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
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EDITOR'S LETTER



There's Magic in These Mountains

he Catskills have a long history as a magical place. In the early 19th century, they were the setting of Washington Irving's short story, "Rip Van Winkle," in which the title character wanders into the mountains, falls asleep, and wakes up 20 years later to find a lot has changed.

From the 1920s through at least the '60s, the Catskills were also a magical place for many, predominantly East Coast American Jewish families, who vacationed at resorts such as Kutsher's, The Concord, and Grossinger's and saw shows by some of the greatest comedians of all time.

In The Borscht Belt: Revisiting the Remains of America's Jewish Wonderland, photographer and Catskills native Marisa Scheinfeld documents the ruins of these resorts and recalls fond childhood memories. In the book, which was published in 2016, she writes: "The Catskills, after all these years, still entices people in search of community and leisure."

That has never been truer than this past year, as people have looked for an escape from their own four walls during the pandemic. Whether it's for a daytrip, a weekend retreat, or a second or primary home, folks are heading to the mountains to enjoy not only the great outdoors, but the great food, drink, shopping, and lodging options in the region. The Catskills are especially appealing to NYC Millennials, says Jennifer Grimes, owner of Country House Realty. "The idea of sitting around a fire pit with friends, sipping local craft brews and grilling up a feast with area ingredients purchased at the local farmers' market, is right up their alley."

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

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
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

Hudson's newest workout space has old-world charm... and fixtures. BY NINA DOYLE

itness enthusiasts seeking an inspired workout venue now have a new option: The Maker Gymnasium. It's the latest addition to The Maker Hotel in Hudson, and in keeping with that property's unique style, it's no ordinary gym.

Along with all the modern equipment you'd expect to see, The Maker Gymnasium offers fun and unusual pieces to inspire any workout. Test your core strength on a beautifully refurbished 1930s pommel horse; work up a sweat with a restored speed bag; have fun with antique leather medicine balls; and tone your biceps on 1940s gymnast rings.

The gymnasium's decor is equally unusual, as many features tell a story. The wall panelings are refurbished doors removed during The Maker Hotel's renovations; the high ceilings feature antique light fittings that hail from a bank in Poland; and an ornate armoire, previously owned by the brother of Houdini, stands proudly in the changing area. "We wanted the gymnasium to be an energizing, colorful, and intimate space that makes visitors look forward to working out," explains owner and founder Lev Glazman. "There's a playful reference to the gymnasiums and circus performers of the past, and reflecting that theme we reclaimed pieces from the old world and brought them back to life."

The past-and-present concept also features in the fitness programs. Certified instructors offer tailored personal training, stretching, and Pilates sessions, and trained aerialists and acrobats will soon teach a unique Circus Physique program that focuses on strength and core development. And in true recognition of present times, the gymnasium follows all COVID-19 precautions.

Glazman and his team are now gearing up for new additions. A juice, salad, and supplements bar is in the works to open in the gymnasium's spacious lobby this spring, and when regulations allow, visitors can relax in a hammam-inspired steam room and enjoy a holistic massage





in a beautifully decorated space.

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

These Highland Falls still-photography artists have created a legacy of working with high-profile clients. BY SIERRA GUARDIOLA



ohn Bigelow Taylor and Diane Dubler have had their fair share of exciting jobs throughout their careers. They have traveled to Afghanistan, photographed Madeleine Albright's pin collection for their book Read My Pins: Stories From a Diplomat's Jewel Box. Taylor was the personal photographer for the Dalai Lama in 1993, 1995, and 1997, when he came to talk to Congress about the crisis in Tibet. They have photographed work for more than 300 books, and have also created their own publishing company, where they create estate books for private families.

Dubler and Taylor originally met in 1970 in Princeton, NJ. Years later, they bumped into each other in a chance encounter on a street in Amsterdam and stayed in touch. After returning to the U.S. and experiencing the era's unrest due to the Vietnam War, they decided to leave together to live in Afghanistan, Nepal, and India. While abroad, the couple's non-commercial photography was inspired by the many Tibetans they met there.

Ultimately, their careers brought them back to U.S. soil, where they continued to follow their passion for still-life

photography. About two years ago, they permanently relocated to Highland Falls after splitting time between Manhattan and the Hudson Valley for many years.

"For years our work was both in the studio and on location, but as time has gone on, most of our work is on location and we really didn't need the studio anymore," Taylor says. "We got tired of making that shift back and forth every week between the city and up here."

While working with high-profile clients like Albright, Elizabeth Taylor, and Kenneth Jay Lane, Dubler and Taylor stumbled upon the idea that led to their passion project. On one client's table sat Baron Rothschild's red book, an album of his estate under construction and then finished. Curious as to why it existed, they asked what its purpose was.

"It was the ultimate take-away to give a house guest that was important," Taylor says. "You would hand them this book, and they would take the house with them. I thought it was a pretty good idea."

This inspired the two to begin creating red books for people with important homes, grounds, and/or art collections who wanted to create a legacy for their family, allowing a small number

of copies to live on for generations. These red books, along with packaged collections for commercial use, grew into their personal publishing company, Kubaba Bespoke Books.

