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


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
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Market Value

If you've never been to a Field + Supply fair, you're in for a treat. And if you have, you know it's not to be missed. We are happy to say the event is back after a two-year hiatus and will take place October 8-10 (10 a.m.-6 p.m.) at Kingston's Hutton Brickyards, a beautiful setting right on the banks of the Hudson.

"More than a traditional market, Field + Supply offers an immersive, inspirational, and aspirational experience for makers and shoppers alike," says Brad Ford, an interior designer and founder of the high-end fair. "We see it as a cultural event aimed at celebrating all that the Hudson Valley has to offer."

With over 150 artisans and vendors, the market offers something special for everyone — from handmade jewelry, textiles and botanical skincare products to stunning ceramics, lighting, and other furnishings and accessories for the home. You can easily spend a day (or two) here. In addition to shopping, you'll enjoy hanging out at a picnic table sampling the food (Oyster Party's lobster rolls are amazing) and listening to live music. The weekend lineup of indie folk, reggae, and country bands includes Good Morning Nags, August First, and The Big Takeover. Oh, and there's a bar, too.

A few vendors to keep an eye out for: Woodstock's Lowland Studio, which specializes in porcelain chandeliers and scones inspired by the natural beauty of the Catskills, as well as West Africa and Eastern Europe, where owner Kelly Storrs studied the human relationship to fire and clay. Helen Prior's ceramics and pillows, with patterns based on wildflowers and plants native to the Valley, are absolutely stunning. And be sure to swing by HETTA to sample (and, we bet, buy) their sweet and spicy Glögg (Nordic mulled wine). It's based on an old

Norwegian family recipe and bottled in Kingston.

Mike White, behind Germantown-based design studio Ordinal Indicator (a three-time vendor), is excited to experience the market's trademark friendly community. "We've all been cooped up the past year," he says, "and I think I can speak for the entire maker community and say that we're all looking forward to reconnecting with one another." Prior, whose studio is based in Kingston, agrees. "Field + Supply is exciting because it's a cross between a trade show and a really great family event. It's the best of both worlds."

Block Party

The new Legoland park and hotel in Goshen promises a fun-filled family getaway. **BY MEGAN GOLDSCHEN**

My husband, two daughters (ages 5 and 3) and I were among the first to experience **Legoland New York** this past summer — and we had a blast. The park offers plenty of rides and excitement for a day trip but if your kids love Legos and theme parks, I recommend booking a night for full Lego immersion.

The hotel is a party from the moment you walk in the door. Characters greet you upon arrival, and love to pose for selfies (they also keep everyone entertained in the hotel's two dining rooms). The fun continues as you head to your room — which are thoughtfully designed to offer privacy for parents, with a king-size bed on one side, bunk beds for the children on the other, and a bathroom in the center.

Rooms are themed (of course). We stayed in the Castle; the other options are Pirate, Ninjago, and Lego Friends. Each has a play area, and the TVs are preloaded with all four Lego movies, which thrilled my girls.

We started our day with a two-minute stroll to **Brick Street**, one of seven themed areas featuring entertainment that caters to both little ones and pre-teens. Next



was **Bricktopia**, which is ideal for building enthusiasts who want to hone their skills. We moved on to **Miniland**, where we marveled at the models of U.S. landmarks and enjoyed the interactive experiences. By then we were ready to cool off at **Lego Pirates** water rides. The other three “lands” are **Lego City**, where kids can earn their license on racecourses and train to be American heroes like fire fighters, police officers, and coast guard officers; **Lego Castle** with its Dragon rollercoaster; and **Lego Ninjago World** where, you guessed it, children go through ninja training!

CLASSIC CARS AND CAPPUCCINOS

A new coffee house in the Western Catskills serves up excellent java alongside old-school autos.

Jared Lamanna, 35, opened Churchill Classics, his repair shop and dealership, in a former hardware store in 2016 and quickly built a reputation as a gifted mechanic for vintage vehicles. Last August, he opened Churchill Classics Coffee right in the showroom. His passion for classic cars can only be matched by his appreciation of — and reliance on — a *really* good cup of joe. Lamanna's cappuccino maker, a 1960s Faema E61A, is a relic of engineering itself: it's the first-ever espresso machine with a volumetric pump. It's eye-catching, a little finicky, and delivers a consistently smooth shot.

“We consider ourselves artists here, we work on a lot of fine British and Italian cars,” says Lamanna. “I love that [the espresso machine] is from the same era as many of the vehicles in our showroom. It seems to work well with how we approach classic car restoration. I love the aesthetic of it.”

The shop is about a half hour from Monticello, and a short drive from fun, scenic hiking trails (the Monguap Pond Loop in Willowemoc Wild Forest is stunning). Lamanna has plans to launch a rental service out of his parking lot. “I've got a few truly epic overland trucks I want to share with people,” he says. The vintage trucks, outfitted with backcountry camping gear, are perfect for a weekend exploring the Catskills.

