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Manufacturers hampered by latest case surge

Workforce and supply chain issues plaguing Oklahoma businesses since COVID-19 infections began 22 months ago are surging along with the fast-spreading omicron variant.

"Manpower is the most significant issue right now. It's very severe at this point," Joe Epperley, communications director with the Oklahoma Manufacturing Alliance, said Thursday. "It's been a problem since 2020 but now it's even worse with the omicron surge."

The owner of a medium-sized manufacturing company told Epperley 75% of his workforce was out one day this week.

The Oklahoma State Department of Health reported the largest single-day number of new cases Thursday - 10,502 - bringing the seven-day average to 7,788, the highest since the pandemic

"A significant percentage of manufacturers are having a hard time maintaining a minimal amount of production," Epperley said. "Supply chains were recovering but with the new surge it certainly puts a kink in it."

Supply chain glitches are a weekly occurrence for Clubhouse Trailer Co., which custom-builds marching band trailers for high schools, colleges and summer drum crops.

"Out of 1,300 inventory items there's always one that's stuck on a boat somewhere or in a delayed delivery," co-owner Drew Taylor said.

A ball bearing needed to manufacture electric actuators currently is delayed 16 to 17 weeks due to a global tungsten shortage, Taylor said. "It's always the smallest piece that holds things up."

The company has a nine-person workforce

US Supreme Court rejects OSHA vaccine mandate for businesses

WASHINGTON (AP) – The U.S. Supreme Court has stopped the Biden administration from enforcing a requirement that employees at large businesses be vaccinated against COVID-19 or undergo weekly testing and wear a mask on the job.

At the same time, the court is allowing the administration to proceed with a vaccine mandate for most health care workers in the U.S.

The court's orders Thursday during a spike in coronavirus cases was a mixed bag for the administration's efforts to boost the vaccination rate among Americans.

The court's conservative majority concluded the administration overstepped its authority by seeking to impose the Occupational Safety and Health Administration's vaccine-or-test rule on U.S. businesses with at least 100 employees. More than 80 million people would have been affected.

"OSHA has never before imposed such a mandate. Nor has Congress. Indeed, although Congress has enacted significant legislation addressing the CO-VID-19 pandemic, it has declined to enact any measure similar to what OSHA has promulgated here," the conservatives wrote in an unsigned opinion.

In dissent, the court's three liberals argued that it was the court that was overreaching by substituting its judgment for that of health experts. "Acting outside of its competence and without legal basis, the Court displaces the judgments of the Government officials given the responsibility to respond to workplace health emergencies," Justices Stephen Breyer, Elena Kagan and Sonia Sotomayor wrote in a joint

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Jobless numbers tick up in Oklahoma, across US

In Oklahoma and across the country, numbers of people who filed claims for unemployment benefits ticked up last week.

Economists blamed rising business uncertainties on continuing supply chain issues and skyrocketing cases of COVID-19. They also pointed out, however, that economies in Oklahoma and other states have generally improved dramatically as compared to the darkest days of the pandemic when unemployment in March and April 2020 peaked at 14.7%.

The Oklahoma Employment Security Commission reported on Thursday that numbers of initial claims for unemployment benefits and continued claims both increased slightly during the week that ended on New Year's Day. However, four-week moving averages for both initial claims and continued claims showed declines. The state's unemployment rate, currently hovering near 2.5% according to the U.S. Department of Labor, is near the lowest in the nation.

OESC Executive Director Shelley Zumwalt said numbers reflect Oklahoma's overall success in maintaining a strong economy despite setbacks dealt by COVID-19.

"Our state leaders are focused on and have been successful in their efforts to attract new businesses to Oklahoma that are offering high-quality new positions to job seekers," Zumwalt said. "In addition, we see existing Oklahoma businesses continuing to grow and offer new job opportunities."

During the week that ended Jan. 1:

- The number of initial unemployment claims, unadjusted, filed in Oklahoma totaled 1,826, representing an increase of 64 from the previous week.
- •The number of continued claims totaled 13,679, an increase of 785.
- The less volatile four-week moving average for initial claims was 2,018, a decrease of 72 from the previous week.
- The four-week moving average for continued claims was 13,496, a decrease of 443.

The nation as a whole has achieved broad economic recovery, with an un-

employment rate currently hovering just below 4%. While the DOL reported that numbers of Americans who applied for jobless benefits rose last week, it noted that jobless numbers are still quite low by historic standards.

U.S. jobless claims climbed by 23,000 to 230,000. The four-week moving average, which smooths out week-to-week blips, rose nearly 6,300 to almost 211,000.

Weekly applications, largely attributable to layoffs, have risen in four of the past five weeks. The DOL noted that

increases were experienced in tandem with wide spread of the omicron variant of the coronavirus.

Prior to the uptick, jobless claims had fallen mostly steadily for a year – and had actually dipped below the average of 220,000 a week recorded pre-pandemic.

"The rise in claims likely reflects an increase in layoffs due to the surge in CO-VID cases," economists Nancy Vanden Houten and Kathy Bostjancic of Oxford Economics told the Associated Press. "Claims may remain elevated in the near term, but we expect initial claims will gravitate back to the 200,000 level once the omicron wave passes. Encouragingly, there are indications that cases from the omicron variant are peaking."

Altogether, 1.6 million people were collecting jobless aid the week that ended Jan. 1.

In Oklahoma, Zumwalt said efforts have been successful in connecting people to jobs both in rural and urban parts of the state.

"State employers are connecting with eligible candidates to fill open positions," she said. "(And), as part of our efforts to keep Oklahomans informed and connected, we regularly highlight employment and career fair opportunities."

Across the country, companies are trying hard to hold on to workers at a time when it's difficult to find qualified replacements. Employers posted 10.6 million job openings in November, the fifth-highest monthly total in records going back to 2000. A record 4.5 million workers quit jobs in November – a sign that they are confident enough to look for something better.

Medical education program benefits state, lawmakers say

Action to better ensure the future of a program that helps to fund training of aspiring physicians has drawn support from lawmakers representing Oklahoma in Washington, D.C.

The Medical Student Education program, which provides grants intended to enhance and expand health care training at colleges and universities, has yielded benefits for the Sooner State since it was established in 2019. Currently, its future is dependent on annual authorizations, which, according to 4th District U.S. Rep. Tom Cole, has resulted in significant uncertainty and makes long-term planning difficult for funded institutions.

Lawmakers, especially those from rural states short on health care professionals, have proposed legislation to authorize continuation of the MSE program for at least five years.

"(That) would allow community-based experiential training in tribal, rural and medically underserved communities to continue with long-term certainty," said Cole, a Republican.

States like Oklahoma clearly benefit from the program, he said, as physicians often choose to settle in areas where they complete professional training.

Second District U.S. Rep. Markwayne Mullin, also a Republican, said the pandemic has made the shortage of physicians in Oklahoma even more critical.

"Oftentimes, people in my district

have to travel long distances to see their primary care provider at small, rural hospitals or (Indian Health Service) and tribally run facilities," he said. "Between the pandemic and shortages in our workforce, it's getting harder for these facilities to recruit new physicians."

Mullin said ensuring continuity of the MSE program would help to address long-term needs.