While their red book projects bring them lots of joy, their love for working with big-name clients has never diminished. Their most recent project, Stardust: The Work and Life of Jeweler Extraordinaire Frédéric Zaavy, was published in November 2020 and is a collection that covers the life and work of the late Parisian artist-jeweler, who designed for Fabergé. Dubler describes it as the story of the artist, his home, his travels, and his jewels.

"This book is a good reflection of all the kinds of photography we do," Taylor says.

There's even a black-light room where the flamboyant, vibrant posters come to life and glow in the darkness. Bethel Woods Center for the Arts is happy to be providing people with the connection, culture, and experiences they crave, says Emily Casey, marketing director. "Educators, teachers, and even parents are craving a little change of pace and stimulation," she says.

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

Hot Property Artist's Paradise in Snedens Landing

Renowned sculptor Grace Knowlton's expansive estate hits the market. **BY JAKE MAURIELLO**

WWT ith ample history and Gothic Revival architecture, a home once a part of Seven Oaks, a historically important 19th-century estate, is on the market for the first time in over 50 years. Previous owner Grace Knowlton — a renowned sculptor featured at the Metropolitan Museum of Art, among other institutions occupied the converted estate barn since 1968.

The property, located in the artist-built and celebrityfilled enclave of Snedens Landing, served as a home base for Knowlton's community of artists, sculptors, and potters. The estate comes equipped with amenities any artist would dream of: a modern studio space, a potter's studio, and a bounty of natural light, thanks to the floor-to-ceiling windows in every subsidiary building.

Inside the renovated barn — which maintains a historic feel, even following its renovation — towering cathedral ceilings overlook the open-concept living room, which leads





into a spacious kitchen fit for home chefs of any skill level. Upstairs, a cozy living space boasts a view of the first floor, while wooden beams, walls, and accents in the bedrooms foster a rustic feel throughout the home. Three woodburning fireplaces are sure to keep the home toasty, even during the coldest of Hudson Valley winters.

There are five buildings on the compound: the aforementioned studios and renovated barn, in addition to an industrial-era machine shop and a storybook cottage. In total, the 4.33 acres boast six bedrooms and four-and-a-half bathrooms, across 5,191 sq. ft. of space.

Artsy folk desiring to find a quaint, country escape on the Hudson are sure to fall in love with this artist's paradise.



Business Profile A Perfect Fit

A Rockland County design company's collaboration with Martha Stewart Living is helping kids thrive in the home-learning environment. **BY FRANCESCA FUREY**

n March 13, 2020, Gary Bilezikian sent an email that would change the scope of his company's impact in home-based learning environments.

Guidecraft, a leader in classroom and playroom design, was founded in 1966 as a woodshop in Garnerville. More than 50 years later (and now based in Tuxedo Park), it has expanded into innovative toys and furniture that "bring families together around meaningful activities and help create wonderful environments to celebrate and nurture children," says Bilezikian, Guidecraft's president.

Prior to the pandemic, the company's main focus was enhancing educational spaces to encourage creativity. However, traditional learning environments were turned on their heads a year ago, causing schools to pivot their modes of teaching. As Bilezikian and his team saw the beginnings of educational spaces dismantling and going virtual, they also saw an opportunity for Guidecraft to concentrate on home learning environments.

With shutdowns looming, Bilezikian reached out to Martha Stewart Living and Marquee Brands to collaborate on a collection that would pioneer the concept of a child's home office space. In 2021, the Martha Stewart Living and Learning Kids' Collection, designed for ages 5 to 15, debuted.

The collection blends independence and imagination with workspaces to ensure a steady flow of organization, studying, individuality, and brainstorming. Desks, reading nooks, storage systems, bookcases, art centers, and more can bring the classroom to a student's home. It helps children understand that discovery and learning can occur outside of school settings.

Some might think: Why would children need an office? Bilezikian believes that

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TIPS FROM A Designer/mom

Lauren Magee, director of architecture and environmental design at Guidecraft, and a mother of three, offers this advice for an effective home learning space:

Include the kids: When making plans for distance learning, allow children to provide input on how they'd like to learn. By including your kids, they feel more invested and connected to the subject. This can be as simple as choosing school supplies, or making their schedules for school days.

Plan for the long-haul: Children grow, but furniture doesn't. Invest in furniture that can provide longevity in the household. These pieces should "grow with them" and be long lasting, so the investment is worthwhile. In addition, when selecting furniture, it should blend with your living space (i.e. no neon or rainbow!).

No distractions: Learning spaces should be clear of items and technology that could derail children from focusing. Instill expectations that distractions like TV, video games, and phones are prohibited during school hours. Over time, a distinction of "school" and "play" mindsets will blossom.

Sure, there are some setbacks in homes becoming environmental settings for an extended period of time. However, Magee believes the flexibility and independence it provides is powerful in children's growth. The home allows kids to choose where they're learning, to change their space for optimal engagement, and influences their ownership and autonomy in decision making.

analyzing adult environments and restructuring them into educational spaces is stimulating. A kitchen table might not have the same engagement and productivity levels as workspaces crafted specifically for children.

"The world has been forced to take a pause, but children don't pause, they continue to grow," says Kevin Sharkey, executive design director at Martha Stewart Living/Marquee Brands. The ergonomically designed Living and Learning Kids' Collection is a perfect fit for their growing bodies and minds, utilizing form and function to help children maximize their potential, no matter the location.





