## On the Frontlines

White Plains Hospital Emergency Department Nurse Manager Ertha Small-Nicolas discusses what she faced at the height of the pandemic and why she has hope for the future. **By Paul Adler** 

elping run the busiest emergency department in Westchester is taxing even on an average day, but during the coronavirus pandemic, it transformed into an exercise in heartbreaking loss, overwhelming work, and unlikely triumph. White Plains Hospital's Emergency Department (WPH) Nurse Manager Ertha Small-Nicolas, RN, has devoted her life to caring for others since joining the hospital's staff in 1998 and today cares for thousands of patients annually across the hospital's bustling ER. We asked Small-Nicolas for a look inside the maelstrom - including the sorrows and the joys - that has been her life as a frontline combatant in the war against COVID-19.

#### Tell us a bit about your role at WPH.

I have been at WPH for 23 years now, and I have seen the tremendous growth we have experienced, especially over the last five years, improving services for patients. I have been the nurse manager since 2012, and it has been a great opportunity to improve emergency care for our community. When I began as a staff nurse, we saw about 100 patients a day. We are now up to 170 or 180, and on a busy day, we can hit 220.

#### What was it like during the early days of the pandemic?

I believe it was the first week in March when we started seeing patients who presented with flulike symptoms but were testing negative through our point-of-care testing. That's when the news started trickling in about COVID-19, and we started to learn more about it .... That is also around [the time] when we had the first [COVID-19] patient in Westchester County. Immediately, we started preparing our emergency departments to have a section where we can care for COVID patients while maintaining safety for other patients within the Emergency Department.

#### What was it like at WPH during the height of the pandemic?

At the height, we had everyone in his or her PPE [personal protective equipment], and you couldn't recognize who was who, so we had our names written on the outside [of the equipment]. In the beginning, you just saw doctors, nurses, and those who were transporting patients upstairs. It was so busy — I don't want to compare it to a scene in a television show in which people are running around — but that is what it was like, except it was organized.

#### Were there difficult moments for you and your staff?

It has been sensitive for my staff to care for patients without their caregivers and loved ones there.... As frontline staff, you try to be very stoic, but for patients, it was difficult not having a family member there and the nurse having to step up to be the one to be there for [a patient's] last breath or to hold their hand or wipe a patient's

tears or reassure them that we are providing the best care for them. Today, that is still the hardest thing that healthcare workers and my staff have spoken about. I think that is going to be a memorable moment for a nurse, to know that she or he was helpful bridging that gap between patients and their families.

#### Were there some positive or uplifting moments?

What I love the most, and what the staff loves, is when someone is discharged and music is played.... Recently, there was a paramedic who was discharged from the hospital, and it was so emotional to watch. I believe he works at the FDNY, and his family, as well as several of his coworkers, showed up at White Plains Hospital. An FDNY ambulance even came to pick him up. It was so touching. For us as frontline workers to see a family member go back to their family or to rehab to continue their healing process is the most [pleasant memory] I believe we've had.

#### How do you think the virus will change your role ahead?

What this whole virus has done is really made me look at data more, and when there are discussions about something going on in the world, I ask how it could potentially impact us and how we can start preparing sooner rather than later. I think this virus has taught me that we have to start preparing now for what's next and what's worse. You can't wait to hear about it. That's really what emergency nursing and emergency medicine are: always being prepared for what may come through the door.

# **Keeping Patients Safe**

Westchester begins the slow and careful process of emerging from the COVID-19 crisis and reopening dental and medical offices, keeping patients and staff safe is a top priority. To ensure the safety within the office, Advanced Dentistry of Westchester is implementing changes to almost every aspect of its practice. The practice is determined to go well beyond the recommendations of the American Dental Association, the CDC, and the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services. As Kenneth Magid, DDS, FICD, explains, "We are making this extraordinary effort because we have always believed our patients deserve not simply what is required, but the very best in safety and treatment."

Many changes the Advanced Dentistry practice has implemented involve a significant investment in technology and equipment to remove and treat the aerosols created during procedures and by the continual scrubbing of the office air to maintain "surgically clean air." Much of the new equipment was not previously necessary or available for the dental office and has been created or modified in response to the highly contagious coronavirus. Advanced Dentistry also plans to incorporate testing for the virus as testing becomes faster and more available.