In a statement, American Hospital Association Executive Vice President Stacey Hughes said the pandemic has exacerbated both short- and long-term physician shortages.

"Many physicians and other health care professionals are exhausted from two years of being on the front lines battling COVID-19," she said. "We look forward to working with Congress to pass this critical legislation that will continue to help build the physician workforce pipeline, especially in medically underserved communities."

Hughes noted that the legislation has received a measure of bipartisan support.

Dr. Mary Clarke, president of the Oklahoma State Medical Association, agreed that MSE program continuity would benefit physician training at institutions – and local communities and states by extension.

"Oklahoma's physician residency programs are of the utmost importance right now, especially considering the COVID-19 pandemic's impact on the health care workforce," she said. "The Medical School Education Authorization Act will help solve the persistent primary care provider shortages in Oklahoma."

Added Dr. Johnny Stephens, president of the Oklahoma State University Center for Health Sciences: "Our mission at the OSU Center for Health Sciences is focused on providing health care for rural and underserved communities throughout Oklahoma. Expanding our footprint in partnership with the Cherokee Nation to establish the first tribally affiliated medical school in the nation has been instrumental in fulfilling that mission. Support such as the MSE program makes this mission come to life, and ultimately will positively impact the health outcomes for everyday Oklahomans."

Construction school to help former inmates jump-start lives

TULSA – A new school and some partnerships pushed by a state senator from Tulsa may help former prison inmates jump-start lives while at the same time adding to Tulsa's inventory of desperately needed affordable housing.

The North Tulsa Community Construction School, set to launch in February, was envisioned as a place where former justice-involved individuals might go to get training for indemand jobs that will pay well enough to allow them to support themselves, according to state Sen. Kevin Matthews, D-Tulsa.

Matthews collaborated with several organizations to establish the school at 3304 N. Delaware Ave. At the same time, plans were made to better address needs of former inmates, who often struggle even to get enough to eat after they've been released from incarceration.

'When people come home from prison, they often need housing and to make enough money to pay their fines and living expenses as they transition," Matthews said. "So, we formed a board and support team which includes Urban Innovative Development Corporation, the 1st Step Male Diversion Program, David Collins of Fenix Construction Group, Carl Walker and Carl's Contractors, and Meals on Wheels, which is sponsoring food for participants."

Matthews said retail businesses in Tulsa and the economy in general also should benefit from investments in affordable housing and in people who aspire to buy homes. Not only will the

Community Construction School offer training that might allow participants to learn trades that pay upwards of \$25 an hour, it will be part of the solution in addressing needs of other Tulsans who struggle with housing costs.

Matthews noted that plans are in place for homes to be built in cooperation with Habitat for Humanity over the next three years in north Tulsa and other communities.

The lawmaker said other plans are

in the works to address needs both of former incarcerated individuals and of business owners and others in Tulsa and across the state.

"After the school is operational and successful in our community, I'll also be working with other groups to possibly add truck driving and tech certifications as other options for those returning from prison, as well as for youth ages 16 to 24 that may not be college-bound," Matthews said. "Most of us doing this work are second-chance folks giving others an opportunity for a second chance and more options for those who may not be taking traditional routes to make a living."

Members of the public have been invited to attend an open house for the North Tulsa Community Construction School set for Monday. A pre-opening reception and press conference also have been scheduled to begin at 3 p.m. at 3304 N. Delaware Ave.

US to allow teen semi drivers in test apprenticeship program

DETROIT - The federal government is moving forward with a plan to let teenagers drive big rigs from state to state in a test program.

Currently, truckers who cross state lines must be at least 21 years old, but an apprenticeship program required by Congress to help ease supply chain backlogs would let 18-to-20-year-old truckers drive outside their home states.

The pilot program, detailed Thursday in a proposed regulation from the Federal Motor Carrier Safety Administration, would screen the teens, barring any with driving-while-impaired violations or traffic tickets for causing a crash.

But safety advocates say the program runs counter to data showing that younger drivers get in more crashes than older ones. They say it's unwise to let teenage drivers be responsible for rigs that can weigh 80,000 pounds and cause catastrophic damage when they hit lighter

The apprenticeship pilot program was required by Congress as part of the infrastructure bill signed into law Nov. 15. It requires the FMCSA, which is part of the Transportation Department, to start the program within 60 days.

The American Trucking Associations, a large industry trade group, supports the measure as a way to help with a shortage of drivers. The group estimates that the

short of the number it needs, as demand to move freight reaches historic highs.

Under the apprenticeship, younger drivers can cross state lines during 120hour and 280-hour probationary periods, as long as an experienced driver is in the passenger seat. Trucks used in the program have to have an electronic braking crash mitigation system, a forward facing video camera, and their speeds must be limited to 65 mph.

After probation, they can drive on their own, but companies have to moni-

nation is running over 80,000 drivers tor their performance until they are 21. No more than 3,000 apprentices can take part in the training at any given time.

The FMCSA must reach out to carriers with excellent safety records to take part in the program, according to the Transportation Department.

The program will run for up to three years, and the motor carrier agency has to turn in a report to Congress analyzing the safety record of the teen drivers and making a recommendation on whether the younger drivers are as safe as those 21 or older. Congress could expand the program with new laws.

The test is part of a broader set of measures from the Biden administration to deal with the trucker shortage and improve working conditions for truck

In a statement, Nick Geale, vice president of workforce safety for the trucking associations, noted 49 states and Washington, D.C., already allow drivers under 21 to drive semis, but they can't pick up a load just across a state line.

'This program creates a rigorous safety training program, requiring an additional 400 hours of advanced safety training, in which participants are evaluated against specific performance benchmarks," Geale said. The program will ensure that the industry has enough drivers to meet growing freight demands,

But Peter Kurdock, general counsel for Advocates for Highway & Auto Safety, said federal data shows that younger drivers have far higher crash rates than older ones. "This is no surprise to any American who drives a vehicle," he said.

Putting them behind the wheel of trucks that can weigh up to 40 tons when loaded increases the possibility of mass casualty crashes, he said.

Kurdock said the trucking industry has wanted younger drivers for years and used supply chain issues to get it into the infrastructure bill. He fears the industry will use skewed data from the program to push for teenage truckers nationwide.

OKLAHOMA CITY DHS hopes to recruit, retain critical workers

The Oklahoma Department of Human Services has announced a series of financial incentives to add to ranks of critical Child Welfare Services workers in the state.

In a release, the DHS said recruitment and retention of skilled workers to fill positions has reached a critical stage in ensuring the safety and wellbeing of many children in the state. It's hoped that incentives will benefit Oklahoma families by bringing back seasoned, well-trained employees who understand needs of the agency's customers.

Current DHS child welfare specialists or supervisors who recruit former specialists who left the agency on good standing to return will be eligible for incentives including:

 Upon hiring of the returning employee, the recruiting employee will receive \$1,000.

· Once the returning employee has completed any trainings necessary to carry a caseload, the returning employee will also receive \$1,000.

•At the returning employee's one-year anniversary, both the returning employee and recruiting employee will receive \$2,500, if both are still employed with the agency.

The total value of incentives, \$7,000 per recruited employee, is roughly 10% of the cost to hire and train a new child welfare specialist, the DHS said.