We asked designers and architects...

What Creative Solutions Did You Bring To Your Own Kitchen?

Steven Kratchman, owner and founder, Steven Kratchman Architect, P.C.

"I have a floor-to-ceiling window behind a glass cabinet filled with colored glass kitchen objects. The window was needed from the outside for aesthetic balance, and more importantly, necessary on the inside to increase the natural light. Functional tension was created because we needed to maximize the walls for storage. So we ran the base and wall cabinets in front of the floor-to-ceiling window but placed glass-faced doors to let light into the interior. Storage for glass objects including vases, servers, and other colored glass creates a "stained glass" look that changes throughout the day from the west-facing window. It transforms ordinary cabinets into a commercial retail vitrine."

Daniel Contelmo, RA, owner, Daniel Contelmo Architects

"When I designed my own kitchen, I included a built-in window seat. It allows the table to be placed closer to the outside wall creating more floor space where needed. It also doubles as a great place to lounge and read a book."



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

Jessica Lynn Williams, founder & principal designer, Hendley & Co

"My kitchen is currently underway and will display a few unique features: a seamless natural stone floor that leads through steel French doors and onto a dining patio, discrete refrigeration for produce and daily needs only, and no upper storage to preserve room for a tile mural and organizational hardware. I intend to honor the original floorplan as well — it's worked perfectly for nearly 100 years according to the architectural plans!"

Maria Szeglowski, certified kitchen designer, Williams Lumber and Home Centers

"I'm a black and white person. But I like color, so I decided to do it on my walls instead of the cabinets. The cabinets are black and white, and the walls are red. I recommend color to clients. I think it brings identity and individualism. And I definitely think it shows how much a person loves their space; they're not afraid of it. Everybody wants a white kitchen, white and gray kitchen. I recommend something a little different so yours doesn't look like everybody else's."

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

Getting Ready for Spring Grab a shovel and some seeds for early

gardening, with help from Mark Adams Greenhouses.

or gardeners who can't wait for spring to be in full swing, don't fret - there's plenty of ways to get your hands dirty in April.

Now's the time to fertilize, says Mark Adams of Mark Adams Greenhouses. Check the weather forecast and plan to spread fertilizer around berries, garlic, daffodils, small trees and shrubs, and other veggies on decent days. Adams, who provides product to Adams Fairacre Farms, says future April showers will dissolve the fertilizer into the soil and help supplement the garden.

When April finally shakes off the remaining cold, Adams suggests you do the following in your vegetable garden:

TILLING

Start agitating your garden soil! Grab a shovel or rake, or a Mantis tiller. Spread peat moss over the surface (an inch deep) if it's a bit wet from the rain. If there's not too much moisture, any compost can be blended in.

COOL WEATHER VEGETABLE SEEDS

The best vegetable seeds to sow in April are radishes, carrots, beets, peas, spinach and Swiss chard. Plant the seeds in rows, so when they grow, weeding won't exhaust you too much. However, carrots are a tough scenario — though it's smaller, this plant is very similar to pesky weeds. If the carrot is planted deep enough, the weeds will germinate before the carrots and can be burned off with a propane torch, also known as "flame weeding."

FROST TOLERANT TRANSPLANTS

Transplant broccoli, kale, cabbage, and lettuce rather than using seeds. Cabbage family plants can tolerate light frost and grows in cool soil. Beware: cauliflower will not grow without coverage, due to its tenderness. With enough plant food, sun, and rich soil, these plants will grow relentlessly in size.

According to Williams, the sink and faucet are often the focal point of the kitchen and set the creative tone for the entire space. With the heightened awareness on hygiene at home, install a hands-free/ touchless faucet or a matte or brushed finish faucet for a low-maintenance upgrade that won't show fingerprints. Customize your kitchen sink by type, basin, and or material. Remember, your sink and faucet are workhorses, so choose wisely so they will last for the life of your home.



UPDATE YOUR COUNTERTOP

When it comes to new countertops, the possibilities are truly endless. Williams points out that counters like Corian and Formica are cost-efficient options, while those made from granite or quartz may be more expensive. Consider durability, longevity, and maintenance before choosing the option that's best for you.

CHANGE OUT THE HARDWARE AND KNOBS

Swapping out your kitchen hardware may seem like a small change, but it can have a major impact on the overall look and feel of your space. Choose from finishes and styles like chrome, nickel, and stainless steel to redefine your space with a fresh aesthetic.

MAKE THE MOST OF YOUR CABINETS

If new or updated cabinets are on your to-do list, make

sure you consider all of your storage options that are available. Kitchens function better when there is a place for everything and everything is in its place. With all the new cooking appliances and gadgets and increased stocked pantry items, more storage space is a necessity. Consider dedicated pantries and enhanced cabinetry options like larger cupboards with pull-out storage solutions (ie. tip-out trays, utility racks, dividers, drawer organizers). The possibilities are endless with kitchen organization.

TAKE IT OUTSIDE

Give your oven a break and showcase your culinary skills in your very own outdoor kitchen. A

Traeger or Weber Grill will get you started, notes Williams, and Trex decking, which is made of 95-percent recycled materials in the U.S., can help you perfect your outdoor cooking setup. From there, make it even more functional with sturdy aluminum cabinetry for demanding areas and a powder-coated finish and sealed storage to withstand the elements.