#### **TRAINING TEAM MEMBERS**

According to Dr. Magid, all team members in the practice are receiving training in the additional procedures that have become necessary to ensure patient safety. Some of those steps include:

• Evaluating each team member when they arrive at the office, including completing a health questionnaire — each team member takes their temperature and pulse oxygen level, with the results documented daily, and anyone exhibiting symptoms or exposure will be sent home.

• Incorporating a revised dress code for team members — clinical team members will change into scrubs upon arrival and don personal protective equipment (PPE), including disposable treatment gowns, gloves, masks, and while treating patients, the use of face shields. A splash shield has been added to the front desk to preserve the social isolation of team members and patients.

#### PATIENT ARRIVAL AND SCHEDULING

Patients will also notice differences in the way they are scheduled and the procedures when they arrive at the office.

• At the time of their appointment, every patient will respond to a questionnaire that evaluates their possible exposure to

COVID-19. The practice's reception room will not be used. Instead, patients will wait in their cars in the parking lot until they are called on their cell phone. Before proceeding directly to the treatment room, each patient will have their temperature and pulse oxygen level taken. Patients will be provided with hand sanitizer and asked to wear masks or face coverings at all times while not being treated.

• To minimize the possibility of exposure to COVID-19, the practice is revising the daily patient schedule and reserving the first treatment times of the day for patients over 60 or immunocompromised. Additional time is being added to each appointment to avoid interaction among patients and for the complete sanitizing of treatment rooms and other areas.

#### TREATMENTS

To minimize patients' exposure, treatments will also be completed in as few visits as possible.

 Building on its ongoing effort to minimize the impact treatments have on patients' lives and schedules, the practice will continue to use "no shot" "no drill" lasers for many cavities, CAD-CAM single-visit crowns, and CAD computerguided implants that have helped keep treatment visits to a minimum.

• During treatment, a new extra oral suction will effectively remove and disinfect the aerosol created by our instruments and every area is equipped with devices that continually scrub and disinfect the air in the room.

From Dr. Magid's perspective, going to extraordinary lengths is par for the course. "As our patients know, our practice is NOT your typical dental office and our response to this global pandemic will be just as extraordinary," he says. **What**: What was being used as a den off the foyer was transformed into an office by Paquin. This was part of a remodel of a 1920s center-hall Colonial.

**Inspiration**: "Function was the design inspiration for this room," says Paquin. "The clients wanted to preserve the 'den' aspect of the room." Although they have a TV in their living room, they also enjoyed watching TV in this room, and it allows family members to watch different shows at the same time. "The problem was that the home wasn't large enough to have this room function simply as a den. Both the husband and wife often work from home, and there was no other place to put an office. This room needed to do triple duty, by functioning as a den, her office, and his office." **Favorite Part:** The wallpaper. "I am most impressed with my client; she was fully onboard with the idea to wallpaper the entire room," says Paquin. "It's a big risk to take, but clearly it paid off. The happy, metallic dragonfly pattern is so cheerful. How could you not love coming to work?"

**Materials**: Once Paquin found the right wallpaper, she says everything else flowed from there. "We played off the turquoise and chartreuse-green colors," she adds. "We spread the colors around the room through pillows, accessories, task lamps, and end tables. The light fixture is a delight — it's a natural-wood color on the outside but has that acid green on the inside."

**Something Extra:** "The biggest element in this room is the cabinetry that is on three of the four walls," says Paquin. "My cabinetmaker, Henry Agudelo, is a master at making built-in designs come to life and function so perfectly and look so beautiful." -JA

# TOMORROW ALONG THE HUDSON

or White Plains resident Mara Perlmutter, jewelry is literally a lifesaver. After her mother became housebound, the jewelryindustry veteran designed a personal emergency-response device that her fashionable mother would consider wearing. Perlmutter's brand, called Trelawear (trela is "alert" spelled backward), offers battery-operated, water-resistant pendants that feature elegant, hand-cut faceted resin stones in various styles and colors. The line is created by the same manufacturers who produce jewelry for brands like Coach and Givenchy.

On the back of each piece, a button connects the wearer to a U.S.-based safety consultant, providing 24/7 emergency help to those even without cellphones. Trelawear is partnered with MobileHelp, a national provider of emergency-response and health-management technology. The collection is available online at *www*. *trelawear.com* for \$148 each (the monitoring service plan is an additional monthly charge).