"We are building a child and family wellbeing network to help families for generations to come and are excited to offer these recruitment and retention incentives to employees who help us carry out this critical mission," OKDHS CWS Director Dr. Deborah **Shropshire** said.

WASHINGTON, D.C. HealthCare.gov sign-up deadline **Saturday**

People looking for health insurance in the grip of the omicron surge have through Saturday to sign up for taxpayer-subsidized private coverage under the Obama-era Affordable Care Act.

President Joe Biden's administration is on track is to

deliver robust enrollment numbers, but those gains could turn into a mirage if congressional Democrats remain stymied on Biden's social agenda package. Biden's coronavirus relief bill has been providing generous subsidy increases that benefit new and returning customers. The juiced-up assistance will go away at the end of this year without further congressional action.

"The determining factor in whether this is a lasting gain in enrollment is whether the subsidies are extended," said Cynthia Cox, who follows health insurance trends at the nonpartisan Kaiser Family Foundation. "The biggest threat to enrollment would be if these subsidies expires." Millions of people could see their monthly premiums double and deductibles would also shoot up.

Health and Human Services Secretary Xavier Becerra said Thursday that about 14.1 million people have enrolled or renewed coverage as of Jan. 8. That's a gain of roughly 2 million covered through Health-Care.gov and state-run insurance marketplaces. Two GOPled states – Florida and Texas are seeing particularly strong sign-ups.

About 9 in 10 U.S. residents currently have health insurance through a mix of employer, public and individual plans, but 28 million people remain uninsured even with the CO-VID-19 pandemic in its third year. Most uninsured people would be eligible for taxpayersubsidized coverage, but surveys show many are just not aware of that.

WASHINGTON, D.C. **Army offers some** recruits \$50K

The U.S. Army, for the first time, is offering a maximum enlistment bonus of \$50,000 to highly skilled recruits who join for six years.

Maj. Gen. Kevin Vereen, head of Army Recruiting Command, said shuttered schools and the competitive job market over the past year have posed significant challenges for recruiters. So, heading into the most difficult months of the year for recruiting, the Army is hoping that some extra cash and a few other changes will entice qualified young people to sign up.

"We are still living the implications of 2020 and the onset of COVID, when the school systems basically shut down," said Vereen. "We lost a full class of young men and women that we didn't have contact with, face-to-face."

The annual recruiting goal fluctuates as currently serving soldiers decide whether

Shoplifting ring targeted pharmacies

State and federal authorities announced Thursday that they arrested and charged more than two dozen people for taking part in a multistate shoplifting ring that made off with more than \$10 million in stolen goods over the past few years, most of which was over-the-counter medications.

U.S. Attorney **Clint Johnson** in Tulsa and Oklahoma Attorney General John O'Connor announced state and federal charges against 29 defendants. Johnson said 25 of those charged had been ar-

rested and four others were still at large.

Prosecutors said the defendants took part in a conspiracy to steal mostly over-the-counter medications from retailers such as Walmart, Costco, Walgreens, CVS and GNC in Arkansas, Colorado, Kansas, Missouri, Oklahoma and Texas. The ringleaders would then arrange for the sale of items on websites such as Amazon and eBay.

"Thieves should take notice. Tulsa is not going to capitulate and allow criminals

to disrupt commerce in our city," said Tulsa Police Chief Wendell Franklin, whose department launched its investigation in 2019 after an organized crime investigator from a pharmacy retailer shared information about bulk thefts from Tulsa-area locations.

Prosecutors allege that a 48-year-old Tulsa woman, **Linda Been**, led the ring, which netted an estimated \$4.5 million from the sale of stolen goods such as Flonase, Mucinex, Nexium and Allegra.

to reenlist or leave. In the last two years, as the pandemic raged, many decided to stay in, lessening the pressure on recruiting to help keep the Army at its full strength of 485,000. Last year's recruiting goal was 57,500, and Vereen said it will be about the same this year.

Job review

In the private sector, workers undergo routine job reviews. The same thing must hold true for officeholders. Every so often, citizens should assess how their government employees are doing.

Oklahoma Superintendent of Public Instruction Joy Hofmeister has now begun her eighth and final year in that office. What results has she generated for Oklahomans? Compared to when Hofmeister was first elected, the state is spending much more on education but getting worse results.

State tests administered in spring

2021 showed a dramatic decline in performance compared to two years prior. Statewide in all districts and grades, there were fewer students performing at grade level or better, and many doing much, much worse. "Below

basic," the category for those more than a year behind in a subject, comprised 40% of all students statewide in 2021. Just 30% were in that category in spring 2019.

That outcome was not the result of underfunding. During Hofmeister's tenure, state school spending has increased 25%, rising from about \$2.4 billion in to roughly \$3 billion today. Schools reported \$1 billion in carryover this year, an increase of more than 50% in savings over five years.

Meanwhile, the teacher shortage persists, even though the Legislative Office of Fiscal Transparency found Oklahoma's average teacher salary now ranks highest in the immediate region and 21st nationally after adjusting for tax burdens and cost-of-living differences. In response, Hofmeister said it was "one-dimensional" to look at teacher salaries.

It's true learning loss in Oklahoma schools is tied to pandemic closures and distance learning, but it's worth recalling Hofmeister sought to close even more schools for a much longer period of time. At the start of the 2020-2021 school year, Hofmeister called for mandating school closures when COVID rates topped 25 cases per 100,000 population in a county and recommended transition to distance learning at rates as low as 14.39 cases per 100,000 population.

Gov. Kevin Stitt's appointees to the Board of Education rejected Hofmeister's plan. Had Hofmeister's proposal been implemented, schools in a majority of counties would have been closed every single week from Aug. 27, 2020, to March 4, 2021.

Hofmeister's education record is one of rising costs and lower return on investment. And if she had her way, it would have been even worse.

'Dear Evan Hansen' a touching conversation starter

Dear Oklahoma City: If you have never seen the musical *Dear Evan Hansen*, don't miss it this week with performances through Sunday at the Civic Center Music Hall.

The show earned six Tony Awards, including for Best Musical, and a Grammy Award for Best Musical Theater Album when it debuted

in 2016 on Broadway, and after seeing the national touring production brought in by OKC Broadway on Tuesday night, I understand why.

The story tackles mental health issues in high school students with

a complicated lead character, Evan Hansen, who is riddled by anxiety and whose uncomfortable and somewhat accidental choice led to his integration into a family grieving the loss of their son, Connor Murphy, after Murphy's death by suicide.

It's a heavy, touching and tragic story that is told very well through beautifully written songs and a modern-day set that uses floor-toceiling screens to incorporate texts, social media posts and shared videos as letters written by Evan Hansen go viral and he digs himself deeper into a lie.

Sam Primack was excellent Tuesday night stepping into the role of Evan Hansen, and plenty of the songs he sang gave me chills, including For Forever and the show's anthem, You Will Be Found. The song's lyrics could belong to all of us: "Even when the dark comes crashing through / When you need a friend to carry you / And when you're broken on the ground / You will be found / So let the sun come streaming in / 'Cause you'll reach up and you'll rise again / Lift your head and look around / You will be found."

Judging from the sniffles I heard throughout the audience (as well as my own), the tearjerker of a song *So Big / So Small* by Evan Hansen's mother, Heidi (Jessica E. Sherman), touched a lot of hearts as she sang of her love for her son and reassured him that she wasn't going anywhere despite his colossal mistake and despite her own shortcomings as a single parent.