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



rom Sullivan County's Dove Trail, whose 50 colorful pop art-style locations pay homage to the world changing 1969 Woodstock Music Festival in Bethel, to North America's highest, fastest, and longest zipline at Hunter Mountain, the Catskills offer an endless array of historic, cultural and outdoor recreation attractions set against the backdrop of pristine wilderness beauty. Spanning four counties – Delaware, Greene, Sullivan, and Ulster

within or close to the 700,000-acre Catskill Forest Preserve, it's no wonder that the region is an outdoor enthusiast's dream. "There's always something to do whether it's skiing, whitewater rafting, fishing, biking, or horseback riding," says Manhattan restaurateur Nicole Arcari, who recently purchased a home in Narrowsburg.
"You have everything and it's only two hours from the city, which is ideal. There's so many great places to dine, to shop; there's tons of activities going on. It's unbelievable."



Metro New Yorkers have flocked to the Catskills since the 19th century, when massive steamboats resembling floating palaces carried them to river towns where they'd take mountain railroads to magnificent, grand hotels high up on lofty peaks. From the 1920s to 1960s, world-famous comedians such as Milton Berle, Rodney Dangerfield, and Mel Brooks either got their start or performed regularly at large Jewish resorts in the Southern Catskills, the likes of which are immortalized in films and TV shows such as *Dirty Dancing* and *The Marvelous Mrs. Maisel*.

These days, the Catskills are drawing a

different crowd. Named a Top 10 Region on *Lonely Planet*'s Best of Travel List in 2019, the area's distinctive, rustic, backto-nature atmosphere is in line with what Millennials are looking for, says Jennifer Grimes, who owns Red Cottage Inc., which offers 52 vacation rentals including rustic cabins and country estates, and Country House Realty in Grahamsville.

Dubbed "Hicksters" by *Eater* (as in hipsters who move or visit upstate for country living), these new Catskills denizens, often from trendy parts of Brooklyn or Manhattan, are breathing creative energy into the region. And business owners are rising to meet their demands for rural takes on metro-quality shopping, dining, and lodging with farm-to-table restaurants; craft breweries, distilleries, and cideries; fashionable boutiques; Instagrammable Airbnbs; and hipster-chic boutique hotels.

The COVID exodus from NYC has only increased the Catskills popularity, as claustrophobic city dwellers discover they can work remotely at long-term rentals or newly purchased homes, while still enjoying the relaxing lifestyle. "You can act like a local, cook outside, hang out by your own fire pit under the stars," says Grimes. "It's an exciting place to be."

Revisit Woodstock 💰

Located at the National Register Historic of Historic Places site of the 1969 Woodstock festival, **Bethel Woods Center for the Arts** is a must-visit for music lovers of all ages. New to 2020 was augmented reality tours that let you explore the grounds with a tablet to experience the sounds and sites of the festival. The museum — filled with music memorabilia, oral histories, and a theater which shows a Woodstock film — just re-opened and outdoor festivals are planned for spring and summer. 

Bring Your Own: Devil's Tombstone Campground, Hunter

Embrace wilderness at this Northern Catskills gem. One of the preserve's oldest campsites, this historic site is surrounded by towering, majestic peaks. After exploring the landscapes of Hunter Mountain trails, snack on s'mores by the serene Notch Lake and stargaze. Devil's Tombstone's amenities include picnic tables, water spigots, and fireplaces.

Some Frills: Mongaup Pond, Livingston Manor and North-South Lake, Haines Falls

Light-on-amenities camping isn't everyone's cup of tea. At Mongaup Pond and North-South Lake campgrounds, adventurers can explore the Catskills' wildlife while enjoying modern amenities, like showers and restrooms. After pitching tents or parking campers at Mongaup Pond, hike the 1.5-mile loop trail in the wooded base of the Southern Catskills. North-South Lake offers tons of trails, including a short journey to the scenic Catskill Mountain House. Remember

Fly Fishing is the Local Pastime By Paul Post



ullivan County's Catskills are the birthplace of American dry fly fishing and remain one of the sport's premier destinations on the East Coast.

Tom Roberts discovered his passion for the sport there and is now one of its biggest promoters as co-founder of the **Livingston Manor Fly Fishing Club**, which offers lessons as part of overnight, outdoor adventures. "Living a busy life in the city, fly fishing was a great sport to force myself to slow down and immerse in nature, which I really appreciated," he says.

The club is based on Willowemoc Creek, which along with the Beaverkill, Delaware, Neversink, and Esopus rivers, attract anglers from around the world. "Fly Fishing is an incredibly inefficient way of catching fish, which is why I love it," Roberts says. "There's a real skill and art to it. But it's not just technique. It's knowledge of the river, analyzing flows and ripples, looking at the bugs and vegetation. You can learn something new your entire life."

Livingston Manor is also home to the **Catskill Fly Fishing Center and Museum** and its Fly Fishing Hall of Fame; **Dette Flies**, the world's oldest family-run fly fishing shop (founded in 1928); licensed guide Bruce Pollock's firm, **Inside The Blue Line LLC;** and **Wulff School of Fly Fishing** for novices and pros alike, founded by national casting champion Joan Wulff and her late husband, Lee. Several miles upstream from Livingston Manor, Willowemoc Creek, and the Beaverkill meet in the legendary Junction Pool, just west of Roscoe, whose reputation as **"Trout Town USA"** is well-deserved.