“Ultimately, my long-term goal has always been to turn this place into a gathering spot for the community,” says Lamanna, who also intends to host monthly openings for local artists.

For now, car geeks and coffee snobs alike can sip and stare in this unusual showroom.

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A Snooki Homecoming

Jersey Shore star Nicole Polizzi returns to her roots in the Hudson Valley to open a boutique in Beacon. **BY JAKE MAURIELLO**



More than a decade ago, Nicole “Snooki” Polizzi made waves across the world as the breakout star of *Jersey Shore*, MTV’s hit reality show that followed a group of young “adults” spending the summer down in Seaside Heights, NJ.

Fans instantly fell in love with Polizzi, whose short stature but larger-than-life personality led to several of the show’s most memorable scenes. Before long, she was one of the first bona fide reality stars of the 2010s. With open arms, the cultural zeitgeist embraced her quippy one-liners, signature hairstyles, and — most of all — her iconic fashion.

Polizzi, who was born in Chile and adopted at 6 months old, grew up in Marlboro in Ulster County and attended Marlboro High School. (Dedicated fans will recall Polizzi dubbing herself “the princess of Poughkeepsie” in an early *Jersey Shore* episode.)

Opening her own store had been a longtime dream, but filming commitments and appearances packed Polizzi’s schedule for much of

the decade following *Jersey Shore*. As soon as she found the time, she took the leap and opened the first Snooki Shop in Madison, NJ, in 2018.

When scoping out a location for her second shop, Beacon was a natural choice for Polizzi. She was first introduced to Beacon while attending high school cheerleading competitions. “I just love the Beacon area because it reminds me of Marlboro, but livelier,” Polizzi says.

Now, Hudson Valley residents can take a step into Polizzi’s wardrobe at The Snooki Shop (508 Main Street). It features Snooki-esque style like leopard print, loungewear, leggings, and *spunk*.

“Beacon is beautiful and such a classy, cute town that I feel needed a little spunk,” Polizzi says. “I definitely wanted a store that resembles my closet and my style. I always say, when you walk into my store, you’re in my closet and you’re shopping my favorite looks.”

Pedal Pushers

Revel in fall foliage while exploring the Empire State Trail with Gotham Bike Tours. **BY MEGAN WILSON**

It’s another super-active autumn for hikers and bikers throughout the region. Since the start of the pandemic, trail usage across the country has increased tenfold according to the American Hiking Society, and the Hudson Valley is no exception. Luckily for us, Gotham Bike Tours launched creative and fun biking excursions for exploring the newly opened 750-mile-long Empire State Trail (EST).

Since 2014, Lukas Herbert and Laura Willis (a top sightseeing guide and Appalachian Mountain Club trip leader, respectively) have treated cyclists to out-of-the-ordinary rides. Although the EST connects Manhattan, Albany, and Buffalo, Gotham focuses on Hudson Valley-area trails. Bikers can start off with the Maybrook Branch, a base tour on the EST; it begins at Brewster’s train station parking lot and stretches 35 miles north to Poughkeepsie. Like all Gotham tours, unlimited refreshments are provided to fuel up before, during, and after the trip. (Lunch, rail and shuttle fare, plus rental bikes are available, too.)

Looking for a more challenging outing? Gotham offers add-ons to the Maybrook Branch: The Sunset Limited option extends the ride through Poughkeepsie and over the river to New Paltz, where you’ll arrive just in time to catch the beautiful sunset over the Shawangunk Ridge before being shuttled back to Brewster.

And then there’s the Craft Brewery tour. This 35-mile ride begins at the “Old Put” rail trail in Brewster — a defunct railroad that was once bustling with commuters in the early 1900s — and includes a mid-day pit stop for a picnic lunch before arriving at Captain Lawrence Brewery in Elmsford, where you can relax and sample up to 10 of their award-winning beers.

Welcome to Camp Anderson

Design gurus Brooke and Gabriel Anderson are madly in love with the Hudson Valley and on a mission to renovate every inch of their home. The goal: an oasis that's classy, creative, and kid-friendly. Yes, it's possible.

Brooke and Gabriel Anderson — the whip smart, hyper likable brand builders behind high-end interior design firm Dean & Dahl — are never happier than when they're sharing the stories behind their brand and their family.

Married almost sixteen years, the two met, fell in love, and got married in a year's time, while they were both undergrads at Utah State University. The entrepreneurial pair's first joint venture took off right there in their college town, with a tiny counter in an existing coffee shop that served as a springboard for three successful crepe-and-coffee shops that the couple finally sold in early 2021. "That was a very special part of our life," reflects Brooke, 35.

That said, their plan was always to pursue a career in the field of design. First up was their inarguably successful furniture company, Gabriel Dean Design. Brooke and Gabriel, 39, took a unique approach from the get-go, melding his extensive grad school training with her background in social




work and human behavior, which infuses her sense of how people actually interact with the spaces they live in. They launched the furniture line in 2015, which now includes seating, case goods, a variety of tables plus other one-of-a-kinds, with prices for the custom-made pieces starting at \$3,000 for a small stool and reaching \$20,000 for a spectacular 11-foot sideboard. Initially the line was sold exclusively through showrooms, but the business model has since transitioned to online sales.