Crafted by fourth-generation funeral director Jennifer Graziano of Coxe and Graziano Funeral Home in Mamaroneck, RememBar is a jewelry line that offers timeless wearable pieces to help individuals commemorate their loved ones who have passed on. Graziano sought the help of designer Ward Kelvin (who has worked for Tiffany & Co. and David Yurman) to create fine necklaces, bracelets, and rings with a hollowedout bar that can hold a small portion of cremated remains, a favorite perfume, or locks of hair, inscribed on the side with the word "remember" and a birthstone. Graziano was inspired to create the collection by her faith that we will be reunited with loved ones in Heaven. The collection ranges in price from \$170 to more than \$300. −*GV*

Westchester-based cosmetics company Alexa Persico can help you achieve this coveted radiant appearance. The Lip Velour Gloss, the company's first product and consistent bestseller, is a nonsticky, high-shine lip gloss that offers a weightless feel. Scarsdale native Persico created the signature product nearly a decade ago, after struggling to find a brand that offered something similar for her clients who lamented that products on the market at the time were too sticky.

"My customers loved that they could apply my lip gloss without having the tacky feel. I'm super proud of it," explains Persico. It took her a year to find a manufacturer to create her product line, since, she says, most laboratories test their products on animals, a practice she is opposed to. To attain that overall soft glow, Persico's Brighten Me Baby highlighter palette of three colors, made for different skin tones, is a go-to. Flattering in bright light – including flash photography - it's understandably a celebrity favorite. Mario Dedivanovic (Kim Kardashian West's makeup artist) is among the palette's fans, Persico notes.

The cosmetic line, created in 2012 by then-17-year-old Persico, has since skyrocketed in fame. Starting with just nine lipsticks and nine Lip Velour glosses, the business now includes more than 40 products, including eye and lip primer, HD pigments (radiant shadows), and concealer. Country-pop superstar Jessie James Decker has partnered with the brand to offer her own oft-sold-out eponymous line, including an eye shadow palette, lip kit, bronzing palette, and a recently launched fragrance. # **Baking Good**

Creator of the popular LMNOP Bakery and devoted Katonah mom, Anne Mayhew offers a peek at her tasteful life. **BY MICHELLE GILLAN LARKIN** 

> ike most new moms, Katonah's Anne Mayhew believed that to give her twin baby girls the best possible start in life, she would have to pay close attention to everything that went into their tiny bodies. And, as ambitious and nutrition-conscious moms often do, Mayhew chose to forgo the convenience of jarred fruit and vegetable purées in favor of homemade baby food. That, in turn, got her thinking about what may be the most fundamental building block of a person's diet: bread.

> So, like any Fulbright scholar worth her salt, Mayhew got a book on the subject. It was a cookbook, so while her girls napped back then in 2015, she played in the kitchen. "It's very addictive," she says. "You take three ingredients — flour, water, and salt — and it's like magic, somewhere between science and art."

> Having studied painting and drawing at Parsons Paris and in rural India, and working as a milliner and costume designer at the Metropolitan Opera and on Broadway in her late 20s,

that kind of alchemy was right up her alley. But that was before this creative and energetic artisan originally from Northern Michigan started baking 200 or so loaves per week in a home kitchen that would become the headquarters of the now popular LMNOP Bakery.

The more Mayhew tinkered with bread making, the more she read about the early beginnings of her newfound medium. She devoured a life-altering book about the importance of grain to ancient communities and local economies and acquired eye-opening information about conventional flour. "It's milled about two years prior to sale," she says, "and it's stripped of all its nutrient-dense germ, to make it shelf-stable." She became consumed with the idea of baking with the freshest and heathiest flour she could get her hands on, as the white stuff at the supermarket was no longer cutting it.

Mayhew discovered that fresh grain was available at the Union Square Greenmarket, so she started making trips to Manhattan, filling her backpack and using a small mill to grind rye and wheat berries herself. Soon after, she signed up for fresh-flour deliveries, and her husband, Jesse, born and bred in Westchester, built an extra oven in the backyard.

Still not able to satisfy her hunger to create, with a growing desire to support local grain producers, Mayhew made a pilgrimage to Wild Hive Farm, about an hour north, in Clinton Corners, NY, where regionally grown, organic grain is milled in small batches and made into flour. She finally had enough of the resource she'd been craving at her fingertips, so her passion for the lost art of bread making really began to take shape.