"Women are the sport's fastest growing demographic," says Kelly E. Buchta, who leads the **Diversity and Inclusion Workgroup for Trout Unlimited**, the nation's oldest cold water conservation organization. "They are finding their own place on the river. You can fish solo or enjoy group camaraderie. It's brought many women together. For some people, fly fishing has become the outdoor version of the gym workout club or sewing circles."

Amy Kirsty, a nurse from Saratoga Springs, echoes that sentiment. She enjoys the peace and relaxation fly fishing affords from her highly demanding job, and has found a good mentor in Anita Coulton (*above, right*), of **Cross Current Guide Service & Outfitters**. "The bow of her boat is my favorite place to be," Kirsty says. "In summer, we'll fish for eight or nine hours 'til it's dark." On one of her first trips, Kirsty hooked a big, fish-of-a-lifetime, only to have it get free and swim away. "Now it's personal," she says, smiling. "It's become a running joke that each time I come back I have to find him."





There's Delicious Dining

BREAKFAST

Small towns are dotted with great old-fashioned diners, like **Miss Monticello** and **Roscoe Diner**, but the region's undisputed, pilgrimageworthy darling is **Phoenicia Diner**. Don't let the NYC hipsters snapping the perfect shot for the 'gram fool you; there's substance here that goes beyond the aesthetic. The upmarket diner classics — egg skillets, fluffy pancakes, French toast, and more — employ local ingredients like Ronnybrook yogurt, house-cured pastrami, NYS maple syrup, market vegetables, and locally smoked trout.

At **Russell's General Store** in Bovina Center, Antonio Mora griddles the perfect BEC — runny eggs, crisp bacon, and a couple slices of yellow cheddar nestled between pillowy brioche — on weekends. While you wait for your sandwich, browse the neatly stocked shelves of pantry items, from childhoodfavorite cereals to bottles of Cholula, and grab a couple pieces of whichever seasonal pies baker Maggie McDowell is slicing up behind the counter.

Pastry lovers can get their fix at Wilson's Bread in Andes, where owner Wilson Keenan sources grains from organic farms for his freshly baked breads and French-inspired patisserie, like pain au chocolat and savory hamand-Gruyère croissants. Pre-order to secure a Meyer lemon and blackberry cruffin or some morning buns, scented with orange, cinnamon, and cloves, and don't forget to add a bag of Brooklynroasted Parlor coffee to your order.

After announcing plans to close last November, Tannersville's **Twin Peaks Coffee & Donuts** got a last-minute reprieve when two local customers bought the beloved breakfast spot. While some of the creations can be decadent, the best donuts of the bunch are the simplest – cinnamon sugar and maple-glazed, straight from the fryer.









LUNCH

With an outdoor deck overlooking the Delaware River, **The Laundrette** in Narrowsburg practically demands you take a leisurely lunch. The Italian, woodfired oven chars rounds of naturally leavened sourdough into puffy edged pizzas, with market-driven toppings like squash, broccolini, and Manchego or nduja, kale, and Calabrian chilies. Also on the waterfront is **Barrio Kitchen**, serving Tex-Mex-inspired cuisine — tequila BBQ wings, Mexican street corn, fried cod tacos, and a guacamole-topped burger with chipotle aioli — overlooking White Lake.

For something quick and portable, try **Marty's Mercantile** in West Shokan. The sandwiches are stacked high, from the New York-style pastrami with Cabot cheddar and chutney on marbled rye to the Mile High Club with turkey, avocado, bacon, and house-made aioli. The on-site market stocks plenty of NYS snacks to round out your meal, including Marquart Farms potato chips and Fruition Chocolate.

When the weather's warm, the string-lightstrewn courtyard is buzzing (day and night) at **The Kaatskeller** in Livingston Manor. The shareable plates run the gamut from cider wings with raw Catskill honey and Neversink Farm arugula salad to wood-fired pizzas, like The White Album with ramp pesto, bacon jam, and local chevre — all to be washed down with local craft beers and ciders. In Mountaindale, **High Voltage** serves beers and casual drinks at its Creek Bar (a retro trailer in the woods) to pair with sandwiches, salads, and seasonal specials.

Mama's Boy Burgers in Tannersville is a classic, roadside burger shack, but with an eye toward better beef. The grass-fed burgers are sourced from JJF Farms, just six miles down the road, and options go beyond the standard LTO-topped fare, with extras like jalapeño bacon and harissa yogurt. (There are also 24 customizable flavors of frozen custard.) In Leeds, **Gracie's Luncheonette** also slings a great burger and other comfort food standards, like buttermilk fried chicken, pulled pork mac n' cheese, and house-made yeasted donuts.

EVERYBODY LOVES THE CATSKILLS

DINNER

Foster Supply Hospitality operates a group of food-driven boutique hotels in Sullivan County, including **The DeBruce** (see page 69) and new **Kenoza Hall** with its retro, Old World Continental Cuisine (think caviar service and duck à l'orange). FSH's **North Branch Inn** is one of the Catskills great dining deals: Just \$49 for a farmdriven, four-course menu, served from a 100-plus-year-old bowling-alley-turnedopen-kitchen.