It was only after starting the furniture brand that they realized they also wanted to pursue high-end, contemporary interior design, says Brooke. Deciding to do so necessitated leaving Utah, with an admittedly limited number of geographic options that made sense from a professional standpoint. They describe New York as their obvious choice. "We considered moving to the city but we really wanted our kids to have more space," says Brooke. Said kids are a huge driving force in Brooke and Gabriel's personal life and professional goals. They have a daughter, Penelope, 10, and two sons, 8-year-old Tucker and 5-year-old Wolfie. All were adopted over a four-and-a-half-year period, a span during which the couple was also defining and refining their business development goals. Brooke happily describes this chapter as "mostly a blur."

The couple quickly zeroed in on the Hudson Valley, for its captivating, fairytale-like beauty and artsy creative energy. When Brooke first viewed the house that would become their home, she was 1,800 miles away in Utah. But after the

FaceTime tour, the two impulsively decided to buy and relocated their family of five to Putnam Valley in December 2019.

SETTING UP CAMP

Their quirky, 2,650-sq-ft house, sits on a 3-acre piece of property, nestled about a half-mile up a private road. It has three bedrooms and as many full baths. According to Brooke and Gabriel, the house had great bones, but they've essentially had to renovate everything. But, as they're first to admit, "We're always renovating." They cheerfully started calling their new home Camp Anderson because they felt so deep in the woods.

Among the many substantial changes: high-vault ceilings and triangular skylights flood the

main bedroom with light, while a stunning upholstered headboard and chandelier lend depth and warmth. Massive picture windows steal the show in the light, airy dining area.

In the process of moving, they ended up downsizing big-time, since their East Coast home is quite a bit smaller than their digs were out West. In the end they got rid of half of what they owned. "There is nothing more freeing than evaluating what you have and only keeping the things you actually like," says Brooke.

A HOME DESIGNED FOR KIDS

According to Brooke, Camp Anderson is all about fun and fueling creativity. Penelope, Tucker, and Wolfie have free reign over every inch of the place. This

was a design imperative for the couple, who both grew up in homes with rooms and entire areas that were strictly off-limits. "I don't understand spaces that aren't designed for living. It honestly drives me crazy," Gabriel says. The kids interact with his original furniture designs in ways he never imagined, he explains enthusiastically. Some days they use the coffee table as a slide, while on other days it functions as a toy car raceway. The sofa doubles as a jungle gym. "No matter what, kids are going to abuse your home. That's what growing up is," Brooke posted on Instagram (@deananddahl) this past June. "Might as well take a deep breath and lean into the chaos." (Follow the couple on Instagram for a mix of evocative product stills, charming personal musings and videos of family outings, many set to great music.)

DESIGNS ON THE FUTURE

Looking ahead, the couple hopes to phase out their twice-weekly commute into New York City and move their business to Cold Spring full-time. "Through COVID, we fell harder in love with the Hudson Valley," Brooke says. "And we're hoping to become the go-to contemporary designers for the region."

Also on their horizon: a luxury resort in the Catskills. The project is still in the development stage, but they promise a design ethos similar to Camp Anderson that mingles luxurious modern touches with homages to land and nature. The timeline is still very tentative, but their hope is a Spring 2023 opening.

In the meantime, their style will only continue to evolve, and their star continue to rise.

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All In The Details

A recent renovation in Poughquag by Southeast Kitchen & Bath showcases a combination of classic design, state-of-the-art appliances, and whimsical, personal touches. **BY LINDA FEARS**

According to Southeast's founder and owner, Anthony Palladino, white Shaker-style cabinets remain a favorite among his clientele. What's new now are to-the-ceiling glass-front cabinets that allow you to easily find what you need. Lights installed inside help showcase dishware and collectibles, and add a warm glow at night when the overhead lights are off.

Floating wood shelves are another trend that works well for several reasons: They provide a visual break on a wall of upper cabinets; they add a warm, decorative element that breaks up all the white and ties in the island and the range hood; and, of course, open shelving offers a prime spot to showcase photos and other favorite items.

A backsplash that extends from counter to ceiling is a look that's very modern right now. Although the homeowner's chose classic Carrera marble subway tiles that echo the kitchen's gray and white theme, backsplashes can also be a great way to introduce another color (or more) to a design scheme and an opportunity to add a pop of personality.

Along the lines of cladding refrigerators and dishwashers in panels that match cabinetry for a seamless look, homeowners are requesting that their stainless range hoods be reimagined as a decorative element. In this kitchen, the hood is paneled in the same gray wood as the island and trimmed in white to match the rest of the cabinetry.



According to Palladino, homeowners are requesting "coffee bars" in new kitchens — in this case, a dedicated corner serves as a drinks station with coffee machines on the counter below a cabinet of glassware and mugs and above a built-in 24-inch beverage refrigerator.