The entire cast was great, including those who played Murphy and his family – NikHil Saboo as Murphy, Stephanie La Rochelle as his sister, Claire Rankin as his mother and John Hemphill as his dad – and Alessandro Costantini and Ciara Alyse Harris as Evan Hansen's friends of sorts. I noticed on Oklahoma City University's Wanda L. Bass School of Music Facebook page that one of its alumni, Julian Diaz-Granados, will be playing Connor Murphy Frid

Dear Evan Hansen is a difficult story of grief, family, healing and forgiveness. There are moments where the title character's actions made me uncomfortable emotionally even as I had empathy for the reasons behind them. If you go, its modern themes will give you plenty to discuss with an older child in your family. It was excellent though, and I recommend seeing it if you get the chance.

I know the spread of COVID is on everyone's mind with this most recent surge, but OKC Broadway is taking good precautions by requiring masks for everyone and proof of a vaccination or a negative COVID-19 PCR tests taken with 72 hours of the performance. Door opens for state to mend fences with tribes

Rep. Ken Luttrell's proposal to legalize sports betting at Oklahoma's tribal casinos is more than just common sense. It's also an opportunity to begin restoring a vital partnership that Gov. Kevin Stitt inexplicably shredded.

The question is, will the

Legislature seize the moment to help get Oklahoma back on track?

You may recall that when Stitt took office three years ago, the state and the sovereign tribal nations were enjoying a golden age

of cooperation, working together to improve the lives of everyday Oklahomans and help create a brighter economic future.

State-tribal gaming compacts were generating millions of dollars for both. State coffers were benefiting from the tribes' purchase of hundreds of thousands of state-issued hunting and fishing licenses. Where local governments and school districts were cash-strapped, tribes helped upgrade infrastructure and gifted fire trucks and other heavy machinery.

Indeed, tribal nations' financial support was a godsend to many rural areas struggling to create economic opportunities that could slow, if not reverse, the exodus of younger residents to the state's fast-growing urban centers.

Stitt blasted the compacts as onesided, but mostly did his negotiating in the media, not face-to-face with tribal leaders. He ended up losing, spectacularly. The compacts rolled over for another decade.

Then along came the U.S. Supreme Court's *McGirt* decision, reaffirming historic tribal nation boundaries, and Stitt doubled-down on his bone-headed strategy, complaining the ruling unleashed criminal justice chaos in eastern Oklahoma – even though there's little evidence to support his claim.

Finally, last month, the governor abruptly ended the 2016 agreement in which the Choctaw and Cherokee nations annually purchased a minimum 200,000 state hunting-fishing licenses for their members and paid related administrative fees to the state.

What rankled Stitt was that tribes paid only \$2 each for licenses that otherwise cost \$42. But that's not the whole story. The state was able to cash in on federal grants determined by the number of licenses sold. Indeed, the Choctaw and Cherokee nations estimate the license deal helped generate \$38 million for state coffers.

Now, the state will get nothing from the two tribes, which instead will exercise treaty rights to allow their citizens to hunt throughout their historic, *McGirt*-affirmed reservations.

All of which brings us back to Luttrell's House Bill 3008, which would expand current tribal gaming compacts to include sports betting. As proposed, the measure would give the state a 10% cut of bets made minus prizes paid and federal taxes.

What would that mean? Luttrell cites a study by the British-based Oxford Economics Group that projects legal sports betting would generate \$240 million for the state and create 3,000 direct and indirect jobs.

Luttrell, an enrolled member of the Cherokee Nation and chair of the Legislature's Native American Caucus, points out three of Oklahoma's neighbors already have approved (Arkansas) or are taking steps (Kansas and Missouri) to approve casinobased sports gaming.

"We don't want to be behind the curve on this," said Luttrell, R-Ponca City. "I've talked to people who are going to Arkansas to play. We need to keep those dollars in Oklahoma."

Sports betting already is here – in fraternal halls, watering holes, around the office water cooler. Online betting is exploding. The OSBI has made a dozen busts and seized thousands of illegal gaming dollars in recent years.

Bottom line: It's time for state lawmakers to regulate and tax the action ... which will require first getting the tribes and state leaders on the same page.

"I'm optimistic at the very least," Luttrell said, "that this will open some dialogue again between the executive branch and the tribes."

That would be very good news indeed.

After wave of cancellations, Delta sees recovery in 2022

Delta Air Lines lost \$408 million in the final quarter of 2021, dragged down by a COVID-19 surge that rocked the airline in December, and the carrier predicted Thursday that it will suffer one more quarterly loss before travel perks up in spring and summer.

CEO Ed Bastian said 8,000 employees have contracted COVID-19 over the last four weeks. Sick workers and winter storms have led to more than 2,200 canceled flights since Dec. 24.

Cancellations have dropped sharply in the past few days – Bastian said Delta had only two coronavirus-related cancellations on Wednesday – but the spate of spiked flights cost the airline \$75 million and the latest outbreak, caused by the omicron variant of the virus, is expected to push the industry's recovery back by two months.

"I don't think we're going to see a pickup in bookings or travel during January and probably the first part of February," Bastian said in an interview. "It's always the weakest part of the year, and it's going to be that much weaker because of omicron. We need confidence in travel returning once the virus recedes."

Delta assumes that omicron infections will peak over the next few days and then decline rapidly as they have in South Africa and – more slowly – in the United Kingdom.

Omicron halted a long, slow rise in travel and threw it into reverse. So far in January, the number of people flying in the U.S. is down 20% from the same month in 2019 – worse than the 16% declines in November and December.

Earlier this week, United Airlines CEO Scott Kirby said 3,000 employees have tested positive for COVID-19. On a single day nearly one-third of United's staff in Newark, New Jersey, called in sick, and the airline has reduced scheduled flights

systemwide.

Delta expects to lose money in January and February and for the first quarter as a whole. Revenue this quarter will likely be 72% to 74% of pre-pandemic levels, Delta said, about the same as the fourth quarter. Costs other than fuel will jump about 15% from 2019, and jet fuel is getting pricier too.

However, the Atlanta company expects to return to profitability in March – when spring break could help fill planes, especially if coronavirus infections are falling.

Delta will hire several thousand people this year – including 100 to 200 pilots a month – as it bounces back from the pandemic, Bastian said. The company set aside \$108 million for special profitsharing payments of \$1,250 for each current employee.

The thank-you payment to employees comes as a new skirmish breaks out between largely non-union Delta and the nation's largest union of flight attendants. The union, which has tried unsuccessfully to represent Delta workers, accuses the airline of pressuring employees to return to work too soon after contracting the virus.

Delta lobbied the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention last month to reduce the recommended quarantine period from 10 days to 5 days for vaccinated people who contract the virus, with Bastian and other Delta officials saying that the 10-day standard may significantly impact our workforce and operations."

The CDC made the change, with its director, Rochelle Walensky, explaining on NPR that "we started to see challenges with ... airline flights and other areas."

Delta's fourth-quarter loss compared with a profit of \$1.1 billion in the same quarter before the pandemic.