In Monticello, Resorts World Catskills is home to **Cellaio**, celebrity chef Scott Conant's Italian-inspired steakhouse, featuring classically prepared cuts of beef, modern appetizers, and housemade pastas, including Conant's famous pasta al pomodoro. Meat-lovers can go more casual at **Jägerberg Beer Hall** in Hunter, with German beers on tap and hearty fare like bacon-onion flammkuchen, schnitzel, wursts, raclette, and Bavarian pretzels.

At Brushland Eating House in Bovina, owners Sohail Zandi and Sara Elbert have adapted to pandemic dining by offering pod dining, buyouts of the entire restaurant so loyal customers can enjoy their much lauded farm-totable cuisine — named among the 200 greatest restaurants in the world by *Condé Nast Traveler* in 2016 — safely. In Tannersville, **Deer Mountain Inn** has also been shaking things up with a series of pop-ups and guest chef programming.

Chilly spring evenings call for dinner at Bull & Garland in Hobart. The British-inspired gastropub serves acrossthe-pond favorites like Scotch eggs with grainy mustard, flaky chicken-and-leek pies, and crisp, beer-battered fish and chips. When the weather's warm, The Heron has an outdoor patio with an unbeatable location along the Delaware River and a menu that highlights local farms and producers. An emphasis on local sourcing is also part of the ethos at Peekamoose in Big Indian, owned by NYC industry vets Marybeth and Devin Mills, who cut their teeth at Gramercy Tavern, Le Bernadin, and Picholine. The menu changes seasonally, but expect American comfort food, including the pair's decadent braised short ribs in silky truffle Bordelaise.

It's a Great Place to Live

onvenience, connectivity and high quality of life are fueling a Catskills real estate boom as the COVID pandemic made Metro New Yorkers realize they could work and learn from home while enjoying the region's beauty and bounty.

Previously, many people took weekend retreats, but "Now people who came last March, April and May and rented or had second homes are staying," says Mark McLewin, owner of Monticello-based Pennywise Properties. "They say, 'What are we doing? Let's just stay here.' All of a sudden, your blood pressure is lower and you aren't missing the city. People have found that the lifestyle is much better for them. It's much more comfortable, relaxing, and fulfilling."

Jennifer Grimes, of Country House Realty in Grahamsville, says internet connectivity is one of the first things people inquire about. "Everyone wants to make sure they can work from home or their rental," she says. "People are coming up, mixing business with pleasure, doing kind of vacation-work days."

This increased interest has created "a dramatic uptick in average home sale prices in very specific categories," says Grimes. "Namely renovated, turnkey properties, privately set with updated styling near popular towns. Add water or great views, and the feeding frenzy was and remains eyebrow-raising."

"The housing inventory has dropped way down," agrees McLewin. "Basically what's left is stuff that needs to be renovated.

Charles Petersheim's design-andbuild firm, The Catskill Farms, has worked on more than 270 new homes in the region. "People drawn to new construction can't find anything in the existing marketplace that satisfies their checklist," he says. "It grows by the day because there's less and less inventory and just as many buyers out there."

Eric Winterling, whose company manufactures costumes for Broadway, film, opera and ballet, hired Petersheim to create his dream home in Ulster County, near the Ashokan Reservoir. "The best part of it is that it is a new house," Winterling says. "There was no renovation. It's a solid house, everything works, the heating and air conditioning. It's great."

Manhattan restaurateur Nicola Arcari had a new mini-barn-style home built on seven acres in Narrowsburg. She plans to generate income by listing it on Airbnb part-time. The only problem is that guests quickly started requesting to book stays as soon as the home was completed in December.

"I might have to fight to use my own house," Arcari says, smiling.



rom the 1930s through the early 2000s, the Hudson Valley served as a mecca for sports fans of New York's professional teams.

During the off-seasons in the 1940s and '50s, the best basketball players in the world converged on the Catskills to showcase their skills. Other professional athletes also came to the resorts for business and pleasure. If you were a guest, it was entirely possible to socialize with Mickey

Mantle, Jackie Robinson, and Muhammad Ali – everyone sat down for meals together in a communal setting.

The New York Knicks, New York Football Giants, and Brooklyn Dodgers trained at Bear Mountain due to World War II travel restrictions. From the 1980s through 2001, hockey and basketball fans attended select open Rangers and Knicks practices in Westchester. And the Giants held open pre-season camps in the Valley for a total of 28 years in Pleasantville and at the University at Albany.

While the Rangers, Knicks,

and Liberty still train in the Hudson Valley — in a luxurious complex just off the Saw Mill River Parkway in Greenburgh — no fans are allowed.

Basketball

Basketball in the Catskills began in 1946, when the New York Knickerbockers held their first camp at the Nevele Resort. But Catskills ball didn't really take off until Kutsher's Hotel hired coaching wizard Red Auerbach in 1950 to develop a league with teams consisting of pro and college players that represented the major resorts.

Due to NCAA rules, college players worked day jobs, but played ball and partied at night. Top talent converged on the region from all over the country, especially from East Coast powerhouses Long Island University, New York University, St. John's, and City College of New York.