"There are so many variables to the ingredients... the flour, water, and salt, and I kept messing around with time and temperature," Mayhew recalls. She also began experimenting with different varieties of bread — some with oatmeal stout, others with spent brewhouse grains — but the essence of her loaves was, and still is, simple sourdough. "It's not the sourdough you buy commercially," she explains, and it doesn't taste sour either. "It just refers to the oldest way of making bread, where you rely on natural leavening present on the grain and in the air, instead of adding yeast."

Mayhew calls this "the lazy way of making bread," as it requires just a few minutes of hand mixing, followed by 12 to 36 hours of rising and fermenting. "The longer it ferments, the more flavorful it is," she notes, "and easier to digest."

With her craft continuing to refine, her young girls now in school, and word spreading about what she was doing on a serene, wooded street in Katonah, she and Jesse expanded their kitchen to accommodate two large bread-baking ovens and a walk-in refrigerator.

Visits to Wild Hive Farm increased, to the point that she now travels there every three weeks, loading up her minivan with around 600 pounds of newly milled flour per trip. This allows her to whip up an average of 50 loaves a day for farmers' markets, local gourmet shops, and individuals (some from Connecticut) who order online and pick up at a number of drop spots throughout Northern Westchester or at her doorstep.

Jesse goes the extra mile, making deliveries to loyal customers, like NYC's Patricia Rogers. "LMNOP is pure bread-joy deliciousness! I'm obsessed," says Rogers. As for Jesse, he couldn't be prouder of his wife. "It's been amazing watching this small business develop," he says.

Mayhew, who just turned 40 in June, sits on the advisory board of the Northeast Grainshed, which is committed to building a local food chain by connecting regional farms, mills, and malthouses with craft food and beverages. She also hosts workshops at

her home every few weeks, and there's usually a waitlist for those.

Even with everything on her plate, "I'm still a mom from 3:30 p.m. to 8 p.m.," she half jokes. Her family has grown; her girls now have a brother in preschool, and when asked what she does in her downtime, she responds like the typical mom: "I clean the house!" However, she enjoys being outdoors whenever possible, on local hiking trails or the beaches of

Montauk, and wishes there were more time for a vegetable garden or to try new recipes with Jesse, the way they used to.

In her solitary moments, her apron dusty with flour, she dreams about opening a bakery in Katonah or reviving the community oven of old, in which folks would bring homemade dough to the village center to be fired alongside that of their neighbors. "Perhaps a mobile oven," she considers.

Mayhew recognizes that taking LMNOP Bakery to the next level will result in less time with her kids, but she admits she's "kinda ambitious" and longs for them to be proud of her. "I want to show my kids that they can do anything they put their minds to," a fresh, wholesome goodness that should be within everyone's reach.

The menu reads like a trip to Madrid or Barcelona, with all the classics, like platters of imported cured meats and cheeses, garlicky *gambas al ajillo*, mini-meatballs in almond-wine sauce, torta Espanola, pimento-laced octopus, *boquerones*, and, of course, paella. Finishing the meal with churros and chocolate is practically de rigueur.

#### **Chicken Cutlet Sandwich** Torta con Milanesa de Pollo

It's a hot take for sure, but the most delicious iteration of a chicken cutlet sandwich that we've had in Westchester isn't a classic parm or wedge; it's this Mexican version. Available for takeout only, it's got more texture and flavor than what you'll get at a corner deli, thanks to a smear of chorizo refried beans, seasoned mayo, buttery avocado, and spicy jalapeños.



#### Cacio e Pepe Lusardi's

When it's done in the U.S., cacio e pepe has the Goldilocks conundrum: Sometimes it's too bland; sometimes it's too clumpy; sometimes it's just right. At longtime Larchmont staple Lusardi's, the execution of this Roman pasta definitely falls into the "just right" category, with a smooth, emulsified sauce, chewy ropes of fresh pasta, and plenty of appropriately piquant pepper and pungent pecorino.

#### Place to Eat Summer Tomatoes Boro6 Wine Bar

Hastings-on-Hudson; *www.boro6winebar.com* Locally grown tomatoes are truly local at Boro6, where owners Jennifer Aaronson and Paul Molakides cultivate their own garden of more than 15 heirloom varieties for summer specials. Embodying the simple-is-better mantra, they range from thick slices of Sullivan Street Bakery bread topped with ricotta and super-sweet roasted tomatoes to platters of sliced heirlooms with imported olive oil and sea salt.