Excluding losses on some investments and profit-sharing, Delta earned \$170 million, or 22 cents per share. That easily topped per-share projections on Wall

Street of 14 cents, according to a FactSet survey.

Revenue was \$9.47 billion, down 17% from \$11.44 billion in the fourth quarter of 2019, but well above the \$9.02 billion predicted by industry analysts.

Analysts said the results and outlook were in line with expectations that Delta set at an investor event last month.

"They did make money (on an adjusted basis), and Q1 is going to be a loss – not a shock," said Peter McNally, an analyst at Third Bridge. "Business and international travel are still a long way off, but the outlook is about where we thought it would be"

Savanthi Syth of Raymond James called the outlook "encouraging."

Shares of Delta Air Lines Inc. gained 4% in midday trading Thursday. Other leading U.S. airlines rose between 2% and 6%, and other travel stocks including booking sites, hotels and cruise lines also moved higher.

Twitter, Meta among tech giants subpoenaed by Jan. 6 panel

WASHINGTON – Months after requesting documents from more than a dozen social platforms, the House committee investigating the Capitol insurrection has issued subpoenas targeting Twitter, Meta, Reddit and YouTube after lawmakers said the companies' initial responses were inadequate.

The committee chairman, Rep. Bennie Thompson, demanded records Thursday from the companies relating to their role in allegedly spreading misinformation about the 2020 election and promoting domestic violent extremism on their platforms in the lead-up to insurrection of Jan. 6, 2021.

"Two key questions for the Select Committee are how the spread of misinformation and violent extremism contributed to the violent attack on our democracy, and what steps – if any – social media companies took to prevent their platforms from being breeding grounds for radicalizing people to violence," Thompson, D-Miss., said in the letter.

He added that it's "disappointing that after months of engagement," the companies have not voluntarily turned over the necessary information and documents that would help lawmakers answer the questions at the heart of their investigation.

In his letter, Thompson outlined the way the companies were complicit in the deadly insurrection perpetuated by pro-

Trump supporters and far-right groups.

YouTube, owned by Alphabet, was the platform where a significant amount of communication took place "relevant to the planning and execution" of the siege against the Capitol, "including livestreams of the attack as it was taking place," the letter stated.

The committee stated how Meta, formerly known as Facebook, was reportedly used to exchange hateful, violent and inciting messages between users as well as spread misinformation that the 2020 presidential election was fraudulent in an attempt to coordinate the "Stop the Steal" movement.

On Reddit, the "r/The_Donald" 'sub-reddit' community grew significantly, the letter said, before members migrated to an official website where investigators believe discussions around the planning of the attack were hosted.

The letter outlined how Twitter was warned about the potential violence that was being planned on its platform in advance of the attack and how its users engaged in "communications amplifying allegations of election fraud, including by the former President himself."

Stable residents, stable properties

The Urban Land Institute has been my "go-to" place when it comes to evaluating housing options and issues. Recently, the ULI issued a report that caught my eye. The report found that proactive efforts are necessary to protect the security of renters and allow property owners/managers to viably steward and operate their properties. It is a partnership between landlords and tenants. This sounds obvious, right?

Obvious, but not easy. I have witnessed communities referring to owners and landlords as "greedy" and renters as "irresponsible" and not wanting "rental homes" in their neighborhoods. The report, called Stable Residents, Stable Properties concludes that finding common ground

among stakeholders in the rental market is critical to creating sound housing policy as the United States struggles to improve resident stability amid a nationwide housing shortage and the ramifications of the COVID-19 pandemic.

I could not agree more. Rental housing options in communities are a very important ingredient to growing a healthy, diverse and efficient community. The pandemic exacerbated the preexisting financial insecurity faced by many lower-income renters and essential workers. This comes at a time when property owners/managers are facing higher costs and labor shortages. The report suggests that the federal, state and local governments should construct policy that supports short and long-term stability for renters and owners and addresses the severe shortage of decent, attainable rental housing.

Research in this report included a literature and data review, 30 interviews, and 280 survey responses from renters, tenant advocates, public officials, housing affordability researchers, property owners, and developers. Critical points of general consensus include: strengthen public services, elevate housing quality, increase the housing supply, build trust, ensure good governance, and concentrated and focused efforts.

Those points are hard to argue and I don't have any trouble believing the findings. However, I would say that the devil lies in the details. The report provides several takeaways that could inform future policymaking. Ensuring that vulnerable tenants can fulfill their rent obligations and safeguarding housing quality and access in the future is key. A well-designed combination of "carrots" and "sticks" that improve housing quality and tenant living conditions is also important. Lastly, rebalancing eviction policy that can improve tenants' ability to exercise their rights is imperative. I always question whether government is the answer; however, this report is certainly a start to a needed conversation.

Gambling revenues down, but Atlantic City looks forward

ATLANTIC CITY, N.J. (AP) – Atlantic City's casinos are forging ahead with ambitious new projects in 2022, even as the coronavirus pandemic continues to make it harder to do business.

And non-casino projects involving family entertainment, education and the offshore wind industry will take flight in the new year.

But challenges lurk, as well.

In-person gambling revenue at seven of the nine casinos is down compared with 2019, before the pandemic hit. Sports betting and internet gambling revenue has filled some of the gap, but that money must be shared with third parties, including technology platforms and sports books, and is not solely for the casinos to keep.

A law passed signed by Gov. Phil Murphy in December gives the casinos some relief from big increases in payments they were due to pay to Atlantic City, Atlantic County and the schools system in lieu of property taxes.

A big unknown is how long and how seriously the COVID-19 pandemic, and particularly the fast-spreading omicron variant, will affect customers' willingness to come out and gamble in person in 2022.

And a big challenge is right around the corner when New York begins allowing people to bet on phones or other mobile devices anywhere in the state, as soon as January but almost certainly in time for the Super Bowl in February.

Gambling industry executives and analysts expect New Jersey to lose at least 20% of its sports betting volume as

New York residents who formerly had to cross over into New Jersey to bet will be able to do it at or close to home.

Mark Giannantonio, president of Resorts casino, said he is "tremendously optimistic for a great year" in 2022.

Starting in February, Resorts is renovating its rooftop pool, adding a retractable roof to enable it to be used year-round. Resorts also is investing \$5 million into new table games and slot machines, remodeling its highlimit slots area, and creating a new VIP Asian-themed room.

The Ocean Casino Resort plans to begin a \$75 million project in spring or summer to finish 12 floors of hotel rooms that were never completed when the casino first opened as Revel in 2012.

Caesars casino will start work in 2022 on a new theater and resident show due to open in the first quarter of 2023. The project will incorporate the facade of the former Warner Theatre from 1929, which is currently part of the casino's exterior facing the Boardwalk.

Also planned for Caesars in 2022 is a new restaurant opened by a hospitality company involving actor Robert De Niro that also will renovate hotel rooms there. Caesars Entertainment is partnering with Nobu Hospitality for a project to be called Nobu Hotel Atlantic City.

Bally's will unveil 750 renovated hotel rooms, a redone hotel lobby and bar, and an indoor-outdoor entertainment venue in 2022.

A \$100 million indoor water park to be built next to the former Showboat casino, which now operates as a nongambling hotel, plans a ground breaking for early 2022.

Atlantic City will host a three-day country music concert on the beach in August headlined by Luke Bryan and Morgan Wallen.