> In 1954 and 1955, high school phenom Wilt Chamberlain worked as a Borscht Belt bellhop at Kutsher's for \$13/week, plus tips. In addition to setting up mahjong tables, he stood outdoors and hoisted bags over his head to a partner on the second floor.

Chamberlain became so close to owners Milton and Helen Kutsher that he considered them his "second mom and dad," wrote Robert Cherry in *Wilt: Larger Than Life.*

The games also appealed to a less savory element: gamblers, who gravitated to basketball due

in part to the game's offensive barrage and the invention of the point spread.

Instead of asking players to lose, the fixers paid them to shave points and win by no more than five, for example.

When the law fingered the vaunted 1951 CCNY squad for chicanery, a plan allegedly hatched at Grossinger's, the case exposed widespread corruption in college ball nationwide, at the time

far more popular than the nascent NBA.

The Knicks — who trained at Bear Mountain in 1950 returned to the Hudson Valley in 1987, when they rented space at Purchase College and stayed until 2001, spending \$1 million renovating the gym, adding offices and replacing one of the courts. Once a year, the Knicks opened practices to sign autographs and give out swag.

"Nowadays, students would mob them," said Chris Bisignano, Purchase College's director of athletics. "Back then, other than Patrick Ewing being 7 feet tall, the students didn't really know or care."

Hockey

In 1981, the New York Rangers signed a lease to skate and maintain offices at Rye Playland through 1999.

"It's a grand old facility," team President and General Manager Neil Smith told *The New York Times* in 1993. "Mentally it takes us away from the rush and push of New York City." The next year, they won the Stanley Cup.

Football

From 1935 to 1938, the New York Football Giants held preseason practice at Blue Hill Country Club in Pearl River, and moved to Bear Mountain during World War II in 1943.

After hopscotching around the country, they camped at Pace University from 1975 to 1987.

The team eventually settled at Albany from 1996 to 2012 (except for the 2011 lockout), practicing outdoors, staying in the dorms, and requiring players to sign autographs. In their final season upstate, they attracted 37,684 fans.

The New York Jets also trained at Bear Mountain (1961) and the now-defunct Peekskill Military Academy (1963 to 1967).

Baseball

During World War II, the Brooklyn Dodgers held "spring" training at Bear Mountain. Snow sometimes blanketed the field.

Open for Business Legacy and Loyalty

Ten months after the closure of II Barilotto, Scott Rosenberg is back with a new Fishkill restaurant. **BY SAMANTHA GARBARINI**

year into the pandemic, and many restaurants are struggling. Perhaps that's why Scott Rosenberg was somewhat shocked by the enthusiastic way in which his loyal customers flocked to his new venture, Il Figlio Enoteca, which opened in Fishkill in January.

"We never expected such a humongous reaction," explains Rosenberg, whose previous restaurant, Il Barilotto, closed in March 2020. "[Our customers] spent the last year eating take out, and they are embracing coming back and getting this elevated experience again. What we're seeing is that people are not scared to go out to dinner."

For fans of Il Barilotto, some aspects of Il Figlio will feel familiar. There's still an emphasis on fresh pasta, including house-made ricotta cavatelli with sixhour veal Bolognese and stracciatellafilled ravioli bathed in sage-scented brown butter. Appetizers like American gulf shrimp with brandy and gorgonzola and grilled Spanish octopus are familiar favorites, and "there's still no better place to get a grilled veal chop," says Rosenberg.

That doesn't mean everything's stayed the same. "I listened to my customers, to what frustrated them about Il Barilotto," promises Rosenberg. "They could never get in; there was never any parking. There was never room at the bar. It was just too packed." At full capacity Il Figlio will seat 120 across two floors.

What to drink with one's Angus beef carpaccio or branzino with French

lentils and salsa verde has also changed. The wine list is shorter and more curated, and the spacious bar is home to a new cocktail program, which Rosenberg is very excited

about. "We wanted to step into that genre because I know it's something that's here to stay," he says. "My bartenders and I spent a lot of time creating a menu that has a little bit of an Italian twist."

And while customers seem to be

embracing the new, Rosenberg named his restaurant Il Figlio, meaning "the son" in Italian, as a nod to what came before.

"This is the son of Il Barilotto," he says. "The son grew up and moved away, just like any son does. He grows, he evolves, and he begins to form his own life. That is exactly what Il Figlio is. It is me on my next step."

Locally Made Go Nuts for Edenesque

Get your nut milk fix from this sustainable, holistic Kingston brand. **By FRANCESCA FUREY**



hef Leslie Woodward has been around the (butcher) block — food pun *intended*. However, there's no butcher involved in her current venture: curating unique flavor profiles of nut milk at Edenesque, her nutritional, holistic Kingston-based brainchild. For more than 20 years, Woodward has dived deep into the world of clean eating. "If you have a cleaner diet, you overall have better health. A lot of food-related diseases, I believe, are connected to the way we eat and the lack of clean food," she explains.