Even though this kitchen has plenty of counterspace, it's more elegant when you can keep it clutter-free. The homeowners installed a microwave drawer in the island instead of purchasing a countertop model. The microwave opens and closes like a drawer with the press of a button so there's no need to bend down to use it. The dark gray island offers a nice contrast to the white cabinets and hardwood floors, and switches things up with polished nickel pulls versus the oil-rubbed bronze pulls on the perimeter cabinets.

For a traditional marble look without the potential staining problems, the homeowners chose easy-care quartz for their countertops. The engineered stone surface is a popular choice, says Palladino, particularly for families with children. The only downside: The material is not heat resistant.

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

Kitchen Trends To Try

Planning an update or a total reno? Here are eight ideas kitchen designers love right now.

1. **Shiplap!** Thanks to Chip and Joanna Gaines, the trend remains strong for those looking to inject a bit of farmhouse style.
2. **Two- to three-inch thick counters.** The average countertop is 1 or 1 ½ inches, so going big and bold makes a major style statement.
3. **Blue cabinets are big** — in every imaginable shade from baby blue to aqua to navy.
4. **Another cabinet trend:** Painting the inside with a contrasting color.
5. **If you like your kitchen looking sleek and uncluttered,** consider installing a charging station for electronics in a dedicated drawer to hide all those wires.
6. **Speaking of concealing,** the trend of hiding appliances behind custom cabinetry is still big.
7. **While a subway tile backsplash is a classic,** installing the tiles in a herringbone pattern is a new twist that adds a bit of depth and richness. (Herringbone patterned wood floors are in now as well.)
8. **If you have an island, get creative with the stools.** Homeowners are adding modern seats to traditional kitchens for a unique look; some are also using them to add a pop of color to an otherwise neutral space.

BELGIAN FRIES

Seven Lakes Station

Are we in Brussels, or Sloatsburg? After snacking on these traditional, twice-fried Belgian fries — you won't be so sure. You'll want to pile on this potato goodness, so stick with the hearty portion served with mayo (the traditional condiment in Belgium and Amsterdam) or one of the delicious sauces like house-made truffle, lemon dill, or roasted garlic aioli. Really hungry? Get a B.E.C. burger or Cubano with a necessary side of frites. *Sloatsburg; sevenlakesstation.com*

CANNED COCKTAILS

The Roosevelt Bar

Make room in your coolers. From the ever-popular Hudson Valley Food Hall, The Roosevelt Bar creates sophisticated beverages ready to elevate any cookout or tailgate. Their Old-Fashioned blends bourbon and cinnamon syrup with three styles of bitters. Manhattans and gin Negronis round-out their canned exports. *Beacon; find them on Facebook*

COMMUNITY-MINDED BREWERY

Keegan Ales

Tommy Keegan passed away this year, leaving behind a powerful legacy. Keegan Ales has been a favorite hangout of Kingstonians (and the Valley in general) since its founding in 2003. Keegan's motto "Have Fun, Play Nice" is immortalized on the label of FUN IPA, but you'll have fun sipping any of the ales including Mother's Milk (milk stout), Joe Mama's Milk (coffee milk stout) and Hurricane Kitty Copper IPA (named after Tommy's grandma). Keegan helped mentor several of the Hudson Valley's most notable breweries and supported many local musicians and artists over the years. *Kingston; keeganales.com*

BEST SMALL PLATES

Flores Tapas Bar

Looking for great Spanish tapas? Head straight to this Wappingers Falls hotspot. Austin and Danielle Flores turned their popular food trucks into a gorgeous restaurant where guests truly "eat with their eyes." Come with a group and try the colorful pulpo a la pancha (grilled octopus), brisket empanadas, or bountiful paella. *Wappingers Falls; florestapasbar.com*

BREWERY FOR LIVE MUSIC

Tin Barn Brewery

Sipping on some of New York's best hazy IPAs while surrounded by green rolling hills makes Tin Barn's good live music sound even greater. 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

You've just learned you have breast or ovarian cancer. Your doctor has explained things but you feel overwhelmed. Perhaps you've spoken to a friend who's been through cancer but their situation isn't quite the same. Or maybe you've completed your treatment, but still have emotions you don't know how to deal with. Where can you turn?

SUPPORT CONNECTION IS THERE FOR YOU

Support Connection is a 501(c)(3) not-for-profit organization founded in 1996 that provides free, confidential support services to women, their families and friends affected by breast and ovarian cancer. Their office is in Yorktown Heights, but through their toll-free helpline and their virtual programs and services, they assist people nationwide.

Support Connection provides personalized attention to anyone seeking support or information for themselves or a loved one. Regardless of where you are in your cancer journey - diagnosis, treatment, recovery, and beyond - and no matter what stage your cancer is, they can help you navigate the changes you experience as a result of living with breast or ovarian cancer.