Construction is to begin in 2022 on a new ShopRite supermarket in Atlantic City, designed to end the city's status as a "food desert" without a major supermarket. The project should open in 2023.

Stockton University hopes to complete a new student residence hall in the city in 2022.

Atlantic City will play a big role in the burgeoning offshore wind energy industry. Atlantic Cape Community College plans to open a wind energy workforce training center on its city campus in the fall, and wind developer Orsted hopes to start work in 2022 on a maintenance and operations center in Atlantic City to support its offshore wind projects in the area.

And a plan that has gotten little attention outside of Atlantic City but which will affect most visitors to the city is due to begin in 2022.

The city plans to reduce Atlantic Avenue, one of its two main north-south thoroughfares, from two lanes in each direction to one lane in each direction, in the name of pedestrian safety.

But many residents and businesses oppose the plan, predicting that traffic that is already difficult to navigate under current conditions will become even worse with only one lane in each direction.

Oahu home sales soar; median price \$1M-plus

HONOLULU – The median sale price for a single-family home on Oahu was over \$1 million during the second half of 2021, a record high for Hawaii's most populous island.

In December, the median price was \$1,060,000, a 22% increase compared to 2020, Hawaii Public Radio reported. Condo prices were also up 7% to \$485,000.

Real estate firm Locations Hawaii's senior vice president and principal broker, **John Connelley**, said despite higher prices, more people were buying last year.

"When we take a look at the number of sales for singlefamily homes, they were up 18%," he said. "The number of sales for condos was up over 50%. And that doesn't include the new developments. That's just resales."

More than half of the singlefamily homes sold in December were purchased above the asking price. Because of a decline in inventory, Connelley does not see prices going down.

"With the interest rates remaining down around 3%, the demand still being very, very high, we expect these trends to continue in the foreseeable future," he said.

Kentucky frets over mill project investment

FRANKFORT, Ky. – Kentucky lawmakers signaled Wednesday that their patience is wearing thin with an aluminum company's long-stalled promise to build a massive plant backed by a state investment.

A bill that would set in motion efforts to recover the state's \$15 million investment in the project won initial approval from the Senate Appropriations and Revenue Committee.

Committee members said they still hope the plant gets built. But the legislation puts more pressure on Unity Aluminum, formerly known as Braidy Industries, to follow through on its five-year-old promise to build the aluminum rolling mill near Ashland in northeastern Kentucky.

"What we want is an aluminum mill, not \$15 million," said state Sen. **Chris McDaniel**, the committee chairman. "But our

confidence has been greatly eroded."

McDaniel, the bill's sponsor, said frustration with the project's long delays has "reached a boiling point." He said it's "time to begin to apply additional levels of pressure" on the company.

Company executives need to reach out to lawmakers and the public with updates on the project's status, especially for people in the Ashland area, McDaniel said.

Amid great fanfare, the company had announced plans to build the Appalachian plant, projecting it would create more than 1,000 constructions jobs, 550 full-time mill jobs and thousands of indirect jobs in a region in need of the jobs. The construction delay has increased the project's cost, with Unity's website indicating it's now expected to require \$2.2 billion, the Courier Journal reported.

US Steel plans \$3 billion mill in Arkansas

LITTLE ROCK, Ark. – United States Steel Corp. has announced it's building a \$3 billion mill in northeast Arkansas that's expected to employ at least 900 people.

The Pittsburgh-based company announced it has chosen Osceola for the site of its new mill, with construction expected to begin early this year and to be completed 2024. Osceola is about 50 miles north of Memphis, Tennessee.

"With this location selected and shovels ready, we are reshaping the future of steel-making," U.S. Steel President and CEO **David B. Burritt** said in a statement. "We had numerous competitive site options, but Osceola offers our customers incomparable advantages."

Arkansas lawmakers last month passed an incentive package aimed at helping lure the steel project to the state, including an income tax credit for recycling equipment for the facility.

The facility will be located near the existing Big River Steel plant, also owned by U.S. Steel. Another steel mill owned by Nucor Steel is also in the area.

"Arkansas has created an ideal business environment for the growth of the steel industry in our state," Gov. **Asa**

The east side of Reser Stadium was renovated before the 2005 season, adding additional seating and luxury boxes. Oregon State added a terrace area the following year on the north end zone, adjacent to the Valley Football Center.

The Beavers will continue to play at the stadium while construction continues.

Steelmaker Nucor to build \$2.7B plant

CHARLESTON, W.Va. – A North Carolina steelmaker will build

a \$2.7 billion mill in West Virginia, creating an estimated 800 manufacturing jobs, Gov. **Jim Justice** announced Wednesday.

The Republican governor called the location of Nucor Corp.'s plant in Mason County the largest investment in the state's history.

"Nucor's

brand new facility is going to be a key part of West Virginia's DNA long into the future," Justice said in a statement. "It's going to change lives by bringing hundreds of great-paying jobs to Mason County, and the economic ripple effects will bring even more goodness to our state."

Lawmakers completed legislation at Justice's request Tuesday to offer the company an undisclosed tax incentive. Justice had said the incentive was based upon "very significant investment and employment thresholds."

Charlotte-based Nucor recycles scrap metal in electric arc furnaces to produce steel. Construction of the facility will start this year and is expected

to be finished by 2024. It's anticipated to create an additional 1,000 construction jobs.

"This is a transformational project that will have a significant economic impact in Mason County and surrounding areas," Nucor President and CEO **Leon Topalian** said.

The mill will have the capacity to produce up to 3 million tons of sheet steel per year. The company also said it is considering building a transloading and processing center in the northern part of the state. Nucor employs 28,000 at 300 facilities located mostly in North America.

West Virginia's steel industry has gone through decades of declines.

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Old Florida Keys bridge reopens to pedestrians, bicyclists


MARATHON, Fla. (AP) - A segment of a 110-year-old Florida Keys bridge reopened to pedestrians and bicyclists on Wednesday following a \$44 million restoration project.

Rehabilitation construction on the oftphotographed 2.2-mile span of the Old Seven Mile Bridge began in late 2017.

"What made the project challenging was that it is a historic bridge, and we had to restore the bridge to the same aesthetic fabric as the original," said project manager Tony Sabbag, a Florida Department of Transportation contractor.

Nicknamed "Old Seven," the bridge was completed in 1912 as part of Henry Flagler's Florida Keys Over-Sea Railroad that connected the Keys with each other and mainland Florida. The span is the gateway to historic Pigeon Key, a tiny island beneath it that once housed 400 railroad construction workers.

In 1938, the railroad bridge was converted to carry automobiles. In 1982, the

new Seven Mile Bridge, actually 6.79 miles whose steel swing span that facilitated long, debuted alongside the historic one, marine traffic between the Atlantic Ocean

and Gulf of Mexico was removed.

The retired "Old Seven" became a popular recreation area and appeared in several films including True Lies, a 1994 action-comedy starring Arnold Schwarzenegger and Jamie Lee Curtis.

Wednesday's ribbon-cutting ceremony was the crowning moment of a 30-year, \$77 million agreement inked in 2013 between Monroe County, the city of Marathon and the Florida Department of Transportation. That agreement funded restoration and maintenance to preserve the iconic landmark listed on the National Register of Historic Places.