At Edenesque, the nut milks — almond, cashew, and oat — are free of additives, preservatives, stabilizers, and gluten. Many products are sourced within a 200-mile radius of the Hudson Valley, including oats from Wild Hive Farm in Clinton Corners and honey and maple syrup from Bee Hollow Farm in Schodack Landing. Woodward admits it's nearly impossible to locally source almonds and cashews, but she's looking to add more regional nuts — like hazelnut and black walnut — to the menu in the near future.

Nut milk enthusiasts can enjoy an array of flavors, like carob date maple almond, raw honey vanilla bean cashew, and lightly sweetened oat. The milks are bottled in glass or compostable bottles with recycled labels, and leftover nut meal is composted at Solid Ground Farm in Kingston.

Edenesque has an open-employment policy for individuals of diverse abilities and those who are immigrants, domestic violence survivors, or were previously incarcerated. "We need to believe in each other and lift each other up," says Woodward. "I don't exist alone. I exist within a community."

A Fresh Start

Open since June, Spice Revolution is a coup for flavorful home cooking. **BY LIZ SUSMAN KARP**

ooking to up your pandemic cooking? A stop may be in order at Cold Spring's aptly named Spice Revolution, where hundreds of spices, coffees, and teas are organic, non-irradiated, certified fair trade, small-batch, hand-harvested, and/or unencumbered by pesticides and additives, offering a freshness and pure flavor markedly different from store-bought brands.

"The difference is drastic," says owner LJ Fastiggi, a former sous and pastry chef. She started Spice Revolution 10 years ago because she had trouble finding good quality spices. A Dobbs Ferry storefront was short-lived, but Fastiggi maintained an online presence and a booth at the Pleasantville Farmers' Market before opening a Cold Spring brick-and-mortar in June 2020. "We're finally getting it just right," she says, citing better understanding of the concept and greater customer interest in where food comes from.

Fastiggi sources her wares locally (sage from North Adams, MA), domestically (garlic from Gilroy, CA, the garlic capital of the U.S.), and internationally (Aleppo pepper from Syria). Some spices, like Spanish paprika, come with government certifications as to their provenance. Many, like the shop's best-selling Saigon cinnamon, are ground and shipped within 48 to 72 hours. The majority of the store's stock is less than 30 days old.

he completed 750-mile Empire State Trail should attract droves of hikers, bikers, and kayakers. But what if brewery hopping factors into your outdoor fitness plans? There's an app for that.

In late October, the New York State Brewers Association launched the New York Craft Beer app, which puts the state's beer knowledge in the palm of your smartphone-holding hand. The app includes two virtual passport stamp programs, the existing NYS Brewery Passport, and a new program, the Empire State Trail Brewery Passport, highlighting breweries within 10 miles of the trail. With the app, you can track your brewery visits, and there are incentives to check-in. Each thirstquenching, pint-pounding visit earns app users stamps that add up to rewards in the form of free swag like t-shirts and backpack coolers.

"This new partnership will make it even easier for New Yorkers to experience this great state's natural beauty and world-class craft beverages," said Governor Andrew Cuomo in a press release. "Tourism and recreation are at the foundation of our local economies... in communities across the state."

New York State Brewers Association executive director Paul Leone echoed Cuomo's words, "Almost half of the state's craft breweries are within 10 miles of the Empire State Trail, making this the perfect initiative to shine a light on the trail and the state's craft beer industry."

The New York Craft Beer app will have location features, so you can find a brewery near where you are on the trail, plus a map of 460+ breweries in NYS. Users will also be able to look up where draft lines have recently been cleaned, view up-to-date tap lists, book brewery tours, scan beer labels, and access a ratings system for beers and breweries. There's even an educational guide that'll come in handy when you run into uncommon beer styles.

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
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


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A Hudson Valley Mansion with a *Titanic* Connection BY FRANCESCA FUREY

uring a typical April, history buffs and travelers alike have explored the Staatsburgh State Historic Site and its commemoration of the famed sinking of the *Titanic*. The Beaux-Arts Mills Mansion's halls were well trodden; through its annual *Tales of the Titanic*, visitors toured living quarters, a dining room, and moody grand staircase which resembled the ship's interior.

Although the mansion is currently closed, Staatsburgh will memorialize the history of the *Titanic* with virtual and limited-attendance outdoor programs. On April 9 and 15 at 7:30 p.m., trivia buffs of all ages can play an online version of Titanic Quiz Night, with five themed rounds on the ship's history. If you don't *sink* and place at top three, you'll receive a special prize.


In addition, the site will host four socially distant, in-person programs about Staatsburgh's connection to the *Titanic* (April 18, 23, 25, 30). Visitors can view reproductions of items from the famed ship at the mansion's front portico.

Staatsburgh is one of countless estates built during the American Gilded Age (1876-1917). In 1890, Ruth and Ogden Mills acquired the land and remodeled the 1832 Greek Revival-style home into a Beaux-Arts mansion. Its flat roof, symmetrical design, and neoclassical details are tell-tale signs of the architectural movement. Ruth Livingston Mills' great-grandfather was the third governor of New York; Ogden Mills eventually became the United States Secretary of Treasury under Herbert Hoover.

Ruth Mills' cousin, John Jacob Astor, was one of the 1,500 passengers who perished from the sinking of the *Titanic* on April 15, 1912, during its maiden voyage. Ruth and Ogden Mills had tickets to sail on the ship — fortunately, it was for its second journey.