A UNIQUE APPROACH

Support Connection is unique because the Peer Counselors on their staff are cancer survivors. They've been through



the tests and treatments. They've felt the fear and anxiety. They know what it's like to have your life changed by cancer. Peer Counselors are available by phone and email. There's no limit; reach out as often as you need to. Your counselor will listen to your concerns, offer emotional support, connect you with community resources, and let you know about Support Connection's other valuable services.

PERSONALIZED SERVICES

Support Connection understands that no two people are alike. In addition to **individual counseling** provided via phone and email, they offer a wide range of programs. Select what works

best for you. You can utilize one of these services or all of them:

- **Monthly support groups:** A confidential setting where women come together to discuss their concerns and support one another.
- **Educational programs:** Learning opportunities on a variety of topics related to living with cancer, such as nutrition, dealing with side effects, etc.

Tips About Dealing with Cancer



Learning you have cancer is like having the rug pulled abruptly from under your feet. The world as you knew it is suddenly turned upside down. You find yourself on a path you never expected to travel, without any idea of where it will take you. At every step along the way, you face new challenges.

A cancer diagnosis also has tremendous impact on families and loved ones. You want to be helpful and supportive, to somehow make things easier. But for most people, it's hard to know what to say or what to do.

Support Connection's Peer Counselors, survivors themselves, know how it feels to hear the words "You have cancer." More than that, they speak every day to other people facing their own breast and ovarian cancer diagnoses. They also offer support and guidance to families and loved ones. Each counselor has talked to hundreds of people, helping them sort through their feelings and fears, showing them how to find their own strengths, giving them hope that they'll get through it all.

Based on their own personal experiences, as well as what they've learned along the way from the wisdom of the brave people they talk to every day, Support Connection's Peer Counselors have some suggestions and tips for anyone dealing with breast or ovarian cancer, and for families and friends who want to help:

When You've Been Diagnosed With Breast Or Ovarian Cancer: Finding Ways To Cope

Don't try to do it alone

- Allow yourself to accept support. It's not always easy; most

of us are used to doing it all. But you know how good it makes you feel to help someone else. Give others the chance to do that by helping you.

- Say yes to offers of practical help with day-to-day things like cooking, shopping, carpooling, etc. Your family and friends will appreciate this. They're feeling powerless and they want to help you.
- Clearly communicate your needs to anyone who is helping you or offers their support. Also let them know what's not helpful. This is your time to take care of you!
- The emotional rollercoaster can be just as exhausting as the physical journey. There are no right or wrong emotions. Find ways to express your feelings – sharing with others, attending a support group, talking to a counselor, journaling, etc. Holding emotions in can make them larger than life.

Enlist the help of your medical team

- Gather a medical team that gives you a sense of comfort as well as the confidence that your health needs are being addressed the way you feel they

should be.

- Make the most of your doctor visits. Prepare a list of questions in advance. Bring someone along, as a second set of ears and for moral support. Let your doctor know as much as you can about you and your life so you can discuss your treatment options in the context of your daily reality.
- Never hesitate to express your questions and vulnerability to your medical team. This is new for you and very scary. Let your medical team know what you're feeling, what your fears are. They need to know in order to treat the whole "you," and they won't know unless you tell them.

Take control of information overload

- Put a pad of paper on your nightstand. When you wake up in the middle of the night and find your head filled with "what if's," write them all down and make a note of who you'll call the next day to get your answer. It will help you rein in the tornado spinning in your head.
- The internet can be a wonderful tool, but it's important to proceed with caution. Always stick to reliable sources. More importantly, remember every person's cancer is different. Online research can lead to statistics and prognostic information that is not relevant to your specific situation.
- Find other ways to keep your mind occupied. Word puzzles, knitting or crocheting, computer games, reading a good book... anything that will distract you and give you a breather from thinking too much.

Be good to yourself

- Instead of focusing on what you have ahead of you, try to look at what you've accomplished. Give yourself credit and see your own strength.
- Live in the moment – as often as you can. Worrying about the future does not serve you now or resolve unknown issues down the road. It only robs you of today.
- Try to take a break from cancer when you can. Engage in things that add joy to your day, activities that help you relax and have fun. This will feed your soul and remind you that you're so much more than your cancer.
- Give yourself permission to move “you” to the top of the list. Leave the guilt behind.
- A cancer diagnosis impacts you mentally, physically and emotionally. You are exhausted on many levels. Allow yourself time to process and to heal so you can recover.



When A Family Member Or Loved One Has Breast Or Ovarian Cancer: How To Lend A Helping Hand

Stay In Touch

- Check in regularly. Just say hi and ask how she's doing. It tells her you're thinking about her and that you care. You don't always need to “do” something or “say” something to be helpful. Being consistently present is what matters.
- Cards, notes, emails – these are all great ways to let her know she's in your thoughts. They also become lasting messages of love and reassurance she can re-read whenever she needs a boost.
- Give small gifts that offer comfort and make her smile. Lotion... a pair of fuzzy socks... warm pj's or a robe... light reading material to take her mind off what she's going through.