#### New Japanese Restaurant Oko

There are typical Japanese restaurants, and then there's Chef Brian Lewis' Rye 52-seat hotspot, where the menu showcases modern and sometimes playful interpretations of traditional fare. There's tempura shiso leaves served with whipped tofu and smoked trout roe, ramen egg with pickled onion and pork belly, and duck-and-foie-gras gyoza. Add in beautiful plating and numerous ingredients done in-house (e.g, miso, fermented rice, kimchi), and this becomes a must-do dining experience.

After cooking chickpeas (no canned beans here), Saleh blends them with lemon, garlic, and whipped tahini and ice water — an essential trick that gives The Nook's hummus an ethereally light texture — until the final product is silky smooth.

# Tony Takeout

A silver lining of the pandemic restrictions is that takeout and delivery options have broadened beyond pizza, wings, and Chinese. Such fine restaurants as White Plains' Kanopi (www.kanopievents.com/kanopiathome) have special takeout/delivery menus, proffering handmade pastas and sauces as well as artisan cocktails (e.g., the pink pineapple margarita shown above). Thanks to Kanopi's Chef Anthony Goncalves for enabling some very classy home dining! stylish jewel box on Warburton Avenue, Hastings-on-Hudson's Boro6 Wine Bar has a lot going for it, from the roughly 40 by-the-glass wines to the shareable menu of salads, sandwiches, toasts, and cheese-and-charcuterie boards assembled behind the long, U-shaped marble bar.

#### "[Before opening] we traveled to Tuscany and Liguria with another family," recalls Paul Molakides, who opened Boro6 with his wife, Jennifer Aaronson, in 2016. "Handcrafted cheeses, meats, simple wines, negroni, wine o'clock — Jenn and [our friend] Nicole cooked so much that we rarely ate out. Boro6 was born in those Italian hills. We never entertained the idea of hot food."

Many customers fell hard for the wine bar's simple-is-better menu and high-design digs, but others "saw us as a 'not real food' kind of place," says Molakides. "Maybe you start or finish your evening here, but you can't make a meal out of meat and cheese." So, in early 2019, when the adjacent real estate office became vacant, Molakides and Aaronson decided to expand and open B6 Kitchen, a takeout-only shop with a full kitchen to serve the restaurant (Boro6 has only a hot plate and toaster oven) and retail space for the antique dishware, glasses, and other items Aaronson has a knack for collecting.

Slated to debut in September, the opening was accelerated by COVID-19. "As the pandemic started, we reacted the best we knew how. We closed [Boro6], then we reopened, then we closed [again]," says Molakides. Ultimately, Aaronson pushed for the wine bar to remain open, with a takeout-oriented menu that would help the business survive shelterin-place while serving the community and providing wages to employees.

"But how many prosciutto sandwiches can you eat? We needed hot food," says Molakides. B6 Kitchen was close to opening but hadn't yet had inspections. Surprisingly, the health department was still scheduling appointments, and Molakides and Aaronson were able to open in April.

Takeout offerings launched with familystyle comfort foods, like harissa-rubbed roast chicken, red-wine-braised short ribs, Yukon Gold-parsnip purée, panko-topped mac 'n' cheese, and a trio of burgers, including a special, beefy blend of ground brisket, chuck, and 18-month-aged prosciutto.

Also planned is a wide variety of pantry items, many of which are ingredients on the Boro6 menu, including pole-caught American tuna, Gotham Coffee Roasters beans, olives, and bread from NYC's Sullivan Street Bakery. Housemade offerings will include jams, preserves, and nut butters; soups and salads; fresh pasta; and gin-cured gravlax. —Samantha Garbarini

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# Soul Man

Inspired by small European village breweries in Belgium and Germany, a home brewer opens a craft tap house in Pleasantville.

hen Allan Wallace opened Soul Brewing Company in March, the snug place represented "an intentionally different business model than other breweries," he says. The beers he brews are made to be enjoyed in the taproom, and while people can buy 32-ounce cans and growlers to go, Soul Brewing is the only place right now to find the beer.

"When I decided to move from being a home brewer into opening a business, this is what I gravitated toward," he explains. "I wanted to open something simple and close to home."