'The Old Seven Mile Bridge is important to the Keys, the history of the Keys and a viaduct to get to Pigeon Key," said Monroe County Administrator Roman Gastesi.

Restoration included structural steel and bridge joint system repairs, new decking, pedestrian and bicycle handrails and other enhancements.


Newly affirmed, tribe looks at casino plans with fresh eyes

BOSTON (AP) - As he begins his first full year in office, the new head of a Massachusetts tribe says he intends to take a cautious approach to gambling while turning attention to social challenges and other economic opportunities for its members.

Mashpee Wampanoag Tribe Chairman Brian Weeden, who is 29 and is the youngest ever to hold the post, said last month's decision by President Joe Biden's administration to affirm the tribe's reservation and reverse a controversial Trump-era order gives the tribe legal footing to continue pursuing its long standing casino dreams.

But he said tribal leaders also want members to look at the idea with fresh eyes, given how much the landscape for gambling has changed.

Massachusetts currently has three major casinos - MGM Springfield, Encore Boston Harbor and the slot parlor Plainridge Park. The separate Aquinnah Wampanoag tribe has also broken ground on a more modest gambling hall on Martha's Vineyard, though that's been mired in legal uncertainty. And

state lawmakers are weighing legislation to legalize sports betting in Massachusetts.

"We're back to the drawing board, basically," said Weeden, who took office in May, in a wide-ranging interview Thursday. "There's still an appetite for gaming. It just needs to be a smart approach. It has to be different from the past. We need to learn from our mistakes and proceed with caution."

Meanwhile, anti-casino residents in Taunton, the city where the Mashpee Wampanoag project is proposed, have asked a Boston federal judge to reopen their legal challenge.

They argue, as they have before, that the tribe wasn't eligible for a reservation because it wasn't an officially recognized tribe in 1934, the year the federal Indian Reorganization Act, which laid the foundation for modern federal Indian policy, became law.

The opponents have also argued the tribe's lands in Taunton shouldn't have been included in its reservation because they're some 50 miles from the tribe's home base on Cape Cod and weren't part of the tribe's historical domain. The tribe's reservation encompasses about 170 acres in the town of Mashpee and another 150 acres in

US average long-term mortgage rates jump; 30-year now 3.45%

SILVER SPRING, Md. - Average long-term U.S. mortgage rates jumped again this past week, reaching their highest level since March 2020, just as the coronavirus pandemic was breaking in the U.S.

Mortgage buyer Freddie Mac reported Thursday that the average rate on the benchmark 30-year home loan rose to 3.45% this week from 3.22% last week. It was at 3.5% in late March of 2020 when the pandemic was just starting. A year ago, the 30-year rate stood at 2.79%.

The average rate on 15-year, fixed-rate mortgages, popular among those refinancing their homes, rose to 2.62% from 2.43% last

"This was driven by the prospect of a faster than expected tightening of monetary policy in response to continued inflation exacerbated by uncertainty in labor and supply chains," said Sam Khater, Freddie Mac's chief economist. "The rise in mortgage rates

so far this year has not yet affected purchase demand, but given the fast pace of home price growth, it will likely dampen demand in the near future."

Available housing has been in short supply since long before the pandemic started, and prices have risen close to 20% in the past year. Higher mortgage rates could make it even

harder for homebuyers to secure a new home. Mortgage rates have been expected to rise this year after the Federal Reserve announced last month that it would begin dialing back its monthly bond purchases - which are intended to lower long-term rates - to slow accelerating inflation. But even with the expected

three or four rate increases in 2022, the Fed's benchmark rate would still be historically low at around 1%. On Wednesday, the government reported that inflation spiked to 7% in December from

a year earlier, the sharpest such increase in four decades. Earlier Thursday, the Labor Department reported that prices at the wholesale level surged by a record 9.7% in December from a year earlier.

In addition to surging inflation, experts expect robust economic growth and the tight labor market to continue to push rates higher.

Although U.S. jobless claims climbed by 23,000 last week to 230,000, it's still low by historic standards and the highly contagious omicron variant doesn't appear to have triggered layoffs yet.

As South Florida condos age, more owners willing to sell

FORT LAUDERDALE, Fla. (AP) – For some South Florida condo dwellers, that tap on the shoulder could lead to the deal of a lifetime.

The tri-county's white hot real estate market is prompting developers to take stock of the region's older beachfront high-rises as potential buyout candidates for redevelopment. While not new, the trend has taken on greater importance as vacant land disappears and more out-of-state residents move to South Florida in search of luxury digs.

Owners who would not have given a thought to selling previously are now taking the idea of moving seriously when confronted with lofty buyout offers, industry analysts and attorneys say.

- In Pompano Beach, The Related Group recently bought out the owners of all 46 low-rise units at the Beach Villa at 900 N. Ocean Dr. The complex was built in 1978. The company recently won city approval to rezone the property so it can build a 21-story luxury tower in the Beach Villa's place.
- In Miami Beach, owners of the Castle Beach Club, a circa-1966 17-story highrise on Collins Avenue, received so many unsolicited offers from various unidentified suitors that they hired Colliers, the real estate services firm, to sort through them
- In Sunny Isles Beach, Related Group and Dezer Development are celebrating a sellout of their sleek new 55-floor Armani/Casa luxury tower. The project, which broke ground in 2016, came after the developers took over a site that was home to the decades-old Seashore Club, a low-rise complex of 170 units, which they bought out.

Although the latter deal was roughly five years ago, it's emblematic of how new upscale condo projects are increasingly displacing long-standing residential sites whose early years are distant memories.

"It does seem to be a growing trend," said Gerard Yetming, executive managing director of Colliers, the real estate services company. "Really there are very few opportunities to build a new high-rise somewhere as desirable as on the beach."

How it works

Yetming said the obvious attraction for owners selling their older units is the premium prices developers are willing to pay for them.

"They begin to realize this is something we should explore in an organized fashion," Yetming said. "It is only with the right collective goals and an adviser where you can get something done."

He said there are a lot of buyout initiatives you don't hear about. Many fail, he said, amid bidding wars or internal disagreements over whether a sale should occur in the first place. It always takes a consensus among the unit owners to move forward, he said.

"These are more the exceptions than the rule," he said of the successful buyouts.

"This is not for every building," Yetming added. "There are a lot of buildings that were well built and well located and well run that are probably not good candidates. There needs to be a very specific set of circumstances for these deals to work."

Once an older building is acquired, the time from sale to the construction of a new project runs from 18 to 24 months,

said Eric Fordin, managing director of Related's condo division.

"After the buyout happens it takes anywhere from 6 to 9 months to obtain site plan approval," he said. "Then, the sales and marketing process varies per market but generally takes 6 to 9 months as well. From the time we release construction documents to obtaining a permit generally takes 12 months as well."

The Chaplain Towers factor

Some sales drivers include the rising cost of maintenance for the buildings.

For years, members of many condo associations have deferred repair projects because of their expense. A potential consequence of deferred maintenance came into sharp relief after the terrifying collapse of the Champlain Towers in Surfside, which took 98 lives.

The disaster caused a major ripple effect of concern among residences of other older buildings along the Gold Coast.