- Say three simple words: “I love you.” The most healing words in the universe.
- Keep the communication going. Don't stop because treatment ends. That's when she can finally step off the roller coaster she's been on, look back at where she's been, and wonder where she's headed next. She still needs your support.

Be There

- Be a calm presence, accepting any emotions or fears she needs to express. That can be tough when you have your own fears and emotions.
- Allow her to be human. Most people try their hardest to be strong. It's good to acknowledge her strength, but no one can be strong all the time. Even Superman has to be Clark Kent sometimes. Give her “permission” to take off her cape.
- When she's up for it, visit with her. Thirty minutes over a cup of tea... an outing for lunch or a movie... anything that takes her away from cancer for a bit is invaluable.
- Remember to talk about the everyday things going on in your lives. Don't be afraid to laugh – laughter really is wonderful medicine.

Help Out

- Offer to go with her to appointments. Dealing with cancer and all the decisions and information is overwhelming and exhausting. Offer to: go along to take notes....sit with her while she waits... stay with her during a test or chemo.
- Don't wait for her to ask for help, just do it! It's really hard to ask and she may not have the energy to do so. Here are some ideas:
 - » Call to say you're going to bring over a meal. Tell her what you have in mind and ask if there's something she'd prefer instead.
 - » Mention you're going to the grocery store. Ask what's on her shopping list and offer to pick it up.
 - » Let her know when you're available. Ask what she needs help with during that time.
 - » If she has children, anything you can do to keep life as normal as possible for her children will help her feel better. So, take them for playdates, drive them to activities, etc.

Just Listen

- The musician Alfred Brendel said: “The word ‘listen’ contains the same letters as the word ‘silent!’” It's normal to want to solve or fix things, to find the right thing to say. Try to silence your mind and just be in the moment with her.
- Avoid saying things like “You'll be fine” or “It's all behind you now.” It's never really over. Instead, ask how she's feeling. When she tells you, offer compassion and support.
 - Stay away from offering advice. She's already getting instructions from all directions. Even if you've been through a similar experience, remember, everyone is different.
 - Let her set the boundaries. There may be times when she doesn't want to talk, or things she feels are too private. You'll hear this when you listen. •

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

Seminary Hill Cidery and Orchard, Callicoon

Minimal Design, Maximum Flavor

Discover heritage and sustainability at Callicoon's Seminary Hill — a cidery complete with bountiful orchards, farm-fresh menus, and homey accommodations.

A comeback is brewing in the Southern Catskills. Sullivan County was once a part of the iconic Borscht Belt, a colloquial term for the 1950s resorts boom that attracted vacationing Jewish-American families from NYC. Come the '70s, the hype fizzled out.

But now in the 21st century, towns like Narrowsburg and Livingston Manor are experiencing a second wind — a resurrection, if you will — from city dwellers looking for a change of pace. Callicoon, a quaint town tucked along the Delaware River, has experienced a revitalization that combines both historic roots and aesthetic values.

In the town's foothills is Seminary Hill, a blossoming cidery and orchard that hopes to honor ancestry and bolster local economy with flavorful concoctions and design-forward accommodations.

Seminary Hill is the brainchild of Doug Doetsch, whose ancestry in Callicoon dates to the 1800s. Doetsch, an international finance lawyer, returned to his



fifth-generation homestead with wife Susan Manning, a professor at Northwestern University, a few years back.

For eight springs, trees were planted in an orchard with sweeping views of the Upper Delaware River and a brick steeple of a former Franciscan seminary (which inspired the cidery's name). Over 1,500 trees and 2,500 gallons of cider later, Seminary Hill opened its doors in June.

The Boarding House

As you creep up the incline of Upper Main to Hospital Road (only minutes from downtown Callicoon), you'll see Seminary Hill's first stop: the Boarding House, designed by Livingston Manor-based company, Homesteadt. Two century-old white buildings — one of which was a local hospital in the early 20th century — have been converted into eight apartments featuring Shaker design and Scandinavian minimalism.

Seventeen bedrooms with neutral tones, natural wood paneling, and historical references are spread across the Upper and Lower houses. Over 500 Shaker pegs adorn the Boarding House's spaces, from individual bedrooms to the communal kitchenettes, living rooms, and corner libraries.

Homesteadt, run by husband-and-wife duo Tom Roberts and Anna

Aberg, believes in a core ethos of sustainability and natural living — a theme you'll find throughout the Seminary Hill properties. Roberts and Aberg are also behind the widely publicized Livingston Manor Fly Fishing Club, 30 minutes northeast of Callicoon.

Don't expect to find plastic or single-use items on the property: Homesteadt's Zero Waste Home line is implemented throughout the communal spaces; water from a well is always flowing; cow's milk from a local farm is stocked in the fridges; and provided body care products are refilled as needed.


The entirety of the Boarding House's furniture and accent pieces have been repurposed, either from Doetsch's family or local vintage warehouses. Most of the books in the Lower House were once a part of a former ambassador to Italy's private collection. Pages from *The Apples of New York* serve as wall art, and a nod to the orchard. A downed tree from the orchard wasn't even scrapped for firewood — it became the parlor kitchen's dining table. As you'll discover on your stay, everything has a purpose.

