to consider. I wince away from the sharp chatter of classmates, I have to push myself to make it through the simplest of interactions, and how much energy it takes to lift my head and smile is monumental.

I have to analyze every word, pause after every sentence to try and gauge a thousand things I am naturally blind to: rules constricting what's appropriate, body language, facial expressions, non-literal statements that catch me off-guard.

Conversation is quite repetitive in many aspects. I draw traits I find in others around myself as a shield. From a distance, you can't see how it leaves me drowning

One of my favorite anonymous quotes states, "You only think my autism is mild because you experience my autism mildly." Some days speaking is like dragging shards of glass up my throat. Eye contact burns and some sounds feel as though needles are being stabbed through my ears.

I'm obligated to function. That's what it's felt like for a long time - I've lasted this long. I can force myself to. After most days I want to crawl into my bed with sound-cancelling headphones and break apart for another two weeks.

I don't.


The next morning, I get up and do it all again. Many nights, after

school, I have to retreat to my room for hours to have a meltdown and try to decompress.

It wasn't until high school I found people who made me feel comfortable. That let me have these moments in peace. To flutter my hands excitedly and let myself react in the purest, simplest forms instead of analyzing to the point of exhaustion. A place I can openly discuss the exhaustion seeping into my bones, a haven, providing comfort in simple objects and support during bad days that made them more than bearable.

I don't need your judgments. I don't need your "cure." I just want your kindness and friendship and accommodations to bring safety and hope to people like me.

In Seattle, Washington, Amazon is opening the first cashier less grocery store in Seattle. The store is called "Amazon Go." Amazon Go specializes in seafood, fresh produce, meat, bread, and ready-made meals. Other existing Amazon Go stores are like convenient stores that sell snacks and ready-made sandwiches. Since 2018, Amazon Go has opened 24 locations.

Amazon Go stores are located in Seattle, New York, Chicago, San Francisco and other locations. Amazon Go is tailored in big cities and also mostly tailored to of-

Amazon wants their stores to be around the size of normal supermarkets. The size would be around 30,000 square feet. Amazon is using the Go store in Seattle to test if the size would be compatible. Amazon's reason for making their supermarkets gigantic is because they want to have a big inventory of foods. Amazon will rival other Whole Food supermarkets.

Amazon Go uses artificial intelligence and computer vision from sensors to ensure that the customer has picked up what he/she ordered. Amazon Go is an app that helps you shop and pay for food items. Once a customer has entered the store, that customer has to scan the app, so you can pass the turnstile. The app navigates you to the items you have ordered. Once you have finished, you just walk out and go. When you walk out you have paid for the items through your phone.

Amazon Go doesn't include shopping carts or baskets. The Amazon Go store lets the customers bag their items inside of a bag because of no carts or baskets. The customers get to keep the bag and reuse it anytime, too. When a customer put a food item into their bag, it adds to the price on their accounts. Whenever the customer takes a food item out, the price decreases on their online account. The only way that amazon knows to increase the price or decrease the price when an item is added or taken out of the bag, is through camera sensors. The camera sensors are built into the





Sleeping is very important, especially to students who are still learning and growing. If students are able to sleep longer, this will not only increase their attendance but it will also improve their mental health and attitude. There is a common problem that students face in school: sleep deprivation. About eightyseven percent of American schools have students that are sleep deprived according from the National Sleep Foundation. Students are required to sleep for at least nine hours but only nine percent of them are doing so. Technology, high stress levels, and early school times are most likely the cause of sleep deprivation. Schools should start later in the day because it would help them academi-

cally and mentally.

One reason that schools should start later is because it is not healthy for lems, it can also bring students to be waking up at such an early time for school. Dr. Micheal Breus, a clinical psychologist, said that in teenage years, when students are still growing, sleep deprivation affects the brain and body development. A study has shown that students with sleep deprivation have a thirty-eight percent risk of having depression and possible suicide attempts. There is also research showing that students who sleep less than six hours have a high chance of getting obesity or type two diabetes. People who sleep less than six hours process glucose more slowly than people who sleep up to nine hours. Sleep deprivation can cause serious health problems due to students not getting enough sleep, which is why school should start later in the evening.


Sleep deprivation not only causes health proba student's attitude and ability to focus down. Research has shown that sleep deprivation impacts our mood, ability to focus, and higher level cognitive functions. There are many students who choose to sleep in classrooms and are unable to focus because they could not get enough sleep. Sleeping for less than seven to eight hours increases the likelihood of students having bad grades, attendance, and a lessened ability to concentrate.

Teen drivers also have a lot of problems when it comes to vehicle accidents. There are a lot of cases of car crashes caused by teens using their phones or texting someone while driving, but sleepiness is another huge problem when it comes to teen drivers. According to the AAA,

there has been a reported 100,000 crashes per year from drowsy driving. Teens are at a very high risk of getting in an accident while driving, especially in the morning when students might not be alert enough to focus on driving due to lack of sleep. School should start later during the day, for it could be very dangerous for people who are sleep deprived to drive.