"The Champlain Towers incident really, really is pushing this trend," said Joseph Hernandez, partner and chair of the real estate practice group at the Weiss Serota Helfman Cole & Bierman law firm in Coral Gables

"The trend's been going for some time," he said. "I've been doing these transactions for 10 years. The trend really started because we're getting into the period where condos developed in the '70s or '80s are becoming functionally obsolete."

"Now people are much more in tune to the issue," Hernandez said. "They're focused on trying to band together and sell their property in a way they weren't before."

He added that he's seen "probably a two- to threefold interest in these transactions in the past year since Champlain Towers" "Normally I work on a couple of these transactions" each year, he said. "I'm working on seven or eight major transactions right now."

Prime prices for prime properties

Still, it's bottom-line economics that decides whether a deal will materialize, asserted Yetming of Colliers.

"The only time this makes sense is when the value of the underlying land is significantly more than what the collective units are currently selling for," Yetming said. "Why else would somebody want to sell their property unless they can make a significant profit?"

Jamie Sturgis, founder and CEO of Native Realty Co. in Fort Lauderdale, said "all-time records" are being paid for multi-family buildings as new residents arrive in South Florida from out-of-town and out-of-country.

"I would say the vast majority of the sites being targeted are on the beach, in light of what happened in Surfside," he said.

Many owners are snowbirds who see this as "an opportune time ... to cash out at the top of the market and avoid having to pay these special assessments" for heavy repair projects in older buildings.

Nick Perez, a vice president at The Related Group, said the Beach Villa owners in Pompano sold after realizing they could double or even triple their money against their original purchase prices.

"Ultimately it was the price they were getting for their units," Perez said. "I would say they were getting well above their market price for their units. No one has to sell. Luckily, I was the only one trying to acquire all of the units and I didn't have a bidding war."

He said he met with 26 or 27 of the 46 owners.

"There was a little bit of hand holding," Perez said. "They didn't want to leave the beach."

Some wondered where they would live next. Related is allowing the sellers to stay through the end of winter season.

"The ultimate deciding factor was if they were to sell to another end user versus the offer I was proposing, they would have gotten a substantially less amount of money," he said.

Perez did not provide any sales figures. But sales data unearthed by Zillow, the national online real estate research and investment firm, found some owners received up to \$800,000 for their 302-square-foot, one-bath, one-bedroom units with market values just below \$200,000.

It's not hard to understand the attraction for Related. The 3.07-acre complex of one- and two-story buildings is located right on the beach between the Atlantic Ocean and State Road A1A. The property offers significant green space and a community pool in the back.

In its place: Related is planning a 21-story, mixed-use luxury condominium tower with 119 condo units and approximately 2,200 square feet of commercial space, according to a filing with the City of Pompano Beach.

A short distance to the north, Related is building another luxury high-rise called the Solemar, which the company says is 99% sold.

The swift sellout, the company says, is an example of the white-hot demand for beachfront property.

"There are really no true vacant lots that are ripe for development located right on the sand," Perez said. Forty-yearold low-rises are the next best thing.

in a 22,000-square-foot facility in Edmond. Taylor said no one has tested positive for COVID-19 so far but the pandemic has affected delivery of completed trailers.

With customers in 17 states – soon to be 21 – locations experiencing an extended school closure can delay delivery. At one point, Clubhouse Trailers had 12 finished trailers on site that couldn't be delivered, Taylor said.

The Associated Press reports shortages at U.S. grocery stores have grown more acute in recent weeks as new problems – like the fast-spreading omicron variant and severe weather – have piled on to the supply

chain struggles and labor shortages that have plagued retailers since the coronavirus pandemic began.

Part of the scarcity consumers are seeing on store shelves is due to the pandemic trend of Americans eating at home more than they used to, which is exacerbated by omicron.

A deficit of truck drivers that started building before the pandemic also remains a problem. The American Trucking Associations said in October that the U.S. was short an estimated 80,000 drivers, a historic high.

The current COVID surge in Oklahoma is affecting a variety of businesses, schools and hospitals.

A downtown Edmond diner had customers at only one table at lunch-

time Thursday. The server expressed concern about another possible shutdown.

By Thursday afternoon, hundreds of school districts across Oklahoma had announced closures or a move to online learning because they don't have enough teachers, bus drivers, cafeteria workers and other staff to keep the doors open.

The number of patients with COVID-19 in Oklahoma hospitals jumped from 1,288 Wednesday to 1,361 Thursday, according the OSDH. Of those, 302 were in intensive care units

The growing number is stressing hospital resources and staffing, said Dr. Dale Bratzler, OU Health chief quality officer.

Many people go to the hospital for reasons other than severe COVID infection and test positive once they are there, he said.

"They have to be isolated. We have to protect our other patients and we have to protect our workers," Bratzler said. "Even if they're not here for CO-VID they still take a lot of resources to take care of them when they test positive"

Hospital administrators are urging people who are eligible for a booster vaccine to get it.

The Commonwealth Fund released a study this week that estimates doubling the number of Americans who have received the booster could prevent 41,000 deaths and 400,000 infections by May.

them. The administration nonetheless still views the rule as a success at already driving millions of people to get vaccinated and for private businesses to implement their own requirements that are unaffected by the legal challenge.

Both rules had been challenged by Republican-led states. In addition, business groups attacked the OSHA emergency regulation as too expensive and likely to cause workers to leave their jobs at a time when finding new employees already is difficult.

"The State of Oklahoma is pleased the Supreme Court ruled in favor of the states challenging the OSHA vaccine mandate on private businesses," Oklahoma Attorney General John O'Connor said. "Now, individuals who work in the private sector can make healthcare decisions for themselves and their families – as it should be. This is a major win for job creators and their employees,"

O'Connor expressed dismay that the Court allowed Biden administration's vaccine mandate for health care workers to stand.

"The State of Oklahoma is already suffering from healthcare staffing shortages and the CMS vaccine mandate will only make matters worse, especially in rural Oklahoma," he said.

The vaccine mandate that the court will allow to be enforced nationwide scraped by on a 5-4 vote, with Chief Justice John Roberts and Justice Brett Kavanaugh joining the liberals to form a majority. The mandate covers virtually all health care workers in the coun-

try, applying to providers that receive federal Medicare or Medicaid funding. It potentially affects 76,000 health care facilities as well as home health care providers. The rule has medical and religious exemptions.

The challenges posed by a global pandemic do not allow a federal agency to exercise power that Congress has not conferred upon it. At the same time, such unprecedented circumstances provide no grounds for limiting the exercise of authorities the agency has long been recognized to have," the court wrote in an unsigned opinion, saying the "latter principle governs" in the healthcare cases.

Justice Clarence Thomas wrote in dissent that the case was about whether the administration has the authority "to force healthcare workers, by coercing

their employers, to undergo a medical procedure they do not want and cannot undo." He said the administration hadn't shown convincingly that Congress gave it that authority.

Justices Samuel Alito, Neil Gorsuch and Amy Coney Barrett signed onto Thomas' opinion. Alito wrote a separate dissent that the other three conservatives also joined.

A separate vaccine mandate for federal contractors, on hold after lower courts blocked it, has not been considered by the Supreme Court.

More than 208 million Americans, 62.7% of the population, are fully vaccinated, and more than a third of those have received booster shots, according to the federal Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. All nine justices have gotten booster shots.

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