The Cidery

Sitting on 62 acres of land and just north of the Boarding House, Seminary Hill is comprised of a cidery, an orchard, and tented event space.

Built into the hill of the apple orchard, a two-story building is packed with all things cider and sustainability. The cidery was designed by Cold Spring-based River Architects and built by Poughkeepsie-based Baxter Building Corporation. It's the world's first Passive House-certified cidery: low-impact energy and a carbon zero approach were implemented in its construction.

On the second floor is the Tasting Room. Cathedral-style wooden beams and floor-to-ceiling windows adorn the 3,500-sq-ft space along with warm-toned wood and eclectic furniture. The larch wood finishing was reclaimed from underwater pilings of the former Tappan Zee Bridge.

Outside, visitors can revel in its bank barn-style exterior, local bluestone, and a wrap-around patio. Of course, the balcony provides stunning panoramas of the Delaware River Valley and the fruit orchard below.

The orchard is lined with 60 varieties of apple and pear trees; they were planted holistically under watch of orchardist Michael Phillips and are free of pesticides and herbicides. These American, English, and French trees produce 10,000 bottles worth of cider. By 2026, Seminary Hill hopes to meet a quota of 60,000 bottles annually.

Seminary Hill has created five ciders: Baldwin Pippin, Beechwoods, Delaware Dry, Northern Spy, and Susan's Semi-Dry. Each one is over 7% ABV and contains little-to-no residual sugar; the deep gold and peachy semi-dry still brings some sweetness (it was named after Manning).

The Delaware Dry (citrus and creamy notes) and Beechwoods (stone fruit and melon) are packed with a variety of apples, like Tremlett's Bitter and Chisel Jersey. On the other hand, Northern Spy (apple and caramel) and Baldwin Pippin (apple and acidic finish) highlight just one or two apples, respectively.

The tasting room also features 100% New York craft beer, wine, and spirits. There's an eclectic menu of farm-to-table small plates, always changing to highlight peak-season ingredients and produce. In the fall, the culinary team offers local venison, baked breads like za'atar focaccia, and seasonal

vegetables on its Argentinian wood-fire grill. Notable offerings include black cherry tamarind ribs with pistachio dukkah and fennel slaw, duck BLTs, and a colorful beet hummus.

For an in-depth look at the orchard and cidery, guests can tour the grounds and enjoy a cider tasting (Sundays, \$45 per person). The ciders are available for tastings year-round (Thurs-Sun, \$25 per person).



Florrie's Autumn Blend

Florrie Kaye's Tearoom, Carmel

Ingredients:

- ½ tablespoon Harney & Sons cinnamon spice tea, loose-leaf or bagged
- ½ tablespoon Harney & Sons chocolate black tea, loose-leaf or bagged
- Fresh whipped cream,

pinch of cinnamon and shaved milk chocolate, for serving

Preparation:

- 1) Boil 8 ounces of water. Steep teas for 5 minutes, and strain or remove tea bags.
- 2) Top with garnishes.



Lavender Honey Syrup

Supernatural Coffee, Hudson

Ingredients:

- ¼ bunch fresh or dried lavender (with stem)
- 1 cup water
- 1 cup sugar
- ½ cup honey (preferably local)

Preparation:

- 1) Combine water and sugar in a saucepan and bring to a boil. Simmer lavender for 10 minutes.
- 2) Add honey to pot and stir until dissolved. Remove pot from heat and allow to cool.
- 3) Strain the syrup into an air-tight container or jar, and discard lavender sprigs.
- 4) Add syrup to taste in lattes and herbal teas, or iced coffees and cold brew. Store in the refrigerator for up to one month.



Brown Sugar Cinnamon Latte

Ready Coffee, Newburgh and Wappingers Falls

Ingredients:

- 1 cup brown sugar
- ½ tablespoon cinnamon
- ½ teaspoon maple syrup
- Double shot (2 oz) espresso or instant espresso
- 9 oz milk of choice, steamed
- Ground cinnamon

Brown Sugar Cinnamon Syrup:

- 1) Combine brown sugar, cinnamon, and ¾ water in a medium saucepan. Bring to a boil and stir consistently.
- 2) Reduce heat to low until all sugar has dissolved. Remove from heat and add maple syrup.

Latte:

- 1) Pour espresso into a coffee mug. Add brown sugar cinnamon syrup to taste and stir gently.
- 2) Heat and froth milk to 150° F. Pour milk into mug, garnish with cinnamon.



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Sara B. Franklin in Tannersville,
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A Taste of History

Oral historian and author Sara B. Franklin dishes on finding her career path and giving voice to stories of women in food and agriculture.