Wallace's goal is to have approximately a half-dozen beers available at all times, maxing out at 10. His three "regulars" are

a Belgian Blonde Ale made with honey from Hudson River Apiaries in Cortlandt; a British-style Empire Pale Ale, brewed with New York hops and malt; and the El



Tropical IPA, which Wallace describes as "hazy and creamy." There are seasonal and "experimental" beers in the rotation, as well. Wallace recently offered an oatmeal stout infused with cold-brewed coffee made from beans from neighboring Black Cow. In summer months, there are fruity goses (a sour wheat beer) to quaff. The tasting room provides an opportunity for customers to enjoy flights of beer to sample different styles.

There are a number of snacks being served along with the beer — Bavarian pretzels from Katonah's LMNOP Bakery, empanadas from Croton's Baked by Susan, and charcuterie and cheese from neighbor Second Mouse Cheese. "I love having a mom-and-pop-type of brewery here," says Wallace. "And I'm glad to have the chance to pair with local, small production and artisanal shops that are doing the same types of things I'm doing here."

Beer is available for pickup in 64-oz growlers and 32oz cans Wednesday and Thursday, 4 p.m. to 8 p.m., Friday and Saturday, 12 p.m. to 8 p.m, and Sunday, 12 p.m. to 6 p.m. Orders can be placed ahead by phone (914.800.7685) or e-mail (info@soulbrewingco.com) and will be ready for pickup at the front door, curbside. Delivery within Pleasantville is also offered.

At press time, the taproom remained closed to sit-down business, as mandated by the state.

Kanopi Restaurant's perch high atop the Ritz-Carlton in White Plains may be temporarily closed, but you can still enjoy Chef Anthony Goncalves top-rated dishes via Kanopi at Home (1 Renaissance Sq, White Plains; 914.761.4242; www.kanopievents.com/ *kanopiathome*). The menu includes in-house-butchered organic meats, handmade pastas (e.g., semolina thick spaghetti, wholewheat garganelli) and sauces (e.g., Marcona-almond pesto, mushroom Bolognese), focaccia garlic bread, veggie kebabs, a superlative Portuguese rice pudding, and even artisan cocktails. Orders are filled Thursdays and Fridays, require an \$85 minimum, and curbside pickup or delivery (to much of Westchester and Fairfield) is available.

qually impressive to winning 14 Best Of awards in the 20 years this magazine has been handing them out is the fact Tranquility Spa is among but a few Westchester businesses that won both this year and in 2001, the inaugural year of the publication (for Best Day Spa in both instances).

To glean more about a business that has consistently operated at the highest level for such a long time, we spoke with Stephanie Hershkowitz (her mother, Billie Adelson, and uncle Andrew Schwartz launched Tranquility in 1991), general manager of Tranquility Spa.

# What is a key element to succeeding for as long as Tranquility has?

We've always stressed and practiced innovation, to offer clients whatever the latest technologies and services are, such as HydraFacials, laser technology for skincare and hair removal, and, most recently, CBD massages. Also, the deep experience of our staff makes clients feel comfortable, assured by the knowledge and trust that they will be there when needed and know exactly what to do.

# Since 2001, was there any period that was especially challenging?

Being part of the community for as long as we have, we've been through it all. We were here during 9/11, the 2008 financial crisis, and the H1N1 flu epidemic. Our philosophy of treating each client like you would a family member enabled people to trust they would leave feeling safe and better than when they came in. This philosophy starts with who I hire. When potential new staffers are performing during the interview process, I look not just for technical skill but also for a sense of energy, a natural feel they have, or don't, for the business. Those intangibles are hard to teach but are important to imparting that family-member feel.

# What is the biggest change in your industry since 2001?

The amount of men who have become comfortable with self-care. We currently



serve almost as many men as women. Men used to be ambivalent about visiting a spa but now see the benefits. Another principal change is the prevalence of computers and how their use in society affects the body. There is no "off button" to escape this.

#### Are there many long-term employees?

We have been at our current location, in

Scarsdale, for almost 16 years. Much of our staff remained with us from our previous location, in Hartsdale. It is these friendly faces at the front desk, of the massage therapists, aestheticians, and cleaning staff, that keep clients coming back. We have 12 employees who have been with us for at least 17 years, including massage therapists Dawn Freal [since 1995] and Natasha Vaz [since 2003].