It can be difficult for students waking up at such an early time to go to school. Sleep deprivation can cause serious health and mental issues. Students will be out of focus in class and will end up with poor grades. Sleep deprivation has a significant effect on both academic performance and health. If school were to start later, this would allow students to get more sleep, improving mental and physical health, and academic performance.

Larger schools vs. smaller schools: Who wins?

Diluted teaching, bullying threats, low discipline, and much more. These are many "unfortunate benefits" that come from going to larger schools like Will C. Wood and Vacaville High versus schools like Buckingham Charter.

In larger schools, nearly 400 to 500 students are within each grade level and because of this, individual classes end up having a much higher ratio of students per teacher. This results in students having less one-on-one quality time with their teachers and forces them to not get the important help that they need. Though with smaller schools like Buckingham, which only have about 100 students per grade, teachers can more easily organize coursework to better fit the classes. Teachers are able to listen to many more of students' needs and can give each one the personal attention and feedback that helps to foster their learning. With these smaller classes, students are also able to participate in more team situations, giving students a greater opportunity to work with and learn from

their fellow classmates. Many close friends of mine who have attended larger schools have also told me how they have had to deal with many bullying problems. The National Bullying Prevention Center in their "Bullying Statistics" article estimated that nearly 24% of teenagers in schools with larger bodies of students have gotten bullied and abused; further explaining that because of this, it has led to an alarming increase in depression and anxiety amongst many teenagers.

In smaller-scaled schools like Buckingham, however, there is much less tolerance for these kinds of harmful actions. Teachers and staff members are able to better "police" and pull ill-mannered students to the side; getting the opportunities to have these students see the school counselor to further discuss their underlying anger issues. Then for students who continue to be impudent, they are kindly asked to leave the school to stop any and all types of disruptive problems from arising.

Additionally, larger schools also have less discipline for their students. Teenagers are constantly bringing prohibited drugs and alcohol onto school grounds and are rarely caught. In fact, Editor Camille Renzoni estimates in her "High School Drug Use Facts & Statistics" article that nearly 59% of seniors in immense schools have used alcohol while another 16% have used drugs. Even in my hometown, I have witnessed countless students spray painting and destroying much of school property without receiving many major punishments. Though with students who go to smaller schools, they've generally decided to go to these schools; having a much greater desire to honor the institution that they attend. Teenagers in these schools are not only watched over much more closely by the staff, but they are also continuously taught to be aware and respectful of the rules.

In the end, prodigious schools may be the better looking schools with much higher quality resources, but with all the negative outcomes that come from their sizes, it makes one wonder if these schools are really benefiting anyone at all.

Using science to rear children

In the depths of British research lies the longest study on human develop-

ment, The British Birth Cohorts. Originally this study was intended to find out what it was like for women to have a baby in 1946. Every few years, the scientists would come back to get more information from the families and their babies. The study was so successful that scientists came back and did it again in 1958, 1970, and 1991. The study has collected information on more than 70,000 babies and their families. But today I want to focus on just one finding — perhaps the most important discovery to come from this remarkable study. It's about how to use science to do

the best for our children.

The first lesson from this study is an obvious one, don't be born into poverty. Children born into poverty or working-class homes were more likely to do worse in almost every way, they did worse in school, got worse jobs and earned less money. Surprisingly, these kids were more likely to be overweight, to have high blood pressure, and then decades down the line, more likely to have a failing memory, poor health and even to die earlier. This tells us that early circumstances have a profound influence on the way that the rest of our lives play out.

The second lesson is this: parents really matter. In this study, children who had engaged, interested parents, ones who had ambition for their future, were more likely to escape from a difficult start. It seems that parents and what they do are really, really important, especially in the first few years of life. In one study, children whose parents were reading to them daily when they were five and then showing an interest in their education at the age of 10, were significantly less likely to be in poverty at the age of 30 than those whose parents weren't doing those things.

Now, I said the first lesson from this study was not to be born into poverty because those children tend to follow more difficult paths in their lives. But then I said that parenting matters and that good parenting helps children beat the odds and overcome those early disadvantages. This study shows that poverty and parenting matter. One study looked at children growing up in persistent poverty and how well they were doing at school. The data showed

that even when their parents were doing everything right — putting them to bed on time and reading to them every day and everything else — that only got those children so far. Good parenting only reduced the educational gap between the rich and poor children by about 50 percent. This means that poverty leaves a really lasting scar, and it means that if we really want to ensure the success and well-being of the next generation, then tackling child poverty is an incredi-

bly important thing to do. So, now what? How is this information helpful?

For one, this study looks at children on average. Every child is different, their genetics and their experiences make them unique.

Ultimately, if you want happy children, all you can do is listen to the science, and of course, listen to your children themselves.



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