Sara B. Franklin's first experiences with food were a bit... complex. During her childhood in the suburbs of Westchester, her parents made it clear that food was something to be enjoyed. Simultaneously, she was influenced by "mixed messages" of 90s diet culture — her home had both processed foods and a vegetable garden, and she remembers feeling conflicted about the enjoyment of cooking, especially with the advent of the Food Network. "It was not consistent with the feminism I was growing up with, which was go to work and hate cooking," she notes.

But Franklin, 35, soon learned that food was rooted in kindness and empathy when the neighborhood women — always women, she adds — brought meals over while her mom combatted an illness. She went on to discover new ingredients and food cultures in Boston while studying public health and American history at Tufts University.

During her time there, Franklin fell head over heels in love with growing food while visiting an organic farm. Her interests in "cooking, eating, health, social movements around equity and access all converged," she says. The experience fundamentally changed everything — how she cooked, what she liked to eat, the kinds of food to keep in her pantry and refrigerator, and her attitude toward body image and ideas of fullness and hunger — and inspired a vocation.

"I basically created a career that allows me to do what I want to do,"

says Franklin, “which is to be nosy and get into people’s intimate spaces — meaning their kitchens — and talk to them about their lives,” she says.



It’s been quite the career. Franklin, a Kingston resident and mother of 5-year-old twins, has received high praise for her two books, *Edna Lewis: At the Table with an American Original* and *The Phoenicia Diner Cookbook: Dishes and Dispatches from the Catskill Mountains* (which she co-authored with Chris Bradley and Mike Cioffi). The latter was named a 2021 finalist for best American cookbook by the International Association of Culinary Professionals.

Her next project (title is in the works) is a biography of the iconic Knopf cookbook editor, Judith Jones, best known for working with Julia Child. An authority on Jones, Franklin received a National Endowment for the Humanities Public Scholars Grant last year for the book.

“I never really know exactly what I’m thinking until I write it down,” says Franklin, explaining how she comes to her work, which explores food and agriculture and its ties to popular culture, media, performance of gender, care, and identity. “Journalism and the idea of going out into the world, talking to people and learning about their stories felt like an extension of my curiosity and how I understand the world. I didn’t know oral history was ... a thing that existed until significantly later after college.”



Oral history involves in-depth, long-term projects with more personal and emotional “digging into people’s lives and histories in ways that are very different from the way I was taught biography and history,” she says. Franklin notes that history is predominantly told from the perspectives of white men; oral history, she explains, is one way of uncovering other stories, often in a more nuanced way.

Franklin has written for numerous food and mainstream publications. She teaches food and oral history courses at



NYU’s Gallatin School (she received her PhD in food studies from the university, too) and at its Prison Education Initiative at Wallkill Correctional Facility. She has also worked in sustainable agriculture farming at the American Museum of Natural History’s Our Global Kitchen exhibition and collaborated with agricultural and culinary activists in South Africa and Brazil.

Food was traditionally mocked as a field of study, says Franklin. Her goal is to add stories of women rooted in food and farming to the archives of history “to legitimize the record around how we think about food and how central it is to our identity. Because we all eat, food is a unique conduit for talking to people about their lives.”



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
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A Cut Above

The experts from the Great Jack O'Lantern Blaze teach us their tips and tricks. **BY FRANCESCA FUREY**

There's nothing subtle about Halloween — including pumpkin culture. Leave your half-hearted carving attempts behind and turn to the local experts at Croton-on-Hudson's The Great Jack O'Lantern Blaze. Armor up with an ice cream scooper and patience: it's time to make a pumpkin masterpiece (and secure your front porch as the best on the block).

We're at the pumpkin patch: What should we look for?

Find a pumpkin that has a sturdy stem, a flat bottom, and no bruises. You'll also want to make sure it's heavy — if it's too light, it could be rotten inside. Blaze sources its pumpkins from Wallkill View Farm in New Paltz.

Do we have to buy tools?

Everything you need is already in your kitchen. A boning knife works well for cutting a hole in the bottom of the pumpkin. An ice cream scooper is perfect for removing the guts.

How do we properly prep a design?

Sketch your design on a sheet of paper and then tape it to your pumpkin. Use a fork or a pencil to poke holes along the lines you'll be carving.

It's carving time! Walk us through the steps.

Wash and dry the pumpkin, and then cut a hole in the bottom — this helps keep the pumpkin structurally sound. (If you cut it from the top, it can cave while decaying.) Scoop out the seeds and scrape the flesh until it's completely smooth. Then tape your design to your pumpkin

and start carving from the middle of your design out, leaving the largest pieces to cut last. Light your pumpkin and then make any final adjustments.

What's the best lighting technique?

Just place your tea light on the ground, light it (or turn it on, if battery-operated), and then cover it with the pumpkin.

Can we keep a pumpkin fresh all season long?

Yes. While carving, make sure the inside is squeaky clean — it can help prolong the life of the carved pumpkin. After carving, clean it with water and soap or diluted bleach and water to prohibit any mold from growing. You can also use petroleum jelly to coat any openings. If it's a hot day, store your pumpkin in a cool, dark place or even in the refrigerator. Remember: it's a piece of fruit!

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