# Any special reopening plans when the COVID-19 restrictions are lifted?

We are planning to conduct curbside check-

ins, and, when the treatment time is ready, clients will be called in their cars to enter and proceed directly to a treatment room. Hand sanitizing will be required for all clients upon entering the spa, and all staff will wear masks and gloves at the front desk. A clean apron and a new mask will be worn by the staff member for each new client. Turnaround time for a room is going to significantly increase (from 5 minutes to 25 minutes, as clients will change in the room, plus the boosted sanitation efforts). My overhead hasn't changed, of course, so operating at reduced capacity will be a challenge.

# What does winning 14 Best Of awards mean to the business?

It is a confirmation that our hard work and care are recognized. Tranquility Spa has grown and expanded over the years [from four treatment rooms in 1991 to 21 rooms today] because our clients wanted more from us. # Frosty the Knuckleman

his is a baseball story, told purposely in a summer of pandemic, when the lethal capriciousness of COVID-19 has all but shuttered the Great American Pastime. It's about Forrest "Frosty" Thomas, a right-handed pitcher who played in exactly two games for the Detroit Tigers in 1905 — and was knocked out of the box in each of them. His lifetime Major League record is no wins, one loss.

Chances are better than even that you never heard of him, though he deserves (albeit long-overdue) credit for inventing the knuckleball, a notoriously bewildering pitch that is devoid of spin and flutters like a butterfly.

Frosty also happened to be an uncle of my late mother-in-law, who resided for many years in Larchmont and figures in this story. More about that later.

Frosty was born in 1881 in rural Missouri. At the age of 22, the sixfoot, 185-pounder signed up with the Minneapolis Millers, a storied Minor League franchise in the American Association.

Frosty made his mark early on. Pitching for the Millers in 1904, he logged 329 innings and won 21 games. He was so good that a Minneapolis sportswriter dubbed him the "candy doll of the club and invincible." His success earned him a shot with Detroit in 1905 — the same year, as it happened, the Tigers brought up a surly 18-year-old kid named Ty Cobb, who would go on to become the most prolific hitter of all time.

The Tigers were a decent team in 1905, no thanks to Frosty, whose second, and last, pitching appearance was on May 6, when he was bombed in a 9-4 loss to the St. Louis Browns. The Tigers dumped him not long after that — an unfair demotion, according to a brief item in the *Minneapolis Journal*. "There is a feeling abroad that [*sic*] in Minneapolis that Detroit has not given Thomas a chance to show his worth," the newspaper wrote. Frosty never got another shot at the big time — though he continued on with the Millers and a few other Minor League teams until he retired, in 1916. I doubt he made more than \$1,500 in any one season, probably a lot less.

However, he left behind one very important contribution to baseball: the creation of the knuckleball.

The knuckleball is difficult to hit, hard to catch, and almost impossible to throw with consistent accuracy. Few pitchers have mastered it. "You need the fingers of a safecracker and the mind of a Zen Buddhist to throw it," said Jim Bouton, who late in his career had varying degrees of success as a knuckleball pitcher. Bob Uecker, the former catcher, said, "The way to catch a knuckleball is to wait until it stops rolling and pick it up."

The man reputed to be the first successful knuckleball pitcher is Eddie Cicotte, whose prowess earned him the nickname "Knuckles." He achieved lasting infamy as one of eight members of the Chicago White Sox who threw the 1919 World Series.

But Cicotte did not invent the knuckleball. Frosty did — and at least three newspaper articles published in the early part of the 20th century give him the credit. Cicotte either learned the pitch directly from Frosty, or Frosty taught the knuckleball to another pitcher, Ed Summers, who then passed it on to Cicotte. A piece in the March 24, 1908 edition of the *Detroit Free Press* reported that "a former Tiger...is the really truly inventor of the style of slingshotting that the baseballists are most discussing at the present time. This man is Frosty Thomas."

Unfortunately, Thomas never gained command of the knuckleball himself. "The delivery has brought no great fame or advancement to its inventor," the "He was so

Eventually, Frosty went home to Missouri. He went to college, studied medicine, and developed an interest in psychiatry. Now, he was called "Doc."

In the early 1920s, my future mother-in-law contracted polio and became paralyzed on her left side. The crafty creator of the knuckleball drew on his studies of mind over matter and personally treated her with a form of tough love.

Not believing in braces or crutches, he prescribed a vigorous exercise regimen. Tying the little girl's right hand behind her back, he would taunt her mercilessly, angering her to the point where she would try to kick him or strike at him with her paralyzed left hand.

Amazingly, it worked. Eventually she was able to walk again.

And there was joy in Mudville. 🕡
